

Dixon High School 2025-2026 Schedule

With the addition of 30 minutes into our day beginning in the 2025-2026 school year, Dixon High School will use the following schedule as our 'Regular Day' bell schedule. In addition, we will be creating 'Alternate Day' schedules (S.I.P., Late Start, Early Release, Assembly, Etc...) for those specific occasions. School will continue to start at 7:45 and will now end at 2:45. Attendance at school all day, including our last hour 'Advisory' period is mandatory for all students. Students who currently have outside of school commitments beginning after our current 2:15 release, should plan now for those to be scheduled after our 2:45 release beginning in the fall.

The additional 30 minutes will be divided between class periods (additional 3 minutes per period, per day compared to the current schedule) and our new 'Advisory Period', which will replace our current E.L.T.

The additional class time will provide our students with 4.5 additional hours of instruction per semester, which equals six 'extra' instructional days per semester.

Our 'Advisory Period' will be a time in which students will take part in additional math and reading instruction and intervention, prepare for the ACT test (Horizon Education), complete college and career readiness activities, and have the opportunity to work with teachers in classes in which they may need additional time, have missing work, need to complete test re-takes, etc.

Our end of the day Advisory Period will also create flexibility in students who leave early for athletic and extracurricular activities, and will not require them to miss instructional class time as often.
