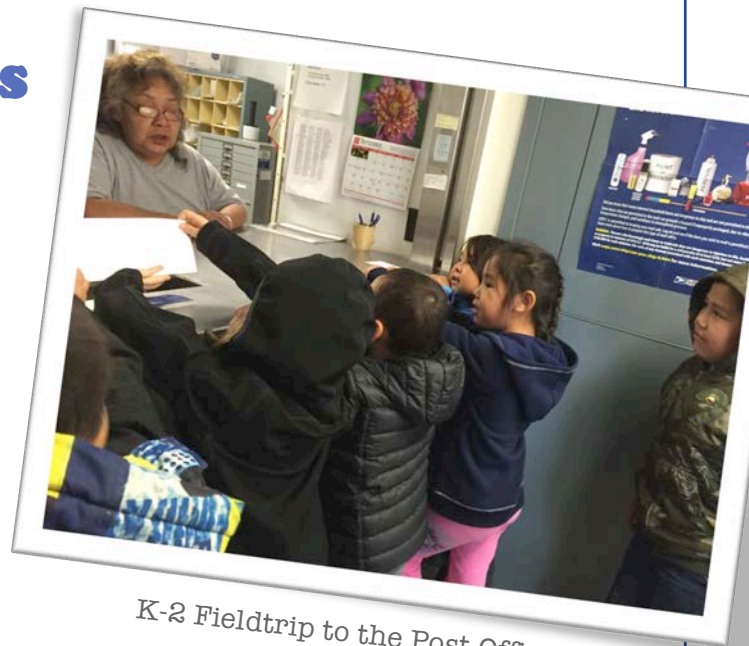

They are gathering material to create a phone application that will help people speak the Alutiq language. The Townsends spent two days using an empty classroom to meet with three elders from our village, Virginia Aleck, Mary Boskofsky, and Sam Stepanoff. It is the hope of community members and family that when they have the app on their phones, and they ask to translate an English word into Alutiq, they will hear the voice of one of our elders.

Attendance

As of September 23rd, Chignik Lake had 12 students enrolled. One student left on September 27th planning to return on October 4th. Two other students left on September 28th to go to Anchorage for an unspecified period of time. While the parents would not be clear on when they would return, it was thought that they would be gone for a month, at least.

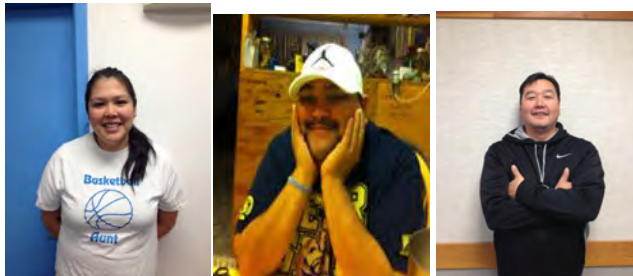

Dear Pat and Ty,

We're writing to request additional instructional staff at Igiugig School. With 19 students working in levels ranging from kindergarten through twelfth grade, it is currently impossible to plan and implement a meaningful educational program with only two teachers and a part-time aide. Our efforts to deliver appropriate lessons and interventions for kindergarten, primary and upper elementary, and middle and high school students are not working. This is especially true at the primary and elementary level where students can only manage short periods of independent work, and the multi-level curriculum regularly requires one-on-one attention. Without additional staffing assistance, this group of Igiugig students will fall behind.

The need for additional staff cannot be based on a simple student/teacher ratio formula. We are called a "two-teacher school", but in fact our responsibilities far exceed those of "teacher". Unfortunately, it seems our teaching responsibilities often must take a back seat to other pressing issues that would normally be handled by a principal, secretary, counselor, nurse, custodian, trained special ed teacher, trained technology expert, or school cook.

There is a specific reason we feel this is the time to act to remedy the problem of under staffing at Igiugig School. A new village administrator has recently been hired and he and his wife have just moved to Igiugig. His wife, Jacqueline Jacko, is a smart and competent woman who has experience teaching pre-school and kindergarten. She is very good with children and full of enthusiasm and positive energy. She could make a vital contribution to our school if we were able to hire her as a morning classroom aide.

In addition, we would like to request an extra hour per day classroom aide time for Betsy Hostetter. Betsy is currently working part-time as combination classroom aide, sped aide, PE aide and lunch monitor. She has worked at Igiugig School for 17 years as both a classroom aide and custodian and knows more about managing the school facility and secretarial issues than anybody else here.

Thank you for considering this request.

We'd be happy to talk with you at length about these and other issues. Please call as soon as possible and let us know what you think.

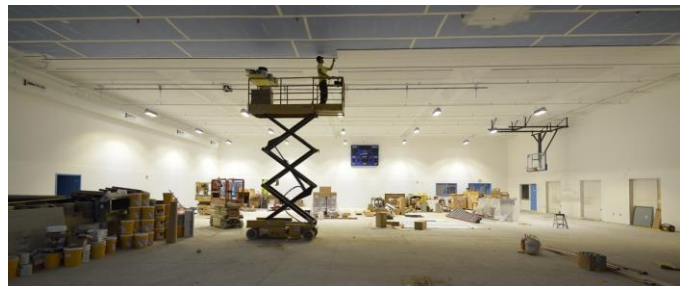

SMITHTOWN, N.Y. — The students used to overflow the wooden booths and green tables at Don Jono's Pizzeria, racing through pepperoni slices and large sodas before driving the quarter-mile back to Smithtown High School West in time for their next class.

But now the pizzas pile up behind the counter. Pete Crescimanno, a compact man with a neat black mustache who co-owns the place, estimates that he has lost more than \$500 a week in sales since the school district ended its longstanding policy of allowing seniors to go off-campus for lunch. One recent morning, Mr. Crescimanno and an assistant pounded and tossed dough in a nearly empty storefront, with only the radio to break the silence.

"It's not the same, and you miss that because you used to prepare for the kids and now you don't see them," he said. "Of course, you miss the business, but you also miss the fact that they're not here anymore." Smithtown is one of a number of districts on Long Island and around the country that have recently closed their campuses at lunchtime, canceling a generations-old rite of passage because of school officials' and parents' growing concern over traffic accidents and in some cases, truancy. This 11,000-student district in Suffolk County stopped allowing students to go out for lunch in November, the day after a lunchtime car accident that killed two Smithtown West seniors and a third teenager.

Three weeks ago, the 2,600-student West Hempstead district in Nassau County became the latest to suspend its open-campus policy after two high school students were fatally injured in a lunchtime car accident; the school board is reviewing the policy. A third district, Jericho, closed its campus after a high school student was crushed by a vehicle in the parking lot in 2005, and more than a dozen others across Long Island have re-evaluated or tightened their open-lunch policies in recent years, according to school officials and parents.

The accidents on Long Island have prompted State Assemblyman Michael N. Gianaris, a Democrat from Queens, to propose legislation that would prohibit students from driving during school lunch periods. The New York State School Boards Association is among the opponents of that plan, arguing that such matters should be decided by local districts.

Across the country, more districts are deciding that they are better off without open lunch periods. Fort Worth, Tex., closed its 13 high school campuses at lunchtime this year after finding that in addition to becoming involved in traffic accidents, students were more likely to skip classes before and after lunch.

Reactions

RALEIGH — The Department of Transportation tracks all kinds of accident statistics. Several projects focus specifically on teenagers. One reasearch effort shows teens are most likely to crash during three different times of the day: the hour before school, the hour after school, and lunchtime.

They fly through intersections, blow through stop signs, swerve in and out of traffic, and pack their cars way beyond capacity. They are high school students out to lunch, just having fun, most with little concern about the consequences of their dangerous driving.

"Everyone is pretty much in a rush to get off campus," says teen Carol Symons.

"I'm just trying to get where I need to go so I can eat fast and get back," says Antoine Eason.

Student Josh Van Deusen acknowledges, "There are a lot of accidents."

One of the worst: 10 Plymouth High School students were killed during a lunch run four years ago. The teenage driver lost control and skidded into the path of a tractor trailer.

A wreath still marks the intersection where a Leesville High School student was killed and two others injured while heading back to school after lunch.

Britney Luongo is one of eight Athens High students injured in a lunchtime accident two months ago, when one car loaded with students rear-ended another.

"All I can remember is just seeing the big back of whatever kind of car it was just coming at us, and knowing we were going to hit," Luongo says.

"I didn't even realize I was hurt or anything," she says. "Then I looked down, and I was really burnt up."

The statistics are eye-opening. Research shows one out of every four teenage drivers will be involved in a crash. Forty percent of this will be injured or killed. In fact, more teens die in car crashes than from anything else.

And consider this: every passenger added to a car increases a young driver's risk of crashing. Add one passenger and the risk of a deadly accident doubles. Add three passengers and the fatal crash risk is five times higher than driving alone.

Yet, when WRAL's Five On Your Side investigated, they saw car after car after car crammed with kids. Some were on the laps of front seat passengers, two students actually squeezed themselves into the back window of a two-seater sports car.

Add to that the dangerous teen tendency to show off while driving, and the distractions of listening to music, talking on cell phones, smoking, eating and drinking while they drive.

Sgt. R.E. Hawley heads a Sheriff's patrol division that focuses on traffic problems around schools in Wake County.

"They're not paying attention to anything that's going on around them because there is so much going on inside the confines of the car," Hawley says.

During one lunch hour, resident complaints have Hawley's officers monitoring 3-way stops in a neighborhood near Leesville High School. Within minutes, WRAL witnesses one car after another running right through a stop sign. Many drivers stop only after they realize they are caught.

Hawley has seen a lot of lunch time accidents. Most are "fender benders," though he fears another bad wreck is right around the corner.

"It's just a matter of time," he says. "It's not if it's going to happen. It's when."

Luonga agrees, and says her accident experience has changed her outlook.

She says she is a lot more careful about who she gets in a car with.

"I'll say, 'I'm not going to ride with you if you don't drive better,'" she says. But she realizes most of her peers are not concerned about driving dangerously, and do not even consider that speeding, running stop signs, tailgating, just acting crazy like so many young drivers do, could kill them.

"Youth have no concept of tomorrow," Hawley says. "They figure it's coming. They just don't know that it might come without them."

A lot of parents feel the answer is to keep students on campus for lunch, but school leaders say they simply cannot accommodate all the students without drastically revamping schedules. Johnston and Cumberland County Schools do not allow students to leave for lunch, though.

What should parents do? Limit the number of passengers in a teen's car and clearly relay your expectations about driving responsible.

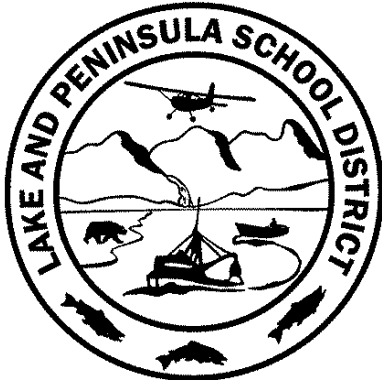

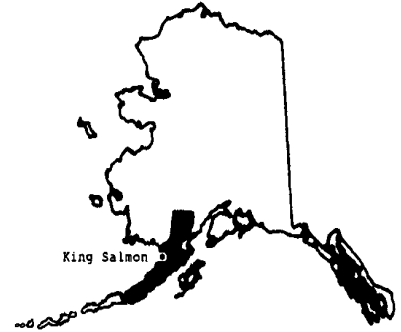

On behalf of the Lake and Peninsula School Board, I wanted to touch base with you in regards to your letter to the Board and Borough Assembly.

We have been advised that local hire preference as suggested in your letter is a violation of 4 AAC31.080(d). This statute reads *"The award of a contract for the construction of an educational facility under this section must be made without regard to municipal ordinances or school board resolutions granting a preference to local offerors."*

As you can see in the attached letter, such stipulations are also in violation of the Alaska Constitution. The letter is from our Capital Projects Manager, Kathy Christy, and was sent to her in regards to an earlier project she was managing. While the letter is from years ago, the statute and DEED's position on local hire are still the same.

Nicky, you wrote a thought-provoking letter, which more than anything, shows that our Region is hungry for work. There is no arguing your point, local jobs are crucial to our region's survival. With this said, I do hope you get established as a general contractor and are able to bid on some of our future projects (teacher housing, etc...).

I appreciate your letter and want to let you know the school board had an in-depth discussion on the points you brought up. Unfortunately, at this time, our hands are somewhat tied when it comes to local hire preference. I hope this information helps, please give me a call at the district office if you have any further questions or concerns.

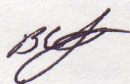
It has come to the department's attention that some districts using approved alternate project delivery methods are allowing local hire to be a deciding factor in their contractor choice.

This is a clear violation of 4 AAC 31.080(d). In addition, the Alaska Supreme Court has held that Article 1§1 of the Alaska Constitution forbids this type of intrastate regional hiring practice.

Using local preference requirements, or allowing local hire business history to be discussed as a factor in the selection of a contractor, or allowing a contractor to present their local hire program to the selection committee in any way, will cause the department to terminate the district's alternate project delivery method authorization. In accordance with 4 AAC 31.080(e), this will limit the district's procurement method to design-bid-build, low bid only.

Field Trip Activity: Students will discuss and define the causes of the American Revolution and search the original document of the Declaration of Independence at the National Archives for 3 unalienable rights.

Learning Objective #7

Students will describe and define the roles of federal, state, and local governments. (SS.08.01.06)

Field Trip Activity: Students will visit the nation’s capitol and experience the federal government first-hand. They will journal their experiences and engage in discussion on the differences between federal, state, and local government.

Learning Objective #8

Students will explain the processes of the legislative and judicial branches of government. (SS.08.01.10, SS.08.01.11)

Field Trip Activity: Prior to the trip, students will study the legislative process and the trial differences in the judicial branch. Students will visit the Capitol Building and the Supreme Court where they will learn and observe the processes of each branch of government. Students will reflect on their observations in their field journals.

Learning Objective #9

Students will compare and contrast the art from two eras. (SS.11.05.01, CA.08.01.01)

Field Trip Activity: Students will choose two eras from art history prior to the trip. While on the trip they will locate art from each era in the various art museums we visit. They will take observations on the art in their field journal and take pictures where permitted.

Learning Objective #10

Students will identify five types of instruments at the symphony. (CA.08.01.04)

Field Trip Activity: Students will watch the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra perform at Carnegie Hall.

Learning Objective #11

Using the methods of art critique, students will identify three reasons they appreciate a chosen piece of art. (CA.10.01.02)

Field Trip Activity: Students will choose a piece of art from any of the museums we visit and complete a worksheet on methods of art critique.

Learning Objective #12

Students will demonstrate and apply healthy, appropriate professional communication skills. (EM.08.01.04, EM.10.01.04 , EM.10.01.05)

Field Trip Activity: Students will be meeting and interacting with professionals at the U.S. Capitol, the Supreme Court, and several other locations. Prior to the trip students will be practicing appropriate behavior. While on the trip, students will demonstrate and apply these skills.

Any parent, guardian or responsible person who wishes to accompany students on a school sponsored trip must complete the paperwork. Organization is the key to a successful trip. It also applies to the effectiveness of the chaperones that accompany our students. Safety is one of our major concerns. It is your responsibility as a chaperone to focus students on activities that will enhance their travel experience and we want everyone to enjoy their trip, but we must remember that chaperones are in attendance to oversee the activities of our students in the safest possible manner.

Chaperones are there for all students, not just students from you Site. As defined in the Student and Parent Handbook, students who do not conduct themselves appropriately are to be sent home as soon as possible at the parent's expense.

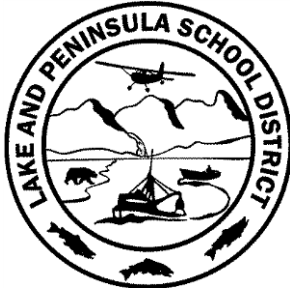

- State-wide superintendent meeting in AKN was a huge success (a big thanks to the PTA choir)
- Took a good swing at the AMP Assessment – considering the rigor and for the first attempt, we did well
- Welcoming the Mannings' back to LPSD – it feels like they never left...
- LPSD students having the opportunity to meet President Obama
- Reindeer are once again alive and well on the Alaska Peninsula!
- The Port Alsworth Lynx were State finalist in State Mix 6 Volleyball!

II. Looking into the Future

Eight years ago (as of this meeting) I was asked to take the helm and steer the LPSD ship through the political and financial seas. With Steve Atwater, the seas were relatively calm but when I took over in 2008 they were a bit choppy. Luckily (and thankfully), they have settled and it has been smooth sailing for the last several years. I hate to say it but I think the political and financial forecast for this spring semester and for the upcoming several years is much like the KDLG weather forecast for Port Heiden to Cape Sarichef: "High Seas - A small craft advisory with heavy freezing spray."

Going into the second semester I am happy to report our classrooms are doing just fine and it is our mission to keep them untouched by Federal and State funding and political fluctuations. We will undoubtedly have to battle for what we hold dear with the next several years promising to present many challenges. However, we have numerous factors on our side that will help us weather this storm: a strong board, a supportive borough, a great staff and collaborative partnerships throughout the region. While some things will have to change, I feel confident that the things that we hold near and dear will be able to be sustained.

III. Important Dates to Remember – LPSD Budget Preparation Timeline

- **January:** Survey stakeholders on possible budget cuts. Budget workshop with School Board (invite Assembly)
- **January thru February:** Begin building budget with constant communication with School Board and Borough Assembly.
- **March:** First Reading – Budget goes out for stakeholder comment
- **April:** Second Reading – Pass budget
- **May 1st:** Budget due to Borough
- **May (3rd Monday):** Budget approved (or not) by Borough

IV. Capital Projects (via Kathy Christy)

PTA - We are in the process of closing out SKW contract. It has been successfully completed. There is a warranty issue of a glycol leak, which SKW is addressing. There are a few additional equipment items that the school needed and they have been ordered and should be received after the first of the year. The only remaining obligation is the 1/2% for art requirement. I intent to issue an RFP for the PTA and NEW art together. Once the art is installed the project can be totally closed out. Art can take a while to have produced so it may be this summer before it is installed, possibly longer if they decide to involve students in the production.

NEW - As a renovation to an older existing building the contractor has encounter a number of unforeseen conditions that directly effect life safety and protection of structure. We are very fortunate to have a conscientious and fair contractor that is focused and doing things correctly at a fair and reasonable price. in addition to expanding the gym Steppers has replaced the second floor classroom exit and corrected the associated dry rot. Steppers is also willing to correct utility deficiencies of the building which include replacement of the sewer and water lines. It is more cost effective for this work to occur next summer. There are additional dry rot problems with will also be corrected in the summer.

The current unanticipated condition is the condition of the concrete under the gym floor. When the existing gym floor was removed and the flooring contractor as prepping the floor portions of the old floor delaminated. A concrete expert from DOWL was brought in and evaluated the floor and core samples. Their recommendation is to chip out the delaminating sections until solid concrete is encountered and then fill and level the flooring. This is case a brief delay in the work as the flooring crew has been moved to another project. However, the new gym floor should be installed prior to the holiday break. With the additional utility work it is anticipated Steppers work will continue until August 2016. The art requirement should also be in place by this time.

Re: Curriculum – October-November 2015

It seems like we just started the school year, but yet the semester is almost over. How time flies!

October In-service:

- October In-service was held October 14-17. Topics included the Danielson Framework for Teaching; reading strategies for lower levels; engaging parents and communities; Alaska Measures of Progress (AMP) state assessments; health care; as well as many breakout sessions focusing on individual programs. On top of this there were principal and SP.ED. meetings. We also incorporated optional skin sewing and kuspuk making classes that were offered in the evenings; these were a huge hit and allowed teachers to socialize while learning a valuable skill that they could take back to their communities. Collaboration with BBBSD at this event continues to grow. It was a very busy, informative week!

Curriculum:

- The WIKI webpage I mentioned in my previous report has been created. As a refresher, this site will provide resources for specific standards that will be open not only to teachers, but also to students, parents, aides, and other people who need resources to teach or learn a standard. Technology and Science are being targeted first, and Matthew Stark and I have been populating the site with resources. I am interested to see what will come of this site, and if it will encourage student ownership of their education as it is intended to.

Professional Development:

- Due to October In-service Survey results showing that teachers were wanting more professional development on the Danielson Framework for Teaching, we have worked with Melissa Linton (KPBSD's Curriculum and Assessment Coordinator, and a Danielson Consultant) to provide follow up training. The Danielson Framework for Teaching is a research based set of components that outlines best practice in teaching; it is also what our teacher evaluation is based on. We have had two sessions with Melissa: one session focusing on creating classroom environments of respect and rapport, and establishing cultures for learning; and another session on using questioning and discussion techniques, and engaging students in learning. These Blackboard sessions have been engaging and informative. Professional development on the Danielson Framework for Teaching will continue throughout the year. This is providing us with a good opportunity to look at best practice in LPSD.
- We have had two early release sessions focusing on the State AMP tests. These sessions have acclimated new staff to the basics of the AMP Practice Tests, as well as introducing AMP Interim Assessments to the whole staff.

- I'm sure Glenda will provide you with more specifics on these topics, and what is coming down the pike with AMP.
- Blackboard Collaborate has continued to be a valuable tool for professional development. It has allowed us to hop on with teachers and see, real-time, what a teacher needs assistance with. We have also used it to train online tutors, provide collaboration between sites, and meet in committees. This format continues to be a cost effective means of providing training while saving on travel.

Tutoring:

- A note on our online tutoring program from Linda Richter: We ended up with 39 kids being tutored this semester. We are looking at Mansfield and Centenary coming on board with student tutors next semester. We are not sure what UAA is looking at in numbers, nor do we have a count yet for Western Oregon. But, we continue to feel it is a win-win-win project.

Student Count

The count period for foundation funding went as expected. Closing Egegik School and changing enrollment numbers resulted in a count of 310, 6 intensive and 9.95 correspondence. Due to changes in enrollment at other schools, LPSD did not experience a 5% decrease in ADM. Additionally, we did not trigger the hold harmless for funding in FY16. LPSD is in year three or 24% of the hold harmless generated in FY14 with the closing of Chignik Bay school. Opening Chignik Bay again in FY15, along with changes in population shown below, contribute to the hold harmless not being met with the closing of Egegik.

Progress to Date

It has been busy so far this year keeping operations moving along. Nana Management underwent some restructuring and provided us a summary of services and information. We will be reviewing the information and working to restructure our bid services for food service in an effort to reduce costs and improve efficiencies.

I learned that Heartland Services, who owns our lunch management software, contains a module called MySchoolBucks which not only allows LPSD to collect lunch payments on-line via credit/debit cards but also allows LPSD to build a store site for student governments and other events at no cost to LPSD for the platform.

Credit card fees are applicable at 3.95% and are being split with users for lunch, passed to users for the store and absorbed by LPSD for donations. Our goal is to have these payment options active after Christmas Break.

The Assoc. of School Business Officials (ASBO) conference was very valuable this year in preparing for ACA reporting, obtaining health market place information and visiting vendors help LPSD progress toward a paperless workplace. A potential web-based financial software features ACA hours tracking and ACA reporting, time keeping and more.

The Government Finance Officers Association, in cooperation with school districts and ASBO, through a grant from the Microsoft Foundation, have developed a program called Smarter School Spending For Student Success. The program developed a framework for continuous improvement in school budgeting. The process and information is excellent and can be found at: <http://smarterschoolspending.org/home>. This tool is free and valuable and we hope to incorporate this into our budget and management process in the future.

Technology Update

The technology team has been crazy busy this year so far and are finally about even. The team is looking at programs to provide interactive assessments for the lower grades, developing a plan for a RUS grant application to support technology equipment and needs, working on single sign-on programming for teachers/students and reviewing software programs to support other areas.

The Casper server program is configured and on-line, which allows tech to perform updates and software installations in the background without traveling to sites. This provides a great deal of flexibility for teachers in installing optional software and managing site devices, such as printers without administrator access or assistance.

Special Education Professional Development and In-service:

The special education teachers participated in professional development October 13-16, 2015. In addition to participating with regular education teachers in the LPSD/BBBSD in-service, several training sessions were specifically designed for them including: training on the WIAT (an individually administered achievement test) using iPads instead of paper and pencil to administer and score; training on SEAS, the web-based software program used to generate and manage special education documents; training on protocol for developing IEPs for students with intensive needs; and discussions of recurring legal issues in special education.

I am enjoying my work with Lake and Peninsula School District. I am impressed with the caliber of the special education staff and the services that are being provided to students.

- 2015 Spring AMP results arrived at the District Office. Individual student data reports will be sent home with Principals after the December meetings in King Salmon for distribution to parents
- KITE Client, the app that provides access to the Practice Tests and the State assessment has recently been updated. Teachers and students have access to login, explore and practice the features that will be available on the AMP assessments.
- Board Members and Parents can download KITE Client and use the general usernames and passwords to access the Practice Tests and explore the tools that will be available to students when taking the new online State Summative assessment. <http://education.alaska.gov/akassessments/>
- Student and teacher rosters have been uploaded into KITE Educator Portal for teachers to access Formative Testlets. Testlets, *Assessments for Learning* were introduced/reintroduced to staff members during the November 20th Early Release. Teachers were asked to administer 1 or 2 Testlets prior to the Winter break. . "The testlets are short, 8-10 item tests available to teachers to use to inform their instruction. These optional, no-stakes, assessment tools are designed to give teachers information on student progress on individual standards. Teachers select which testlets to give to students and when to administer them." http://education.alaska.gov/akassessments/amp/AMPInfoDoc11_4_14.pdf
- Spring AMP assessments are scheduled for the first two weeks in April.
- EED has provided and continues to provide excellent webinars for District Test Coordinators and Technology Coordinators in preparation for the Spring AMP. EED Staff support is excellent as each are very responsive to emails and phone calls.

College and Career Readiness Assessments (CCRA)

- 11th grade students were given the opportunity to select and have all selected which CCRA they want to take.
- The North and South Counselors are participating in webinars and working diligently to update users and enroll students for the 2015-2016 CCRAs(WorkKeys, ACT & SAT).
- CCRA requirement for students discontinue at the end of this fiscal year

Federal Programs Report November/December 2015

I'm sorry I can't join you for this meeting. I will be attending the ALASBO conference (Alaska Association of School Business Officials). This training will help me with the grants/budgeting component federal programs.

- FY15 federal grants have been closed out; we can put those behind us.
- Migrant recruiting for FY16 funding is complete. Our migrant count looks to be above last year's, but I won't have final numbers until the state completes their approval process.
- We will soon begin preparing Impact Aid reports. I believe we have been under-counting students in prior years. I will be working with the borough to be sure we have reported all students who are categorized as "federally impacted children."
- Fall OASIS has been submitted. This is a critical report as it is the basis the state uses for our funding.
- I have cleaned up some of our lunch status data with the state's reporting and data collection system. As of this writing we have exceeded the 40% threshold necessary to qualify as a Community Eligibility Provision district. The "count" date for this is April 1, 2016. If our numbers hold we should qualify for CEP next year...this means all students would be eligible for free lunch. It will ease some of our paperwork requirements considerably.
- Correcting the findings from our ESEA audit is an ongoing project. This is something that we will be chipping away at a little at a time. While I don't want it to take that long, when I was at the fall migrant training one district had just wrapped up their audit findings after three years of effort.

Federal Programs Report December 2015

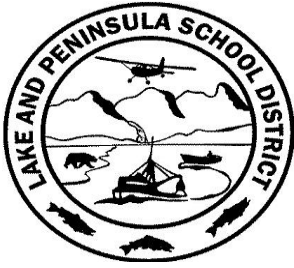
Hello Board-

I'm sorry I'm not able to join you for this meeting. I'm currently in Anchorage for some technology training, and will move from that right into the ALASBO (Alaska Association of School Business Officials) conference. This conference will provide some great professional development for me as I learn more about budgeting federal & state grants.

There isn't much to report about federal programs at the moment. The two items worth noting are:

- Migrant Recruitment: We've completed our migrant recruiting and all students have been submitted to the state for approval. There are still a few families who have not returned signed forms for me to pass along to the Department of Education, but our numbers appear to be up from last year. At the time of this writing I don't have access to that data, but I will provide you with solid numbers in my next report.

- Impact Aid: As the migrant recruitment efforts wind down Impact Aid picks up. The district is currently gathering data and completing the necessary paperwork to file with the Office of Impact Aid with the US Dept of Education. The deadline for all districts is the end of January.

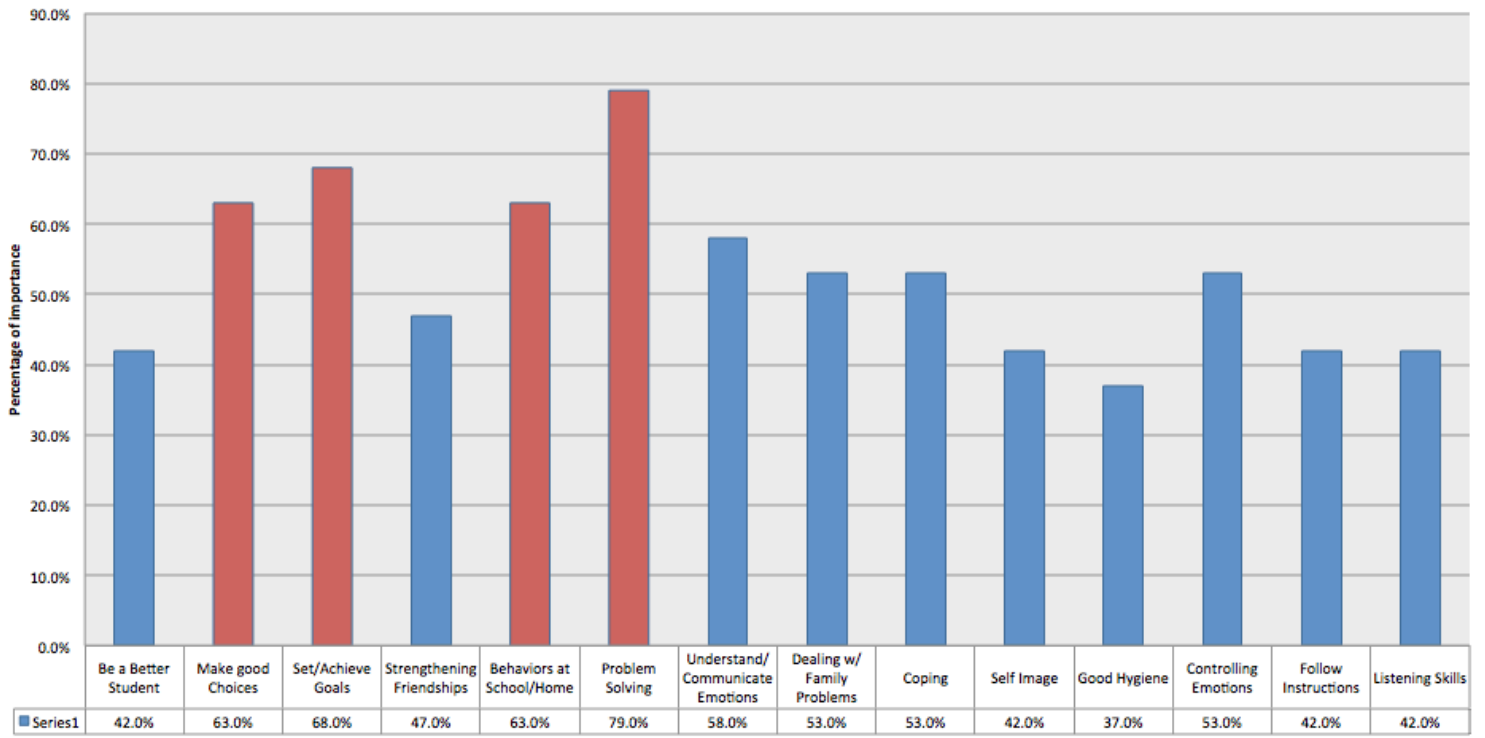

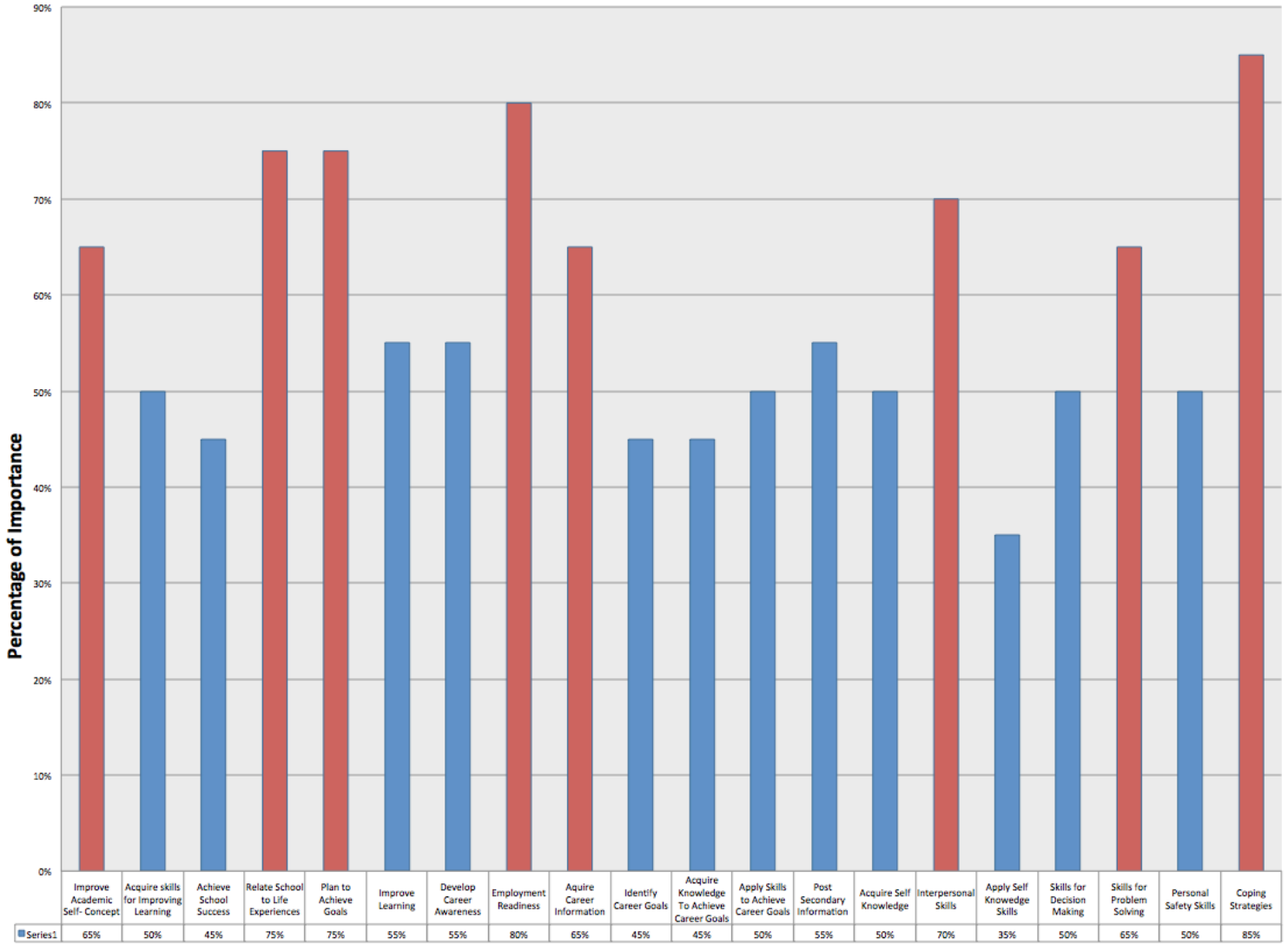

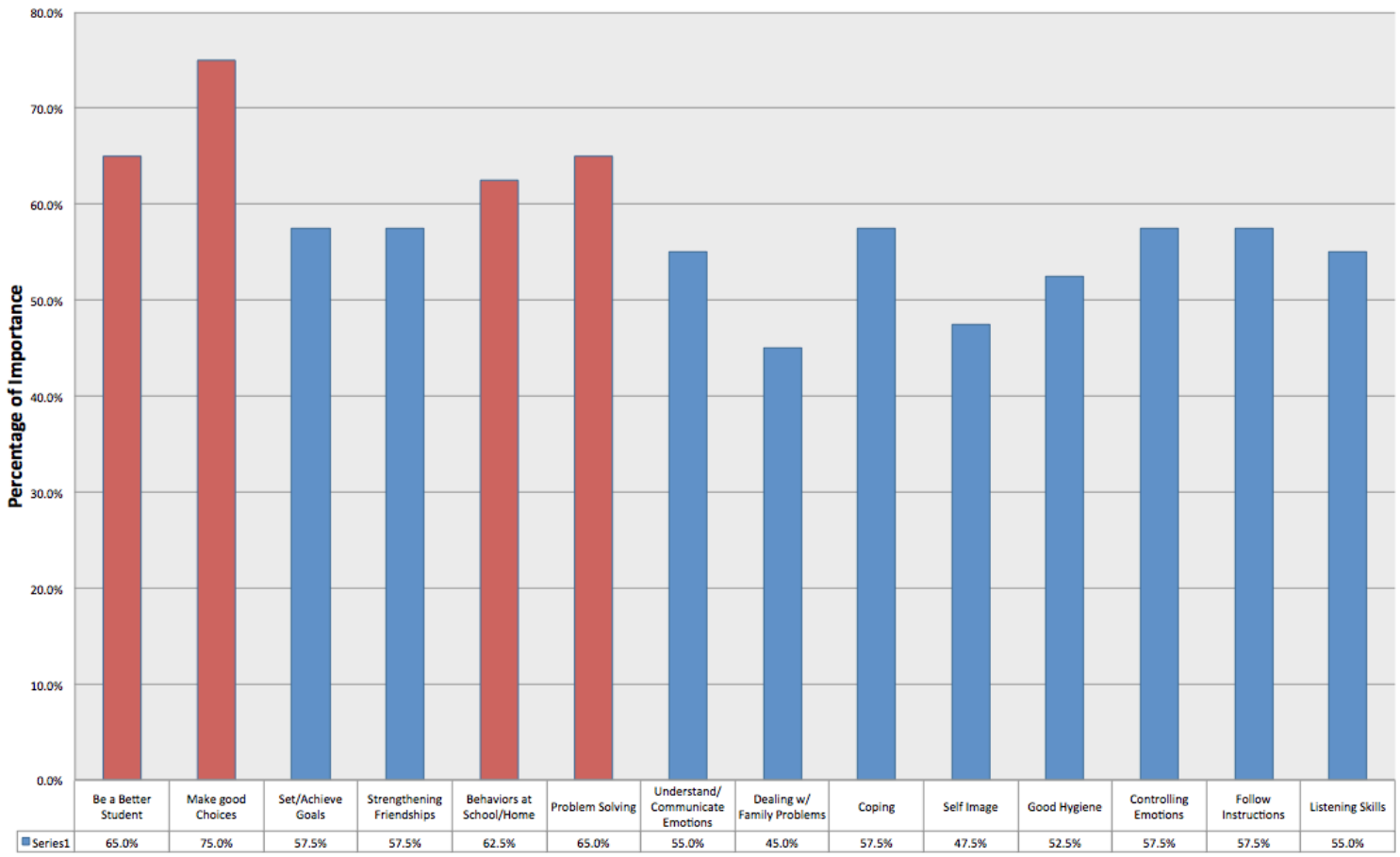
Staff (K-6th Grade) Needs Assessment Results (FY15-16)



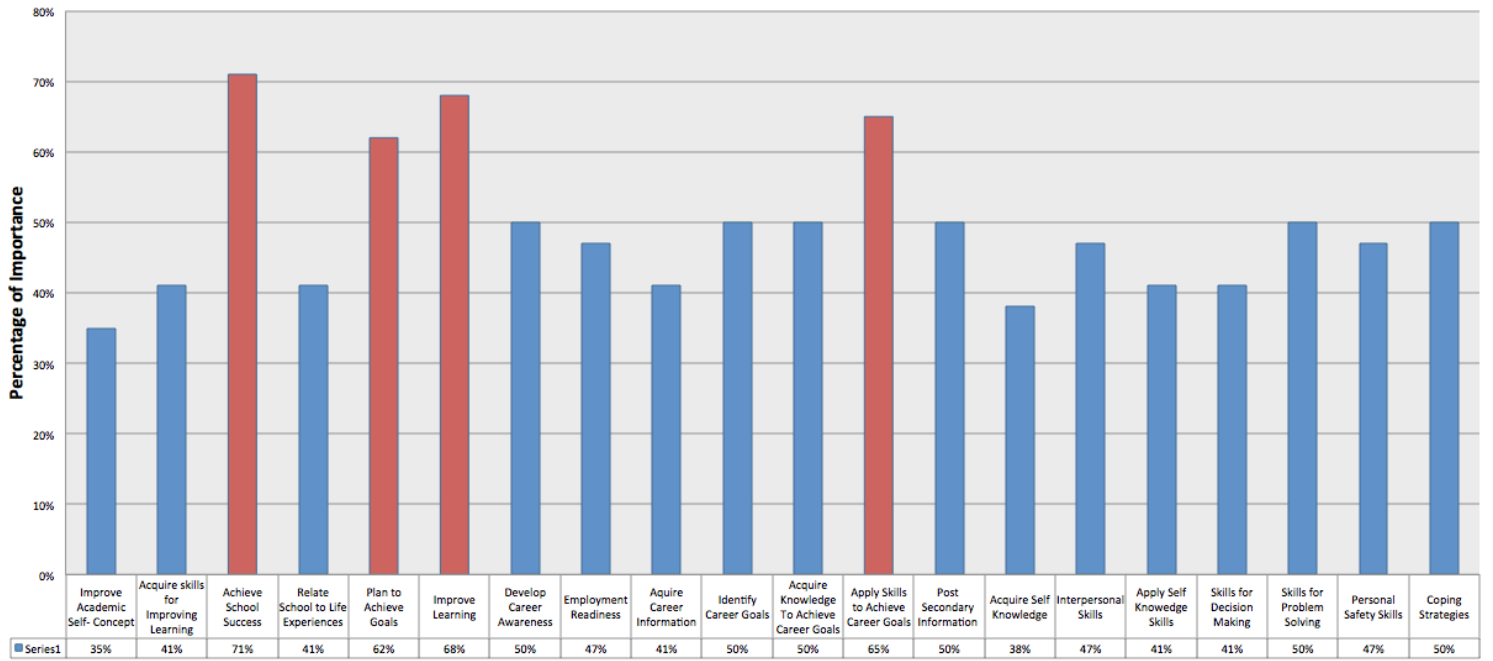
Staff (7th-12th Grade) Needs Assessment Results (FY15-16)

December FAMILY Grant & Preschool Report

Fathers and Mothers Impact Learning Years=FAMILY

- FAMILY Grant opportunities continue to be provided to families with preschool age children at 11 of our school sites (PVL, BAY, LAG, LAK, PTH, LEV, IGI, KHK, NEW, NON, PTA). PIP has a vacancy notice posted.
- Each month FAMILY Coordinators share FAMILY Kits with activities that preschool parents/guardians may checkout and enjoy at home with their child. The kits shared this Fall have been Letters, Magnets and Let's Build. In December will be introduced to and have the opportunity to check out an iPad kit. Each site has one kit available for check out, with larger sites have two kits available.
- Since language is key to our young learners being prepared for Kindergarten, the Language is Key DVDs have been distributed for FAMILY Coordinators to share with their families. November and December video selections are Language and Books & Language and Play. Great resource for parents.
- Support materials for December, January and February have been assembled and sent out to sites. These include FAMILY Coordinator guidelines plus the Singing kit for January. Supplies arrive on a regular basis for additional kits.

Preschool

- Preschool is in session at PVL, BAY, LAG, LAK, PTH, LEV, IGI, KHK, NEW & PTA. Currently NON and PIP preschool positions are vacant. Notices were reposted last week in hopes of generating interest.
- Sites with 3 or more students have 12 hours of student contact time per week, while sites with less than 3 are allocated 8 hours.
- With the support of the Technology Director, Preschool, FAMILY & Migrant Ed iPads have been set up in the JAMF program. Enrolling devices in the system allows us access to manage the inventory and distribute apps.
- All iPads have now been sent out for student use.

Informal Review of Complaints

The following procedures will govern the receipt and resolution of complaints.

Filing a Complaint

Any district resident may file a written complaint alleging that the district has failed to comply with the requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act as set forth at 20 USC 6301-7941; or with school and district accountability requirements set forth at AS 14.03.123 and 4 AAC 06.800-899. The complaint must be submitted to the Superintendent.

In order to be reviewed, the complaint must include the following:

1. A statement describing the provision of law that the school or district has allegedly violated;
2. A statement of the facts supporting the alleged violation;
3. The name and address of the complainant; and
4. A description and documentation of prior efforts to resolve the concern informally.

If a complainant is unable to put a complaint in writing due to a disability, or reading or language barriers, district staff shall assist him/her to file the complaint.

Investigation of Complaint

Within five business days after receiving the complaint, the Superintendent will assign an investigator to conduct an informal review of the complaint. The investigator will be an employee of the district, may not have taken part in the action that is the subject of the complaint, and may not have a personal or financial interest in the subject matter of the complaint.

The investigator may conduct interviews of the complainant and district employees, and may request information and documents necessary to complete a review of the complaint. The complainant and district employees are expected to fully cooperate with the investigation.

PUBLIC COMPLAINTS CONCERNING DISCRIMINATION (continued)**Written Recommendation**

Within 60 days after the date the complaint was assigned to the investigator, the investigator shall submit to the Superintendent and the complainant, a written recommendation setting forth one of the following determinations:

1. The complainant did not provide complete information for the investigator to review and therefore the Superintendent need not respond to the complaint. This finding does not bar the Superintendent from taking additional action based on the information already received; nor does it preclude the complainant from submitting a new complaint with the additional information, or from pursuing remedies available under state or federal law.
2. The complainant's allegations, even if true, do not establish a violation of 20 USC 6301-7941, AS 14.03.123, or 4 AAC 06.800-899 and therefore the Superintendent need not respond to the complaint. This finding does not bar the Superintendent from rejecting the investigator's recommendation and taking additional action; nor does it bar the complainant from pursuing remedies available under state or federal law.
3. A violation of 20 USC 6301-7941, AS 14.03.123, or 4 AAC 06.800-899 is likely to have occurred, based on information available to the investigator, and that the Superintendent should take action to correct or stop the violation. This finding does not bar the Superintendent from rejecting or declining to act upon the investigator's recommendation; nor does it bar the complainant from pursuing remedies available under state or federal law.

The written recommendation will also advise the complainant of his or her right to file a complaint with the Department of Education and Early Development under the procedures set forth at 4 AAC 06.888.

No Reprisals

Neither the complainant, the investigator, nor any other individual cooperating in the investigation shall be subject to retaliation or reprisals. An employee who engages in retaliation is subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination.

TRANSPORTATION

The School Board desires to provide transportation for eligible students in accordance with state and federal law.

The goals of the transportation service are:

1. to provide maximum safety for students between home and school and on school-sponsored trips.
2. to promote desirable student behavior and respect for traffic safety.
3. to provide assistance and transportation for handicapped students.
4. to provide transportation for field trips.

Note: Effective July 1, 2014, AS 14.09.010 was amended to require that school districts adopt a policy addressing transportation services to students attending a charter school operated by the district. Department of Education and Early Development regulations require a charter school transportation policy if: 1) the district provides pupil transportation services under AS 14.09.010; and 2) the district operates a charter school or an application for the establishment of a charter school in the district is pending. A district must submit its charter school transportation policy to the Department for approval by: 1) April 15, 2015 if a charter school is in operation in the district on July 1, 2014; or 2) no later than 30 days after approval of a new charter school if the district does not already have an approved charter school transportation policy in effect. See 4 AAC 27.057 for further guidance on the transportation policy approval process. The policy is to be developed with input solicited from individuals involved in the charter school, including staff, students, and parents. If a district fails to adopt a policy, the district is required to allocate the amount of state transportation funding received for each charter school student to the charter school. AS 14.09.010(f).

(continued)****Charter School Transportation**

The School Board recognizes that charter school students may benefit from transportation services. On a space available basis, charter school students may access school bus transportation on those regular school bus routes that run within the attendance area where the charter school is located. Transportation access is subject to the following:

- a. Charter school students may only access those school bus routes that are appropriate to their school level, i.e., elementary school, middle school or high school.
- b. Charter school students who reside within a mile and a half of the charter school are not eligible for transportation unless they must cross a designated hazardous road area. Special education routes are not subject to the mile and a half restriction.
- c. Charter school students must comply with all rules for safe and appropriate conduct while waiting for, boarding, and exiting the bus, and while riding the bus. Charter school students are subject to the same sanctions as other students for bus violations.
- d. Annually, the charter school must provide information to charter school families who are accessing school bus transportation about the district's school bus rules.
- e. School bus transportation is not available to charter school students enrolled in charter schools identified as correspondence programs.

Annually, the Superintendent or designee shall communicate to the charter school the space availability on applicable transportation route(s) and determine the transportation needs of charter school students. If the number of charter school students desiring transportation exceeds available space, the charter school is responsible for developing a written process for addressing ridership on a fair and equitable basis. A copy of the written process shall be provided to the district.

Note: The above language reflects the minimum transportation obligation for charter school students as required by AS 14.09.010(e)(2). A district is not obligated to provide greater service, to establish dedicated routes for exclusive use of the charter schools, or to permit charter schools to opt out of the policy and receive transportation funding. The following is optional language for those districts desiring a process to consider, and act upon, requests by charter schools for additional transportation services.

OPTIONAL: The district is not required to establish dedicated transportation routes for the exclusive use of charter school students, but may choose to do so.

A charter school desiring additional or dedicated student transportation may submit a written proposal to the Superintendent or designee. The proposal shall identify, at a minimum, student transportation needs, charter school funding available to support additional transportation, and the transportation routes and services being requested. The Superintendent will make a

TRANSPORTATION ROUTES AND SERVICES

Note: Effective July 25, 2014, the Department of Education and Early Development amended and added regulations 4 AAC 27.006-951, establishing regular and special education transportation routes, allowing in-lieu-of agreements, establishing hazardous routes and requiring transportation reports to be filed. A regular transportation route may be established where 8 or more students reside more than one and one-half miles from school, and the entire route is over regularly maintained roads under the supervision and maintenance of the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, a public utility district, a municipality, a borough service area or other agency supported by public funds, and the route provides adequate turnaround space for transportation vehicles. 4 AAC 27.011.

The School Board shall approve transportation routes and services based upon student needs and a continuing assessment of financial resources, including district funds and state reimbursements. Districts will use the most cost efficient methods when developing and establishing regular and special education routes and engaging in other transportation related services. Transportation shall be provided for students living at least one and one-half miles from school. Special education routes will be established without regard to distance.

Note: Pursuant to 4 AAC 27.036, the Board may designate hazardous routes within one and one-half mile from school. The designation must be by resolution which must state the nature and potential duration of the hazard and is only valid for one year.

The Board may designate hazardous transportation routes within the minimum walking distance when such routes are unsafe.

Note: A district may establish in-lieu-of agreements with parents to provide reimbursement for transporting their children to the nearest attendance center if: 1) the student's residence is more than one and one-half miles from the regular bus route and the pupil's attendance center (unless the child is a special education student); 2) the per-mile rate does not exceed the maximum mileage reimbursement rate paid by the district to administrative employees; and 3) reimbursement is based on the actual miles traveled, not the number of students.

Instead of extending existing transportation routes or establishing new routes, the District may establish in-lieu-of agreements to reimburse parents for transporting their children at approved rates and under approved conditions.

TRANSPORTATION ROUTES AND SERVICES (Continued)

Note: 4 AAC 27.056 requires that each district that receives pupil transportation funds from the department submit pupil transportation reports on prescribed forms. The pupil transportation annual report shall be submitted by October 1 of each year. The pupil transportation quarterly report shall be submitted not later than 15 days after the end of each quarter of the fiscal year. The final report is due by July 15 of each year, unless the district is offering summer school transportation services, in which case it is due by August 15. Any school bus accident reports must be submitted not later than 10 days after the end of each month in which a reportable school bus accident occurs.

The district will timely submit to the Department of Education and Early Development all transportation reports required by law.

Note: 4 AAC 27.086 establishes minimum standards for requests for proposals (“RFP”). Districts must ensure that an RFP commences six months before the expiration date of the current contract. Pre-bid conferences shall be held 30 days after the release of the RFP. Proposals are due to the district 14 days after the pre-bid conference and shall be opened that day in public at the hour and place stated in the RFP. The School Board shall forward a copy of the written proposed contract and successful proposal to the Department of Education and Early Development, not later than April 15 of the fiscal year preceding the first year of the contract. A copy of the final signed contract shall be forwarded to the Department not later than the first day of the contract. Each District with an ADM of 4,500 or more shall work with the Department to align, bid and remain on the same five-year term cycle.

All contracts for pupil transportation awarded by the School Board will be based on the competitive proposal process and meet minimum standards as required by law.

Note: Alaska school districts are required to adopt standards relating to when a teacher, teacher’s assistant, or other person responsible for students is authorized to use reasonable and appropriate force to maintain classroom safety and discipline. Effective October 2014, the use of restraint and seclusion of students is strictly limited and in some situations prohibited by law. AS 14.33.125. Any use of restraint or seclusion by a district employee of a student must comply with all legal requirements. A teacher, teacher’s assistant, principal, or another person responsible for students may not be terminated or otherwise subjected to formal disciplinary action for lawful enforcement of a school disciplinary and safety program, including behavior standards. AS 14.33.130. This group is protected from civil liability for acts or omissions arising out of enforcement of the disciplinary and safety program while in the course of employment, unless the act constitutes gross negligence or reckless or intentional misconduct. AS 14.33.140, and the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

An employee may use approved methods of physical restraint if a student’s behavior poses an imminent danger of physical injury to the student or others and less restrictive interventions would be ineffective at stopping the imminent danger. Restraint must be limited to that necessary to address the emergency and must be immediately discontinued when the student no longer poses an imminent danger or when a less restrictive intervention is effective to stop the danger.

BB 9250 REMUNERATION, REIMBURSEMENT, AND OTHER BENEFITS

Compensation of Board Members

School Board members will be allowed expenses and compensation subject to yearly budget allocation and as allowed by [AS14.14.140\(c\)](#). Annually the School Board will assist the Superintendent in developing the parameters of the School Board's Operating Budget to be incorporated into the following years overall district budget.

The following outlines eligible expenses and compensation. The compensation (stipend) and per diem will be paid upon submission of a claim signed by the board member and certified by another board member.

(A) Stipend

School board members are eligible to claim a stipend for every day or part day that the Board Member is either attending or traveling to, a board meeting, board approved attendance at either Board Training, In-Service, Bid Opening or Board Approved Committee Assignment Meetings. Daily stipend rate shall be \$150.00 per day or part of the day.

(B) Per Diem and Transportation

School Board members are eligible to claim either \$42.00 per day in-district, \$85.00 per day in King Salmon and or \$175.00 per day Out-of-District per diem when away from home attending a Board Meeting or on Board Approved Board Business. (If the District arranges lodging Out-of-District per diem shall be \$75.00 per day)

District will arrange transportation for attendance at school board meetings and for approved board business from place of residence to board meeting or location of board business and return. A claim for transportation expenses to either an alternate location or at a differently scheduled time shall be paid only if results in no additional cost, other than what would have been incurred, to the district.

Staff Travel

- 1) It shall be the general policy of the School Board to make budgetary provision for reasonable travel by staff in the interest of effective administration and improvement of the program of education.
- 2) Out of district travel shall require approval by the Superintendent or Chief School Administrator of Schools.
- 3) The use of employee vehicles while on District business results in employee personal vehicle insurance acting as primary coverage for losses due to damage and/or accident; LPSD vehicle insurance is secondary coverage.
- 4) School Personnel are prohibited from flying private aircraft for school business.
- 5) Use of personal vehicles and residences are prohibited when staff are chaperoning students.

At no time should personnel be compelled or think they have to travel when conditions are questionable. If personnel believe weather or other conditions warrant a postponement or rescheduling of travel, please inform the District Office. All staff, students and others traveling on District sponsored aircraft are required to be dressed appropriately for the weather and take precautions to provide for the maximum safety.

Out of District Travel

1) Travel Authorization

Travel on District business must be authorized by the Superintendent or Chief Operating Officer unless specified otherwise. Submit requests ten (10) days in advance, except with good cause, by completing the Out of District travel form in the All Staff area of FirstClass. Travel that does not receive advance authorization may not be reimbursed. A separate request form is to be submitted for each person traveling.

2) Per Diem

The District has adopted U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) Per Diem Rates for all travel. Rates are by city/local and are at <http://www.gsa.gov/perdiem> and are adjusted on a going basis.

Per Diem will be paid in advance of the trip as described below; staff is responsible for arranging and paying for hotel reservations, taxi or rental car selection/reservation out of the per diem given for lodging and incidentals. Use of personal residence or vehicle is at the employee's discretion and liability.

- a) Per diem will be paid in advance of the trip for the city the employee is traveling to at the per diem rate for Lodging, Local Meals or Proportional Meals and Local Incidentals.

- b) Travel request received less than 10 days in advance of the departure date will not receive per diem in advance, travelers must complete the Travel Report Form upon their return and per diem will be issued based on actual reported travel.
- c) First and last day of travel are paid at 75% of the Lodging, Local Meals or Proportional Meals and Local Incidentals rate.
- d) If meals are provided by the conference or other entity as part of the activity the Proportional Meal rate will be used instead of the higher Local Meal Rate. Meals included in the cost of lodging and continental breakfasts are not reportable as a provided meal.
- e) Rental car's purchased and used as part of District approved travel for District business are authorized as an acceptable use of per diem and are covered by District auto insurance.
- f) Upon return from each trip employees must complete a Travel Report Form to report actual travel activities this form will be compared to the Travel Request to determine if an overpayment exists or additional per diem is owed.

3) Transportation

The District will arrange and purchase all airline tickets through the District Office travel desk.

4) Registrations and Fees

The District will initiate and pay conference registrations and fees directly, by purchase order or staff who have been issued District purchasing cards can charge registrations and fees in accordance with purchasing card acceptable use once travel is approved by the Superintendent.

In-District Travel

1) Travel Authorization

Travel within the District must be authorized by the Superintendent or Chief School Administrator, or District Office Administrator. For the maintenance staff, the Maintenance Supervisor can authorize in-district travel. All arrangements for travel will be made in the District Office.

2) In-District Per Diem

The District will reimburse employees on authorized official District business upon completion of a "Claim for In-District Per Diem", with lodging receipts attached, if any.

Reimbursement will be as follows:

- a) \$42.00 per day or any part of a day when the employee has an overnight stay away from

their assigned travel base, unless meals and lodging are provided by the District.

b) The In-District Per Diem Policy applies to all employees of The Lake and Peninsula School District. It also includes temporary summer maintenance employees.

Staff In/Out Travel

The District will reimburse South Area teachers a mid-year round trip airfare from their duty station to King Salmon. Reimbursement will be made on the basis of proof of payment by the teacher. This second mid-year trip may be used by an immediate family member.

The Superintendent or Chief School Administrator is authorized to reimburse certificated staff in accordance to the negotiated agreement.

Student Travel

- 1) Student travel shall be approved by the board annually in the form of the Student Activities List.
- 2) Each activity will be reviewed and approved by the Superintendent to ensure Board established guidelines are followed. Travel shall be submitted to the Superintendent a minimum of 10-days before date of travel using the Student Travel Form in FirstClass All Staff Area.
- 3) All travel reservations for airlines, hotels, rental houses, rental cars and other needed items will be provided by the District Travel Desk and distributed in advance of the event.
- 4) Out of District travel per diem will be issued to the event chaperone in the amount of \$30 per person per day. Chaperones must keep receipts and complete the Student Trip Expense Record, attach receipts and return unspent funds to the business office within 10-days of returning from the trip. If additional funds are owed the chaperone payment will be issued upon receipt and reconciliation of the Student Trip Expense Record.
- 5) Student per diem food and incidentals, examples of incidentals include luggage carts, personal needs of students, movies and other low cost entertainment. Per diem is not for non-travel related expenses such as clothing the District does not normally pay for.

BB 9322 AGENDA ITEMS

Procedures for placing an item on the agenda, making a presentation, or speaking to an item on the agenda shall be as follows:

Any member of the public or any Board member may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the Board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting. The request must be in writing and be submitted to the Superintendent or designee with supporting documents and information, if any, at least seven (7) days before the scheduled meeting date. Items submitted less than a week before the scheduled meeting date may be postponed to a later meeting in order to allow sufficient time for consideration and research of the issue.

The Board President and Superintendent shall decide whether a request is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. Items not within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board may not be placed on the agenda. In addition, the Board President and Superintendent shall determine if the item is merely a request for information or whether the issue is covered by an existing policy or administrative regulation before placing the item on the agenda.

The Board President and Superintendent shall decide whether an agenda item is appropriate for discussion in open or closed session, and whether the item should be an action item, informational item or consent item.

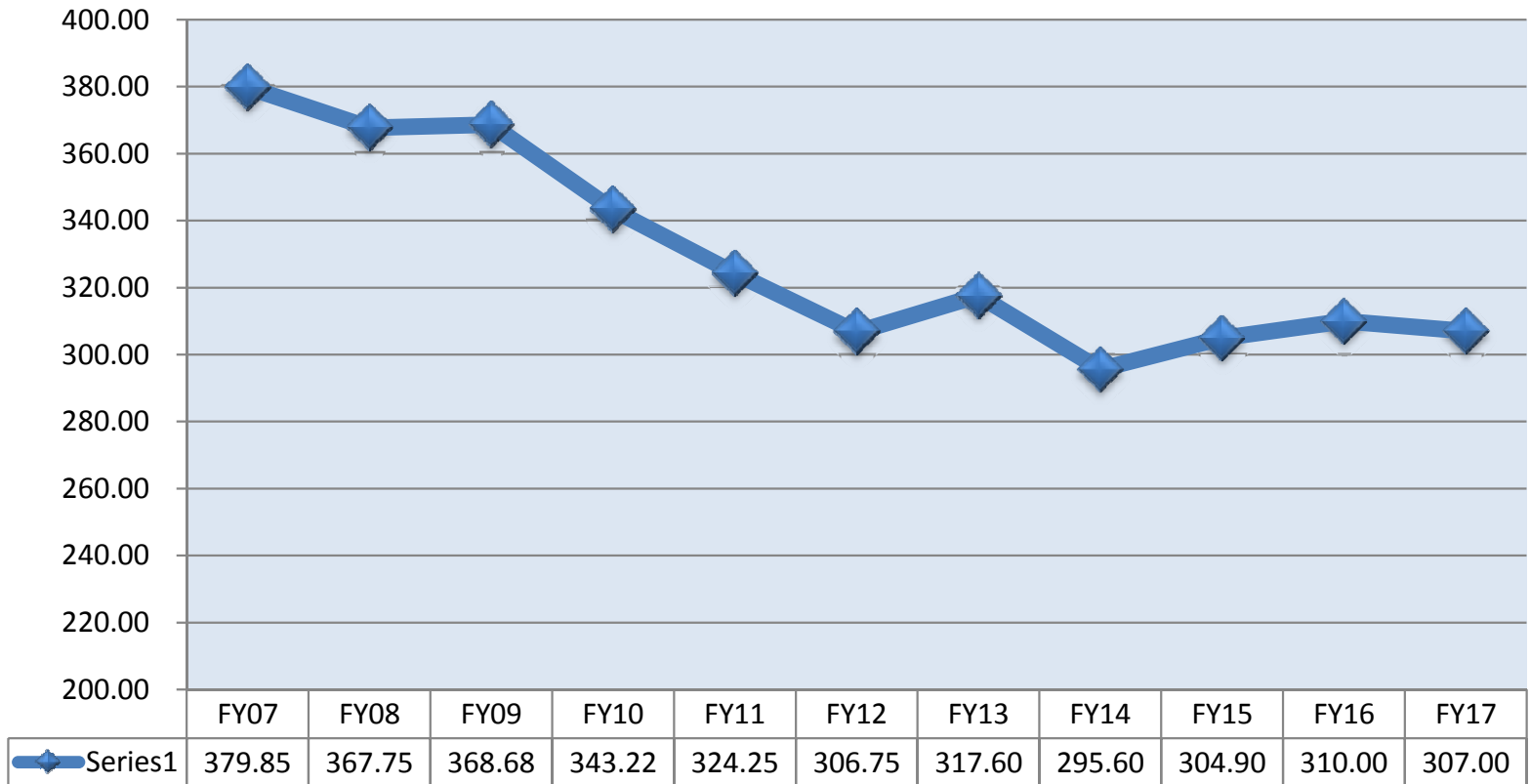

The School District has prepared a projected expenditure budget in the amount of **\$14,824,716 in anticipated expenditures and transfers**. The budget provides expenditures in the instruction categories of 69%. The District requested and received a waiver of the statutory provision that 70% of the general fund budget (excluding transfers) for all school districts be spent on instructional categories.

Due to SB53 the State is contributing directly to the retirement system an amount equal to the difference between our actuarially set contribution rate and the actual set by SB53 for FY2016. For LPSD the TRS is 29.27% vs. 12.56% and for the PERS 27.19% vs. 22%. The revenue amounts listed above for on behalf of contributions reflects management’s estimate of this contribution. The estimated expenses are recorded in this budget by function.

The Alaska State Board of Education adopted a new Chart of Accounts for Alaska School Districts which was effective July 1, 2002. This may limit the usefulness of the historical information for comparison. This reclassification does not represent any change in actual programs but simply a re-ordering of expenditures in some of the functional categories.

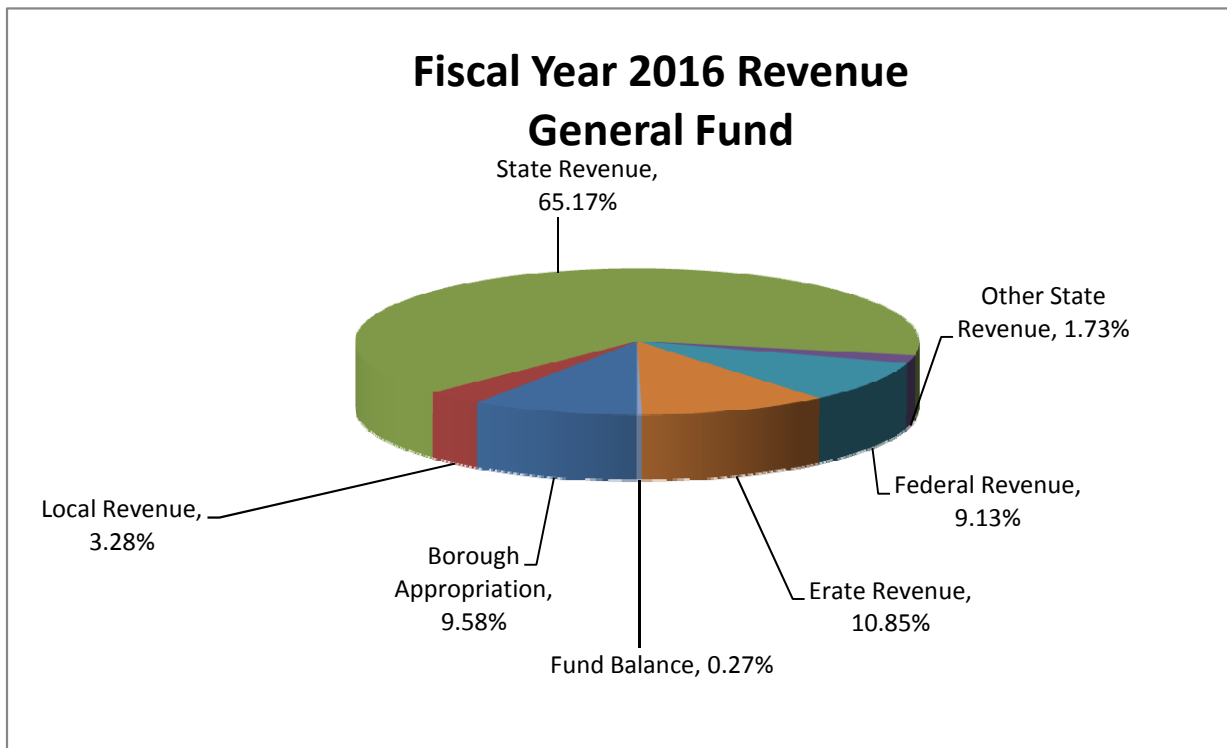
