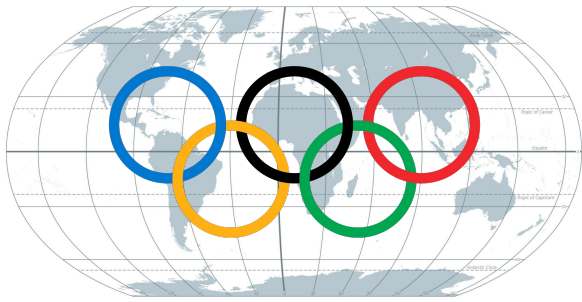

**RESOLUTION SUPPORTING USE OF COOPERATIVE FACILITIES LEVY TO
PURSUE STATE MATCHING DOLLARS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF NEW
NORTHERN LIGHTS ACADEMY FACILITY**

WHEREAS, the School District is a member of the Northern Lights Special Education Cooperative (“NLSEC”);

WHEREAS, NLSEC leadership is currently working to secure funding for a planned Northern Lights Academy (“NLA”) facility that will serve students with significant needs that cannot be met in the traditional school setting;

WHEREAS, NLA currently operates out of two old buildings which are located five miles apart and were not designed to serve students with significant needs;

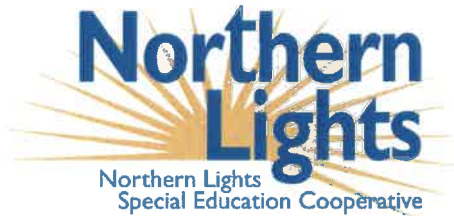
WHEREAS, there is insufficient funding available to construct the proposed NLA facility without assistance from the State of Minnesota;

WHEREAS, the School District is willing to consider exercising its authority to levy for lease costs pursuant to Minnesota Statutes section 126C.40, subdivision 1(h) if necessary to enable NLSEC to pursue any financial assistance from the State of Minnesota.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of Independent School District No. 94 as follows:

1. The School Board is open to exercising its lease levy authority under Minnesota Statutes section 126C.40, subdivision 1(h) in an amount not to exceed \$65 times the adjusted pupil units of the District if necessary to assist with pursuing State funding for the construction of the new proposed NLA facility.
2. This Resolution is intended only to be an expression of the School Board’s willingness to consider using its lease levy authority under Minnesota Statutes section 126C.40, subdivision 1(h) to assist with the construction of the proposed NLA facility to the extent such a commitment will be helpful in securing any State funding.
3. Nothing in this Resolution shall be construed as a final decision on the School Board’s use of its lease levy authority. The School Board reserves the right to reconsider its position on the potential use of its lease levy authority under Minnesota Statutes section 126C.40, subdivision 1(h).

- Assist Cooperative districts to maximize reimbursement of MA funds for health related IEP services.
- Process and monitor all district medical assistance claims.
- Provide superintendents and business managers with quarterly medical assistance revenue statements.
- Monitor consent forms and obtain private insurance denials, process third party.
- Train special education staff on the medical assistance billing process.

Interagency Planning and Implementation

- Coordinate interagency planning and implementation efforts with the twelve districts and five counties within the Special Education Cooperative.
- Participate with Interagency Council members to train disability stakeholders on the interagency planning process.

Other Services

- Assist Cooperative districts with the hiring of special education staff.
- Prepare and present reports to school boards as requested by Cooperative superintendents.
- Type and process vacancy notices and advertise for vacant positions.
- Assist districts with application to PELSB for unlicensed special education teachers.
- Assist districts to comply with statute provisions as related to special education.
- Prepare special education workload studies and staff recommendations upon request from districts.

REIMAGINE THE POSSIBILITIES

A Comprehensive Facilities Proposal to Impact Special Education Students Served by Northern Lights Academy and Northern Lights Special Education Cooperative



WHAT IS NORTHERN LIGHTS ACADEMY (NLA)?

NLA is a cooperative public school district operated through a joint powers agreement between 12 member districts of Northern Lights Special Education Cooperative (NLSEC) that operates in two facilities – one in Cloquet and one in Carlton.

WHAT IS THE NORTHERN LIGHTS SPECIAL EDUCATION COOPERATIVE (NLSEC)?

The NLSEC has a total of 29 Special Education staff, including administrative, coordinators, low-incidence teachers, and therapists. These staff members provide various services that are too costly for member districts to provide on their own.

WHAT SERVICES DO WE PROVIDE?

- **Setting 4:** Our two sites serve students in grades K-12 that require Setting 4 Special Education services. These students have severe-profound disability needs that are best served outside of a traditional K-12 school building. Students requiring these intensive services have exceeded their serving/resident district's capacity due to significant verbal or physical aggression and lagging skills. NLA's primary goal is to teach students the skills they need to successfully transition them back to their serving/resident district. The current capacity is approximately 50 students across both facilities.



WHAT SERVICES ARE STILL NEEDED?

- **Day Treatment:** Within our 12 districts, an additional option is needed for students who need Day Treatment services for those who require daily, intensive mental health services. Unfortunately, there is no space in either location to add these services.
- **Preschool**
- **Transition services for 18-22-year olds**



WHERE ARE WE PROVIDING THESE SERVICES?

- Approximately 4,300 square feet in the lower level of Cloquet Schools' Garfield Building provides two classrooms that serve students in grades K-5 with emotional and behavioral disorders and other disabilities.
- Approximately 4,200 square feet in Carlton High School provides two classrooms that serve students in grades 3-12 with emotional and behavioral disorders and two classrooms that serve students in grades 3-12 with autism.
- Approximately 5,400 square feet in the Esko Education Center Building provides offices and workspace for 29 NLSEC staff members.

receive Special Education services across our member districts. NLA is available to any students who are unable to be successful in their serving/resident district. However, enrollment capacity is limited by our current facilities.

WHY IS THE NLA/NLSEC FACILITY PROJECT NECESSARY?

- NLA cannot offer Day Treatment services for our member districts due to a lack of space.
- In a typical school year, all grade levels are at maximum capacity and have an active wait list. There is not enough space to add classrooms to serve additional students.
- Providing these services in a single facility would be the most effective option to 1) increase collaboration among staff and 2) eliminate frequent travel between our current sites.
- Member districts express a desire for students to receive local assistance instead of traveling to other districts where most have wait lists up to one year.
- Member districts have other Setting 4 programming needs such as preschool, Developmental Coordination Disorder (DCD), and transitional services for 18-22-year olds that cannot be provided due to a lack of space.
- Rural cooperative students with special needs deserve quality educational spaces. Beyond the classroom, there is a lack of greenspace, playgrounds, and additional spaces that best support students.
- Before NLA, the only learning option for students with needs was homeschool. Students are still learning at home due to a lack of space.

HOW HAS THE NLA REACHED THIS POINT?

Working cooperatively with our member districts to provide Special Education services is the most effective, efficient, and cost-effective way to provide quality programming.

Currently, the team is solutioning whether building a new facility or renovating an existing facility is the best option for NLA, NLSEC, and our member districts.

The NLA is working with an experienced project team to determine physical facility needs, identify potential funding options, and prioritize potential solutions to meet our most critical facility needs. Our team includes ICS (a K-12 planning and construction firm), Wold Architects and Engineers (a K-12 architecture and engineering firm), and Ehlers (a K-12 financial advisor).

In May 2021, the ICS team conducted listening sessions with all stakeholders to identify how our existing facility challenges impact education. Stakeholders included NLA students, parents, staff, administration, school board members, and the NLSEC staff.

OUR ASK: HELP FROM THE STATE

Our member school districts understand our need and are unified to turn our vision into a reality. However, there are very limited funding options to build cooperative facilities under current legislation.

HF 568 and SF 113 are asking for approximately \$6 million in state bonding assistance to pay for half of our project. This ultimately reduces the financial burden on our member districts.

We appreciate the state's consideration of our funding request that ultimately will positively impact students, staff, and our communities as a whole.

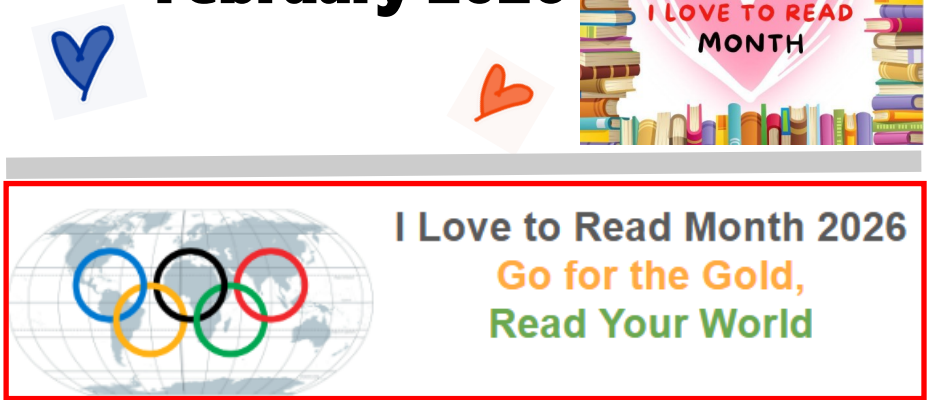

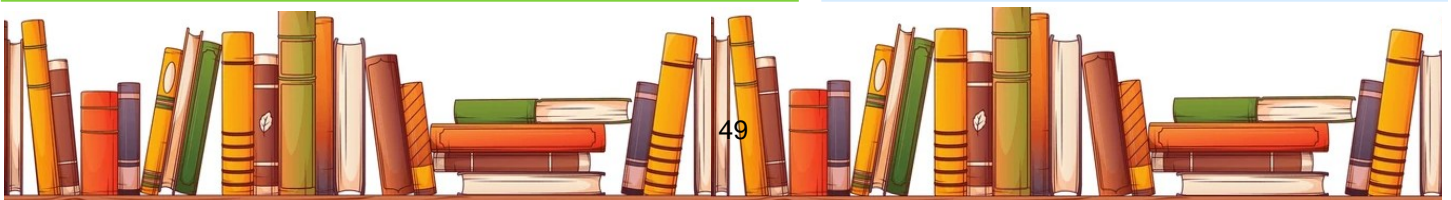

**Cloquet High School to Receive National Recognition from
Special Olympics for Achievements with Inclusion**

Cloquet, MN, January 26, 2026 – Special Olympics Minnesota has announced that Cloquet High School, a Special Olympics Unified Champion School®, is receiving national banner recognition for its efforts to provide inclusive sports and activities for students with and without intellectual disabilities. Cloquet High School is receiving this distinguished status as a result of meeting 10 national standards of excellence in the areas of inclusion, advocacy, and respect. These standards were developed by a national panel of leaders from Special Olympics and the education community.

The primary activities within these standards include Special Olympics Unified Sports® where students with and without disabilities train and compete as teammates, inclusive youth leadership, and whole school engagement. National banner schools should also demonstrate they are self-sustainable or have a plan in place to sustain these activities into the future.

Cloquet High School has been a Special Olympics Minnesota Unified Champion School since the 2019-2020 school year. Cloquet High School has two Unified Physical Education classes that are offered each semester along with a Unified Club that creates unified events inside and outside of school. Cloquet High School currently has three students on the Special Olympics Minnesota Student Board of Directors. Cloquet High School will be celebrating their national banner recognition the week of February 17-20, 2026 including a Unified Dance on Tuesday, February 17 from 10:00 AM-12:00 PM and a pep fest on Friday, February 20 from 2:45 PM-3:30 PM. Both events are in the Cloquet High School gymnasium.

Unified Champion Schools is a strategy for schools Pre-K through university that intentionally promotes meaningful social inclusion by bringing together students with and without intellectual disabilities to create accepting school environments, utilizing three interconnected components: Unified Sports, inclusive youth leadership, and whole school engagement. As many as 19.5 million young people are taking part in inclusive experiences through Special Olympics.

More than 375 schools are currently participating in Unified Champion Schools programming in Minnesota, as part of over 10,000 schools across the country engaged in the program.

Unified Champion Schools model is supported by the Office of Special Education Programs at the U.S. Department of Education. This model has been proven, through research, to be an effective and replicable means to providing students with and without disabilities the opportunity to form positive social relationships and promote a socially inclusive school climate.
