**Re: Accepting Bid Proposal and contracting Jackson & Associates for the EFIS wall replacement at South Mountain Elementary**

During the late 1990s and early 2000s the WSD had various construction projects that incorporated the installation of EFIS wall systems as part of the envelop package. After taking wall cores of these areas and completing further investigation we have found that most of the systems may have been installed per plan but discovered that the plan details themselves were not correct. Add to that the necessary maintenance required on these systems has not been completed. These factors and more have resulted in a wall system that is not performing as needed causing multiple leaks, wall saturation, and potentially increasing the likelihood of structural damage and failure.

To repair these areas, we need to remove the existing EFIS assembly (EFIS Surfacing & Insulation Layers) down to the existing concrete block wall. Then the area needs to be thoroughly cleaned and primed. A new layer of self-adhering underlayment air barrier would then be added. Once installed, a layer of 2" mineral wool insulation will be installed. A new vented hat channel is then secured through the mineral wool insulation to the block wall. Then new 22-gauge steel panels, associated trims and closures are installed to complete the work.

The South Mountain Elementary School gym walls and two smaller areas at the main entrance and by the library are desperately in need of this work. We sent out RFPs to 8 qualified contractors, had a pre-bid meeting and received four (4) bids for this work on June 2<sup>nd</sup>. Jackson & Associates was the lowest responsible bidder with a price of \$420,000.00. We would like to move forward with this work this year and contract with Jackson & Associates. Therefore, we would like the Boards approval to contract with Jackson and Associates in the amount of \$420,000.00 to complete this work.

**Re: Designating Auction Proceeds for needed Equipment Purchases.**

The WSD B&G Department has various pieces of equipment that we would like to auction off utilizing Wisconsin Surplus Online Auction (WSOA). WSOA is utilized by multiple municipalities, school districts, universities and government agencies to sell outdated and excess materials and equipment. The advantage of this service is that it allows for the ability to capture a large bidding pool with the hope of maximizing the best price. The successful bidder pays the commission fee for items purchased directly to WSOA. Items are sold "AS IS", which eliminates the hassles of warranties or call backs from those with buyer's remorse. We send WSOA pictures and a description of the items and they take care of the posting, advertising and auctioning of the items. The WSD's main cost is coordinating the pickup of the items by the purchaser, so in our case this will be very minimal.

We have multiple pieces of equipment that are obsolete, making it difficult and expensive to purchase parts and or maintain. Many of these pieces were purchased years ago, for whatever reason, and are not properly sized or useful within our current operations fleet. Much of the equipment has been deemed risky to further invest in but feel it may have value for potential purchasers.

We would like the Boards permission to utilize funds received from this auction to be designated to WSD B&G toward updating needed equipment in the 2026-2027 Fiscal Year. We are confident that we will capture better results through the auction than any trade-in offers we receive.
