Principal & Director Reports October 2009

AC. Houghton Elementary New Leadership Activities at ACH

We are starting two new special-purpose teams in our third grade to teach kids leadership activities and responsibilities this year. With the loss of the fourth grade to IES, we are not doing our past traditional Student Body officers and Student Council. These two groups are the following:

Recycle Team

Student Council had the previous responsibilities of collecting the white paper recycling from each classroom that we collect each week. The paper collection boxes have recycle signs on them in each of the classrooms in our building. The members participating will wear special buttons, showing them as part of the team. They will circulate through the school on Thursday mornings emptying and consolidating the classroom collection boxes. Once a week, on a regular trip to Hermiston, we recycle the white paper at the Sanitary Disposal transfer station. When up to full speed typically we will recycle about the equivalent of 2-3 cases of paper a week that otherwise would be thrown into our dumpster.

Playground Assist Team

The Playground Assist Team will put three third graders a.m. and p.m. on the kindergarten-second grade playground. These students will be on three separate areas on the playground, the blacktop area, the red top area, and the grass field area. Their purpose will be to play with other kids, help students start activities where possible, and talk to kids who are not making productive choices about what might be better choices. We are training our team members not to intervene like little boxes, but to ask key questions as to whether the current activities or choices being made are helpful or not helpful to the kids on the playground or to themselves.

Our enrollment numbers are up this year as we currently have 197 students enrolled at HES and our attendance percentage for the month of September was 97.05%. The HES Staff and I enjoyed our open house the night of Tuesday, September 22nd 2009. Based on the smiles of our students and parents during the evening, I would say it was a huge success. The HES Student Council elections were held on Thursday, October 1st and I am happy to report that all of the HES students who were running for office ran clean campaigns and gave outstanding speeches. I am also pleased to report that with the continued help and support of Adopt-a-Teacher we are able to continue the HEROES Reading program at HES again this year. We are also currently in the process of a canned food drive to help the Heppner Neighborhood Center, stay tuned for an update on how many pounds of food we collect.

- ➤ We have started our PLC/Data team meetings. Our first order of business was to find the weeds in the classrooms that impede student achievement. We will work on improvement of instruction through focusing our efforts on instruction while using data to help make decisions of change.
- ➤ Homecoming week came and went. It was a fun week for all of our students and both our football and volleyball teams won their games. Our students competed hard and participated at a record level. There were no losers- for our school is full of spirit and camaraderie.
- ➤ Our AP numbers are as follows- AP Calculus, 11, AP Biology, 17, AP Government, 20 and AP English Literature, 32. We are not offering AP Chemistry this year.

- ➤ Forrest Service Career Camp applications have been collected and the planning has begun. Heppner High School turned in 14 applications this year and interviews are planned for this week. Hopefully, we can fill the camp this year and our senior participants learn some valuable lessons through this process. Irrigon Elementary School

- 1. **H1N1 Flu Preparations**: Here at IES we have had the ESD put the flu preparations from many areas into our school web site. Now parents can see the things we want them to know in case we have an outbreak of the flu which is going around. As of yet, we have been keeping very clean and safe to prevent major sickness. Our attendance is good and we hope to stay that way. For now we are washing hands, disinfecting, and sending kids home who feel sick.
- 2. **Volunteers at IES**: This year I want to thank the Ed Karls who is in his fourth year of volunteering his time at IES. He served his country for 30 years in the U.S. Marine Corps, and now he still serves his country at Irrigon Elementary. He reads with students who need help, and he does math with students who are struggling. He helps out in recess duty and with the After School program. Both he and his wife Pat, who volunteers at ACH, are great people in our schools at Irrigon.
- 3. **First Fund Raiser at IES**: On September 8th, we held our first fund raising assembly. The children raised about \$3500 for their first try. This will help us in field trips, special educational needs and incentives in writing contests and in AR reading awards. We hope to raise more for end of the year trips which will cost much more. The economic times have shown some difficulty in this endeavor.
- 4. **IES Open House**: We had over 75 parents show up to our Open House on the 10th of September. Invited to this event were: Irrigon PTO, Oregon State Nutrition program, CSEEP, Army Depot, Irrigon Volley Ball league, Morrow County Health Dept., and Irrigon ASB. Parents met teachers, visited rooms, mingled and had a nice dinner fundraiser by the PTO. It was a success for parent/community involvement.
- 5. **After School Program**: on September 14th we started our After School program with 5 staff persons helping. We have about 45 children who must attend or who want to attend. Here we are concentrating on Writing and Math. Kids who did not meet a benchmark test last year must attend. A serious focus of staff, curriculum and time is given to help children meet benchmark scores this year.
- 6. **Come Visit Our School**: I extend a warm invitation to school board members to come visit our school. Lunch is on me, and you can see the good things happening at IES. We love kids, work hard, and like what we do. It would be an honor to have you visit and see your decisions in the life of Irrigon Elementary School.

Irrigon High School

Our open house was held on September 14th. The evening started with a brief description regarding the direction we are headed as a school with our Be Responsible, Be Respectful, and Be Safe program. Afterwards, we had a series of parent meetings regarding our ELL program, GEAR-UP, Extended Options, Knights Pride Booster Club, a Bruce Brown video about the role of the parent in athletics, and a senior parent meeting where we distributed senior handbooks designed to help them navigate their last year. Students spent the afternoon writing a reflection paper, thank you notes, and enjoying a presentation by Blue Mountain Wildlife. A special thanks to Ms. Constantine of our Gear-Up team who spearheaded the project for us. Other projects include a college fair in Hermiston this month and school wide college visitations in November.

Shaindel Beers, a BMCC English Teacher, will be here to visit with our students on Wednesday, Oct. 7th. She will be speaking to two different classes in the afternoon and then will meet with anyone who is interested at 3:00 in the library. Ms. Beers' will read from her recently published book of poetry, *A Brief History of Time*, which came out this summer and has been well received by critics.

We held our first staff in-service last Friday. Amy Ditton spent the morning discussing with our staff the concept of peer coaching and how it might look in our school. This was right in line with what we have been encouraging staff to do in terms of getting out and observing each other. We hope to utilize much of what she presented as we prepare for our next Friday in-service regarding PLC groups. Matt followed up in the afternoon reviewing student behavior and deescalation strategies.

Our leadership class is taking on a new project this year. Their endeavor is entitled 'Knightly News' which is a news video of our daily announcements, but also includes weather updates and interviews. The show airs every Thursday during advisory. This production is enormously popular with students and staff glued to the televisions for the 5-7 minute broadcasts.

We are currently in the middle of our Homecoming festivities this week. Some of the activities this year include a car push, macho volleyball, car bash, noise parade, powder puff football, and bonfire. The king and queen will be crowned at halftime of the football game on Friday. The dance will be held on Saturday.

FOREST SERVICE


