

Dear Corrina:

As President of the National Association of Federally Impacted Schools (NAFIS), I am writing to encourage you to renew your NAFIS membership for the 2018-2019 membership year. NAFIS dues are a priority for my school district, and I hope they are for yours as well.

Suffice it to say, this past membership year has been an interesting one for Impact Aid, proving the importance of our collective voices supported by a national membership organization. We started the year focused on infrastructure with the release of the NAFIS report, Foundations for Learning: The Facilities Needs of Federally Impacted Schools. We are ending it focused on defeating legislation that would re-purpose Impact Aid into a private school voucher. In between, we secured an increase in Impact Aid funding.

Together we successfully advocated for a sizeable increase for FY18 Impact Aid funding—the third year in a row Impact Aid received an increase. After we departed the NAFIS Spring Conference, Congress appropriated \$81 million for Basic Support and \$4.5 million for Federal Properties above FY17 funding levels. The increase in Basic Support helps alleviate the downward pressure on the LOT payout, and the Federal Properties increase will ensure resources are allocated to all schools based on the new formula.

Throughout the year, the NAFIS Family has opposed the most significant attack on the Impact Aid program in recent memory. Legislation is moving through Congress that would re-purpose Impact Aid into a private school voucher for some military connected students. This legislation fundamentally ignores and undermines the Federal government's responsibility to provide funds to school districts whose ability to generate local revenue is limited by the presence of nontaxable Federal property. NAFIS has led the efforts to defeat this legislation, working closely with numerous education and military serving organizations, the NAFIS subgroups, and congressional champions. This voucher proposal will follow us into the next membership year.

More than 200 NAFIS members responded to a NAFIS survey on the infrastructure needs of federally impacted school districts. We learned that their most pressing construction needs total more than \$4.2 billion in projects. NAFIS shared this information with Congress and the Administration, positioning Impact Aid construction as an issue if an infrastructure bill should gain momentum.

Throughout these successes and challenges, I am most proud of the NAFIS Family. Collectively, whether our school districts are military connected, educate students living on Indian Lands, are 100 percent LOT or Low LOT, or are impacted by federal properties, we have banded together.

I am also thankful that we have the NAFIS organization with the NAFIS staff leading the way. We are fortunate to have a strong team of professionals advocating for Impact Aid on a daily basis and mobilizing the NAFIS Family at the appropriate moments.

During the year, NAFIS hosted two national conferences and the Federal Relations Outreach (FRO) meeting. NAFIS worked throughout the year with national and local media to promote the Impact Aid message, including placing op-eds. The Faces of Impact Aid campaign has become an integral vehicle in telling the Impact Aid story. In addition to keeping up to date with the latest Impact Aid information through the highly valued weekly NAFIS News and bi-monthly IMPACT newsletters, I hope you have had a chance to participate in one of NAFIS' many webinars this year. No other organization provides its members with quality information about Impact Aid as timely as NAFIS.

NAFIS also maintained its presence through leadership positions with national coalitions, including the Committee for Education Funding, the Organizations Concerned about Rural Education, the National Coalition for Technology in Education and Training, and Rebuild America's Schools. NAFIS exhibited at the AASA: The School Superintendents Association's national conference, and NAFIS staff regularly work with leading organizations representing military and Native American students. These partnerships ensure the Impact Aid message is delivered to a wide audience of stakeholders.

NAFIS staff work for your district every day, attending meetings on Capitol Hill and responding to member requests for assistance. These requests range from Impact Aid funding estimates for individual school districts to help connecting with Federal officials.

As we look to the upcoming membership year, Impact Aid vouchers will still be on the docket, and defending Impact Aid will continue to be a priority, as will increasing its funding. There is also an election on the horizon, which means there will be new members of Congress to educate about Impact Aid. The last thing you should do is let your NAFIS membership lapse.

Just as running a school district requires funding, so does running NAFIS. The NAFIS dues rate has not increased for close to 20 years. We cannot continue to advocate effectively for federally impacted school districts without your continued engagement and support. Please mail your NAFIS membership renewal today. Determination of NAFIS Dues for the 2018-2019 Membership Year Section 7003 dues are based on FY 2016 Impact Aid payment Section 7002 dues are based on FY 2016 Impact Aid payment

 Membership dues are based upon a calculation that multiplies 0.0014 by the Impact Aid payment (Basic Support; Disability; Federal Property) that a school district received for the most recent fiscal year for which final payments have been made or \$350, whichever is greater.

Example: Total Impact Aid payment is \$1,000,000 x 0.0014 = \$1,400 dues payment

2. For any amount a school district receives exceeding \$7 million, the dues for receipts above \$7 million will be calculated at one-hundredth of one percent (0.0001 of 1%).

Example: Total Impact Aid payment received is \$10,000,000

Step 1 - $$7,000,000 \times 0.0014 = $9,800$

Step 2 - $\$3,000,000 \times 0.0001 = \$ 300$

Total Amount of dues \$10,100

Districts in equalized states will have only those Impact Aid funds exempt from State equalization counted toward their membership calculation.

Applies only to New Mexico, Alaska and Kansas.
