Dear School Board Members,

Thank you for your efforts during the continued challenges you're facing as a school district. It's unfortunate that a virus has been politicized in the way it has, forcing individual communities to navigate mitigation plans individually. It's simply not fair that you're in the position to make these important decisions. Yet, here you are, here we all are, trying to navigate how to keep our children as healthy as possible and in school full time as much as possible. We're uncertain as to what the "must haves" are regarding the requirements for the ARP funding, but current data is showing that cases, and more importantly, hospitalizations are on the rise for younger populations with the new variants circulating. It's hard to know how this will look for children ineligible for vaccination with school back in session across the country. We are again in "wait and see" mode.

We support most any decision you decide to make, but strongly urge you to consider universal masking for at least the first two weeks. We're sure you're already working on clearly lining out what steps will be taken if we see a surge in cases, and look forward to reading what protocols will be established.

Implementing a masking protocol as school gets going may provide some mitigating measure; however, as we're sure you're all aware, Delta is more contagious, and regular masks may do little to prevent spread. It's what we have though, and we can only hope for individual responsibility to help keep our community as safe as possible. At some point, we think it comes down to this. If some measures are taken, you can fulfill funding requirements, and at least be able to say you tried what you could with the tremendous burdens placed on you now, and recognize this was never for you to carry alone.

We all have to decide the role we play in getting back to normal. Unfortunately, it seems likely we may all catch this virus at some point, and there probably isn't a lot to stop that. As vaccinated individuals, we can only hope that our experience with the illness will be less severe, and help relieve pressure on our medical system. It's incredibly unfair that our younger population may become subjected to more serious disease because of the vitriolic and oppositional behaviour we're witnessing from many adults. But, again, here we are.

More of us will die; some of them will be children. We're not sure we can do much to stop it anymore given the resistance to do some very basic things early on in 2020. We think the battle is lost. COVID is likely here to stay. We hope no one else we love dies, or becomes permanently disabled, but it will be what it will be.

As a family, we will be watching our community numbers, and make regular risk assessments based on this information as to whether or not school is a safe enough environment for our family. We will continue to do our part - engage our individual responsibility to do what we can to keep our community safe. We hope others will too.

Thank you again for all you do. This continues to be a tremendously challenging time to navigate, and we are grateful for your attempt to navigate this situation from a well-informed place.

Petersburg School Board Members, Ms. Kludt-Painter, and Ms. Conn,

First off, we genuinely want to say how much we appreciate you and your dedication to our children and the families of Petersburg. Being thrown into this position in the midst of a pandemic is mind boggling and we honestly do not know how you do it – and no matter how we may differ or concur on the issues at hand, just know that we greatly value your tireless work for trying to do the best for our kids.

We wrote a brief email prior to last night's school board meeting; however, we are not sure whether you received it or not. We simply suggested waiting to make masking optional until children under 12 can be vaccinated and believe this could be an excellent compromise for both sides of the topic at hand.

I (Kellii) listened to the meeting in its entirety last night and wanted to add more to our original statement. These are some items we hope you consider when making your decision:

1. We are not only urging, but actually **PLEADING** with you to consider universal masking until children under 12 can be vaccinated – which the experts at your meeting said would be in November. That is approximately 3 to 4 months of universal masking. Please make your decisions based on science and not popular opinion. The medical community all over the country are urging mandatory masking in schools and the CDC is recommending masking in schools.
2. I (Kellii) heard from a couple of school board members that stated we should not have universal masking in schools if we do not have COVID in the community. We genuinely want to know how we will know there is no COVID in the community without testing everyday? From speaking with local medical staff, many seem to believe that COVID is continuously circulating in our community, but people are not testing. In addition, flights are bringing people in from outside of Petersburg twice a day and nobody can be certain that COVID is not being brought in, especially with the absence of a testing mandate in place. **With this being said, if you are only considering implementing universal masking when COVID rates are high – we would like you to consider utilizing the State's alert system and not just our community test results.**
3. I (Kellii) heard from multiple school board members speak about COVID as if we were dealing with the original strain of the virus. We have had two individuals recently pass away from COVID and it is most likely from the Delta variant – as it accounts for 96% of the positive cases in Alaska (<https://www.alaskapublic.org/2021/08/04/delta-variant-account-for-96-of-alaskas-new-covid-cases>). Dr. Tuccillo mentioned during the meeting that this is not the same virus we were dealing with last year and that Delta is causing more and more young children to end up in the hospital (<https://www.theatlantic.com/health/archive/2021/08/delta-variant-covid-children/619712> and <https://www.yalemedicine.org/news/5-things-to-know-delta-variant-covid>). Your experts mentioned that one person has the ability to infect eight other individuals. We are also fully aware that more than likely children will survive Delta, but how many of these infected children will be dealing with long haul disease at a young age. How will this affect them later on in life? And are we willing to risk any child's life for a mere 4 months of universal masking? There is more to consider than death. If you take away most of the protective protocols you had in place last year – in addition to making masks optional, we feel this is a recipe for disaster. **All it will take is one Delta positive individual (most likely unmasked) to spread the virus (that has been shown to have a high viral load <https://www.cdc.gov/>**

[coronavirus/2019-ncov/variants/delta-variant.html](#)) to multiple children in a class. **By this time – it will be too late to protect that class by making masking universal again.** Is it worth not waiting 4 months to get more children vaccinated before you take this course of action?

4. Our daughter, Mia, is not yet eligible for a vaccine. However, she will be vaccinated as soon as she is able to. Regardless of what you decide for the school year, our child will be wearing a mask at school, and she has no problems doing so. We strongly feel that masking in a room with a large number of children who we are not familiar with, will help to protect her. With that being said, wearing a mask most likely protects those around her more than it protects her. We want to know who will be protecting her if she is seated next to an unmasked child who may be symptomatic/asymptomatic? **If you make masking optional, we would like to know what options we will have to seat her next to other masked children in the classroom? Or what barriers will be implemented to protect her?**

5. We understand we are just one family and that it appears there are people in the community that are louder and more aggressive on the other side of this issue than we are, when it comes to this topic. **So, with that being said, we also urge you to decide what direction you will take before school begins in August and definitely before September 14th.** If you do decide to make masking optional after September 14th and before children under 12 can be vaccinated, it may be too late to make a decision that will reduce the risk to our child. We want to know our options before school begins.

Again, we greatly appreciate everything you have done so far in regard to this issue. This is not easy and we totally get it. We know you are exhausted and overwhelmed and that there doesn't appear to be an end in sight. We are there and fully support you. We understand that no matter what you decide – not everyone will be happy, but hope you are able to find a happy medium that will help to keep our kids as safe as possible before school begins.

Dear Petersburg School Board Members,

Today we are writing this letter in hopes that our voices can be heard and opinions considered as you make these heavy decisions for our school, which in effect ripple out to the community. As parents of a first grader at Stedman elementary and a month old newborn baby, we are extremely grateful for the current Covid safety guidelines you have implemented this year, and the previous year. We do have some concern however, if the masks mandate is lifted, especially for the youth 12 and under who do not have the option of an added layer of protection of a vaccine. This includes our son who comes home to his brand new baby sister each night. Yes, we can choose to have him continue to wear a mask, but the most protection comes when all people participate in wearing masks. We also know the risks of social pressure amongst students if some kids go with masks and some without, we are concerned about the potential avoidable teasing and divide this could cause between students in the building. The only thing we can hope for, is we all work together to do what we know will help stop any potential spread within the school walls, and that is continue universal masking. That is our only layer of protection until we can get our children vaccinated, against this Delta Variant which we know is even more transmissible and dangerous to children than the original strain. The school did such a fantastic job last year preventing spread in the school, it just doesn't make sense to loosen up the protocols when this variant is more dangerous now for our children and families at home.

The statistic show that taking multiple preventative measures such as universal masking and vaccinations are the best chance we have at keeping the virus from spreading, then its not a far leap to realize this is also our best chance at keeping kids in the classrooms this year, keeping parents at their jobs and keeping this community healthy and functioning. Many schools around the country have started school with no masks and already had so many kids in quarantine that they have shut down and gone back to virtual learning. Recently there was an unvaccinated teacher who took her mask off to read a story aloud to her class and ended up infecting over half her class who were wearing masks, who then took the virus home to their families. More data showing we all need to wear them to keep everyone safe. We cant control who is vaccinated and who is not. What we can do is one simple thing to add protection in a classroom full of unvaccinated children and perhaps unvaccinated teachers, mask up. If we wait until there's a problem to put the masks back on, then we are already to late. Please consider continuing on the wonderful path you have all taken so far to be proactive in stopping potential spread of Covid in our school system and community. Please consider masking, at the very least, until we have opportunities to vaccinate our children and give them some protection from severe illness and hospitalization.

We appreciate your strength to stand up for what is best for the safety of our kids. Our hope is that you know there are many of us out there who appreciate what you have done thus far and hopefully continue to do to protect our children, the teachers, staff, and community!

First of all, I wanted to thank the school board members for their service. Covid has definitely made your jobs more complex. Thank you for caring about our students by serving in this role and making these hard decisions.

As a mom and a registered nurse, I am in favor of masking in the schools. Last year, we could all clearly see that Covid was not a short term problem. It is something that we will be dealing with for a long time to come.

While I do respect that each individual has the right to have their personal opinion on the matter, I feel it is important for the school to make their decisions based on educated facts, not opinions. The medical community recommends that masks be worn because the research confirms masking helps in preventing the spread of Covid.

If we do not mask, and a big outbreak occurs, we know from this last spring's experience that it affects our whole community: schools, businesses, medical facilities, etc. It is in everyone's best interest to prevent that from happening again.

Another problem is the fact that vaccines are not available to those under 12 at this time. That means they are in the exact same situation that they were in one year ago. This new Delta variant seems to be making more children sicker than the virus did even six months ago.

While the vaccine is available to those 12 and up, it is still the parents' decision on whether or not to vaccinate. I think making those who are unvaccinated mask (while not making the vaccinated students mask) would add friction and divisions among kids. Therefore, I think all kids should mask.

I do think that even if the mask mandate is lifted for students that any unvaccinated staff in the school should have mandatory mask wearing. They are adults who made a choice not to vaccinate but still need to comply with recommendations of masking indoors. Thank you for the work you do in the interest of the students in our community. Our children are our future, and they deserve the best education we can provide, but also a safe environment in which to learn. For that reason, I am writing to strongly support a universal mask mandate in our schools until children under 12 can be vaccinated, which medical experts say will likely be in a few months.

I cannot believe there is even a question, or issue, or debate about this- we are talking about a few months! Dear School Board Members,

I used to be a teacher with this district and one of the greatest gifts for me has been to see the young people I've had in my classes grow and find happiness and success in their adult lives. I care so very deeply for each and every one of them. I deeply respect the decisions they make for their lives and their interest in becoming involved in our community even if I don't agree with what they are doing or saying.

This is a very difficult time in our nation's history. We are in the middle of a pandemic that has caused serious divisions in our community. Young parents are having to deal with issues that most parents who are alive today didn't have to consider. Pandemics don't come with instructions. When we first started this thing we were all shooting from the hip. Some of the decisions made were good and the incidence of covid cases and deaths shrank considerably. We were so excited this spring because we were happy to get back to normal. We want so badly to have our lives back the way they were pre Covid, unfortunately with the Delta variant not only can we not go back yet, it is even more dangerous not to stay the course.

When I was a mom, I sent my kids to this school without considering their safety because I knew student safety was at the forefront of all of the decisions made by the school board, superintendent, principal, the teachers, the aides and the janitors. Sure you couldn't control scrapes on the playground or the bumps and bruises that go with growing up but I never ever worried about my kids' safety when they marched off to school each morning. The district did their job to take student safety worries off the very full plate of child rearing concerns.

A year and half or so ago, that all changed. Student safety was no longer about bumps and bruises it became about life and death. Last year our district did an excellent job of providing a safe environment for kids to go to school. I am not familiar with any other public school that had in-person learning for the entirety of last year. We are very lucky we had caring professionals looking after our young people so they didn't miss a year of school. It was cumbersome and at times overwhelming but boy, you did it and you did it well.

You know we all are just sick of Covid. We are done with it, we want it to be over, every single one of us. And many of us are used to getting what we want. But Covid is still here and stronger than ever. We know that the majority of Covid deaths in this country are happening to people who are not vaccinated. Unfortunately our most vulnerable people, our little ones can't be vaccinated against this dread disease and that scares me crazy. I have 3 grandchildren in this school district who are too young to be vaccinated. They are in the most at-risk population in our community. If an adult is unvaccinated, they have a choice about how they spend their time, they aren't forced to spend hours a day in a small space with a large group of people 5 days a week.

We also know that masks prevent the spread of COVID. They are not 100% effective, in fact the fabric masks most kids wear are not the most effective masks but they do prevent the spread. There have been many studies related to masking and the spread of disease, decades worth. Specific studies related to Covid and masking have similar positive results.

If you ask children to wear a mask until the danger is over, you are doing one small thing that may help in the spread of this horrible virus. You aren't asking for the fingernail of their left pinky finger, you are just asking that children put a piece of fabric on their face when they can't social distance. If one child dies from this horrible virus can you imagine the devastation that would cause to their family, their friends, their teachers, the community. As a grandmother of three precious treasures in the school, I would ask that the district provide N95s to all children, not take away the one thing that may save their life.

It really is the School Boards responsibility to make sure every child that comes through their doors is safe. You must pass another temporary mask mandate. I believe it's important to maintain your very strong record of providing a safe environment for learning.

Dear School Board Members,

I want to thank all of you for taking the time to discuss and put plans into place to help our schools reopen this year. As a teacher and parent, I want to see the schools open and in-person as that is best for all academically and socially. I would like to voice my concerns with the current plan in place with universal masking until the 14th and then at that point another plan put into place for the remainder of the school year.

To begin, I've taught through masking as of last year and then now again this school year and it's taking a toll on me as a teacher, parent, and citizen of this community. As a teacher, I'm wearing a mask from 7:45-3:45 with limited mask breaks and it's causing me to feel dizzy and lightheaded. I am also having a very hard time with a mask on, microphone up on full volume control, with zero talking in my classroom for my students to hear me articulate words for my lessons. I can't even tell you how hard it is to give a spelling test in a mask! Students can't see my facial expressions and hear me articulate and watch my lips as I speak. This is not enhancing our learning, it's actually causing the opposite effects right now. On top of keeping up with mask breaks, reminding children of masks, keeping up with masks, and always having to think of masks, it's a lot to keep up with when you are trying to teach and get a lot of our students caught up from the pandemic.

I understand requiring masks for everybody seems like an easy decision but that doesn't mean it's the best decision for our students. More and more studies are also being released that there is no scientific evidence necessitating the wearing of a face mask for prevention. I have even been told by state health officials that it doesn't matter if you're masked or unmasked, if you are around someone with COVID, you can still pick it up. There are staff and students that were masked and socially distanced last year and still caught COVID. We currently have zero active cases in our school after coming back from almost two weeks which leads me to think we should be considered in the green or yellow status. If we are moving towards the yellow status as stated in your mitigation plan then that means indoor masking is recommended but not required. That is the same as optional masking which is what many of this community are asking for. I met with 13 out of 14 of my families for Intro to Your Child conferences and out of those 13 families, only 1 said they felt they were in the middle of comfortability with optional masking and 12 of them were in favor of optional masking. My classroom which includes the parents and students is asking for this and seeking optional masking including their teacher. As a teacher and parent at the Petersburg School District, please look at all sides of this issue and please consider allowing us to choose.

I appreciate your time and consideration. Thank you again for all that you do and for the opportunity to be heard as a teacher, parent, and community member of Petersburg.

Dear School Board Members,

Thank you for taking the time to read this email and all the others that you are receiving. You have a very difficult job that is often unrewarding. I would like you to know how grateful I am for all the hard work you have been doing to make Petersburg School District safe and in person.

I am writing for several reasons. First, to show my support and appreciation for the Moderate Risk Reopening Plan "to allow for a slow transition while other routines and procedures are fine tuned." (quote from PSD Reopening Plan 8-13-21).

Now that these two weeks are coming to an end, I would like to urge the school board to consider reinstating the masking policy that the elementary school had during the 2020-21 school year. From experience, I can confirm that universal masking, or full time masking, is too restrictive for this age of students. The students are not able to consistently and correctly wear their masks at all times during the day. We have had to spend much time during the school day redirecting students to put their masks back on, which takes away from educational time.

Last year, students were able to take their masks off if they were 6 feet apart, allowing them to have longer mask breaks. When they moved to a group situation and/or left the classroom, they put their masks back on. This was much more manageable. This allowed them to have some time with and some time without their masks on. If a child was just unable to wear their mask, they chose to sit 6 feet away from others. This policy worked well last year and we were able to be in person successfully for a majority of the school year.

As a teacher, I would like to request that teachers be allowed to wear shields in situations where the teacher is 6 feet away from students. I have been consistently wearing my mask for the past two weeks. It is very fatiguing to teach, talk, interact and connect with students all day with a mask on. I've been going home exhausted and with a headache most evening. When I was allowed to remove my mask and replace it with a shield for portions of the day, I felt much better physically and emotionally.

Lastly, I am very concerned about the possibility of optional masking for staff and students. I feel that it is going to create a division that could be devastating for relationships for both students and staff. This severance is already seen in our community and it would be very discouraging to see that happen within our schools.

Dear Board Members and Administration,

I'd like to start by thanking each and every one of you for the time and energy you've committed to this school and the community. I know that you are not tasked with an easy job and I do appreciate that you've been willing to do it.

At the end of summer when the district put out their safe start plan they said full masking for 2 weeks. I get it, we had to test the waters to make sure there wasn't going to be a surge in cases. The safe start plan said that it would be re-evaluated after the first two weeks of school, at the next school board meeting.

Here we are. 2 weeks into school and there has not been a single case of COVID in the school. There hasn't even been confirmed cases in town that would indicate community spread. Our only recent positives have been travel related.

And even though there haven't been any confirmed COVID cases in the school, and even though the kids have been fully masked, there *have been* the usual sniffles and cold and stomach bugs that would normally circulate when kids return to school. So tell me, how are the masks working if our regular run of the mill germs are still making their rounds?

Last year we had DOZENS of confirmed COVID cases in the school. All while the kids *were* fully masked.

We are reaching a point where masks are doing more harm than good with our kids. We have a kid at home hanging on by a thread at school. Its hard for him. All of it. The masks are the icing on the top of an already overloaded cake for him. We need our kids to start thriving again. We are fortunate to have an incredible teacher and amazing support staff that have helped pull him through this. My plea goes beyond "discomfort" or "fatigue" of wearing a mask- this is hindering his ability to learn and enjoy school.

I feel that the board needs to be reminded that they were voted in by their peers, to represent their peers. The survey that you are using to help weigh this decision clearly shows how the majority of the responders feel.

The major problem that I have with this new mitigation plan is the lack of logic- this is not Fall of 2020, these kids have not been podded-up or distanced, they have been together, unmasked, all summer long. There have been sleepovers, little league, and camping trips- all the fun things kids should be doing! All unmasked. My kids were both a part of an outdoor summer care program all summer long. All unmasked! It was awesome and it felt normal.

And in the evenings when they head to the pool or the weekends when they head to a birthday party they will continue to be unmasked. So why is it we feel the need to mask in school? When we need them to feel safe, engaged, acknowledged and eager to learn? Why put that barrier on them there and not anywhere else?

There are several daycare and preschool facilities in the community that have been totally unmasked for the last 18 months and still no surge in COVID cases among the kids.

I'll close by saying that the masks are disgusting. These are not doctors or nurses prepping for surgery. They are not working in a sterile environment. They are grubby, gross, grimy kids who drop their masks on the ground or reach for them from the bottom of a moldy backpack and put them on their mouth.

I'm Cadence, a sixth grader in Mitkof Middle School and I do not support your idea to mask us kids Kindergarten through twelfth grade.

First of all I'm on the swim team and cross country, both non-masking sports. After a long hard workout most kids are panting their lungs out or breathing heavily and as you know the showers are very close together and our spit molecules go everywhere. Furthermore, swimming has only closed down once due to a broken pool, NON-COVID RELATED. And our cross country team hasn't closed down at all.

Second, on a normal day at school (plus masking) we have recess then gym, we mask at gym, so after all that exercise we need to cool down a little bit and breathe for a moment. Instead we head to class wearing hot masks over sweaty faces making it hard to concentrate and or breathe, and stopping to cool down would stall class. So that just adds on to the stress of completing work.

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Dear School Board Members:

Over the past 18 months I have repeatedly thought back to the movie *The Croods* – if you haven't seen the movie the story is about a family during the stone ages and their journey in a changing world. The dad is terrified of every single thing around them and convinced that any deviation from the utmost cautious plan will result in death.

Each day we are all faced with multiple decisions where we have to weigh the risk and determine the best course of action. Sometimes we have to make immediate decisions to protect ourselves, our children, our property etc.

Other times we are given an overload of information and we have to weed through all the choices to make our best informed decisions. Weigh the “pros” and “cons”, look at the worst possible outcome and at the same time also consider the best possible outcome. The healthy adult will then make a decision isn't made out of fear – but rather a calculated decision that balances the worst and best outcomes.

We have lived this reality for about 78 weeks now. Last school year we were able to narrow down the class sizes, “pod” the kids at school and try to manage the risk. Masking was relaxed when risk was low and then masking was tightened up when the risk increased. We were able to be fluid in our response to COVID-19.

The proposed plan is a giant step backward to the beginning phases of COVID-19: strict rules, harsh realities for children, emotional isolation, and the plan leaves no room for hope. In September 2020 there were ZERO vaccinated people in Petersburg. Today 75% of our 12 and up population is fully vaccinated. Let that sink in! 75% vs 0%

The risk has changed but the rules have, for lack of better words, gone Stone Age.

One of my children has a hard time looking people in the eye – so when you remove the rest of the face and only leave the eyes – what does that do for him? We've stripped him of the ability to feel safe, comfortable and ready to learn. This plan does not teach our kids how to navigate the world – but rather hide from it.

Please don't make your decision fueled by your fear. When you serve a community there is an obligation to weigh all the information and not be frozen in fear. Everything has a risk – everything.

Make a calculated decision based on the risk in Petersburg, Alaska. Not the risk in Anchorage, Seattle, New York, Dallas, or any other place. Find a middle ground where the safety measures taken are reflective of the community risk coupled with the measures our community has proactively taken.

Consider an alternative that provides flexibility, reflects the special community we live in and gives hope. Thank you for your time and your willingness to serve our children.

Dear School Board Members,

In addition to the letter we sent last month, we'd like to offer specific feedback now that school has started. Our number one want (as we know it is for you too) is for our kids to maintain in-person school as much as possible this year. We know that will be dictated by what community spread looks like as the year proceeds, and what public health directives dictate based on current risk level. With this in mind, we'd really like to see some of the mitigating measures from last year brought back. In some ways, this is feeling more pertinent than continuing to try and mask young children who simply aren't able to do so effectively. Also, it seems challenging for some teachers to maintain close to full-time masking since they want their students to hear and understand them correctly (because, of course!). As a result, we've observed masks being pulled down to obtain that goal. Please don't take this feedback as negative criticism, but instead a realistic observation of what may contribute to increased virus transmission. If it is decided to continue with universal masking, we're wondering if there's some alternative mask that could be provided to teachers that allows their entire face to be seen so they can keep their masks on mostly full time? Clear Masks (clearmasks.com), and Safe 'N' Clear (safenclear.com) are some examples of what may be an appropriate alternative since face shields are not considered adequate by the CDC.

We're uncertain as to why it was decided to have K-2 all meet in the cafeteria in the morning regardless of breakfast need, but we have been uncomfortable with this. It seems unnecessary for so many children to be centrally located at that time, most with masks removed for eating. Our 4th grader starts school at 8am, and is able to sit with his class in the classroom while his peers eat breakfast. He is able to work on other things during that time, or also eat more if he chooses. This seems much more reasonable from a mitigation standpoint, as well as contact tracing should someone in his perimeter test positive. We would like to see some of the smaller groups be re-instated for this purpose. We understand there's a staffing shortage, so we ask that you consider K-2 going to their classrooms and eating with only their classes. We also hope ventilation with windows remaining open, and filtration systems staying on, continues to be a part of the strategy taken to reduce viral transmission (remember the New York Times simulation of ventilation in the classroom? Here's a link to it if you haven't seen it: <https://www.nytimes.com/interactive/2021/02/26/science/reopen-schools-safety-ventilation.html>, and if you hit a paywall, here's another similar simulation: <https://www.3ds.com/newsroom/media-alerts/schools-reopen-during-pandemic-classroom-simulation-helps-make-them-safer-students-staff>. Last year, during cold and flu season, there seemed to be a drastic reduction in how many kids were sick, and we do think some of these measures proved useful in changing that outcome. Our 4th grader who is notoriously sick every birthday in January, was unusually healthy for that time of year. And, he was really excited about it too :).

The current mitigation in general terms, mostly makes sense to us. If transmission levels stay low, we understand it might be reasonable from a risk standpoint to make masking optional; however, this could become taxing on teachers and those students whose parents want them to remain masked. It seems unfair to require teachers to become the enforcers of some of these students. This is why considering maintaining (or re-implementing) some of last year's measures makes the most sense to us. Things like masking on the move, good ventilation practices, and smaller groups may help to keep our schools operational while maintaining consistent protocols for everyone. Smaller groups could allow for less masking too. With that said, we also want to be sensitive to families and staff who may feel it absolutely necessary for their safety to maintain universal masking regardless of current risk level and/or mitigating measures. Our family is perfectly comfortable maintaining masking if that is what is decided. We also ask that consideration be given to some of our concerns revolving around re-implementing mitigating measures as outlined above.

Again, we support you, and your efforts. Regardless of what decisions you settle on, we'll continue to gauge what's right for us as family in moving forward, and we feel comfortable in making those decisions as the school year progresses.

However, if masks are only effective if they are worn properly and securely at all times then at the elementary school that is a very unrealistic expectation. I believe that if optional masking is not a decision made then masking on the move is probably the best-case scenario. Masking on the move in my definition is masking when in small close groups, masking when moving down the hallway, masking when doing carpet time. But other than those moments when students are seated at their desks away from others, or simply walking around in their classrooms, masks may be removed. Classrooms are a family unit and I do not personally wear my mask around my family. I also feel that so many students are interconnected outside of the school community, that there is truly no way to stop a spread if it were to happen. One last thought, with my teacher hat on, is that I also feel that special education needs to be an exception if required masking continues. It makes life so difficult to not be able to properly communicate with a child who already has challenges in so many areas of life that a mask just adds one more barrier of frustration by students and adults.

Dear Members of the Petersburg School Board:

I am writing this email to you to ask that you stop the masking and testing of our students. Continue to observe the symptom exclusions but allow our children to think. In writing this, I thought to talk about civil rights, science and non-science, differences in values and the free expression of those values for the community because there are so many ways to come at this problem. The following are the arguments that I feel are most beneficial.

I recently attended the work session of the School Board in order to ascertain what exactly were the fears and obstacles that the Board were dealing with regarding the masking and testing of students. I found that there seemed to be more fears than obstacles and that many of those were complicated by unfounded assumptions on the side of further restrictions that are not being questioned by the Board in a climate where daily reports of failures in masking, vaccines, PCR and antigen tests, and medical protocol are available to whomever cares to do the research. I also found many of those fears were taken on personally by members of the Board in absence of parental consent that they do so. I try to not get upset as I see you trying to take over what I view as my parental responsibility (to keep my child healthy), especially when you are displacing the values that I have for my family with your own. The reality is that the schools have taken more and more authority from the parents as we have sat back and watched this freedom slip from us. Meanwhile, our society has lost the understanding that all persons have different priorities for the values that we live by. Instead, we arrogantly want others to have the same priority of values that we do. In a free society, the expectation that what you value alone should reign supreme is ludicrous.

As a mother, I understand the desire that each of you has to protect your own children. However, as an elected community member, I ask that you not vote for yourselves but for your constituency. Or, if you cannot do so, I ask that you step down from your position. Each of us operates on two levels. We advocate personally for our own children, but we operate on the community level for the good of the majority of the community, while protecting the rights of the minority. In the past, when working with kids in the Leikkerring/Norwegian Dance Troupe or with Viking Swim Club I have always seen that unwritten maxim played out. I was surprised to see the valuing of personal interests on our Petersburg School Board. Insisting that healthy, young students who are at a negligible risk of being infected by COVID-19, experiencing serious harm from any infection and, or of transmitting the disease, sacrifice their lives in order to maintain a community bubble big enough to protect those at risk is unconscionable. Prior to this virus it was up to each parent to determine the risk level of their own child when attending school. Unlike some, I know that after 1 ½ years a lot is known about COVID-19, and a lot is known about how to protect those most vulnerable. A better aim of school resources would be in educating the most vulnerable in the school district on how to protect themselves. If I’m not mistaken, this is what we do in gym as we teach the individual to exercise for their health, it is what we do in health classes to teach the individual to protect themselves from STDs or pregnancy, and it is what we do in speech classes to defend our positions. We do not teach our children that any other person needs to do the work to protect us. It is not the school’s job to

place mandates on our children when those vulnerable among us now have ample opportunity and ability to protect themselves.

Years ago, when my husband and I were confronted with sending our child to a public school where the Board's actions concerned us, we were told that if we didn't like the actions of the Board that we should choose something else for our child. This led to 18 years of homeschooling where each child then attended Petersburg High School. While I realize that homeschooling can be difficult, I also know that if my child was at a significant risk of catching a virus, that could severely hurt them, I would take them out of public school in a second. We cannot continue to treat our healthy children as if they are loaded guns and everyone around them should fear them without any evidence that they might cause hurt. Three years ago, if a child caught a virulent viral or bacterial infection in the school restroom or a virulent staff infection from the mats in the gym, most in this community, and a majority of Americans nation-wide, would not believe that a school board member, a teacher, a staff member or the school itself would be responsible for paying their health-care costs or being sent to jail for any possible deaths. Instead, over the years, parents have worked with school board and staff to educate their children on the health measures needed to protect themselves.

My purpose is not to attack you but to encourage you to due diligence of research and logical expression of the scientific facts. Usually, when we don't get what we want or the conversations get difficult, the tendency is to attack the person presenting an alternate idea and labeling them, which results in not listening to them. Let's reframe the epithets and labels that we sling at others, because our conversation now is divisive and does not belong in a community, or on administrative boards, where we don't necessarily elect people upon party lines. Someone who chooses not to mask their family is not an Anti-masker, but someone who has chosen to rely on other measures to protect them, and their family, from Covid-19. Some of them may do so because they value personal liberties of everyone over a false sense of security for some. Some may dislike the thought of teaching hypocrisy by wearing a covering that does not prevent viral pass-through which has surrounded the masking debate. And, yes, a few may value their own physical comfort over another's desires. Someone who chooses not to vaccinate their family is not an anti-vaxxer, but someone who loves their family and has chosen this for their better immune health. Most of them are educated, many of them have read scientific studies about the vaccinations and are checking out the data. Some of them make decisions based on their faith, and a few make their decision based on their distrust of the government. Someone who chooses to question the governmental directives regarding Covid-19 is not an idiot, or anti-science. They may be of a group that has historically been betrayed by our government or students of history who recognize that the political game means government betrayal is not one isolated incidence in Tuskegee. Some may be researching scientific evidence (not position papers without proper scientific authority). Some may find the control of information, the excesses in new attempts to grab freedoms, or a tenet of their faith is involved in their decision-making.

Each American citizen makes different decisions for themselves based on their values. Allowing them to do so, good or bad, is a tenant of American Freedom. That has always been moderated with the understanding that you cannot use your freedoms to intentionally hurt another. Thus the saying, "Your freedom ends at my nose." But intentional hurt cannot be ascertained unless a child intentionally spreads a virus that they know that they have. Forgive

me if I am wrong, but I believe that some of you have the value that places scientific proofs above all else. And I can see that, as a Board member, that may be considered best in light of the fact that you are voting for a constituency and not for yourself or for the students who live in your household alone. The problem that I see is that you have never presented proof to the Petersburg Community that there IS true scientific data confirming that masks or testing in children will prevent the spread of COVID-19. I know you all have isolated stories, but even in the admission of those stories I have come to realize that you are unaware of the literally hundreds of mitigating factors that distort the truth about COVID-19 transmission among students. That is why we rely on statistical data from scientific studies which have a high degree of certainty. Because of your beliefs, as indicated in the work session last Wednesday, I'm guessing that you have never actually researched the science that you claim to believe. As I noted in my survey, I read all of the cites given in the CDC guidelines linked to the PCSD website (Titled: Science Brief: Transmission of SARS-CoV-2 in K-12 Schools and Early Care and Education Programs – Updated) for the section dealing with masking. Of the 8 cites, not one was of a statistically verifiable study on masking using the scientific protocols taught so ably by Victor Trautman at PHS all those years. Instead, the CDC sought to support their guidelines with "bad" science. They used opinion papers written by journalists, observational studies done without controls, and studies with multi-mitigation strategies that have no true or isolated scientific proof that masking prevents the spread of COVID-19. Much of the claims of the CDC aren't backed up by any proofs at all, such as the statement that, "Masks work through the combination of source control and protection for the mask wearer." Instead, the CDC cites flimsy "proofs" beneficial to supporting their already determined objective, piling on a quantity of cites hoping that you won't realize that there is no quality in their cites.

So, in reality, when you say that you "trust the science", what you don't even realize is that you are deceiving yourself. What you really trust is a governmental agency that has no legislative authority and has been plagued with accusations of being controlled or bribed. What you really value, then, is not the science, but the ease of having someone else tell you what to believe. Like those whom I find to be in the majority in Petersburg, I prefer not to live by another entity's dictates. And I believe that it is still a fundamental inalienable right from God, not given to us by our government, but guaranteed to us in our Constitution to do so. This makes me insist that if someone wants me to comply with their directives that they provide proof of the truth of their message. The courts have always demanded that a government entity provide this proof whenever liberties are curtailed. The CDC, the NIH, and The WHO have not fulfilled this requirement over the last few years. If you listen to the CDC, NIH, and The WHO without ascertaining the probative value of their proofs, yet allow them to guide your votes on the School Board, you are really saying that you hold, as a value, adherence to whatever a governmental agency tells you to do. That is simply not supportable with any study of history.

Instead of believing what you are told to believe by the different governmental agencies, your community, while they value your time and energies used on behalf of Petersburg, insist that you verify the science that you follow or admit that you do not want to do the research. In your research, seek to rate your proofs. Opinions without support by experts are worthless. Because I want you to know that I respect and value each Board Member’s time and the fact that you have each chosen to benefit your community by serving on the school board, I would like to present a myriad of scientific studies addressing the truth behind masking and testing mandates. We also know the risks of social pressure amongst students if some kids go with masks and some without, we are concerned about the potential avoidable teasing and divide this could cause between students in the building. The only thing we can hope for, is we all work together to do what we know will help stop any potential spread within the school walls, and that is continue universal masking. That is our only layer of protection until we can get our children vaccinated, against this Delta Variant which we know is even more transmissible and dangerous to children than the original strain. The school did such a fantastic job last year preventing spread in the school, it just doesn't make sense to loosen up the protocols when this variant is more dangerous now for our children and families at home.

The statistic show that taking multiple preventative measures such as universal masking and vaccinations are the best chance we have at keeping the virus from spreading, then its not a far leap to realize this is also our best chance at keeping kids in the classrooms this year, keeping parents at their jobs and keeping this community healthy and functioning. Many schools around the country have started school with no masks and already had so many kids in quarantine that they have shut down and gone back to virtual learning. Recently there was an unvaccinated teacher who took her mask off to read a story aloud to her class and ended up infecting over half her class who were wearing masks, who then took the virus home to their families. More data showing we all need to wear them to keep everyone safe. We cant control who is vaccinated and who is not. What we can do is one simple thing to add protection in a classroom full of unvaccinated children and perhaps unvaccinated teachers, mask up. If we wait until there's a problem to put the masks back on, then we are already to late. Please consider continuing on the wonderful path you have all taken so far to be proactive in stopping potential spread of Covid in our school system and community. Please consider masking, at the very least, until we have opportunities to vaccinate our children and give them some protection from severe illness and hospitalization.

Thank you all for your all you are doing for our community. We appreciate the endless hours you must have put into the past year and half dealing with something none of us have experience dealing with before. We appreciate your strength to stand up for what is best for the safety of our kids. Our hope is that you know there are many of us out there who appreciate what you have done thus far and hopefully continue to do to protect our children, the teachers, staff, and community!

I would like to focus on moving away from the politics of masking and let staff, the school board, and the administrators focus on the work that is being done to keep our schools open and our kids in the classroom and engaged. We all want our kids to be in the classroom and in a safe learning environment. We all want our kids to be in preschool, or in dance, or in school sports... activities that tie directly to whether or not the school district can stay open. And the bottom line: I really, really, really want my kids to be in the classroom with their teachers.

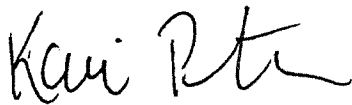

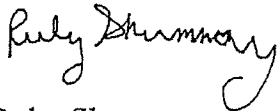

To the Petersburg School District Board of Directors:

As educators at Mitkof Middle School and Petersburg High School, we are committed to the physical, emotional, social, and intellectual development and well-being of all students in our community. We believe these interests are best served by having our students present in our classrooms. In order to achieve this end, we support the continuation of universal masking in our schools while our state and nation continue to grapple with the pandemic, and specifically with the highly contagious Delta variant.

This school year, in response to the changing conditions and guidance from medical experts, we have relaxed many of the mitigation strategies that we implemented last year. Some proved superfluous, while others were effective but burdensome. We have tried to return to operating the school as normally as possible, removing podding, allowing for increased class sizes, and shifting our emphasis away from distance delivery of instruction. We recognize the expansion of antigen testing among athletes as a very positive step forward; however, that testing currently includes around 55 students and staff out of a total that is well over 200. The one universal layer of protection is that we have in place to reduce the potential transmission of the coronavirus - and the incredible disruption to learning that would follow an outbreak - is universal masking. Removing that layer of protection would leave our schools incredibly vulnerable to spreading the virus unchecked before we realize that it is happening, as we have seen in many schools across the state and country.

Ultimately, we all want our students (and in many of our cases our own children) to be in school. Universal masking may be an inconvenience, but it is one that makes continuous in-person learning a reality. Based upon public health directives - which we do not determine - consistent universal masking is the least intrusive option to keep students in person at the school rather than being forced to quarantine if there are cases in the building or their classroom.

For these reasons, we, the undersigned educators at Mitkof Middle School and Petersburg High School, encourage you to approve the continuation of universal masking in our schools.

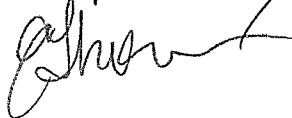
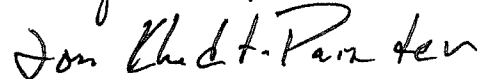
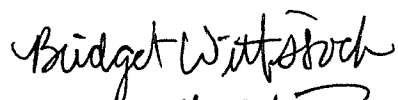

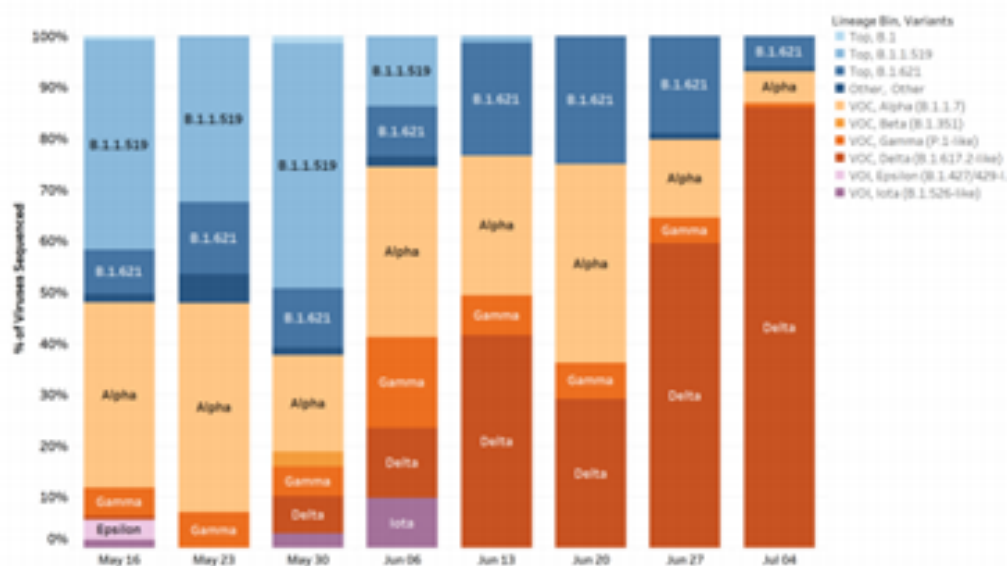

Delta Variant

What we know:

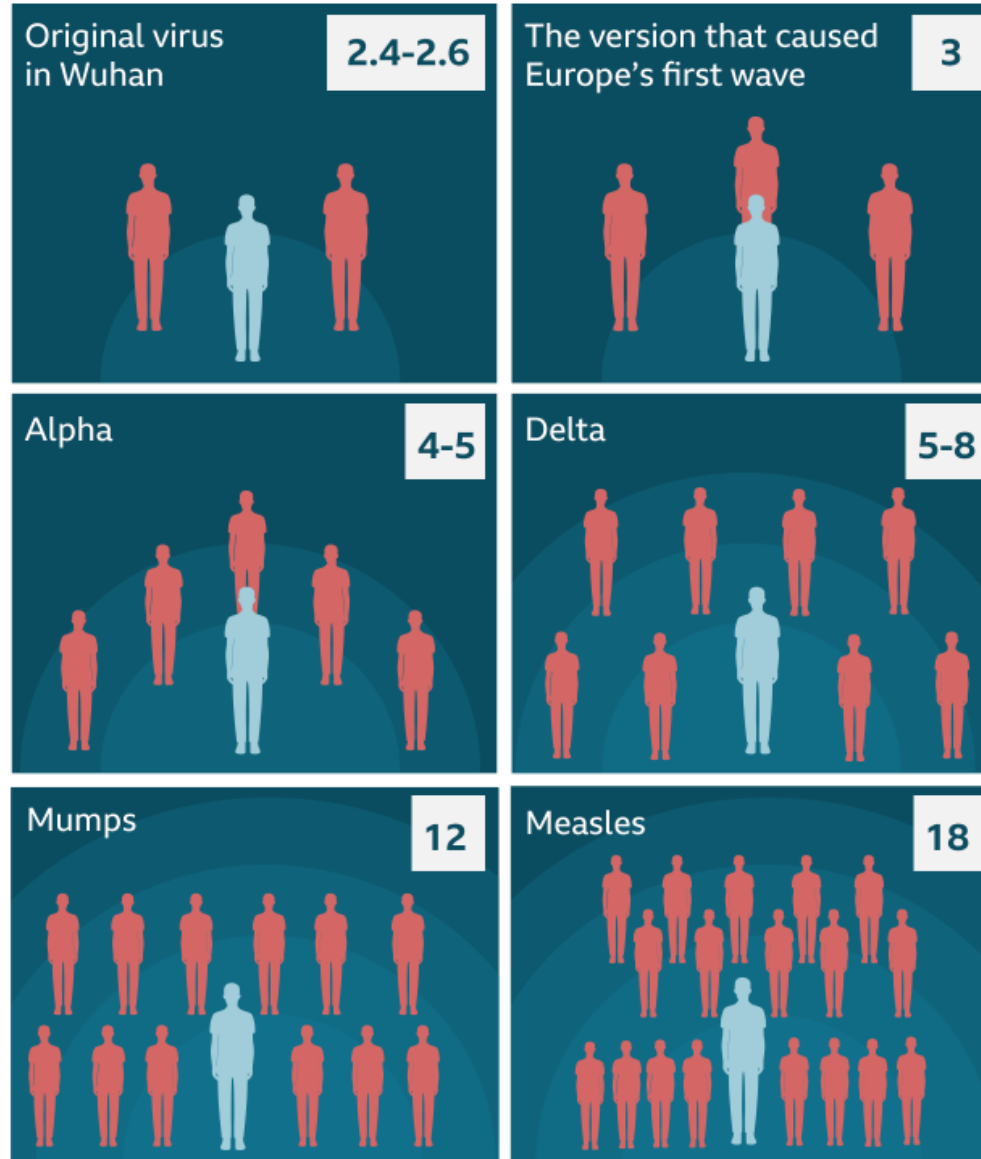
- Delta is a variant of the virus that causes COVID-19.
- New data show Delta is very contagious and spreads more easily than other variants.
- Unvaccinated people are at highest risk.
- Second dose of mRNA increases effectiveness of vaccines against Delta.
- **The Delta variant is now the predominant variant in Alaska.**

Recent Prevalence of Variants in Alaska



How the R0 numbers of Covid-19 variants and other diseases compare

The more contagious, the higher the R0 number



With the original SARS-CoV-2 virus, one infection spread to about 2-3 other unprotected individuals on average. With the delta variant, each infected person typically infects 5-8 unprotected individuals.

R0, pronounced "R naught," is a mathematical term that indicates how contagious an infectious disease is. It's also referred to as the reproduction number.

More on Delta

- **The emerging evidence about the Delta variant demonstrates it is more formidable than the original (wildtype) virus.**
 - Delta spreads more than twice as easily from one person to another, compared with earlier strains.
 - Delta has most recently surged to become the predominant variant –from <1% in May to over 80% of cases in July.
 - Delta is causing some “vaccine breakthrough infections,” meaning infections in fully vaccinated people, than other strains have. But, even so:
 - Most breakthrough infections are mild.
 - Vaccines are working as they should—they are preventing severe illness, hospitalizations, and death.
- New data show that people infected with Delta have higher viral loads—meaning more virus in their body—than with previous variants.
- In contrast to the Alpha strain, new data show that fully vaccinated people who are infected with the Delta variant might be infectious and might potentially spread the virus to others

- **CDC recommends universal indoor masking for all teachers, staff, students, and visitors to K-12 schools, regardless of vaccination status.** Children should return to full-time in-person learning in the fall with layered prevention strategies in place.

Key Takeaways

- Students benefit from in-person learning, and safely returning to in-person instruction in the fall 2021 is a priority.
- **Vaccination** is currently the leading public health prevention strategy to end the COVID-19 pandemic. Promoting vaccination can help schools safely return to in-person learning as well as extracurricular activities and sports.
- **Masks** should be worn indoors by all individuals (age 2 and older) who are not fully vaccinated. Consistent and correct mask use by people who are not fully vaccinated is especially important indoors and in crowded settings, when physical distancing cannot be maintained.
- CDC recommends schools maintain at least **3 feet of physical distance between students within classrooms**, combined with indoor mask wearing by people who are not fully vaccinated, to reduce transmission risk. When it is not possible to maintain a physical distance of at least 3 feet, such as when schools cannot fully re-open while maintaining these distances, it is especially important to layer multiple other prevention strategies, such as indoor masking.
- **Screening testing, ventilation, handwashing and respiratory etiquette, staying home when sick and getting tested, contact tracing in combination with quarantine and isolation, and cleaning and disinfection** are also important layers of prevention to keep schools safe.
- Students, teachers, and staff should **stay home when they have signs of any infectious illness** and be referred to their healthcare provider for testing and care.
- Many schools serve children under the age of 12 who are not eligible for vaccination at this time. Therefore, this guidance emphasizes **implementing layered prevention strategies** (e.g., using multiple prevention strategies together consistently) **to protect people who are not fully vaccinated**, including students, teachers, staff, and other members of their households.
- COVID-19 prevention strategies remain critical to protect people, including students, teachers, and staff, who are not fully vaccinated, especially in areas of moderate-to-high community transmission levels.
- **Localities should monitor community transmission, vaccination coverage, screening testing, and occurrence of outbreaks** to guide decisions on the level of layered prevention strategies (e.g., physical distancing, screening testing).

The purpose of this guidance is to continue to support communities, local leadership in education and public health, and pediatricians collaborating with schools in creating policies for safe schools during the COVID-19 pandemic that foster the overall health of children, adolescents, educators, staff, and communities and are based on available evidence. As the next school year begins, there needs to be a continued focus on keeping students safe, since not all students will have the opportunity or be eligible to be vaccinated before the start of the next school year.

It is critical to use science and data to guide decisions about the pandemic and school COVID-19 plans. All school COVID-19 policies should consider the following key principles and remember that COVID-19 policies are intended to mitigate, not eliminate, risk. Because school transmission reflects (but does not drive) community transmission, it is vitally important that communities take all necessary measures to limit the community spread of SARS-CoV-2 to ensure schools can remain open and safe for all students.

The implementation of several coordinated interventions can greatly reduce risk:

- **All eligible individuals should receive the COVID-19 vaccine.**

2. Consistent and Correct Mask Use

- When teachers, staff, and students who are not fully vaccinated consistently and correctly wear a mask, they protect others as well as themselves. Consistent and correct mask use by people who are not fully vaccinated is especially important indoors and in crowded settings, when physical distancing cannot be maintained.
 - **Indoors:** Mask use is recommended for people who are not fully vaccinated including students, teachers, and staff. Children under 2 years of age should not wear a mask.
 - **Outdoors:** In general, people do not need to wear masks when outdoors. **However, particularly in areas of substantial to high transmission, CDC recommends that people who are not fully vaccinated wear a mask in crowded outdoor settings or during activities that involve sustained close contact with other people who are not fully vaccinated.**

Important Note: During school transportation

CDC's Order applies to all public transportation conveyances including school buses. **Regardless of the mask policy at school**, passengers and drivers must wear a mask on school buses, including on buses operated by public and private school systems, subject to the exclusions and exemptions in CDC's Order.

- For example, if a student attends a school where mask use is not required due to vaccination status (e.g., a high school with a high rate of vaccination), the student is still required to wear a mask on the school bus.



•All students older than 2 years and all school staff should wear face masks at school (unless medical or developmental conditions prohibit use).

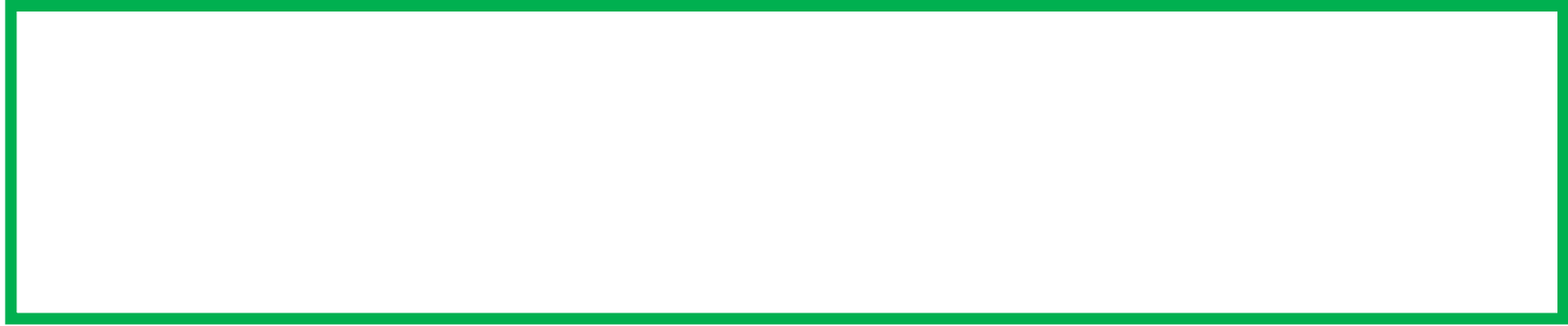
- **The AAP recommends universal masking in school at this time for the following reasons:**
 - a significant portion of the student population is not eligible for vaccination
 - protection of unvaccinated students from COVID-19 and to reduce transmission
 - lack of a system to monitor vaccine status among students, teachers and staff
 - potential difficulty in monitoring or enforcing mask policies for those who are not vaccinated; in the absence of schools being able to conduct this monitoring, universal masking is the best and most effective strategy to create consistent messages, expectations, enforcement, and compliance without the added burden of needing to monitor vaccination status
 - possibility of low vaccination uptake within the surrounding school community
 - continued concerns for variants that are more easily spread among children, adolescents, and adults

3. Physical Distancing

- Because of the importance of in-person learning, schools where not everyone is fully vaccinated should implement physical distancing to the extent possible within their structures, but should not exclude students from in-person learning to keep a minimum distance requirement.
- In general, CDC recommends people who are not fully vaccinated maintain physical distance of at least 6 feet from other people who are not in their household
- The use of cohorting can limit the spread of COVID-19 between cohorts but should not replace other prevention measures within each group.
Cohorting people who are fully vaccinated and people who are not fully vaccinated into separate cohorts is not recommended

4. Screening Testing

- CDC guidance provides that people who are fully vaccinated do not need to participate in screening testing and do not need to quarantine if they do not have any symptoms
- Screening testing may be most valuable in areas
 - with substantial or high community transmission levels
 - in areas with low vaccination coverage, and
 - in schools where other prevention strategies are not implemented.
- To be effective, the screening program should test at least once per week, and rapidly (within 24 hours) report results.



7. Staying Home When Sick and Getting Tested

(Symptom free school)

- Students, teachers, and staff who have symptoms of infectious illness, such as influenza (flu) or COVID-19, should stay home and be referred to their healthcare provider for testing and care.
- If a school does not have a routine screening testing program, the ability to do rapid testing on site could facilitate COVID-19 diagnosis and inform the need for quarantine of close contacts and isolation.
- Getting tested for COVID-19 when symptoms are compatible with COVID-19 will help with rapid contact tracing and prevent possible spread at schools, especially if key prevention strategies (masking and distancing) are not in use.

8. Contact Tracing in Combination with Isolation and Quarantine

Schools should continue to collaborate with state and local health departments, to the extent allowable by privacy laws and other applicable laws, to confidentially provide information about people diagnosed with or exposed to COVID-19. This allows identifying which students, teachers, and staff with positive COVID-19 test results should isolate, and which close contacts should quarantine.

- **Exception:** In the K–12 indoor classroom setting, the close contact definition ***excludes students who were within 3 to 6 feet of an infected student (laboratory-confirmed or a clinically compatible illness) where***
 - both students were engaged in ***consistent and correct use of well-fitting face masks; and***
 - other ***K–12 school prevention strategies*** (such as universal and correct mask use, physical distancing, increased ventilation) were in place in the K–12 school setting.

Sports and Other Extracurricular Activities

- Due to increased exhalation that occurs during physical activity, some sports can put players, coaches, trainers, and others who are not fully vaccinated at increased risk for getting and spreading COVID-19. Close contact sports and indoor sports are particularly risky. Similar risks might exist for other extracurricular activities, such as band, choir, theater, and school clubs that meet indoors.
- Students who are not fully vaccinated and participate in indoor sports and other higher-risk activities should continue to wear masks and keep physical distance as much as possible. Schools should consider using screening testing for student athletes and adults who are not fully vaccinated who participate in and support these activities to facilitate safe participation and reduce risk of transmission – and avoid jeopardizing in-person education due to outbreaks.

Sports and Other Extracurricular Activities (Cont.)

- **Setting of the sporting event or activity.** In general, the risk of COVID-19 transmission is lower when playing outdoors than in indoor settings. Consider the ability to keep physical distancing in various settings at the sporting event (i.e., fields, benches/team areas, locker rooms, spectator viewing areas, spectator facilities/restrooms, etc.).
- **Physical closeness.** Spread of COVID-19 is more likely to occur in sports that require sustained close contact (such as wrestling, hockey, football).
- **Number of people.** Risk of spread of COVID-19 increases with increasing numbers of athletes, spectators, teachers, and staff.
- **Level of intensity of activity.** The risk of COVID-19 spread increases with the intensity of the sport.
- **Duration of time.** The risk of COVID-19 spread increases the more time athletes, coaches, teachers, staff and spectators spend in close proximity or in indoor group settings. This includes time spent traveling to/from sporting events, meetings, meals, and other settings related to the event.
- **Presence of people more likely to develop severe illness.** People at increased risk of severe illness might need to take extra precautions.

As elected volunteers, our town trusts you to put in extra time to listen and guide policy within the district, according to our needs as a community. Thank you for your dedication. It is abhorrent to me that social media is used, by some, to denounce your conversations.

These discussions have the children's safety at their core. They are

truly reflective of our town and it's responses to surveys that were so thoughtfully sent out. Everyone in this town had an opportunity to contribute ideas through the appropriate channels. Thank you for that opportunity.

It is an unfortunate fact that some families in our town do not believe that Covid 19 is real. Some may accept that it exists but believe that it is not threatening. To the school board,

The public school is a piece of infrastructure designed and funded to perform a set of functions which are broadly conceived as a common good. A well-run district reacts quickly to emergencies and slowly to unqualified criticism. It is buffered from the tumult of fashionable, but short-held ideas by a process that selects, based not on the hottest passions, but informed consensus. Because we expect so much from our school district employees, we hire trained professionals and trust them to make decisions informed by that professionalism. While I'm not always happy with the choices made, I allow for the possibility that the people working at the school are familiar with the pressures and complexities of certain difficult issues in a way that I am not, because that seems very likely given that I'm not an educator and only occasionally take an interest in how that job is done. If it is felt that the school district has failed its students in some substantial way, the school board is an established forum for discussion and guidance. Facebook's roll in democracy was certainly not part of its design, and it's a tool better suited to gorilla warfare and bullying than the achievement of consensus. The durability of representative democracy at a local level derives from its flexibility, a tacit acknowledgment that governance must reflect the will of the community; that the will of the people will change as new information or perspective becomes generally accepted; that our institutions can and should adapt to reflect those changes. But this is a machinery that cannot be expected to function properly if it is not maintained and operated properly, which is the obligation of those it represents. Productive participation is the essence of community. Those who have concerns should remember that the school board exists to understand and represent those concerns to the school administration. If change is desired, democracy has provided the apparatus to enact it; no new technologies are required.

In the past, being a member of the school board was an easier job, sometimes just a stepping stone to something more influential. Right now, we're asking too much of you. During the pandemic, everyone in this community who is in a position to make decisions that affect employees, students, patients, etc. has had to make them without the benefit of the absolute knowledge that may someday be available in hindsight. The most commendable are, and will be, those who pass over the opportunity to promote their personal idealism and responsibly seek the greatest good, finding a middle way by allowing their understanding of the problem to constantly evolve. This school administration has been handed the sisyphian task of winnowing substantial risk from the merely aggravating because better paid people up the ladder found the job too difficult and unpopular. That job can't be made easy, but a level-headed school board can do a lot to make it possible.

Hello and Good Evening,

This is a multi-faceted letter covering several concerning issues. The overriding theme is that we need to work together on resolving the worries that parents and students, and I'm sure teachers and administrators in our town have, related to the health and the education of all involved. I write as a mother of four, an owner and administrator of two childcare facilities and a voter in Petersburg.

I'll basically begin to address the Triggering Event prompting this letter now....Living with CoVid and the Restrictions Imposed...How we Have and Can Safely Keep Facilities Open...Masking...Quarantining...and the Importance of Transparency, Integrity, Respect, Communication and Cooperation.

I write today as a voice for many, with the examples included here coming from my own personal and professional experience.

As Administrator of Serendipity Childcare Center and the After-School Academy, I plan for, and oversee, the care of 70-plus children in our town. I have many families who have been patiently awaiting a plan from the public school for the academic year ahead... and who have been left in the limbo of unknowns as to what decisions they need to make for their children. This includes my own family. These become questions of not just education, but of life itself as concerns for health and well-being are involved. Homeschool vs Public Schooling. Masks vs not. CoVid-related Injections/Vaccines vs boosting Natural Immunity and taking Safety Precautions. Quarantining issues and who's involved. These are not little things.

The need to know what the School District plans to do in response to CoVid and its variants is critical. For example, at Serendipity Child Care Center we have a room full of toddlers who have now "aged up" and will be going to the PreK Group; there is one preK group "aging up" and heading to our other facility; and another Prek group "aging up" and headed to Public School. We also have 30 School-aged children left in the unknown, four of whom are my own children. In addition, our 10 employees, who need to know if they will be working full-time or part-time due to the 2021-2021 school schedule and plan should parents decide to not enroll. That's a lot of children, parents, and co-parts in our community without answers, who are affected by the lack of information being provided for the decisions they're trying to make.

We rely on our elected School Board members and the Petersburg School Administrators for information regarding the education of our children. We need clear lines of communication where questions can be asked and concerns expressed in a professional, respectful, and even kind manner. This has not recently been the case, an example of which is the response to a letter put out by KFSK related to the school opening; that has prompted this letter.

After reading the article, I shared a direct quote from that article in regards to basing policy on numbers and vaccination status. Several comments were made, some people took offense, and some got outright nasty. Several comments were deleted. I was disgusted with what I read, in the article and from the board/employees. The point is, this was the first update the public has received whatsoever about the school's opening this fall. Parents have been left in the dark, wondering, and wanting answers so decisions can be made in what we believe is the best interest of their children.

We believed what the article said. It clearly stated the school's policies would be based on "trigger numbers" and "vaccination status." And yes, we were upset with what we read.

I've understood that at the end of last school year, several parents called and emailed, requesting that their children be put into classrooms with only vaccinated teachers, with only vaccinated children, etc. The segregation efforts HAD already begun. Apparently PSD was so inundated by it that they chose to send an email to all letting them know that this was not an option, and that that kind of discrimination would not happen. I felt for those employees being put in that situation and understand the pressures it creates.

In the ChildCare realm in the State of Alaska, based on regulations, we are not allowed to discriminate or segregate OR BASE ANY POLICIES ON VACCINATION STATUS. And, per State of Alaska child care regulation, we are required to

give our families 30 days notice regarding any changes made to our policies and procedures, schedules, and really, anything whatsoever. Conversely, the public school system is giving parents no update, no information, and no indication of when we might have that. Again, people need time to make plans for their children.

At Serendipity Children's Center and After-School Academy we learned to live with the CoVid situation. I'll share why we did this and how we did it. Maybe some of it will make a difference to decisions made going forward at PSD.

When Covid hit...it hit hard. Everything was closed...all, that is...except my childcare facility. According to ChildCare Licensing, Serendipity Children's Center was one of the only facilities within several hundred miles still operating. Parents were swamping me with calls, pleading with me to take their children into our care...from the three different preschools, one childcare facility, and two after-school programs along with the public schools, ALL closed, leaving the lives of these children in unsupervised, unsafe, and in some cases, severe situations. THIS was a pandemic; THIS was an emergency. THIS was not what was best for students.

Although we were ALL deemed ESSENTIAL, everyone closed. At Serendipity we did not have room at our current facility and in order to accommodate the need, we opened another facility, managing that during a pandemic, during which I had nowhere for my own four children to go. So, we opened more facilities...because, if I had closed our doors, and if I didn't work, most Essential Employees with children would not be able to work either. In many, many cases, we would not have had healthcare workers, borough employees, etc.

It took some creativity, some work-arounds, a lot of determination, a bit of courage, and an overriding belief in serving the community...and with several letters from families and support from local citizens, we opened the After-School Academy. We were full the day we opened...with full-time school-aged children, and have remained full and at capacity since.

We did not require masking at either facility and actually found it a safety measure had we been masked where the children would not be able to make the visual and audio connections with us and with one another. Another safety issue for us, as noted by many experts, was that each time a child touched their mask (which tends to be near constant) that mask needed to be washed or disposed of.

Our staff worked long and very hard hours, all while knowing they could have gone on unemployment and made far more. It was extremely challenging. It was scary for our own families. We cleaned and sanitized, and cleaned and sanitized some more, and worked day and even night for our families and their children. We did screening and temperature checks at drop-offs for both the children and the staff. At one point we were put under investigation for a CoVid claim that was found to be unsubstantiated. Through it all we remained open caring for over 70 children. Our staff never had the luxury of working from home or of being with our own families during the pandemic restrictions, all while our work load tripled.

When the public school reopened, our Academy staff would walk up and transport the 15-30 children to the Academy. So, after leaving their "pod" at school, the students were all mixed and combined together without a "pod" restriction. They were together with children who had siblings in our other facility, and they had other public contact, etc. We had staff traversing and working at both facilities. We did not have a single case of CoVid, although we had two parents who asymptotically tested positive and whose children did, too, on a Sunday evening, so we never knew if they were ever positive in care. The point is, we stayed open. We learned to work and live through it. We learned to LIVE WITH the virus.

During our covid investigation I spoke with the Department of Health and Social Services. The person I spoke with said, "Absolutely do NOT close your doors. IF you have a positive case, you notify the parents and staff, you sanitize, and you open your doors the next day. People have to learn to live WITH covid, not without it" ...and...no truer words have ever been spoken.

Our employees are not masked and are not vaccinated; that is a choice. The families involved could be; I don't know, and I would not morally or ethically ask. That is their medical choice. And "I would NEVER base any decision or policy on trigger numbers or vaccination status."

No one, and I will say no one, knows what it was like to remain open and go through the hell that we did providing care, or what all was involved in that...because everyone else closed. My staff literally WAS the front line for these children, every single day. Or like social media likes to emphasize: "Every. Single. Day."

My Staff and I will gladly meet with any of you to answer any questions in regards to what worked for us and what did not.

Given the length of what I've already shared here, I will attach an addendum to include issues from last school year that are important in this one situation as well. These are examples from my own family's experience with CoVid and its restrictions and how those things played out in real life...where we, and others, were left with choices where "you only get an education if you COMPLY" ...and I don't want to see that be the case ever again. It's not how OUR school should operate. I fervently believe that we need to find common ground to give these children the lives and education that they deserve. This should not be about CDC and their ever-changing guidelines, or about mandates at any level of authority, or any of leaders' own personal agendas and beliefs. This should be about the children's education, their lives, and the

safety in our community.

I would like to see all of the children in my care enrolled in PSD. I want all four of my school-aged children enrolled there, too. However, parents need timely updates...they need to know the plan and the provisions for our children's education. We are now nine days into August and feel in a scramble for the information we need to make decisions of whether to enroll our children or not.

I appreciate any consideration you will give these concerns, and look forward to working with you on better communication and solutions that respect the varying needs of all involved.

ATTACHMENT to LETTER of AUGUST 9th, 2021

What follows are examples of occurrences that happened during the 2020-2021 school year because of the policies and practices used by the Petersburg School District. I had grave concerns about them when they were happening; I continue to have the same concerns; and I don't want these to repeat. I hope that, by bringing these situations up now, that we can work together to find better, healthier, kinder ways of resolving them should anything similar happen again.

First, this relates to both masking and to parental involvement in critical health decisions. My daughter has a respiratory illness. She has extremely restricted airways. A CPAP machine breathes for her every night because she literally stops breathing for up to 10 seconds, several times an hour. It is a very hard thing for her to live with...and it's a hard thing as a mother to see her struggle and her suffering.

We do not mask at home or within our family's activities. Public school was the first time she masked. We consulted with several doctors before asking her what her comfort level was. She seemed willing to try, as she did not want to be different than the other children, and she did not want to cause a problem.

It was so sad to see her even have to be a part of making that decision, but we either had to comply or there was no in-person education for her. So, with trepidation, we let her try.

Her health started to rapidly decline. We spoke to the Petersburg Medical Center and to the School. The School had already been aware of her medical diagnosis, and then they received the letter from the doctor regarding her need to at least break from masking and/or to try different types of masks that allowed for more airflow. It wasn't long before we noticed a very big and undeniable decline in her health...and then found out that the School had started masking her in gym class. They had not been masking in gym class prior, nor would we have ever consented with them masking a child with a respiratory illness, having an elevated heart rate and breathing difficulties.

We, as parents, were not notified of this change. I contacted the School, and they had not been made aware either. This was a teacher's decision. And this had serious, severe consequences to a child in their care. I let the School know to pull my daughter immediately, which they did. They apologized, as it was not communicated to them and that this change was because of the teacher's "comfort level." While this may be true, her "comfort" was a very serious threat to my daughter's life.

Secondly, and again relating to both masking and to parental involvement in critical health decisions. The same exact thing that happened to my daughter in elementary school happened with my son in high school. He has asthma, and he has an inhaler. Masking while walking the hall was one thing, but a teenage boy running with an elevated heart rate and breathing difficulties is quite another issue. I was, and am, very confused about the teacher's authority to just make whatever choices and decisions they wanted to, something that could, and did jeopardize a child's health, without at least consulting with his or her parents. This needs to change.

Thirdly, and this relates to quarantining policies and practices. In April of this year, my brother was in a major accident and

there was a big question of whether he would survive. Because we weren't sure we would ever see him again...I took my four children and his four children to see him in the hospital. This was obviously not a planned trip, but could have had lifelong effects on the children had they never seen their father and uncle again.

Upon returning to Petersburg I learned that the children all had to be quarantined...which was fine, but then the School District wanted MY medical record (my test results) and those of for all seven of the kids (one of them was over 18, therefore he could use his own result) OR they would have to quarantine for a full 14 days. We choose to quarantine for those weeks instead of turning over private medical records.

That left eight children out of school for four weeks total due to PSD policies. How is this best for students? Why is PSD one of the only schools in Alaska and the United States that has a travel policy? One of those children was a Senior this year, and he really struggled after that to finish his requirements to graduate with his class. But really, what choices were there? See your Dad with what could be a final time...or do your assignments for school? Most of us, if not all, would have chosen to see Dad...and I hope all would have understood that decision.

I hope to meet with you and work together to find different solutions to these situations...and any others related to CoVid and the policies and practices that end up being a part of it. I hope we can be a cooperative team in this, and not be at odds or work against one another. I took the survey as well as numerous other community members. Let our voices be heard, let those results speak for themselves. Show those raw results to us, so we can see for ourselves. We are all a part of the community, and I choose to believe we all want the best for the children and all who care about them.

BP 5127 GRADUATION CEREMONIES AND ACTIVITIES

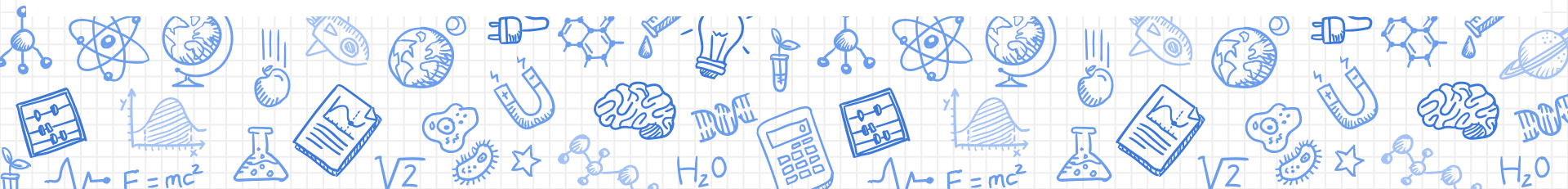
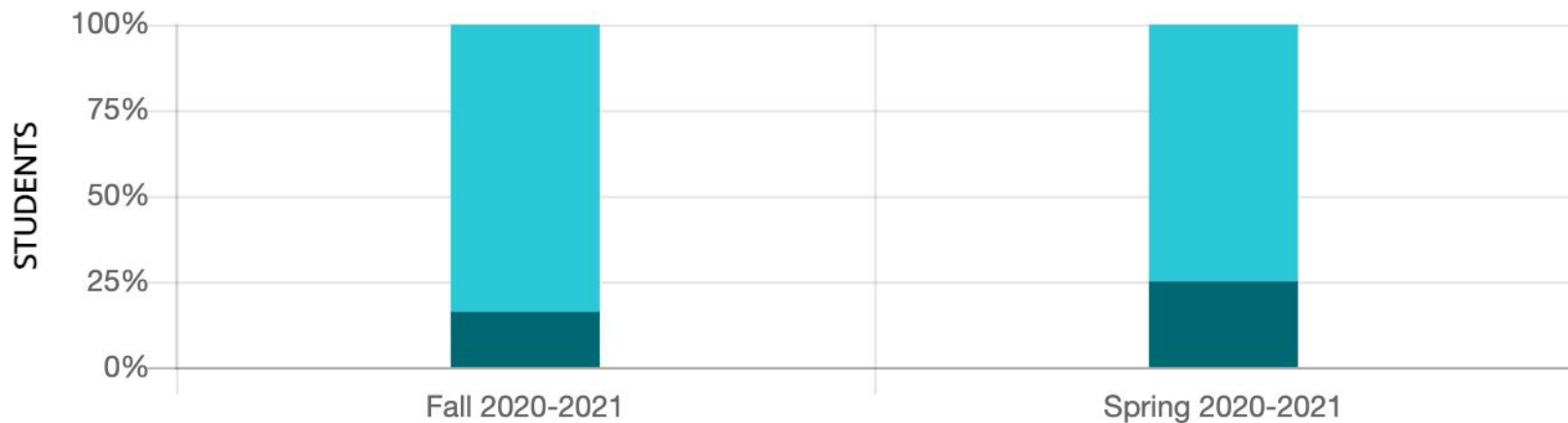
Second Grade Reading Fluency

Evidence-Based Interventions

Evidence-based interventions are practices or programs that have **evidence** to show that they are effective at producing results and improving outcomes when implemented. The kind of evidence described in ESSA has generally been produced through formal studies and research. Under ESSA, there are four tiers, or levels, of evidence:

Tier 1 – Strong Evidence: supported by one or more well-designed and well-implemented randomized control experimental studies.

Tier 2 – Moderate Evidence: supported by one or more well-designed and well-implemented quasi-experimental studies.

Tier 3 – Promising Evidence: supported by one or more well-designed and well-implemented correlational studies (with statistical controls for selection bias).

Tier 4 – Demonstrates a Rationale: practices that have a well-defined logic model or theory of action, are supported by research, and have some effort underway by an SEA, LEA, or outside research organization to determine their effectiveness.

Select Relevant Evidence-Based Interventions

(The following excerpt is taken from U.S. Department of Education’s [Non-Regulatory Guidance: Using Evidence to Strengthen Investments](#), page 4-5.)

Once needs have been identified, SEAs, LEAs, schools, and other stakeholders will determine the interventions that will best serve their needs. By using rigorous and relevant evidence and assessing the local capacity to implement the intervention (e.g., funding, staff, staff skills, stakeholder support), SEAs and LEAs are more likely to implement interventions successfully. Those concepts are briefly discussed below (also see Part II of this guidance for more information on evidence-based interventions):

- While ESEA requires “at least one study” on an intervention to provide strong evidence, moderate evidence, or promising evidence, SEAs, LEAs, and other stakeholders should consider the entire body of relevant evidence.
- Interventions supported by higher levels of evidence, specifically strong evidence or moderate evidence, are more likely to improve student outcomes because they have

been proven to be effective. When strong evidence or moderate evidence is not available, promising evidence may suggest that an intervention is worth exploring. Interventions with little to no evidence should at least demonstrate a rationale for how they will achieve their intended goals and be examined to understand how they are working.

- The relevance of the evidence – specifically the setting (e.g., elementary school) and/or population (e.g., students with disabilities, English Learners) of the evidence – may predict how well an evidence-based intervention will work in a local context (for more information, also see Part II and endnotes). SEAs and LEAs should look for interventions supported by strong evidence or moderate evidence in a similar setting and/or population to the ones being served. The What Works Clearinghouse (WWC) uses rigorous standards to review evidence of effectiveness on a wide range of interventions as well as summarizes the settings and populations in the studies.
- Local capacity also helps predict the success of an intervention, so the available funding, staff resources, staff skills, and support for interventions should be considered when selecting an evidence-based intervention. SEAs can work with individual and/or groups of LEAs to improve their capacity to implement evidence-based interventions.

Some questions to consider about using evidence:

- Are there any interventions supported by strong evidence or moderate evidence?
- What do the majority of studies on this intervention find? Does the intervention have positive and statistically significant effects on important student or other relevant outcomes, or are there null, negative, or not statistically significant findings?
- Were studies conducted in settings and with populations relevant to the local context (e.g., students with disabilities, English Learners)?
- If strong evidence or moderate evidence is not available, is there promising evidence?
- Does the intervention demonstrate a rationale that suggests it may work (e.g., it is represented in a logic model supported by research)?
- How can the success of the intervention be measured?

Some questions to consider about local capacity:

- What resources are required to implement this intervention?
- Will the potential impact of this intervention justify the costs, or are there more cost-effective interventions that will accomplish the same outcomes?

- What is the local capacity to implement this intervention? Are there available funds? Do staff have the needed skills? Is there buy-in for the intervention?
- How does this intervention fit into larger strategic goals and other existing efforts?
- How will this intervention be sustained over time?

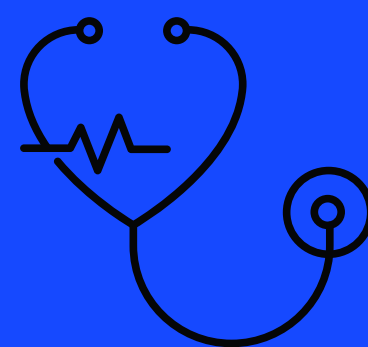

The Alaska State Department of Education through the US Department of Education has asked each District to base its 2021-22 operational decisions on 9 prevention strategies. The following risk plans deal with 1 of the 9 strategies: “Consistent and Correct Mask Use.” We will still be continuing to address physical distancing of desks, ventilation and upgraded air handling system, handwashing/ respiratory etiquette, strict symptom free policy, and additional cleaning and disinfection protocols, as we did during the 2020 school year.

Public feedback and commitment are critical in this process as we continue to balance/prioritize public health and the continuity of in-person learning. Survey comments, letters, and feedback are being reviewed and carefully considered. We are working hard to listen to all voices, respect medical recommendations, and provide an excellent education to all of our students.

Prevention Strategies



What we know:

71% of staff has started or is fully vaccinated

33% eligible student population started or fully vaccinated

55% of the eligible community members started or fully vaccinated

On July 27th, the CDC recommended universal masking K-12 for staff, students, visitors, and contractors, regardless of their vaccination status. [Reason for CDC's updated guidance on masking](#)

AASB and DHSS have provided guidance on how to reopen schools this fall and spoke of a layered approach.

We focused on 8 of the 9 strategies last year, with PMC and Public Health doing the testing to prevent clusters/outbreaks once a case was identified. We did implement bi-weekly antigen testing for students in activities. We had 18 red closure days in the '20-'21 school year.

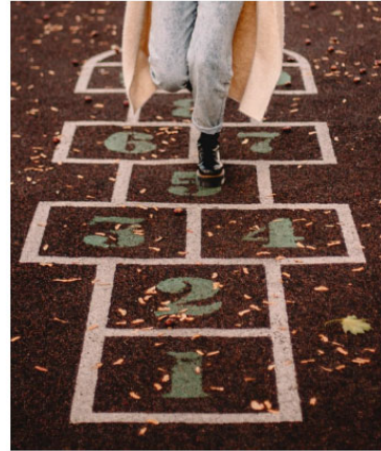

The CDC also provided some guidelines to consider for making decisions at the local level:

Primary Factors to Consider for Decision-Making

- Level of community transmission
- COVID-19 vaccination coverage
- Use of a SARS-CoV-2 screening testing program
- COVID-19 outbreaks
- Ages of children served



Recent guidance for exposure to positive Covid cases in schools:

In the K–12 indoor classroom setting, the close contact definition excludes students who were within 3 to 6 feet of an infected student (laboratory-confirmed or a clinically compatible illness) where-

- *both students were engaged in consistent and correct use of well-fitting face masks; and*
- *other K–12 school prevention strategies (such as universal and correct mask use, physical distancing, increased ventilation) were in place in the K–12 school setting.*

Vaccinated individuals (staff and students) are not required to quarantine if exposed to an individual who tests positive for Covid.

Important to note: regardless of what happens in school, buses are bound by Federal order to have masking for all while on the bus.

Important Note: During school transportation

CDC's Order applies to all public transportation conveyances including school buses. **Regardless of the mask policy at school**, passengers and drivers must wear a mask on school buses, including on buses operated by public and private school systems, subject to the exclusions and exemptions in CDC's Order.

- For example, if a student attends a school where mask use is not required due to vaccination status (e.g., a high school with a high rate of vaccination), the student is still required to wear a mask on the school bus.



We are not where we were in May, and we are not where some other communities in Alaska and the Lower 48 are either. We were much more hopeful for reduced protocols this fall based on declining case counts and rising vaccination rates. Unfortunately, the highly transmissible delta variant has created new challenges for schools and we are trying to adjust our expectations.

Lowest Risk Plan/Strictest Protocols

However, fewer close contacts will be required to quarantine based on the latest CDC guidance, which states: *when both people are wearing masks consistently (contagious and exposed person) students at a 3 ft+ won't be considered close contacts.*

Disrupts community and school spread

What is going on with activities?

Updated 8-3-21 5:30pm

Activities are running similar to how we ended '20-'21. Bi-weekly antigen testing, pared down screening questions (no temperature checks), no masking during play because of the antigen testing. Masking is required in buildings and locations in which it is mandated to have masks on.

We are currently running one outdoor sport, Cross Country, and one indoor sport, Swim.

Students can opt out of bi-weekly antigen tests if they wish to provide full vaccination status. There are mitigation plans around travel and practices, but we will be returning to some of our past procedures such as group housing & ferry travel when possible.

Difference in testing at PHS & MMS

PHS operates on twice weekly antigen testing protocols throughout their season for any activity that contains in-person interscholastic competition and/or travel outside of Petersburg.

CURRENTLY - MMS will operate ONLY on Bi-Weekly Antigen testing on the week of travel and/or interscholastic competition. Example: MMS XC is leaving for Prince of Wales Island on Friday. All participating students will test Monday and Thursday of the travel week before leaving Friday.

Masks are currently NOT required for any activity while actively participating. Moving around indoors at any school facility is required. Outdoor activities are not required to mask.

Universal

- PSD does not offer a full virtual learning option this year, except when in remote learning/school closures or special circumstances, as approved by the school
- Strict symptom free policy implemented for all staff, students, and visitors; masks required for visitors

- Continued emphasis on use of hand washing, sanitizer, desk/surface cleaning between classes, ventilation strategies
- Regular antigen testing available and encouraged for all students and staff (permission required for optional student antigen testing during school; bi-weekly antigen testing required for participation in secondary school-sponsored extracurricular activities)
- At home symptom/temperature screening for staff and students, but no screening/temperature checks at the door
- Emphasize 3-6' distance between students in classrooms
- Close contact quarantine, **per Public Health directive**, for unvaccinated students and staff:
 - *7-day quarantine + Negative PCR test on day 6 or later +No Symptoms-Return on Day 8*
OR
 - *10-day quarantine + No Symptoms-Return on Day 11*
- Close contact quarantine is not required for vaccinated staff and students at this time, or for anyone who has tested positive for Covid-19 in the last 90 days, **per Public Health directive**.
- Students who are within 3-6' of each other wearing masks consistently are no longer subject to close contact quarantine, regardless of vaccination status.

DEED Releases 2021 Statewide Assessment Results

Low participation rates due to COVID-19 warrant caution comparing results to prior years

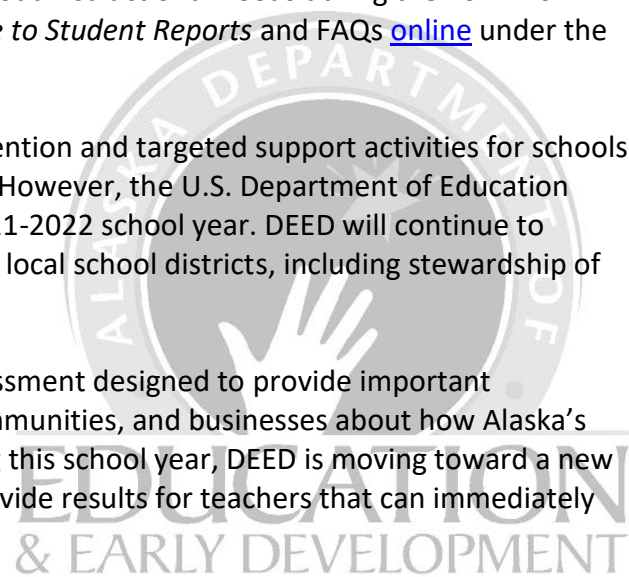
JUNEAU – Tuesday the Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) released statewide, district, school, and subgroup level results from the 2021 administration of the Performance Evaluation for Alaska’s Schools (PEAKS) assessment. These results are now available online. School districts have until September 30 to distribute student-level reports to parents and educators.

Approximately 44,400 students participated in the Spring 2021 administration of PEAKS. That is about 64% of students enrolled in the test grades of 3-9. DEED extended flexibilities including extending the testing hours to evenings and weekends, reducing reporting requirement, and extending the testing window by a week to help schools safely assess as many students as possible given the mitigation practices in place to reduce the transmission of COVID-19. Even with these flexibilities, participation rates varied significantly from district to district and among demographic categories.

Given the low overall participation rate and the high variability in participation among student groups, DEED cautions against comparing 2021 PEAKS data to previous years at the statewide level. The results are still valuable for assessing performance at the school and individual student levels. Parents and educators can use individual student data from PEAKS, along with other local assessments, to inform decisions about instructional needs during the 2021-2022 school year. DEED has published a *Parent Guide to Student Reports* and FAQs [online](#) under the “results” tab.

Typically, summative assessments guide intervention and targeted support activities for schools as directed by the Every Student Succeeds Act. However, the U.S. Department of Education waived accountability requirements for the 2021-2022 school year. DEED will continue to support ongoing school improvement efforts in local school districts, including stewardship of federal COVID relief funds.

PEAKS has been the statewide summative assessment designed to provide important data for parents, educators, policy makers, communities, and businesses about how Alaska’s schools and districts are performing. Beginning this school year, DEED is moving toward a new approach to statewide assessment that will provide results for teachers that can immediately



inform instruction, will better display student growth and needs, and align with interim assessments administered independently by most of Alaska’s school districts.

Alaska innovative assessment system

A connected approach: Bridging MAP Growth interim assessments and the annual summative

As part of its commitment to improving student learning, the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development (DEED) is partnering with NWEA® starting in fall 2021 to implement a creative approach to balanced statewide assessment that better reflects learning throughout the school year and helps educators target instruction to students' individual needs.

This first-of-its-kind balanced approach connects fall and winter MAP® Growth™ interim assessments and the Alaska spring summative assessment to provide a comprehensive assessment system that improves efficiency and cohesion and drives student outcomes by prioritizing teaching and learning.

The Alaska innovative assessment system is designed to streamline the testing experience for grades 3–9 in the areas of English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. In the first year of implementation (2021–22), districts will administer MAP Growth in fall, winter, and spring so research studies can be conducted to support the production of MAP Growth scores (RIT scores) by the summative test starting in the following year (2022–23). In the second year of implementation (2022–23), testing events are reduced to two MAP Growth interim assessments in the fall and winter, and the on-grade adaptive summative test in the spring, which will also produce RIT scores.

Districts that use MAP Growth in grades K–2 will enjoy the connectivity afforded with the Alaska innovative assessment system in grades 3–9, given that the system utilizes MAP Growth. Monitoring growth from second to third grade via MAP Growth scores could be particularly useful for district efforts to support students in becoming proficient in reading by grade 3.

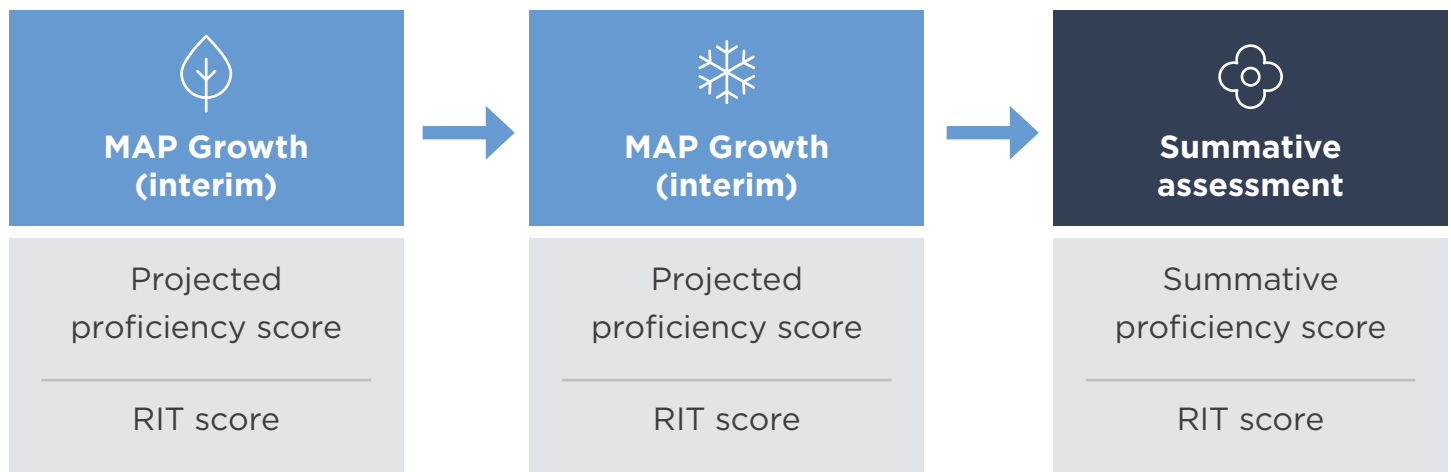


Image reflects the system in 2022–23, following research studies conducted in the initial implementation year (2021–22).

Professional learning and resources for informed instructional decisions

The Alaska innovative assessment system will support educators in making data actionable and advancing effective instructional practices. Virtual, onsite, and self-directed professional learning and resources are designed to help Alaska educators take informed action and improve student outcomes. Professional learning promotes assessment literacy and enables educators to hone formative instructional practices with a focus on using data from multiple sources to inform decisions and provide differentiated and personalized learning.

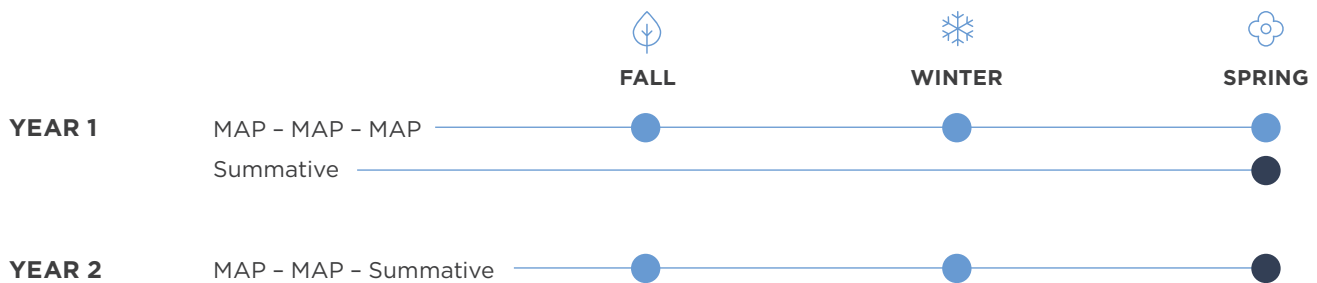
In addition, a resource describing the range of skills within and across achievement levels for each Alaska standard will help educators connect instruction to Alaska’s grade-level standards so every student can have the opportunity to learn and be held to high expectations throughout the year.

The Alaska innovative assessment system will:

- **Streamline testing and maximize efficiency.** A connected system provides a more seamless experience between interim and end-of-year assessments for students and educators and reduces testing events (starting in 2022-23).
- **Increase coherence** across interim and end-of-year tests so educators can drive students toward consistent, challenging learning targets.
- **Help to amplify student learning.** Alaska’s innovative assessment system will give educators, students, and parents meaningful insights on student strengths and areas of need to support students in reaching their highest academic potential.
- **Increase opportunity for students and schools to show growth.** Fall-to-spring and year-to-year growth data, along with access to normative data, are available to both districts and DEED. Within-year growth data enables all students and educators to show and celebrate growth and provides districts with a more complete view of school performance as they work to ensure equitable educational rigor and resources for all Alaska students.

Implementation timeline

During the first school year (2021-22), districts administer MAP Growth interim assessments for grades 3-9 reading, language usage, and math in fall, winter, and spring, and a new on-grade adaptive summative assessment in the spring for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. Starting the second year (2022-23), districts administer MAP Growth interim assessments for grades 3-9 in fall and winter and an on-grade adaptive summative assessment that also produces RIT scores in the spring.
