This DuPage/West Cook (“D/WC”) Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement (“Agreement”) is entered into by and between the Operating Entities (as identified in Appendix A) and the Member School Districts (as identified in Appendix B).

Recitals:

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Illinois Constitution (Article VII, Section 10) and the Illinois *Intergovernmental Cooperation Act* (5 ILCS 220/3), school districts, units of local government, and public agencies are authorized to contract or otherwise associate among themselves, to obtain or share services and to exercise, combine, or transfer any power or function, and to jointly exercise any powers, privileges, functions, or authority which may be exercised by any of them; and

WHEREAS, the Operating Entities and the Member School Districts have determined that it is in their best interests to enter into this amended Agreement providing for access to the special education programs delineated in Appendix A, as may be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Operating Entities and the Member School Districts agree as follows:

**ARTICLE I – PURPOSE AND MEMBERSHIP**

The purpose of D/WC is to provide special education programs as delineated in Appendix A (“the Programs”) for students residing in the Member School Districts listed in Appendix B and as may be otherwise provided in this Agreement. Member School Districts (and non-member school districts as otherwise provided in this Agreement) may purchase available services from the Operating Entities, including (but not limited to) Program participation on a tuition basis, other instructional services, related services, and professional development. School district personnel authorized to commit to the purchase of services from the Operating Entities shall (1) contact the designated administrator for the program offering the requested services; (2) provide the school student records necessary for services; and (3) comply with other purchased services policies and procedures which may be approved by the Operating Entities.

Membership shall include and be limited to those school districts identified in Appendix B and any other school districts that establish membership pursuant to this paragraph. A non-member public school district may petition the Operating Entities in writing requesting membership in the DuPage/West Cook Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement. The petitioning school district shall be invited to join upon satisfaction of the following conditions: (a) approval by the Directing Board of each Operating Entity; and (b) agreement, in writing, by the petitioning school district to abide by this Agreement and all D/WC policies and procedures.

## **ARTICLE II – MEETINGS**

At least twice annually, the Operating Entities shall organize an informational meeting to review the Programs, tuition costs, and services. The Operating Entities shall provide written notice of all such meetings to the Member School Districts, at least fourteen (14) days in advance of the meeting.

Each Member School District shall provide the Operating Entities with the name and contact information of the person designated by the Member School District to receive such meeting notices.

## **ARTICLE III – OPERATING ENTITIES**

- 3.1 The Operating Entities are responsible for the Programs, including the following:
  - a) To administer programs, which shall include the overall planning, administration, and coordination of the educational programs, budget preparation, and staff recruitment.
  - b) To provide proof of the necessary insurance as may be required by law.
  - c) To charge tuition for the Programs based upon a tuition formula established by the Operating Entity. The Operating Entity shall notify the Member School Districts of the tuition formula used by the Operating Entity, and the formula shall include the calculation of the tuition charged.
- 3.2 Services may be provided to students who reside outside of the geographical area covered by the Member School Districts (“Catchment Area”) provided space is available and the resident district agrees to pay the fee established by the Operating Entity.
- 3.3 Member School Districts agree to purchase low incidence special education services available only from the Operating Entities unless an IEP team determines otherwise.

## **ARTICLE IV – TRANSPORTATION**

Transportation to the Programs is the responsibility of a student’s district of residence as determined by law.

## **ARTICLE V – PROCEDURES FOR WITHDRAWAL OR EXPULSION OF MEMBER SCHOOL DISTRICTS**

- 5.1 When a Member School District fails to abide by the terms of this Agreement or fails to meet its financial or other obligations as established or assessed pursuant to this Agreement: (1) the Operating Entities may decline to provide the defaulting Member School District with further services or access to the Programs; and/or (2) the other parties to this Agreement may expel the defaulting Member School District. The expulsion of the Member School District shall be effective upon approval of a resolution by a majority of the other Member School Districts.
- 5.2 A Member School District seeking to withdraw from this Agreement shall provide written notice thereof to the Operating Entities and the other Member School Districts. Such written notice must be received by the Operating Entities and the other Member School Districts not later than eighteen (18) months prior to the effective date of withdrawal. Withdrawal shall be effective on July 1 of a fiscal year (i.e., written notice must be received by the Operating Entities and the other Member School Districts by January 1, 2025 for a withdrawal to be effective July 1, 2026). A Member School District withdrawing from this Agreement is responsible for all fees owed to the Operating Entities through the effective date of withdrawal.

## **ARTICLE VI – CONSOLIDATION OF MEMBER SCHOOL DISTRICTS; DISSOLUTION OF D/WC**

### **6.1 – Consolidation of Member School Districts**

In the event of consolidation of a Member School District with a non-participating school district, the consolidated school district shall be deemed a Member School District under this Agreement unless written intent to withdraw, as provided in this Agreement, is received by the Operating Entities and the other Member School Districts within thirty (30) days after the effective date of consolidation. The new Member School District shall assume the financial and legal obligations that may arise through participation in this Agreement.

### **6.2 – Dissolution of D/WC**

Dissolution of this Agreement and D/WC may be proposed by any Operating Entity or Member School District by adoption of a resolution calling for the dissolution of this Agreement and D/WC. Dissolution shall be effective on July 1 following approval by two-thirds (2/3) of the parties to this Agreement (i.e., Operating Entities and Member School Districts).

## **ARTICLE VII – AMENDMENT OF AGREEMENT**

- 7.1 Proposed amendments to this Agreement may be recommended by any Operating Entity or Member School District by adopting a resolution setting forth the proposed amendments. Any such resolution shall be forwarded to all other Operating Entities and Member School Districts for consideration.

- 7.2 Any amendment approved by a majority of the parties to this Agreement (i.e., Operating Entities and Member School Districts) shall become effective on the date that a majority of the parties have approved the amendment.
- 7.3 The Operating Entities shall provide all Member School Districts with current copies of this Agreement incorporating any and all amendments that have been approved.

#### **ARTICLE VIII – INDEMNIFICATION**

Each party to this Agreement agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the other parties and their Board(s), Board members, employees, volunteers and agents, against and from any and all liability, damage, claim, demand, judgment, cause of action, cost, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), and losses (collectively "Loss") to the extent the Loss arises out of the acts or omissions of the indemnifying party.

#### **ARTICLE IX – GENERAL PROVISIONS**

- 9.1 The parties agree that this Agreement supersedes all prior agreements regarding the establishment and operation of D/WC, and any amendments thereof.
- 9.2 This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties. This Agreement may be modified only by resolutions approved, signed and dated by the parties as provided in this Agreement.

## FOR ACTION

### Lisle Community Unit School District 202 Board of Education Meeting March 24, 2025

**SUBJECT:** Intergovernmental Agreement with Lisle Park District

**RECOMMENDATION:** The administration recommends approval of the Intergovernmental Agreement with the Lisle Park District.

**BACKGROUND DATA:** The Lisle Park District and School District share usage of grounds and facilities at no charge through an intergovernmental agreement. The current Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) has a five-year term and is set to expire April 1, 2025.

The IGA was modified in the Spring of 2020 to reflect the following arrangement that is currently in place:

- 1) The Park District and School District will continue to share usage of their grounds and facilities.
- 2) The Park District will reimburse the School District for the cost of overtime related to their programs.
- 3) The School District will maintain its own grounds.

The Park District will also continue to provide the following additional services:

- 1) Providing mulch as needed to School District properties.
- 2) Maintain all recreational playground equipment at all School District sites.
- 3) Prepare and maintain all baseball and softball fields prior to and in anticipation of any of School District's scheduled games.
- 4) Start-up and winterize the Lisle Senior High School irrigation system.
- 5) Allow the School District to periodically dispose of tree branches at Park District's Maintenance Facility, upon verbal approval from Park District.
- 6) Mow the Lisle Senior High School practice field during Park District summer camps

School District administration met with Lisle Park District representatives in November to review the current agreement and had follow-up exchanges in January. Both sides agree the IGA is working well and there are no recommended changes. Both parties recommend another five-year term.

A copy of the IGA reflecting the new effective date of April 1, 2025 is attached in BoardBook and was approved by the Lisle Park District Board at their February meeting.

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:** The School District will not incur any additional costs beyond those outlined in the previous agreement. Maintenance of school grounds will continue to be covered through in-house staff or outsourcing. Additionally, the Park District will continue to reimburse

the School District for custodial overtime expenses incurred during their programs when a custodian is not scheduled during regular shift hours

**SUGGESTED MOTION:** That the Board of Education approves the Intergovernmental Agreement between Lisle Community Unit School District 202 and the Lisle Park District for shared use of Grounds and Facilities effective April 1, 2025 for an additional five-year term.

**INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN LISLE COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT 202 AND  
LISLE PARK DISTRICT FOR SHARED USE OF GROUNDS AND FACILITIES**

This Intergovernmental Agreement (“Agreement”) is made and entered into as of this 1<sup>st</sup> day of April 2025 (“Effective Date ”), by and between the Board of Education of Lisle Community Unit School District 202, Du Page County, Illinois (“School District”), and Lisle Park District, Du Page County, Illinois (“Park District”). School District and Park District are sometimes hereinafter referred to individually as a “Party” and together as the “Parties.”

**Recitals**

**WHEREAS**, the School District and Park District are units of local government as that term is defined in Article VII, Section 1, of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, and public agencies as that term is defined in Section 2 of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, 5 ILCS 220/2; and

**WHEREAS**, Article VII, Section 10 of the Illinois Constitution of 1970 provides that units of local government may contract or otherwise associate among themselves to obtain or share services and to exercise, combine or transfer any power or function in any manner not prohibited by law or by ordinance and may use their credit, revenues and other resources to pay costs related to intergovernmental activities; and

**WHEREAS**, the Illinois Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, 5 ILCS 220/1 *et seq.* further provides that any power or powers, privileges, functions, or authority exercised or which may be exercised by a public agency of this State may be exercised, combined, transferred, and enjoyed jointly with any other public agency of this State; and

**WHEREAS**, there is significant overlap between the corporate boundaries of the School District and the corporate boundaries of the Park District, such that many residents of the School District are also residents of the Park District; and

**WHEREAS**, the Parties have a history of allowing shared use of their grounds and facilities in furtherance of their respective purposes, and have determined that it is in their respective best interests and the interests of their residents to continue this shared usage for the purposes and subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement; and

**WHEREAS**, the Parties have determined that the shared use of their grounds and facilities will not interfere with either Party’s delivery of recreational or educational activities for its residents, and have further determined that said usage will expand and promote public recreational and educational opportunities for the Parties’ mutual communities; and

**WHEREAS**, the School District and Park District have determined that the anticipated intergovernmental cooperation in the shared use of their grounds and facilities will result in financial economies and enhanced benefits to their respective residents.

**NOW THEREFORE**, in consideration of the foregoing and the mutual promises hereinafter set forth, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

**1. Incorporation of Recitals.** The Recitals set forth above are hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement as though fully set forth herein, and all covenants, terms, conditions, and provisions of this Agreement shall be construed, interpreted, and enforced in accordance therewith.

**2. Term.** Unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided, the term of this Agreement shall be for a period of five (5) years from the Effective Date ("Term"). The Parties may mutually agree to renew or extend the Term of this Agreement at any time prior to its expiration on such terms and conditions as the Parties deem appropriate.

**3. Designated Representative.** Each Party shall designate a representative in writing to the other Party, including the designated representative's name, position, telephone, mobile phone and email address ("Designated Representative"). Each Party's Designated Representative shall oversee the operation and administration of, and ensure compliance with, the terms of this Agreement, and shall serve as the primary contact for the other Party with respect to the same, including but not limited to planned or scheduled use of the Parties' grounds and facilities and changes in planned or scheduled uses of same.

**4. Shared Usage of Grounds and Facilities.**

A. The School District shall permit the Park District to have access to and use of School District's grounds and facilities to conduct organized activities sponsored or co-sponsored by, affiliated with, or offered by or on behalf of the Park District, on a priority basis, provided such activities do not conflict with organized activities sponsored or co-sponsored by, affiliated with, or offered by or on behalf of the School District. The foregoing rights of access and use shall not apply to any facility that is totally financed by revenues generated by that facility.

B. The Park District shall permit the School District to have access to and use of Park District's grounds and facilities to conduct organized activities sponsored or co-sponsored by, affiliated with, or offered by or on behalf of the School District, on a priority basis and at no charge to the School District, provided such activities do not conflict with organized activities sponsored or co-sponsored by, affiliated with, or offered by or on behalf of the Park District. The foregoing rights of access and use shall not apply to any facility that is totally financed by revenues generated by that facility.

C. In the event either Party's access to or use of the other Party's grounds or facilities, as contemplated by Section 4, is significantly or materially reduced or restricted, or is otherwise eliminated, the Parties shall mutually agree to a reduction in the affected Party's obligations to the other Party under the terms of this Agreement, including its

maintenance obligations under Section 7. If the Parties are unable to reach mutual agreement, the affected Party may terminate this Agreement after providing notice to the other Party and an opportunity to cure in accordance with the provisions of Section 14.A. below.

**5. Scheduling Use.** The dates and times for the uses authorized by this Agreement shall be as mutually agreed upon in writing, subject to proper notification as set forth herein. The Parties shall prepare a master use schedule outlining the activities scheduled at all of the Parties' respective grounds and facilities for each month during the term of this Agreement ("Master Use Schedule"). Each Party shall notify the other Party of the proposed dates and times on and during which that Party desires to use the other Party's grounds or facilities to conduct programs or activities as contemplated by this Agreement. Each Party shall endeavor to provide as much advance notice of its proposed usage, or any changes to its planned usage, as possible, but shall provide not less than fourteen (14) days advance notice. In the event either Party fails to give notice as required, the other Party shall nevertheless endeavor to accommodate such uses unless such other Party has already programmed the subject venue for its own use, granted permission to a third party for its use, or otherwise determines it to be in the best interests of such other Party to deny the request. In the event that unforeseen or special circumstances arise that necessitate a change in the Master Use Schedule for any of the grounds or facilities, specifically including but not limited to the use of baseball and softball fields, the Parties shall use their respective best efforts to accommodate the requested modification. Each Party shall notify the other Party in the event that that Party will not be using any of the other Party's grounds or facilities which that Party is scheduled to use under the Master Use Schedule. Such notice shall be given as far in advance of the scheduled use as is practicable by telephone and notice given in accordance with the notice provision in Section 16 of this Agreement, it being the intent of the Parties that the grounds and facilities of a Party may be used by that Party or by third parties permitted by that Party whenever it is not in use by the other Party notwithstanding that it was made available to the other Party under the Master Use Schedule.

**6. Parking.** Park District shall designate forty (40) motor vehicle parking spaces in the east parking lot of its Community Center located at 1825 Short Street, Lisle, Illinois for use by students of Lisle High School ("Lisle Senior High") under terms and conditions set forth below:

A. Utilizing means comparable to those that School uses to mark or otherwise identify student parking spaces adjacent to Lisle Senior High, Park District shall clearly mark or otherwise identify forty (40) parking spaces that it has designated for use by Lisle Senior High students (hereafter, "Designated Community Center Parking").

B. Lisle Senior High students shall not park in any parking spaces owned, operated or maintained by Park District, other than the Designated Community Center Parking.

C. School District shall be solely responsible for registering, in strict accordance with current School District policies, any and all students who will utilize the Designated Community Center Parking, issuing passes or other means of identification to those

students, and enforcing the terms of this Agreement and the parking regulations of both School District and Park District as they pertain to the Designated Community Center Parking.

D. School District shall furnish to Park District its current policies and procedures governing student parking on School District property, and shall promptly notify Park District of any amendments to, or revisions of, those policies and procedures.

E. School District shall furnish to Park District the name of, and vehicle identification information for, each student who registers to use the Designated Community Center Parking.

F. School District shall monitor the use of the Designated Community Center Parking in the same manner that it monitors use of student parking areas adjacent to Lisle Senior High.

G. School District shall immediately notify Park District of any dangerous condition that its employees or agents observe in or near the east parking lot, including the Designated Community Center Parking area, and shall promptly confirm such notification in writing to Park District.

H. School District shall immediately notify Park District of any: (i) unauthorized use of the Community Center east parking lot including the Designated Community Center Parking; (ii) unsafe driving in or near the Designated Community Center Parking area; (iii) vandalism or excessive littering in or near the Designated Community Center Parking Area; or (iv) loitering by Lisle Senior High students in or near the Designated Community Center Parking Area, that School District's employees or agents observe or about which they are informed. School District shall promptly confirm such notification in writing. Park District shall similarly notify School District orally and in writing of any such problems that Park District's employees or agents bring to Park District's attention. School District promptly shall take any and all actions reasonably necessary to cure or remedy all such problems of which it becomes aware, and shall notify Park District in writing of the taking of such corrective action.

I. School District shall, at its sole cost and expense, remove any and all snow, sleet or ice from the Designated Community Center Parking.

J. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement to the contrary, Park District reserves the right to prohibit Lisle Senior High students from utilizing the Designated Community Center Parking immediately before, after or during any special event conducted or permitted by Park District in the event that Park District reasonably anticipates that all or part of the Designated Community Center Parking will be needed for use by persons attending any such special event. Park District shall provide reasonable

advance notice to School District of its intention to prohibit student parking pursuant to this Subsection J.

K. In the event of any conflict between Park District ordinances, rules, regulations or policies and School District rules, regulations or policies pertaining to use of the Designated Community Center Parking, or student parking generally, the Park District ordinances, rules, regulations and policies shall control.

**7. Maintenance & Custodial Services.** Except as otherwise specifically provided in this Agreement, each Party shall provide normal and customary maintenance, custodial services, and utilities at its own facilities at no cost to the other Party. Park District shall reimburse the School District for the overtime costs of School District custodial staff incurred as a result of Park District programs housed in School District facilities. Additionally, the Parties shall be responsible for the following:

A. Park District Responsibilities. In addition to the other responsibilities in this Agreement, the Park District shall, at its sole cost and expense:

- (i) Providing mulch as needed to School District Properties.
- (ii) Maintain all recreational equipment in playgrounds at all of School District's school sites.
- (iii) Prepare and maintain all baseball and softball fields prior to and in anticipation of any of School District's scheduled games.
- (iv) Start-up and winterize the Lisle Senior High School irrigation system.
- (v) Allow the School District to periodically dispose of tree branches at Park District's Maintenance Facility, upon verbal approval from Park District.
- (vi) Mow the Lisle Senior High School practice field during Park District summer camps

**8. Special Services.** The Park District may also provide, in its sole discretion and upon reasonable advance written notice from School District, certain other maintenance and special services not specifically set forth in Section 7.A. above ("Special Services"). In the event Park District elects to provide any Special Services, the work shall be performed on a time and material basis, and School District shall promptly reimburse Park District for all employee time, material and related equipment costs incurred in performing the Special Services. Equipment costs shall be based on the most current Schedule of Average Annual Equipment Ownership Expense published by the Illinois Department of Transportation.

**9. Equipment.** As of the Effective Date of this Agreement, School District and Park District both own and ordinarily keep on hand a variety of educational, recreational, and sports related equipment (collectively, the "Equipment"). It is understood and agreed by the Parties that the Equipment shall be equally available to the Parties during the Term of this Agreement and may be utilized by either Party in connection with any program or activity offered by either Party in accordance with this Agreement. The Parties may provide such additional or other supplies, material, or equipment as may be mutually agreed upon in writing. This Section 9 shall apply only to Equipment owned by the Parties, and shall not apply to, and specifically excludes, any equipment or other property owned by any third-parties.

**10. Supervision.** Neither Party shall have any responsibility whatsoever for supervising the other Party's programs or activities, or supervising the other Party's employees, agents, volunteers, invitees, or affiliates. Each Party acknowledges and assumes complete responsibility for its employees, agents or volunteers used to supervise its activities hereunder

**11. Repairs and Replacement.** The Parties understand and agree that, during the Term of this Agreement, each Party may incur costs for certain repairs and replacements to that Party's equipment, grounds, or facilities (individually and collectively the "Property"), including those costs due to normal wear and tear. The Parties agree that a Party shall be responsible for and shall pay for such repairs and replacements of that Party's equipment, grounds or facilities (except as otherwise set forth in Section 7) that occur as a result of normal wear and tear. To the extent that the cost of repairs and replacements exceeds what is agreed by the Parties to constitute normal wear and tear, each Party shall reimburse the other Party in an amount based on the excess wear and tear attributable to that Party's use of the other Party's Property during the term of this Agreement. If damage to either Party's Property is the direct result of the other Party's activity, other than normal wear and tear, each Party agrees that it shall promptly reimburse the other Party for the cost of necessary repairs or replacements to the other Party's Property. Any request for reimbursement by either Party shall include a complete itemization of all damages sustained and costs incurred to repair or replace the damaged Property, including statements and/or bills for materials and services. If damage to either Party's Property is the direct result of its own activity, that Party alone shall be responsible for the cost of necessary repairs or replacements of the damaged Property.

**12. Insurance.** Each Party, at its sole cost and expense, shall keep in full force and effect at all times during the Term of this Agreement, insurance against claims for injuries or death to persons or damages to property, which may arise from or in connection with this Agreement. Each Party shall provide coverage that is at least as broad as:

A. Comprehensive general liability insurance, including contractual liability coverage, and such other types of insurance in such amounts and with such A-rated companies or through self insurance risk pools as are reasonably acceptable to the School District and the Park District, but, in any event, no less than \$3,000,000 per occurrence. Such insurance shall be evidenced by annually providing to the other Party certificates of insurance. Said insurance shall name the other Party as an additional insured and will

further provide that the insurance may not be modified, terminated, cancelled or non-renewed without at least thirty (30) days advance written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the other Party.

B. Each Party shall keep and maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance covering all costs, statutory benefits and liabilities under State Workers' Compensation and similar laws for their respective employees. Any employee claim related to this Agreement will be the responsibility of the Party employer and the other Party shall have no obligation whatsoever to provide workers' compensation for the other Party's employees.

The minimum insurance coverage specified in this Section 12 may be provided by self-insurance, participation in a risk management pool, commercial policies of insurance, or a combination thereof. Given the duration of this Agreement, required insurance coverage and/or amounts may need to be modified to adequately protect the Parties against possible claims arising from the Parties' rights and obligations under the terms of this Agreement. The Parties shall, from time to time, mutually review the insurance coverage required in this Section 12, and shall mutually agree upon increases in coverage amounts or additional insurance as may be commensurate with similar agreements or other similarly situated parties in the Chicagoland area and as may be reasonably necessary to protect the Parties against these risks.

**13. Indemnification.** To the fullest extent permitted by law, each Party shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the other Party, its elected and appointed officers, officials, employees, volunteers and agents (collectively, the "Indemnitees"), from and against any and all claims, damages, losses and expenses, including but not limited to legal fees (attorneys' and paralegals' fees and court costs), incurred by any of the Indemnitees for injuries to persons or for damage, destruction or theft of property arising out of or resulting from any activity, act or omission of the indemnifying Party, or of any employee, agent, affiliate, vendor, co-sponsor, invitee, contractor, student or volunteer of the indemnifying Party (the indemnifying Party and each and every such other person being hereinafter individually and collectively referred to as the "Indemnitor"), but only to the extent caused in whole or in part by any wrongful or negligent act or omission of the Indemnitor. Similarly, each Party shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Indemnitees from and against any and all claims, damages, losses and expenses, including but not limited to legal fees (attorneys' and paralegals' fees and court costs), incurred by any of the Indemnitees by reason of the Indemnitor's breach of any of its obligations under this Agreement.

**14. Termination.** Either Party may terminate this Agreement as follows:

A. This Agreement may be terminated immediately by either Party in the event of the other Party's material breach of any of its obligations under this Agreement, provided that, except as provided herein with respect to insurance coverage, the breaching Party has failed to cure any such breach within fourteen (14) days after receiving written notice of same from the non-breaching Party. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the breaching Party shall have repeatedly breached the same or other provisions previously, the non-

breaching Party may terminate this Agreement immediately without affording the breaching Party an opportunity to cure the breach, upon seven (7) days written notice to the breaching Party. Failure to maintain required insurance coverage shall be cause for immediate termination of this Agreement, or the immediate suspension of this Agreement until such insurance has been obtained and satisfactory proof thereof provided to the non-breaching Party, in either case upon written notice to the breaching Party without opportunity to cure.

B. In the event either Party shall have: (i) filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy or made an assignment for the benefit of creditors; or (ii) consented to the appointment of a receiver or trustee for all or a part of its property; or (iii) an involuntary petition in bankruptcy shall have been filed and the same shall not have been dismissed within thirty (30) days of such filing, then in said event this Agreement shall automatically terminate.

C. Either Party may terminate this Agreement for any reason, or no reason, upon not less than one (1) year prior written notice delivered to the other Party in accordance with Section 16 of this Agreement.

D. The Parties may mutually agree to terminate this Agreement in writing at any time.

The rights and obligations imposed by Sections 12 and 13 of this Agreement shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

**15. No Waiver of Tort Immunity Defenses.** Nothing contained in this Agreement is intended to constitute nor shall constitute a waiver of the rights, defenses, and immunities provided or available to either Party under the Illinois Local Governmental and Governmental Employees Tort Immunity Act with respect to claims by third parties.

**16. Notice.** Notices shall be deemed properly given hereunder if in writing and either hand delivered or sent by United States certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, or by fax or email transmission with the sending Party retaining confirmation of receipt, to the Parties at their respective addresses provided below, or as either Party may otherwise direct in writing to the other Party from time to time:

Notices sent by certified mail shall be deemed delivered the second business day following deposit in the mail, notices hand delivered shall be deemed given on the date of delivery, and

notices sent by fax or email transmission shall be deemed given on the date of transmission if between 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM on a business day, or, if later, the next business day.

**17. Compliance with Laws.** The Parties shall comply with all applicable federal, state, county, and local statutes, ordinances, rules, regulations, and codes.

**18. Payment Schedule.** Both Parties shall remit payments to the other Party within 60 days of invoicing. Payments due and unpaid under this Agreement shall bear interest in accordance with the Illinois Local Government Prompt Payment Act (50 ILCS 505/1 *et seq.*).

**19. Relationship of the Parties.** Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to create any joint venture or partnership between the Parties. Neither the Park District nor the School District shall have the power to bind or obligate the other except as to the extent expressly set forth in this Agreement.

**20. No Third Party Beneficiaries.** Notwithstanding any provision herein to the contrary, this Agreement is entered into solely for the benefit of the contracting Parties, and nothing in this Agreement is intended, either expressly or impliedly, to provide any right or benefit of any kind whatsoever to any person or entity who is not a Party to this Agreement or to acknowledge, establish or impose any legal duty to any third party. No claim as a third party beneficiary under this Agreement by any person, firm, or corporation shall be made or be valid against the School District and/or the Park District.

**21. No Implied Waiver.** No waiver of any rights which either Party has in the event of any default or breach by the other Party under this Agreement shall be implied from the non-breaching Party's failure to take any action on any such breach or default and no express waiver shall affect any breach or default other than the breach or default specified in the express waiver and then only for the time and to the extent therein stated.

**22. Assignment.** This Agreement may not be assigned, in whole or in part, by either Party without the prior written consent of the other Party.

**23. Entire Agreement; Modifications.** This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties with respect to the matters contained herein, and this Agreement supersedes any and all prior agreements and understandings, whether written or oral, formal or informal. Any modifications to this Agreement must be in writing, signed by both Parties, and dated on or subsequent to the date hereof.

**24. Authority.** The individual officers of the Park District and the School District who have executed this Agreement represent and warrant that they have the full power and lawful authority to execute this Agreement and perform and fulfill the obligations and responsibilities contemplated hereunder on behalf of and in the name of their respective governing boards.

25. **Successor.** It is the intention of each Party hereto that this Agreement and each and every provision shall be binding on its successors.

26. **Multiple Counterparts.** This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall, for all purposes, constitute a duplicate original.

27. **Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois.

28. **Heading.** The various headings used in this Agreement as headings for sections or otherwise are for convenience only and shall not be used in interpreting the text of the section in which they appear.

**SUBJECT:** Contract Renewal Agreement for Food Service Management Company – School Year 2025-2026

**RECOMMENDATION:** The Administration recommends that the Board of Education approve the Contract Renewal Agreement for Food Management Services from Chartwells for 2025-2026 as presented pending approval by the Illinois State Board of Education.

**BACKGROUND DATA:** In May 2024, the Board of Education accepted a food service management company proposal from Chartwells for the 2024-2025 school year. Federal regulations allow for four additional annual extensions to the food service management agreement beyond the initial year. The current renewal is year one of four. The original contract terms outlined in the RFP specifications stated that the basis for any increase from one year to the next would be the Consumer Price Index for Urban Consumers-Food Away From Home annual rate for December of the current school year. The CPI-U-Food Away From Home (Dec) for 2024 was 3.6%. The attached Contract Renewal Agreement reflects a 3.6% increase in the cost of Chartwell's reimbursable breakfast, reimbursable lunches, and a la carte equivalents fee for the 2025-2026 school year.

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:** The estimated cost for food management services, before lunch receipts or federal lunch reimbursements, is projected to be approximately \$540,000. This amount will be included in the FY2026 budget.

**SUGGESTED MOTION:** That the Board of Education approves the Contract Renewal Agreement for Food Management Services from Chartwells for 2025-2026 as presented reflecting a 3.6% increase in the cost of reimbursable breakfasts, reimbursable lunches, and a la carte equivalents fee pending approval by the Illinois State Board of Education.

**SUBJECT:** Audit Services Engagement Letter – FY2025, FY2026, and FY2027

**RECOMMENDATION:** The Administration recommends that the Board of Education accept the three-year Audit Engagement Letter from Lauterbach & Amen, LLP for auditing services performed on the accrual basis of accounting for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2025, June 30, 2026, and June 30, 2027.

**BACKGROUND DATA:** The School District has utilized Lauterbach & Amen, LLP (L&A) to perform the independent financial audit of the School District for the last six years. L&A was selected as the independent auditor back in June 2019 as part of the Audit Services RFP process. A three-year extension was subsequently approved in February of 2022 and concluded with the FY2024 audit.

L&A is proposing an additional three-year extension. The proposal includes a \$1,200 increase for the FY2025 audit and then increases of \$1,150 and \$1,050 for each of the next two years. The amounts reflected below are for the basic audit services and required single audit over the last five fiscal years along with the current proposal.

We are pleased to confirm our understanding of the services we are to provide the Lisle Community Unit School District No. 202, Illinois for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025, June 30, 2026, and June 30, 2027.

*Audit Scope and Objectives*

We will audit the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information, including the disclosures, which collectively comprise the basic financial statements of the District as of and for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2025, June 30, 2026, and June 30, 2027. Accounting standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) provide for certain required supplementary information (RSI), such as management's discussion and analysis (MD&A), to supplement the District's basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. As part of our engagement, we will apply certain limited procedures to the District's RSI in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). These limited procedures will consist of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We will not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance. The following RSI is required by GAAP and will be subjected to certain limited procedures but will not be audited: management's discussion and analysis, the budgetary comparison schedules, GASB-required pension reporting and GASB-required other post-employment benefit (OPEB) reporting.

We have also been engaged to report on supplementary information other than RSI that accompanies the District's financial statements. We will subject the following supplementary information to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS, and we will provide an opinion on it in relation to the financial statements as a whole, in a report combined with our auditor's report on the financial statements: combining fund statements, individual fund statements, budgetary comparison schedules and other information as supplemental schedules.

### *Audit Scope and Objectives - Continued*

The objectives of our audit are to obtain reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion about whether your financial statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with GAAP; and report on the fairness of the supplementary information referred to in the second paragraph when considered in relation to the financial statements as a whole. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements, including omissions, can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment of a reasonable user made based on the financial statements.

The objectives also include reporting on internal control over financial reporting and compliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and award agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.

### *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements*

We will conduct our audit in accordance with GAAS and the standards for financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and will include tests of your accounting records of the District and other procedures we consider necessary to enable us to express such opinions. As part of an audit in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We will evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management. We will also evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and determine whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation. We will plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, whether from (1) errors, (2) fraudulent financial reporting, (3) misappropriation of assets, or (4) violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the District or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the District. Because the determination of waste and abuse is subjective, *Government Auditing Standards* do not expect auditors to perform specific procedures to detect waste or abuse in financial audits nor do they expect auditors to provide reasonable assurance of detecting waste or abuse.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, combined with the inherent limitations of internal control, and because we will not perform a detailed examination of all transactions, there is an unavoidable risk that some material misstatements may not be detected by us, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*. In addition, an audit is not designed to detect immaterial misstatements or violations of laws or governmental regulations that do not have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, we will inform the appropriate level of management of any material errors, fraudulent financial reporting, or misappropriation of assets that comes to our attention. We will also inform the appropriate level of management of any violations of laws or governmental regulations that come to our attention, unless clearly inconsequential. Our responsibility as auditors is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to any later periods for which we are not engaged as auditors.

## *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements - Continued*

We will also conclude, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the District's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

Our procedures will include tests of documentary evidence supporting the transactions recorded in the accounts, tests of the physical existence of inventories, if applicable, and direct confirmation of receivables and certain assets and liabilities by correspondence with selected customers, creditors, and financial institutions. We will also request written representations from your attorneys as part of the engagement.

We have identified the following significant risks of material misstatement as part of our audit planning: management override of controls, improper revenue recognition, increased regulations by oversight bodies or granting agencies, and general or local economic challenges. Planning for this engagement has not concluded and is subject to change.

Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you of your responsibilities.

### *Audit Procedures – Internal Control*

We will obtain an understanding of the District and its environment, the system of internal control, sufficient to identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to error or fraud, and to design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks and obtain evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinions. Tests of controls may be performed to test the effectiveness of certain controls that we consider relevant to preventing and detecting errors and fraud that are material to the financial statements and to preventing and detecting misstatements resulting from illegal acts and other noncompliance matters that have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. Our tests, if performed, will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on internal control and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentation, or the override of internal control. An audit is not designed to provide assurance on internal control or to identify significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. Accordingly, we will express no such opinion. However, during the audit, we will communicate to management and those charged with governance internal control related matters that are required to be communicated under AICPA professional standards and *Government Auditing Standards*.

### *Audit Procedures – Compliance*

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, we will perform tests of the District's compliance with the provisions of applicable laws, regulations, contracts, agreements, and grants. However, the objective of our audit will not be to provide an opinion on overall compliance, and we will not express such an opinion in our report on compliance issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

### *Other Services*

We will also assist in preparing the financial statements and required audit adjustments, if any, for the District in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America based on information provided by you. These nonaudit services do not constitute an audit under *Government Auditing Standards* and such services will not be conducted in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. We will perform the services in accordance with applicable professional standards. The other services are limited to the financial statement services previously defined. We, in our sole professional judgment, reserve the right to refuse to perform any procedure or take any action that could be construed as assuming management responsibilities.

You agree to assume all management responsibilities relating to the financial statements and related notes and any other nonaudit services we provide. You will be required to acknowledge in the management representation letter our assistance with preparation of the financial statements and related notes and that you have reviewed and approved the financial statements and related notes prior to their issuance and have accepted responsibility for them. Further, you agree to oversee the nonaudit services by designating an individual, preferably from senior management, with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience; evaluate the adequacy and results of those services; and accept responsibility for them.

### *Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements*

Our audit will be conducted on the basis that you acknowledge and understand your responsibility for designing, implementing, establishing, and maintaining effective internal controls relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and for evaluating and monitoring ongoing activities to help ensure that appropriate goals and objectives are met; following laws and regulations; and ensuring that management and financial information is reliable and properly reported. Management is also responsible for implementing systems designed to achieve compliance with applicable laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements. You are also responsible for the selection and application of accounting principles, for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements and all accompanying information in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for compliance with applicable laws and regulations and the provisions of contracts and grant agreements.

Management is responsible for making drafts of financial statements, all financial records, and related information available to us; for the accuracy and completeness of that information (including information from outside of the general and subsidiary ledgers); and for the evaluation of whether there are any conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the government's ability to continue as a going concern for the 12 months after the financial statements date or shortly thereafter (for example, within an additional three months if currently known). You are also responsible for providing us with (1) access to all information of which you are aware that is relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements, such as records, documentation, identification of all related parties and all related-party relationships and transactions, and other matters; (2) additional information that we may request for the purpose of the audit; and (3) unrestricted access to persons within the government from whom we determine it necessary to obtain audit evidence. At the conclusion of our audit, we will require certain written representations from you about your responsibilities for the financial statements; compliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements; and other responsibilities required by GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*.

### *Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements - Continued*

Your responsibilities include adjusting the financial statements to correct material misstatements and for confirming to us in the written representation letter that the effects of any uncorrected misstatements aggregated by us during the current engagement and pertaining to the latest period presented are immaterial, both individually and in the aggregate, to the financial statements of each opinion unit taken as a whole.

You are responsible for the design and implementation of programs and controls to prevent and detect fraud, and for informing us about all known or suspected fraud affecting the government involving (1) management, (2) employees who have significant roles in internal control, and (3) others where the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements. **RECOMMENDATION:** The Administration recommends that the Board of Education award the Lisle Junior High School RTU Replacement and Theater Stair Renovation Bid totaling \$936,778 to F.E. Moran, Inc.

**BACKGROUND DATA:** Bids were opened Tuesday, March 18<sup>th</sup> for the Lisle Junior High School rooftop unit (RTU) replacement and theater stair renovation work slated for the summer of 2025. This is a rebid of work that was originally bid out in February. The original bid included replacement of the auditorium rooftop unit in addition to the common's rooftop unit and the theater staircase. The previous bid came in at \$1,529,000, well over the original anticipated cost for the project. As a result, the auditorium unit was removed, and the critical projects for this summer were rebid as a smaller scope of work. The auditorium unit will be revisited when Phase 3 of the renovation work is undertaken.

The Bid Tabulation Summary included in BoardBooks provides detailed results of the bid opening. Five (5) bidders submitted proposals. The apparent lowest bidder for the project is F.E. Moran, Inc. at a cost of \$936,778. The Administration does not recommend accepting the alternate deduct of \$16,900 for exterior grillage steel support, as there is no functional advantage to this option. The primary difference is aesthetic, as it would raise the units several feet above the roof, making them more visible. Since the contractor does not anticipate a significant difference in ceiling demolition between the two options, we recommend proceeding with the base scope.

Also attached in BoardBook is a letter from the architects, Perkins+Will, providing their recommendation to award the base bid to F.E. Moran, Inc.

**FINANCIAL IMPACT:** Approximately \$500,000 of the project costs are included in the FY2025 Capital Projects Fund budget, with the remaining costs planned for inclusion in the FY2026 budget.

**SUGGESTED MOTION:** That the Board of Education approves awarding the Lisle Junior High RTU Replacement and Theater Stair Renovation Bid to F.E. Moran, Inc. by accepting the base bid totaling \$936,778.

## STUDENTS

### **7:70 Attendance and Truancy**

#### Compulsory School Attendance

This policy applies to individuals who have custody or control of a child: (a) between the ages of six (on or before September 1) and 17 years (unless the child has graduated from high school), or (b) who is enrolled in any of grades kindergarten through 12 in the public school regardless of age. Subject to specific requirements in State law, the following children are not required to attend public school: (1) any child attending a private school (including a home school) or parochial school, (2) any child who is physically or mentally unable to attend school (including a pregnant student suffering medical complications as certified by her physician), (3) any child lawfully and necessarily employed, (4) any child over 12 and under 14 years of age while in confirmation classes, (5) any child absent because of religious reasons, including to observe a religious holiday, for religious instruction, or because his or her religion forbids secular activity on a particular day(s) or time of day, and (6) any child 16 years of age or older who is employed and is enrolled in a graduation incentives program.

The parent/guardian of a student who is enrolled must authorize all absences from school and notify the school in advance or at the time of the student's absence. A valid cause for absence includes illness (including mental or behavioral health of the student), observance of a religious holiday, death in the immediate family, attendance at a civic event, family emergency, other situations beyond the control of the student as determined by the Board, other circumstances that cause reasonable concern to the parent/guardian for the student's mental, emotional, or physical health or safety, or other reason as approved by the Superintendent or designee. Students absent for a valid cause may make up missed homework and classwork assignments in a reasonable timeframe.

#### Absenteeism and Truancy Program

The Superintendent or designee shall manage an absenteeism and truancy program in accordance with the School Code and Board of Education policy. The program shall include but not be limited to:

1. A protocol for excusing a student from attendance who is necessarily and lawfully employed. The Superintendent or designee is authorized to determine when the student's absence is justified. A student may be excused, at the Superintendent or designee's discretion, when: (1) the student has a last period study hall, (2) the parent/guardian provides written permission, (3) the student's employer provides written verification of employment, (4) the student provides evidence of a valid work permit, or (5) other reason deemed justifiable by the Superintendent or designee.
2. A protocol for excusing a student in grades 6 through 12 from attendance to sound *Taps* at a military honors funeral held in Illinois for a deceased veteran.
3. A protocol for excusing a student from attendance on a particular day(s) or at a particular time of day when his/her parent/guardian is an active duty member of the uniformed services and has been called to duty for, is on leave from, or has immediately returned from deployment to a combat zone or combat-support postings.
4. A process to telephone, within two hours after the first class, the parents/guardians of students in grade 8 or below who are absent without prior parent/guardian notification.
5. A process to identify and track students who are truants, chronic or habitual truants, or truant minors as defined in [105 ILCS 5/26-2a](#).
6. A description of diagnostic procedures for identifying the cause(s) of a student's unexcused absenteeism, including interviews with the student, his or her parent(s)/guardian(s), and staff members or other people who may have information about the reasons for the student's attendance problem.
7. The identification of supportive services that may be offered to truant, chronically truant, or chronically absent students, including parent-teacher conferences, student and/or family counseling, or information about community agency services. See Board policy 6:110, *Programs for Students At Risk of Academic Failure and/or Dropping Out of School and Graduation Incentives Program*.
8. A process for the collection and review of chronic absence data and to:
  - a. Determine what systems of support and resources are needed to engage chronically absent students and their families, and
  - b. Encourage the habit of daily attendance and promote success.
9. Reasonable efforts to provide ongoing professional development to teachers, administrators, Board members, school resource officers, and staff on the appropriate and available supportive services for the promotion of student attendance and engagement.

10. A process to request the assistance and resources of outside agencies, such as, the juvenile officer of the local police department or the truant office of the appropriate Regional Office of Education, if truancy continues after supportive services have been offered.
11. A protocol for cooperating with non-District agencies including County or municipal authorities, the Regional Superintendent, truant officers, the Community Truancy Review Board, and a comprehensive community based youth service agency. Any disclosure of school student records must be consistent with Board policy 7:340, *Student Records*, as well as State and federal law concerning school student records.
12. An acknowledgement that out-of-school suspensions, expulsions, or court action, shall not be taken against a truant minor for his or her truancy unless available supportive services and other school resources have been provided to the student.
13. The criteria to determine whether a student's non-attendance is due to extraordinary circumstances shall include economic or medical necessity or family hardship and such other criteria that the Superintendent believes qualifies.
14. A process for a 17 year old resident to participate in the District's various programs and resources for truants. The student must provide documentation of his/her dropout status for the previous six months. A request from an individual 19 years of age or older to re-enroll after having dropped out of school is handled according to provisions in 7:50, *School Admissions and Student Transfers To and From Non-District Schools*.
15. A process for the temporary exclusion of a student 17 years of age or older for failing to meet minimum attendance standards according to provisions in State law. A parent/guardian has the right to appeal a decision to exclude a student.

### Monitoring

Pursuant to State law and policy 2:240, *Board Policy Development*, the Board updates this policy at least once every two years. The Superintendent or designee shall assist the Board with its update.

### **INSTRUCTION**

#### **6:235 Access to Electronic Networks**

Electronic networks\* are a part of the District's instructional program and serve to promote educational excellence by facilitating resource sharing, innovation, and communication.

The term *electronic networks* includes all of the District's technology resources, including, but not limited to:

1. The District's local-area and wide-area networks, including wireless networks (Wi-Fi), District-issued Wi-Fi hotspots, and any District servers or other networking infrastructure;
2. Access to the Internet or other online resources via the District's networks or to any District-issued online account from any computer or device, regardless of location;
3. District-owned or District-issued computers, laptops, tablets, phones, or similar devices.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop an implementation plan for this policy and appoint a system administrator.

The District is not responsible for any losses or damages incurred when using the network, or for any information that is retrieved or transmitted via the Internet. Furthermore, the District will not be responsible for any unauthorized charges or fees resulting; from access to the Internet.

#### **Curriculum and Appropriate Online Behavior**

The use of the District's electronic networks shall: (1) be consistent with the curriculum adopted by the District as well as the varied instructional needs, learning styles, abilities, and developmental levels of the students, and (2) comply with the selection criteria for instructional materials and library resource center materials. As required by federal law and Board policy 6:60, *Curriculum Content*, students will be educated about appropriate online behavior, including but not limited to: (1) interacting with other individuals on social networking websites and in chat rooms, and (2) cyberbullying awareness and response. Staff members may, consistent with the Superintendent's implementation plan, use the Internet throughout the curriculum.

The District's electronic networks are part of the curriculum and are not public forums for general use.

#### **Acceptable Use**

All use of the District's electronic networks must be:

1. In support of education and/or research, and be in furtherance of the School Board's stated goal,  
or
2. For a legitimate school business purpose.

\*Electronic Networks include, but are not limited to:

1. The Internet

2. Any wireless access
3. Internet access
4. Remote access to District internal network

Use is a privilege, not a right. General rules for behavior and communications apply when using electronic networks. The District's Acceptable Use Standards (AUS) contains the appropriate uses, ethics, and protocol. Users of the District's electronic networks have no expectation of privacy in any material that is stored on, transmitted, or received via the District's electronic networks. Electronic communications and downloaded material, including files deleted from a user's account but not erased, may be monitored or read by school officials.

School officials may conduct an investigation or require a student to cooperate in an investigation if there is specific information about the activity on the student's phone or account on a social networking website that violates a school disciplinary rule or policy. In the course of the investigation, the student may be required to share the content that is reported in order to allow school officials to make a factual determination.

All users of the District's computers and means of Internet access shall maintain the confidentiality of student records. Reasonable measures to protect against unreasonable access shall be taken before confidential student information is loaded onto the network.

### Internet Safety

Technology protection measures shall be used on each District computer with Internet access. They shall include a filtering device that protects against Internet access by both adults and minors to visual depictions that are:

1. Obscene,
2. Pornographic, or
3. Harmful or inappropriate for students, as defined by the Children's Internet Protection Act and as determined by the Superintendent or designee.

The Superintendent shall enforce the use of such filtering devices. An administrator, supervisor, or other authorized person may disable the filtering device for bona fide research or other lawful purpose, provided the person receives prior permission from the Superintendent or system administrator. The Superintendent shall include measures in this policy's implementation plan to address the following:

1. Limiting student access to inappropriate matter as well as restricting access to harmful materials;
2. Student safety and security when using electronic communications;
3. Limiting unauthorized access, including "hacking" and other unlawful activities: and
4. Limiting unauthorized disclosure, use, and dissemination of personal identification information.

### Authorization for Electronic Networks Access

Each staff member must sign the District's Acceptable Use Standards (AUS) as a condition for using the District's electronic networks. Each student and his or her parent(s)/guardians(s) must sign the AUS before being granted supervised use.

The failure of any student or staff member to follow the terms of the *Acceptable Use Standards*, or this Board policy, will result in the loss of privileges, disciplinary action, and/or appropriate legal action.

## Confidentiality

All users of the District's computers to access the Internet shall maintain the confidentiality of student records. Reasonable measures to protect against unreasonable access shall be taken before confidential student information is loaded onto the network.

## Violations

The failure of any user to follow the terms of the District's administrative procedure, *Acceptable Use of the District's Electronic Networks*, or this policy, will result in the loss of privileges, disciplinary action, and/or appropriate legal action.

### STUDENTS

#### **7:180 Prevention of and Response to Bullying, Intimidation, and Harassment**

Bullying, intimidation, and harassment diminish a student's ability to learn and a school's ability to educate. Preventing students from engaging in these disruptive behaviors and providing all students equal access to a safe, non-hostile learning environment are important District goals.

Bullying on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, religion, sex, national origin, ancestry, physical appearance, socioeconomic status, academic status, pregnancy, parenting status, homelessness, age, marital status, physical or mental disability, military status, sexual orientation, gender-related identity or expression, unfavorable discharge from military service, order of protection status, association with a person or group with one or more of the aforementioned actual or perceived characteristics, or any other distinguishing characteristic **is prohibited** in each of the following situations:

1. During any school-sponsored education program or activity.
2. While in school, on school property, on school buses or other school vehicles, at designated school bus stops waiting for the school bus, or at school-sponsored or school-sanctioned events or activities.
3. Through the transmission of information from a school computer, a school computer network, or other similar electronic school equipment.
4. Through the transmission of information from a computer that is accessed at a nonschool-related location, activity, function, or program or from the use of technology or an electronic device including, but not limited to, a cell phone, smartphone, smartwatch, audio or video recording device, personal digital assistant (PDA), iPod, iPad, portable gaming system, laptop computer, tablet computer or other similar electronic device, that that is not owned, leased, or used by the School District or school if the bullying causes a substantial disruption to the educational process or orderly operation of a school. This paragraph (item #4) applies only when a school administrator or teacher receives a report that bullying through this means has occurred; it does not require staff members to monitor any nonschool-related activity, function, or program.

Definitions from [105 ILCS 5/27-23.7](#)

*Bullying* includes *cyberbullying* and means any severe or pervasive physical or verbal act or conduct, including communications made in writing or electronically, directed toward a student or students that has or can be reasonably predicted to have the effect of one or more of the following:

1. Placing the student or students in reasonable fear of harm to the student's or students' person or property;
2. Causing a substantially detrimental effect on the student's or students' physical or mental health;
3. Substantially interfering with the student's or students' academic performance; or
4. Substantially interfering with the student's or students' ability to participate in or benefit from the services, activities, or privileges provided by a school.

*Bullying* may take various forms, including without limitation one or more of the following: harassment, threats, intimidation, stalking, physical violence, sexual harassment, sexual violence, theft, public humiliation, destruction of property, or retaliation for asserting or alleging an act of bullying. This list is meant to be illustrative and non-exhaustive.

*Cyberbullying* means bullying through the use of technology or any electronic communication, including without limitation any transfer of signs, signals, writing, images, sounds, data, or intelligence of any nature transmitted in whole or in part by a wire, radio, electromagnetic system, photo-electronic system, or photo-optical system, including without limitation electronic mail, Internet communications, instant messages, or facsimile communications. *Cyberbullying* includes the creation of a webpage or weblog in which the creator assumes the identity of another person or the knowing impersonation of another person as the author of posted content or messages if the creation or impersonation creates any of the effects enumerated in the definition of *bullying*. *Cyberbullying* also includes the distribution by electronic means of a communication to more than one person or the posting of material on an electronic medium that may be accessed by one or more persons if the distribution or posting creates any of the effects enumerated in the definition of *bullying*.

*Restorative measures* means a continuum of school-based alternatives to exclusionary discipline, such as suspensions and expulsions, that: (i) are adapted to the particular needs of the school and community, (ii) contribute to maintaining school safety, (iii) protect the integrity of a positive and productive learning climate, (iv) teach students the personal and interpersonal skills they will need to be successful in school and society, (v) serve to build and restore relationships among students, families, schools, and communities, (vi) reduce the likelihood of future disruption by balancing accountability with an understanding of students' behavioral health needs in order to keep students in school, and (vii) increase student accountability if the incident of bullying is based on religion, race, ethnicity, or any other category that is identified in the Ill. Human Rights Act.

*School personnel* means persons employed by, on contract with, or who volunteer in a school district, including without limitation school and school district administrators, teachers, school social workers, school counselors, school psychologists, school nurses, cafeteria workers, custodians, bus drivers, school resource officers, and security guards.

### Bullying Prevention and Response Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall develop and maintain a bullying prevention and response plan that advances the District's goal of providing all students with a safe learning environment free of bullying and harassment. This plan must be consistent with the requirements listed below.

1. Using the definition of *bullying* as provided in this policy, the Superintendent or designee shall emphasize to the school community that: (1) the District prohibits bullying, and (2) all students should conduct themselves with a proper regard for the rights and welfare of other students. This may include a process for commending or acknowledging students for demonstrating appropriate behavior.
2. Bullying is contrary to State law and the policy of this District. However, nothing in the District's bullying prevention and response plan is intended to infringe upon any right to exercise free expression or the free exercise of religion or religiously based views protected under the [First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution](#) or under [Section 3 of Article I of the Illinois Constitution](#).
3. Students are encouraged to immediately report bullying. A report may be made orally or in writing to the Nondiscrimination Coordinator, Building Principal, Assistant Building Principal, Dean of Students, a Complaint Manager, or any staff member with whom the student is comfortable speaking. Anyone, including staff members and parents/guardians, who has information about actual or threatened bullying is encouraged to report it to the District named

officials or any staff member. The District named officials and all staff members are available for help with a bully or to make a report about bullying. Anonymous reports are also accepted; however, this shall not be construed to permit formal disciplinary action solely on the basis of an anonymous report.

4. Consistent with federal and State laws and rules governing student privacy rights, the parents/guardians of all students involved in an alleged incident of bullying will be notified of such, along with threats, suggestions, or instances of self-harm determined to be the result of bullying, within 24 hours after the school's administration is made aware of the student's involvement in the incident. As appropriate, the school's administration shall also discuss the availability of social work services, counseling, school psychological services, other interventions, and restorative measures. The school shall make diligent efforts to notify a parent or legal guardian, utilizing all contact information the school has available or that can be reasonably obtained within the 24-hour period.
5. The Superintendent or designee shall promptly investigate and address reports of bullying, by, among other things:
  - a. Making all reasonable efforts to complete the investigation within 10 school days after the date the report of a bullying incident was received and taking into consideration additional relevant information received during the course of the investigation about the reported bullying incident.
  - b. Involving appropriate school support personnel and other staff persons with knowledge,

experience, and training on bullying prevention, as deemed appropriate, in the investigation process.

- c. Notifying the Building Principal or school administrator or designee of the reported incident of bullying as soon as possible after the report is received.
- d. Consistent with federal and State laws and rules governing student privacy rights, providing parents/guardians of the students who are parties to the investigation information about the investigation and an opportunity to meet with the Building Principal or school administrator or his or her designee to discuss the investigation, the findings of the investigation, and the actions taken to address the reported incident of bullying.

The Superintendent or designee shall investigate whether a reported incident of bullying is within the permissible scope of the District's jurisdiction and shall require that the District provide the victim with information regarding services that are available within the District and community, such as counseling, support services, and other programs.

6. The Superintendent or designee shall use interventions to address bullying, that may include, but are not limited to, school social work services, restorative measures, social-emotional skill building, counseling, school psychological services, and community-based services.
7. A reprisal or retaliation against any person who reports an act of bullying **is prohibited**. Any person's act of reprisal or retaliation will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge with regard to employees, or suspension and/or expulsion with regard to students.
8. A student will not be punished for reporting bullying or supplying information, even if the District's investigation concludes that no bullying occurred. However, a person who is found to have falsely accused another of bullying, as a means of retaliation, as a means of bullying, or provided false information will be treated as either: (a) *bullying*, (b) student discipline up to and including suspension and/or expulsion, and/or (c) both (a) and (b) for purposes of determining any consequences or other appropriate remedial actions.
9. The District's bullying prevention and response plan is based on the engagement of a range of school stakeholders, including students and parents/guardians.
10. The Superintendent or designee shall post this policy on the District's publicly accessible website, if any, and include it in the student handbook, and, where applicable, post it where other policies, rules, and standards of conduct are currently posted. The policy must be distributed annually to parents/guardians, students, and school personnel (including new employees when hired), and must also be provided periodically throughout the school year to students and faculty.
11. Pursuant to State law and Board policy 2:240, *Board Policy Development*, the Board monitors this policy every two years by conducting a review and re-evaluation of this policy to make any necessary and appropriate revisions. The Superintendent or designee shall assist the Board with its re-evaluation and assessment of this policy's outcomes and effectiveness. Updates to this policy will reflect any necessary and appropriate revisions. This process shall include, without limitation:
  - a. The frequency of victimization;
  - b. Student, staff, and family observations of safety at a school;
  - c. Identification of areas of a school where bullying occurs;
  - d. The types of bullying utilized; and
  - e. Bystander intervention or participation.

The evaluation process may use relevant data and information that the District already collects for other purposes. Acceptable documentation to satisfy the re-evaluated policy submission include one of the following:

- 1) An updated version of the policy with the amendment/modification date included in the reference portion of the policy;
- 2) If no revisions are deemed necessary, a copy of board minutes indicating that the policy was re-evaluated and no changes were deemed to be necessary; or
- 3) A signed statement from the Board President indicating that the Board re-evaluated the policy and no changes to it were necessary.

The Superintendent or designee must post the information developed as a result of the policy re-evaluation on the District's website, or if a website is not available, the information must be provided to school administrators, Board members, school personnel, parents/guardians, and students. Reviews and re-evaluations in years they are due must be submitted to ISBE by September 30.

12. The Superintendent or designee shall fully implement the Board policies, including without limitation, the following:
  - a. 2:260, *Uniform Grievance Procedure*. A student may use this policy to complain about bullying.
  - b. 2:265, *Title IX Grievance Procedure*. Any person may use this policy to complain about sex discrimination in violation of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.
  - c. 2:270, *Discrimination and Harassment on the Basis of Race, Color, and National Origin Prohibited*. Any person may use this policy to complain about discrimination or harassment on the basis of race, color, or national origin in violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and/or the Illinois Human Rights Act.
  - d. 6:60, *Curriculum Content*. Bullying prevention and character instruction is provided in all grades in accordance with State law.
  - e. 6:65, *Student Social and Emotional Development*. Student social and emotional development is incorporated into the District's educational program as required by State law.
  - f. 6:235, *Access to Electronic Networks*. This policy states that the use of the District's electronic networks is limited to: (1) support of education and/or research, or (2) a legitimate business use.
  - g. 7:20, *Harassment of Students Prohibited*. This policy prohibits *any* person from harassing, intimidating, or bullying a student based on an identified actual or perceived characteristic (the list of characteristics in 7:20 is the same as the list in this policy).
  - h. 7:185, *Teen Dating Violence Prohibited*. This policy prohibits teen dating violence on school property, at school sponsored activities, and in vehicles used for school-provided transportation.
  - i. 7:190, *Student Behavior*. This policy prohibits, and provides consequences for, hazing, bullying, or other aggressive behaviors, or urging other students to engage in such conduct.
  - j. 7:310, *Restrictions on Publications; Elementary Schools*, and 7:315, *Restrictions on Publications; High Schools*. These policies prohibit students from and provide consequences for: (1) accessing and/or distributing at school any written, printed, or electronic material, including material from the Internet, that will cause substantial disruption of the proper and orderly operation and discipline of the school or school activities, and (2) creating and/or distributing written, printed, or electronic material, including photographic material and blogs, that causes substantial disruption to school operations or interferes with the rights of other students or staff members.

13. The Superintendent, Building Principal or designee shall fully inform staff members of the District's goal to prevent students from engaging in bullying and the measures being used to accomplish it. This includes each of the following:
- a. Communicating the District's expectation and State law requirement that teachers and other certificated or licensed employees maintain discipline.
  - b. Establishing the expectation that staff members: (1) intervene immediately to stop a bullying incident that they witness or immediately contact building security and/or law enforcement if the incident involves a weapon or other illegal activity, (2) report bullying, whether they witness it or not, to an administrator, and (3) inform the administration of locations on school grounds where additional supervision or monitoring may be needed to prevent bullying.
  - c. Where appropriate in the staff development program, providing strategies to staff members to effectively prevent bullying and intervene when it occurs.
  - d. Establishing a process for staff members to fulfill their obligation to report alleged acts of bullying.

### **STUDENTS**

#### **7:190 Student Behavior**

The goals and objectives of this policy are to provide effective discipline practices that: (1) ensure the safety and dignity of students and staff; (2) maintain a positive, weapons-free, and drug-free learning environment; (3) keep school property and the property of others secure; (4) address the causes of a student's misbehavior and provide opportunities for all individuals involved in an incident to participate in its resolution; and (5) teach students positive behavioral skills to become independent, self-disciplined citizens in the school community and society.

#### When and Where Conduct Rules Apply

A student is subject to disciplinary action for engaging in *prohibited student conduct*, as described in the section with that name below, whenever the student's conduct is reasonably related to school or school activities, including, but not limited to:

1. On school grounds at any time;
2. Off school grounds at a school-sponsored activity or event, or any activity or event that bears a reasonable relationship to school;
3. Traveling to or from school or a school activity, function, or event; or
4. Anywhere, if the conduct interferes with, disrupts, or adversely affects the school environment, school operations, or an educational function, including, but not limited to, conduct that may reasonably be considered to: (a) be a threat or an attempted intimidation of a staff member; or (b) endanger the health or safety of students, staff, or school property.

#### Prohibited Student Conduct

The school administration is authorized to discipline students for gross disobedience or misconduct, including but not limited to:

1. Using, possessing, distributing, purchasing, or selling tobacco or nicotine materials, including without limitation, electronic cigarettes, smoking/vaping and materials.
2. Using, possessing, distributing, purchasing, or selling alcoholic beverages. Students who are under the influence of an alcoholic beverage are not permitted to attend school or school functions and are treated as though they had alcohol in their possession.
3. Using, possessing, distributing, purchasing, selling, or offering for sale:
  - a. Any illegal drug or controlled substance, or cannabis (including marijuana, hashish, and medical cannabis unless the student is authorized to be administered a medical cannabis infused product under *Ashley's Law*).
  - b. Any anabolic steroid unless it is being administered in accordance with a physician's or licensed practitioner's prescription.
  - c. Any performance-enhancing substance on the Illinois High School Association's most current banned substance list unless administered in accordance with a physician's or

licensed practitioner's prescription.

- d. Any prescription drug when not prescribed for the student by a physician or licensed practitioner, or when used in a manner inconsistent with the prescription or prescribing physician's or licensed practitioner's instructions. The use or possession of medical cannabis, even by a student for whom medical cannabis has been prescribed, is prohibited unless the student is authorized to be administered a medical cannabis infused product under *Ashley's Law*.
- e. Any inhalant, regardless of whether it contains an illegal drug or controlled substance: (a) that a student believes is, or represents to be capable of, causing intoxication, hallucination, excitement, or dulling of the brain or nervous system; or (b) about which the student engaged in behavior that would lead a reasonable person to believe that the student intended the inhalant to cause intoxication, hallucination, excitement, or dulling of the brain or nervous system. The prohibition in this section does not apply to a student's use of asthma or other legally prescribed inhalant medications.
- f. Any substance inhaled, injected, smoked, consumed, or otherwise ingested or absorbed with the intention of causing a physiological or psychological change in the body, including without limitation, pure caffeine in tablet or powdered form.
- g. *Look-alike* or counterfeit drugs, including a substance that is not prohibited by this policy, but one: (a) that a student believes to be, or represents to be, an illegal drug, controlled substance, or other substance that is prohibited by this policy; or (b) about which a student engaged in behavior that would lead a reasonable person to believe that the student expressly or impliedly represented to be an illegal drug, controlled substance, or other substance that is prohibited by this policy.
- h. Drug paraphernalia, including devices that are or can be used to: (a) ingest, inhale, or inject cannabis or controlled substances into the body; and (b) grow, process, store, or conceal cannabis or controlled substances.

Students who are under the influence of any prohibited substance are not permitted to attend school or school functions and are treated as though they had the prohibited substance, as applicable, in their possession.

4. Using, possessing, controlling, or transferring a *weapon* as that term is defined in the **Weapons** section of this policy, or violating the **Weapons** section of this policy.
5. ~~Using or possessing a cellular telephone, electronic signaling device, two-way radio, video recording device, and/or other telecommunication device, unless authorized and approved by the Building Principal or designee.~~

Using or having interaction with electronic devices, unless authorized and approved by an administrator, teacher or school staff member.

a. Electronic devices include, but are not limited to: a cell phone, smart phone, smart watch, audio or video recording device, personal digital assistant (PDA), iPod, iPad, portable gaming system, laptop computer, tablet computer or similar electronic devices. Pocket pagers and other paging devices are not allowed on school property at any time, except with the express permission of the building administration.

b. Interaction includes, but is not limited to: use of the electronic device; use of accessories such as headphones/earbuds; hands on electronic device; electronic device making any noise; or electronic device visible in the student workspace.

c. Electronic devices and accessories must be powered-off and out of sight unless: (1)

permission is granted by an administrator, teacher or school staff member; (2) use of the device is provided in a student's individualized education program (IEP); or (3) it is needed in an emergency that threatens the safety of the students, staff, or other individuals.

d. Electronic devices may never be used in any manner that disrupts the educational environment, violates student conduct rules or violates the rights of others. This includes, but is not limited to: (1) taking photographs in locker rooms or bathrooms; (2) taking, displaying, or sending images without permission; (3) creating, sending, sharing, viewing, receiving, or possessing an indecent visual depiction or dissemination of private sexual images (sexting); (4) cheating; (5) using an electronic device in the hallway, bathrooms, and or common areas during a class period; or (6) using an electronic device during any loss of privilege time including detentions and in-school suspensions.

6. Possession of, use, control or transfer of any explosive or incendiary device, including fireworks. This includes any component of an explosive or incendiary device, e.g. schematics or other drawings, ignition agent(s), container(s), wiring, etc., when it is reasonably determined that the component was intended to be used as part of an explosive or incendiary device.
7. Using or possessing a laser pointer unless under a staff member's direct supervision and in the context of instruction.
8. Disobeying rules of student conduct or directives from staff members or school officials. Examples of disobeying staff directives include refusing a District staff member's request to stop, present school identification, or submit to a search.
9. Engaging in academic dishonesty, including cheating, intentionally plagiarizing, using a writing service and/or generative artificial intelligence technology in place of original work unless specifically authorized by staff, wrongfully giving or receiving help during an academic examination, altering report cards, and wrongfully obtaining test copies or scores.
10. Engaging in hazing or any kind of bullying or aggressive behavior that does physical or psychological harm to a staff person or another student, or urging other students to engage in such conduct. Prohibited conduct specifically includes, without limitation, any use of violence, intimidation, force, noise, coercion, threats, stalking, harassment, sexual harassment, public humiliation, theft or destruction of property, retaliation, hazing, bullying, bullying using a school computer or a school computer network, or other comparable conduct.
11. Engaging in any sexual activity, including without limitation, offensive touching, sexual harassment, indecent exposure (including mooning), and sexual assault. This does not include the non-disruptive: (a) expression of gender or sexual orientation or preference, or (b) display of affection during non-instructional time.
12. Teen dating violence, as described in Board policy 7:185, *Teen Dating Violence Prohibited*.
13. Causing or attempting to cause damage to, or stealing or attempting to steal, school property or another person's personal property.
14. Entering school property or a school facility without proper authorization.
15. In the absence of a reasonable belief that an emergency exists, calling emergency responders (such as calling 911); signaling or setting off alarms or signals indicating the presence of an emergency; or indicating the presence of a bomb or explosive device on school grounds, school bus, or at any school activity.
16. Being absent without a recognized excuse; State law and Board of Education policy regarding truancy control will be used with chronic and habitual truants.
17. Being involved with any public school fraternity, sorority, or secret society, by: (a) being a member; (b) promising to join; (c) pledging to become a member; or (d) soliciting any other person to join, promise to join, or be pledged to become a member.
18. Being involved in gangs or gang-related activities, including displaying gang symbols or

paraphernalia.

19. Violating any criminal law, including but not limited to, assault, battery, arson, theft, gambling, eavesdropping, vandalism, and hazing.
20. Making an explicit threat on an Internet website against a school employee, a student, or any school-related personnel if the Internet website through which the threat was made is a site that was accessible within the school at the time the threat was made or was available to third parties who worked or studied within the school grounds at the time the threat was made, and the threat could be reasonably interpreted as threatening to the safety and security of the threatened individual because of his or her duties or employment status or status as a student inside the school.
21. Operating an unmanned aircraft system (UAS) or drone for any purpose on school grounds or at any school event unless granted permission by the Superintendent or designee.
22. Engaging in any activity, on or off campus, that interferes with, disrupts, or adversely affects the school environment, school operations, or an educational function, including but not limited to, conduct that may reasonably be considered to: (a) be a threat or an attempted intimidation of a staff member; or (b) endanger the health or safety of students, staff, or school property.

For purposes of this policy, the term *possession* includes having control, custody, or care, currently or in the past, of an object or substance, including situations in which the item is: (a) on the student's person; (b) contained in another item belonging to, or under the control of, the student, such as in the student's clothing, backpack, or automobile; (c) in a school's student locker, desk, or other school property; or (d) at any location on school property or at a school-sponsored event.

Efforts, including the use of positive interventions and supports, shall be made to deter students, while at school or a school-related event, from engaging in aggressive behavior that may reasonably produce physical or psychological harm to someone else. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the parent/guardian of a student who engages in aggressive behavior is notified of the incident. The failure to provide such notification does not limit the Board's authority to impose discipline, including suspension or expulsion, for such behavior.

No disciplinary action shall be taken against any student that is based totally or in part on the refusal of the student's parent/guardian to administer or consent to the administration of psychotropic or psychostimulant medication to the student.

### Disciplinary Measures

School officials shall limit the number and duration of expulsions and out-of-school suspensions to the greatest extent practicable, and, where practicable and reasonable, shall consider forms of non-exclusionary discipline before using out-of-school suspensions or expulsions. School personnel shall not advise or encourage students to drop out voluntarily due to behavioral or academic difficulties. Potential disciplinary measures include, without limitation, any of the following:

1. Notifying parent(s)/guardian(s).
2. Disciplinary conference.
3. Withholding of privileges.
4. Temporary removal from the classroom.
5. Return of property or restitution for lost, stolen, or damaged property.
6. In-school suspension. The Building Principal or designee shall ensure that the student is properly supervised.
7. After-school study or Saturday study provided the student's parent/guardian has been notified. If

transportation arrangements cannot be agreed upon, an alternative disciplinary measure must be used. The student must be supervised by the detaining teacher or the Building Principal or designee.

8. Community service with local public and nonprofit agencies that enhances community efforts to meet human, educational, environmental, or public safety needs. The District will not provide transportation. School administration shall use this option only as an alternative to another disciplinary measure, giving the student and/or parent/guardian the choice.
9. Seizure of contraband; confiscation and temporary retention of personal property that was used to violate this policy or school disciplinary rules.
10. Suspension of bus riding privileges in accordance with Board policy 7:220, *Bus Conduct*.
11. In school suspension and all school activities in accordance with Board Policy 7:200, *Suspension Procedures*. A student who has been suspended may also be restricted from school activities.
12. Out-of-school suspension from school and all school activities in accordance with Board policy 7:200, *Suspension Procedures*. A student who has been suspended may also be restricted from being on school grounds and at school activities.
13. Expulsion from school and all school activities for a definite time period not to exceed two calendar years in accordance with Board policy 7:210, *Expulsion Procedures*. A student who has been expelled may also be restricted from being on school grounds and at school activities.
14. Transfer to an alternative program if the student is expelled or otherwise qualifies for the transfer under State law. The transfer shall be in the manner provided in [Article 13A](#) or [13B of the School Code](#).
15. Notifying juvenile authorities or other law enforcement whenever the conduct involves criminal activity, including but not limited to, illegal drugs (controlled substances), *look-alikes*, alcohol, or weapons or in other circumstances as authorized by the reciprocal reporting agreement between the District and local law enforcement agencies.

The above list of disciplinary measures is a range of options that will not always be applicable in every case. In some circumstances, it may not be possible to avoid suspending or expelling a student because behavioral interventions, other than a suspension and expulsion, will not be appropriate and available, and the only reasonable and practical way to resolve the threat and/or address the disruption is a suspension or expulsion. Students enrolled in the District's State-funded preschool program(s) may be temporarily removed or transitioned to a new program in accordance with federal and State law. State law prohibits the expulsion of students from the program(s).

Corporal punishment is prohibited. Corporal punishment is defined as slapping, paddling, or prolonged maintenance of students in physically painful positions, or intentional infliction of bodily harm. Corporal punishment does not include reasonable force as needed to maintain safety for students, staff, or other persons, or for the purpose of self-defense or defense of property.

#### Isolated Time Out, Time Out, and Physical Restraint

Disciplinary measures of isolated time out, time out, or physical restraint are only authorized for use as permitted in [105 ILCS 5/10-20.33](#), State Board of Education rules ([23 Ill.Admin.Code §§ 1.280, 1.285](#)), and the District's procedure(s).

School staff members are prohibited from using profane, derogatory or disrespectful language when disciplining a student. Staff members are prohibited from projecting a bullying-type application of the staff's authority.

#### Weapons

A student who is determined to have brought one of the following objects to school, any school-sponsored activity or event, or any activity or event that bears a reasonable relationship to school shall be expelled for a period of at least one calendar year but not more than two calendar years:

1. A firearm, meaning any gun, rifle, shotgun, or weapon as defined by Section 921 of Title 18 of the United States Code ([18 U.S.C. § 921](#)), firearm as defined in Section 1.1 of the Firearm Owners Identification Card Act ([430 ILCS 65/](#)), or firearm as defined in Section 24-1 of the Criminal Code of 2012 ([720 ILCS 5/24-1](#)).
2. Any explosive or incendiary device, including fireworks. This includes any component of an explosive or incendiary device, e.g., schematics or other drawings, ignition agent(s), container(s), wiring, etc. when it is reasonably determined that the component was intended to be used as part of an explosive or incendiary device.
3. A knife, brass knuckles, or other knuckle weapon regardless of its composition, a billy club, or any other object if used or attempted to be used to cause bodily harm, including *look-alikes* of any firearm as defined above.

The expulsion requirement under either paragraph 1 or 2 above may be modified by the Superintendent, and the Superintendent's determination may be modified by the Board on a case-by-case basis. The Superintendent or designee may grant an exception to this policy, upon the prior request of an adult supervisor, for students in theatre, cooking, ROTC, martial arts, and similar programs, whether or not school-sponsored, provided the item is not equipped, nor intended, to do bodily harm.

This policy's prohibitions concerning weapons apply regardless of whether: (1) a student is licensed to carry a concealed firearm, or (2) the Board permits visitors, who are licensed to carry a concealed firearm, to store a firearm in a locked vehicle in a school parking area.

### Re-Engagement of Returning Students

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a process to facilitate the re-engagement of students who are returning from an out-of-school suspension, expulsion, or an alternative school setting. The goal of re-engagement shall be to support the student's ability to be successful in school following a period of exclusionary discipline and shall include the opportunity for students who have been suspended to complete or make up work for equivalent academic credit.

### Required Notices

A school staff member shall immediately notify the office of the Building Principal in the event that he or she: (1) observes any person in possession of a firearm on or around school grounds; however, such action may be delayed if immediate notice would endanger students under his or her supervision, (2) observes or has reason to suspect that any person on school grounds is or was involved in a drug-related incident, or (3) observes a battery committed against any staff member or is subject to a battery. *School grounds* includes modes of transportation to school activities and any public way within 1000 feet of the school, as well as school property itself.

Upon receiving a report of (1), above, the Building Principal or designee shall immediately notify local law enforcement. In addition, upon receiving a report on any of the above (1)-(3), the Building Principal or designee shall notify the Superintendent or designee and any involved student's parent/guardian.

Upon receiving a report on any of the above (1)-(3), the Superintendent or designee shall immediately notify local law enforcement. The Superintendent or designee shall also report incidents involving battery against staff members to the Ill. State Board of Education through its web-based School Incident Reporting System as they occur during the year and no later than August 1 for the preceding

school year.

### Delegation of Authority

Each teacher, and any other school personnel when students are under his or her charge, is authorized to impose any disciplinary measure, other than suspension, expulsion, corporal punishment, or in-school suspension, that is appropriate and in accordance with the policies and rules on student discipline. Teachers, other certificated [licensed] educational employees, and other persons providing a related service for or with respect to a student, may use reasonable force as needed to maintain safety for other students, school personnel, or other persons, or for the purpose of self-defense or defense of property. Teachers may temporarily remove students from a classroom for disruptive behavior.

The Superintendent or designee, Building Principal, Assistant Building Principal, or Dean of Students is authorized to impose the same disciplinary measures as teachers and may suspend students guilty of gross disobedience or misconduct from school (including all school functions) and from riding the school bus, up to 10 consecutive school days, provided the appropriate procedures are followed. The Board may suspend a student from riding the bus in excess of 10 school days for safety reasons.

### Student Handbook

The Superintendent or designee, with input from the parent-teacher advisory committee, shall prepare disciplinary rules implementing the District's disciplinary policies. These disciplinary rules shall be presented annually to the Board for its review and approval.

A student handbook, including the District disciplinary policies and rules, shall be distributed to the students' parents/guardians within 15 days of the beginning of the school year or a student's enrollment.

#### Public Relations

The Board President is the official spokesperson for the School Board. The Superintendent is the District's chief spokesperson. The Board, in collaboration with the Superintendent or designee, shall plan and implement a District public relations program to keep the community informed and build support through open and authentic communications. The public relations program shall include, without limitation, media relations; internal communications; communications to the community; communications to students and parents/guardians; the District website and social media accounts; and other efforts to reach all audiences using suitable mediums.

It is best practice for Board members who communicate through social media platforms, to clearly label personal posts as opinions (e.g., "the views expressed are strictly my own") and limit District-related communications to official District accounts.

#### Community Engagement

Community engagement is a process that the Board uses from time to time to actively involve diverse citizens in dialogue, deliberation, and collaborative thinking around common interests for the District. Effective community engagement is essential to create trust and support among the community, Board, Superintendent, and District staff.

The Board, in consultation with the Superintendent articulates the District's community engagement goals.

The Board will periodically: (1) review whether its community engagement goals(s) are achieving the identified purpose(s) and objective(s); (2) consider what, if any, modifications would improve effectiveness; and (3) determine whether to continue individual tactics.

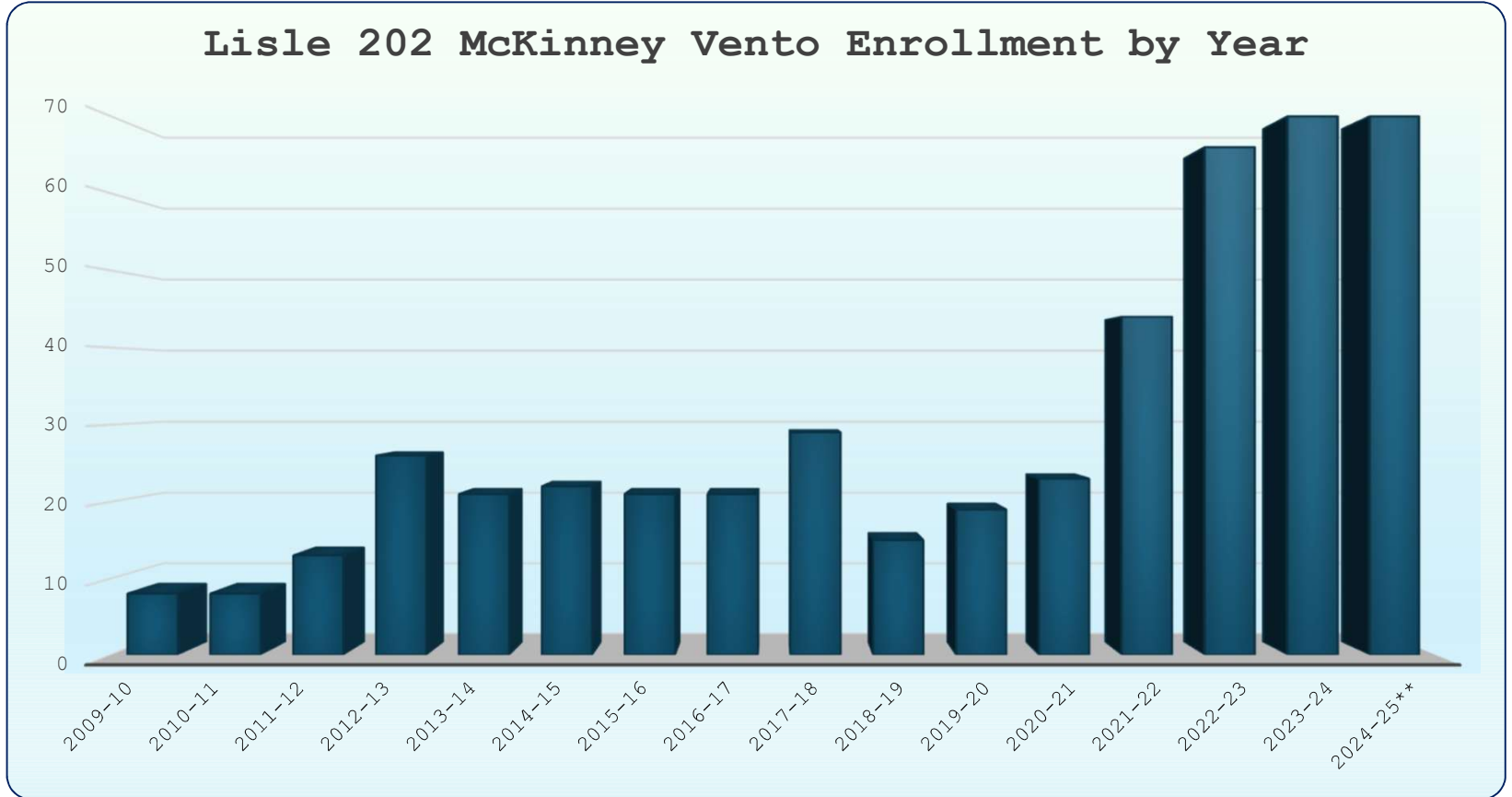

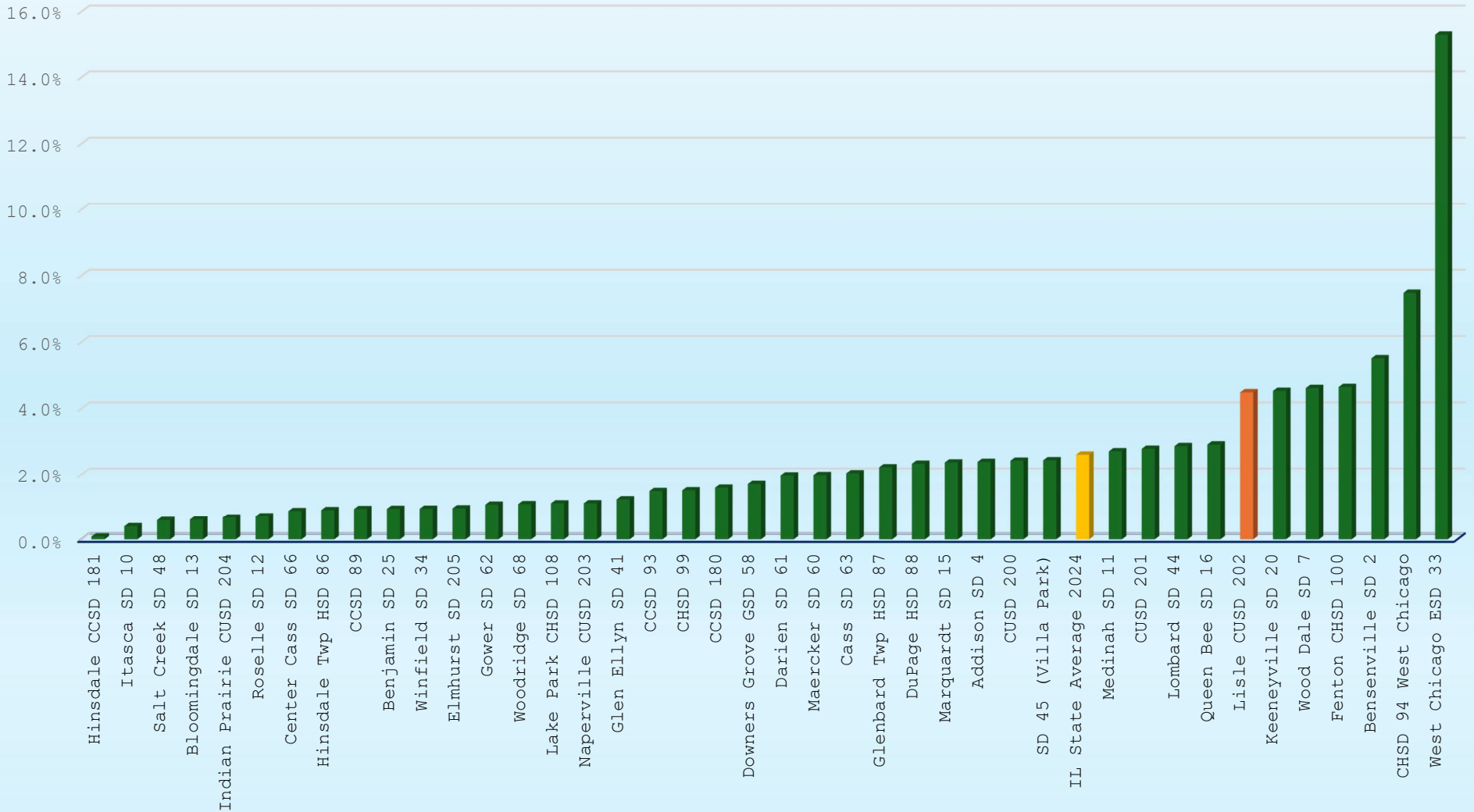

We are requesting the actual electronic data maintained by the Treasurer's office for the annual expenses paid to identified vendors, firms, and individuals for the fiscal years 2024, 2014, and 2004 by the school district, including any predecessor districts that existed at the end of each respective fiscal year and have since consolidated or annexed into the current district. This includes all relevant financial data from districts that, at the time, were separate entities but now form part of the current district. For example, if Districts #100 and #200 were separate in 2004 but

consolidated into District #300 in 2010, we would request data for Districts #100 and #200 individually for 2004, and then only for District #300 for 2014 and 2024. This request specifically

excludes salaries, wages, and benefits paid to staff members. We are interested in vendors, firms, and individuals who have received total payments of \$500 or more for each fiscal year, regardless

of whether this total comes from a single payment or multiple payments.

These records should be provided in their native electronic format, as they are maintained by the Treasurer. Specifically, we are seeking the data contained within each cell of the Excel worksheets

used by the Treasurer to track these financial transactions. This data should be provided in a single

Excel workbook file, with each fiscal year's data on a separate worksheet tab. We suggest labeling

each tab as "FYxxxx," where "xxxx" represents the respective fiscal year (e.g., FY2024, FY2014,

and FY2004). The requested format for the data within each tab is as follows:

□ **Column A: Fiscal Year** - The specific fiscal year for which the data applies (e.g., 2024, 2014, and 2004).

□ **Column B: Person/Firm/Contractor Name** - The full name of the person, firm or contractor receiving payments.

□ **Column C: Aggregate Amount Paid** - The total aggregate dollar amount paid to each vendor or contractor for the respective fiscal year.

By maintaining a structured system gathering expenditure data for vendors, contractors, individuals, etc. at or greater than \$500 in a single, organized file, this approach transforms raw data into actionable information. It creates a centralized repository that can be easily updated annually by the Treasurer, allowing for seamless additions of new fiscal year data. This "evergreen" file will serve as a valuable resource, first and foremost, for the elected members of the Board of Education who collectively oversee the public body, secondly for the taxpayers who fund the public body, and also for parents, employees, media, academic researchers, and other community stakeholders, enhancing transparency and facilitating informed decision-making and long-term analysis of financial trends. It also aligns with best practices for record-keeping and compliance, ensuring that financial information remains accessible and organized over time. In the event that we submit subsequent FOIA requests for additional fiscal years, we kindly request that these new data sets be added to the same Excel workbook file, maintaining the same format and organization. This will allow us to keep all relevant data in a single, searchable file, enhancing our ability to analyze and compare financial information across multiple years.

#### **FORMAT AND DELIVERY**

Pursuant to 5 ILCS 140/3(e), we request that these records be provided in an electronic format, as

they are already maintained in such a format for submission to the ISBE. This will ensure compliance with the Act's provisions regarding the provision of records in a reasonable electronic format.

We request that the Treasurer certify the electronically maintained data in a manner similar to the following:

"I, [Treasurer's Name], Treasurer of [School District Name, County and RCDT Number], do hereby certify that the attached records, which consist of expenditure data for vendors, contractors,

and individuals (i.e., excluding the salaries and benefits of staff and employees), at or greater than

\$500 for the fiscal years 2024, 2014, and 2004, are true, correct, and complete copies of all relevant records found in the files of the Office of the School Treasurer, official custodian of all

district money as well as all investments owned by the district. These records are provided in response to a Freedom of Information Act request received by the public body on [Date Received], as evidenced by the email server timestamp. I further certify that these records include all information responsive to the request and that no other records exist that are not included in this response."

Additionally, we request a waiver of any applicable certification fee, as this request serves the public interest by promoting transparency and accountability in the use of public funds.

### **STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS AND EXPECTATIONS**

Under the Illinois Freedom of Information Act, all records in the custody or possession of a public

body are presumed to be open to inspection or copying, unless the public body can prove by clear

and convincing evidence that the records are exempt from disclosure (5 ILCS 140/1.2). We expect

a timely response and adherence to the statutory requirements. Public bodies are required to respond to requests within five working days after receipt of the request, unless an extension is properly justified (5 ILCS 140/3(d)).

Any failure to comply with this request will be viewed as indifference or negligence in fulfilling statutory duties. If necessary, we will pursue all available legal remedies, including filing complaints for official misconduct under Section 33-3 of the Illinois Criminal Code (720 ILCS 5/33-3), which may result in felony charges against responsible officials, including the Superintendent. Additionally, we may seek injunctive relief, attorney fees, and civil penalties as provided under the Illinois Freedom of Information Act, to ensure that our rights under FOIA are respected.

### **CONCLUSION AND NEXT STEPS**

We understand that the Act permits a public body to charge a reasonable copying fee not to exceed

the actual cost of reproduction. However, we are requesting a waiver of any applicable copying or

processing fees, as this request serves the public interest by promoting transparency and accountability in the use of public funds. By disclosing these records, the public can better understand how financial resources are allocated and ensure that they are used efficiently and effectively.

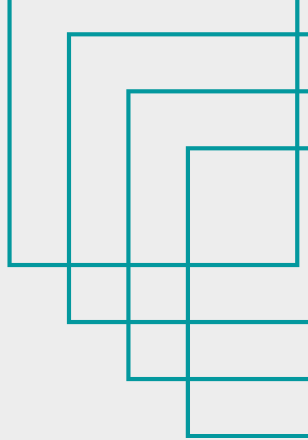
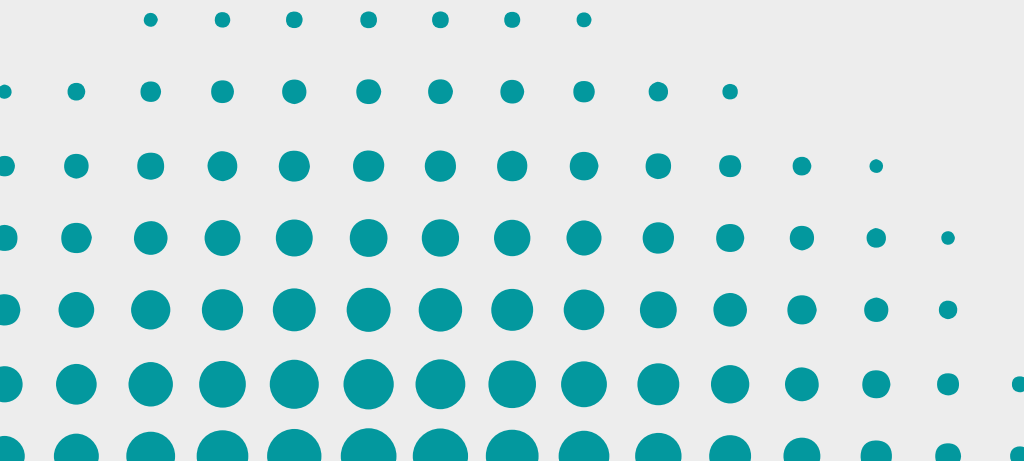


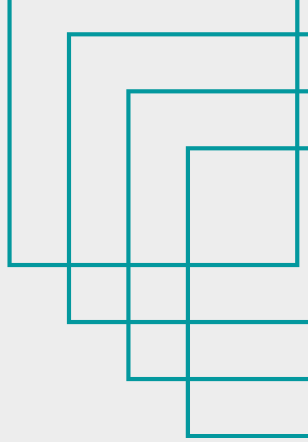
## How Dismantling the Department Would Hurt Students, Teachers, and Communities

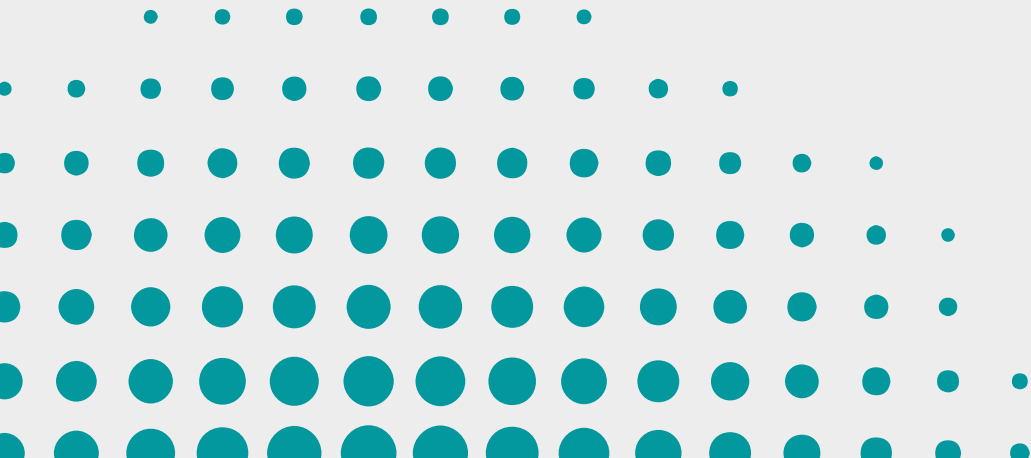

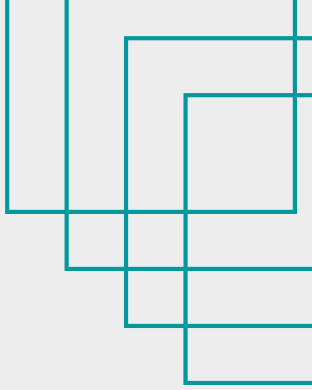

## **SB1329 (Murphy) SA2- License Disclosure**

- Allows the State Superintendent or their State designees to notify a license holder's current or most recent employer that they are being investigated for an alleged act of misconduct that causes a threat to the students.
- **Status: Passed committee, will move to the floor**

## **SB71 CA 2 (Murphy)- IEMA School Safety**

- Beginning in 2027 school evacuation drills may include incidents involving hazardous substances including but not limited to:
  - Hazardous substances that may be transported by rail, chemical, incendiary, and explosive substances



# Senate Education

## SB1519 (Villa)/HB2502 (Ford) - Refer Law Enforcement

- We notified the sponsor that the following concerns remain:
  - Schools will not be able to report the result of the referral, but they CAN report the incident type (ex: weapon, alcohol, tobacco, etc.).
  - The new language states: "that a school resource officer is prohibited from issuing tickets or citations or initiating referrals on school property in accordance with subsection (i) of Section 10-22.6, including a prohibition on issuing tickets for disorderly conduct."
    - This seems to negate the conversations we've had with Stand For Children and ISBE about continuing to allow SROs to refer criminal activity to the local law enforcement agency as required by other state statutes.
- **Status: Bill was held on 2nd reading in both chambers for an amendment; we have yet to see the language**

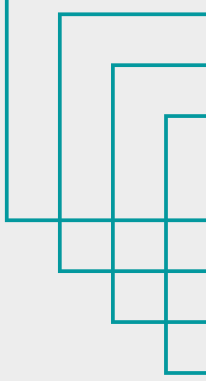
## SB1672 (Belt)- Dyslexia

- We drafted an amendment and the bill now does the following:
- On or before July 1, 2026 each school district that serves students in grades K-3, shall report to the State Board of Education the following information:
  - Any early literacy screeners used by the district in grades K-3, including which skill areas the screener is intended to identify;
  - The grade level of students that are administered the literacy screeners and;
  - The frequency with which each of the literacy screeners are given to students, by grade, each year.
- On or before January 1, 2027 the State Board of Education shall file a report to the General Assembly outlining the data received in subsection (a) of this section. This report shall be posted publicly on the State Board of Education's website no later than January 1, 2027.
- **Status: Passed committee, will move to the Senate floor**

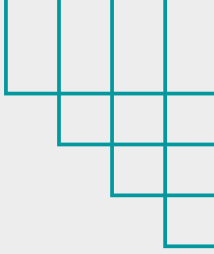
# Senate Education

## SB2527 (Castro)- Cell Phone Ban

- Device includes cell phones, wearable devices, laptop, tablets
- Does not include device that district or teacher provides
- Instructional time, so not recess, passing and lunch
- Policy at a minimum:
  - Can't be used during instructional time
  - Guidance for secure and accessible storage
  - Doesn't prohibit use during instructional time:
    - If a licensed physician allows for use of the phone
    - Is required based on IEP 504 plan
    - Necessary for EL's
  - Can allow for the following exceptions:
    - Teacher authorizes the use
    - Emergency situation
- **Status: Passed committee; will move to the Senate Floor**

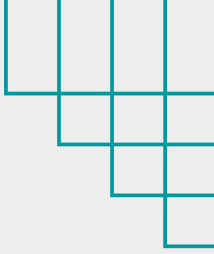


## **SB191 (Morrison)- Seat Belt Safety**

- We offered an amendment including:
  - Only applies to newly purchased school buses (removing leased, MFSAB and school charter buses).
  - Start date is pushed back to 2031.
- **Status: Held on 2nd for an amendment**



# Senate Pensions



## **SB2016 (Villa)- Retirement Savings Plan**

- Senator Villa has brought back her 403b legislation.
- Negotiations are on-going and for now she is holding it on 2nd to continue discussions.
- We will continue to work alongside IASBO on this legislation




# Education Policy



## HB2390 (Katz Muhl)- SPED Agreement

- Brought forward by the representative for one particular district with respect to the district leaving the Special Ed Cooperative.
- The representative passed this out of committee with the promise to hold it and bring back an additional amendment.
- **Status: We have yet to see the language but believe it will bring us to neutral**

## HB2827 CA1 (Costa Howard)

- The Capitol was flush with homeschool families and homeschool students. It was almost impossible to get access to the committee room. Debate lasted for over an hour with both proponents and opponents providing testimony.
  - **Status: Passed out of committee 8-4-1**

# Education Policy



## **HB2927 (Ford)- Inclusive History Act**

- Representative Ford presented his Inclusive History Act in committee.
- He testified that postponing the teaching of history for a year is not acceptable and will remove from the bill.
- He intends to bring an amendment back to committee.
- **Status: More information to come**

## **HB3247 (Jimanez)- Prohibit Denial Free Education**

- Brought forward to codify into State law the policies that already exist in Federal law, ensuring that no student can be denied FAPE regardless of their citizenship status. The sponsor wants to codify this into State law for protections from any changes to Federal law.
- Opponents were concerned if this bill were to become law school districts could be faced with determining whether to follow the State or the Federal law resulting in fines.
- **Status: Sponsor is holding on 2nd and continue conversations**

# Education Policy

## HB3252 (Yang Rohr)- Work Prep Course

- High school districts that offer facilitated employment, career pathways, or internship experiences shall provide to students a unit of instruction:
  - Instruction on discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sexual orientation
  - Protections against sexual harassment including, pay gaps, lack of instructional support, or exclusion from executive or leadership positions
- **Status: Passed with a partisan vote and will come back with an amendment**

## HB3503 (Tarver)- Curriculum Overview and Alignment

- Requires ISBE to conduct a comprehensive review of mandates units of study every 5 years.
- Requires a comprehensive curriculum review and evaluation of the mandates including stakeholder engagement
- Effective January 1, 2026
- **Status: ISBE had strong opposition, sponsor is moving the bill, may consider ISBE amendment**

# Education Policy

## HB1237 (West)- Prohibit Native American Name

- This legislation was first introduced in 2020, Representative West has brought it back numerous times. Opponents of the legislation would like to continue discussions to provide a longer ramp by which districts can shift from their current mascots.
- Definitions in the bill still remain in question.
- **Status: Passed and held on 2nd to work on an amendment**

## HB2997 (Rashid)- Arab American History

- Every elementary and high school district shall include a unit of instruction to study the events of Arab American history.
- **Status: Sponsor agreed to hold on 2nd to work on an amendment**

# Education Policy

## **HB2960 (Faver Dias)- Mental Health Ed Requirement**

- Will be part of comprehensive health.
- If a school district offers course in health education in middle school or high school they have to include instruction on mental health.
- The sponsor continues to negotiate with ISBE and an amendment is forthcoming.
- **Status: Pass Partisan 9-4, holding on 2nd**

## **HB3275 (Faver Dias)- Cardiac Emergency Response**

- All school coaches must obtain and maintain certification in CPR, first aid, and the use of AED.
- A number of committee members asked the sponsor:
  - Does this apply to varsity and intramural coaches? Volunteers that help coaches?
- The sponsor agrees there is still work to be done and is committed to bringing back an amendment
- **Status: Pass Partisan 9-4, holding on 2nd**

# Education Policy

## HB3376 (Mussman)- SPED IEP Guidance

- Over the past few years Chair Mussman has been a part of a House teacher shortage working group. In these discussions a number of teachers shared that IEP paperwork is duplicative, overwhelming, and time consuming. Teachers feel like they're working harder on paperwork than having time to spend with their students.
- This legislation is intended to streamline the paperwork without diminishing the importance of the IEP process.
- **Status: Passed 13-0; will hold on 2nd for an amendment**

# Licensing/ Charter



## HB2651 (Katz Muhl)- Major School Events

- Requires the State Board of Education to identify days during the year when there may be a portion of the student body absent or unable to participate in a major school event due to cultural, religious, or other observances.
- **Status: Passed committee**

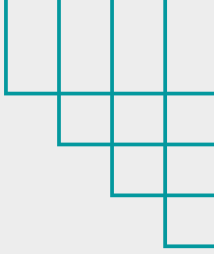


## HB2966 CA2 (Katz Muhl)- Consolidation Analysis

- Requires ISBE to analyze the use of grant funds for consolidation analysis in relation to school districts reorganization feasibility studies.
- ISBE may give grants to school districts to incentivise conducting feasibility studies.
- If a district chooses to proceed with the study and it's approved by the ROE or ISC they can apply for grant funding with ISBE.
- Effective FY2030
- **Status: Passed committee**

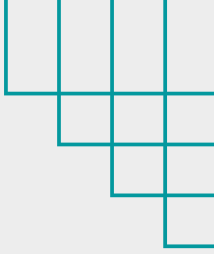


## HB2970 CA2 (Moeller)- Remove/Dismiss Teachers

- An IEA initiative filed in response to previous court cases that were brought forward.
- The language makes changes to the notifications to remedy in the following ways:
  - Allows grieving the notice of remedial warning
  - Requires specificity which could result in a second or third instance of this conduct needing to mirror the previous issue of misconduct in order for the board to take further action.
  - Requires these notices to be removed from the personnel files after 3 years
- **Status: Passed committee- we will continue conversations in the Senate**

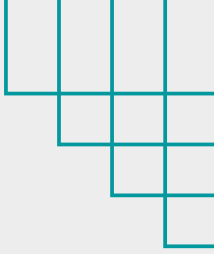


## **HB3026 (Rashid)- Dual Language Education**

- Originally filed with a number of mandates on school districts
- The Representative indicated in committee he will be bringing an amendment back that will require ISBE to adopt comprehensive guidance for school districts on dual language programs by the end of 2026

- **Status: Passed committee will hold on 2nd to amend**

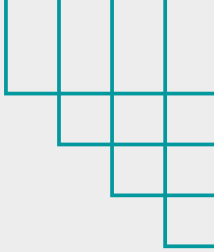


## HB3170 (Faver Dias)- Educator Licensure

- Create an expedited pathway for paraprofessionals to earn their Professional Educator License
- Allow individuals who hold an active and current professional license issued by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation (IDFPR) to forgo taking the content area knowledge test
- Allow Educator Preparation Programs, upon request of a community college, to partner and then offer an approved EPP leading to a PEL
- ISBE is including language to establish a Teacher Performance Assessment Advisory Committee
- **Status: Passed will be held on 2nd and brought back with an amendment**

## **HB3377 (Mussman)- Homeless Youth Funding**

- Requires school districts to report to ISBE on homeless youth; the amount of funds received each year, the amount received in the previous school year, the number of homeless children that qualified in the districts, the amount of such funds that were spent, the activities where funds were spent, supplemental funding the district receives
- **Status: Passed committee; moves to the House floor**

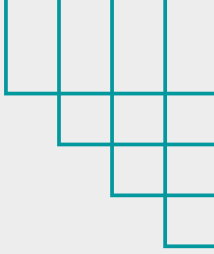


## HB1316 (Davidsmeyer)- Gun Incident Reporting

- Any school employee shall immediately report to the principal 1)any person in possession of a firearm, becomes aware of any person in possession of a firearm on school grounds, becomes aware of any threat of gun violence on school grounds.
- **Status: The sponsor moved the bill with the commitment to hold on 2nd; an amendment is forthcoming.**

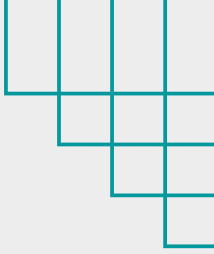


## HB3772 (Davis)- Suspension/Expulsion

- No expulsions shall occur for students in grades K-2 unless required by State or Federal law.
- Any decision to suspend students in grades K-2 for 3 days or more shall not be made by anyone other than the superintendent.
- The suspension shall not be longer than the amount of time needed for the district to develop and implement a behavior intervention and safety plan.
- ALOP support is encouraged be provided in the school district (push in). They do not recommend students in grades K-2 pull out to an alternative school.
- **Status: Passed and will be held on 2nd**



# House Higher ED



## HB3717 (Katz Muhl)- Baccalaureate Degrees

- Allows community colleges to offer four-year baccalaureate degrees.
- The opposition from four-year universities was strong and the House Higher Education held the bill.
- **Status: Did not move**

**HB1072\*\*** SCH-MOBILE PANIC ALERT SYSTEM (REP. YANG ROHR J) Creates the Mobile Panic Alert System Act. Provides that the Act may be referred to as Alyssa's Law. Requires, beginning with the 2026-2027 school year, each public school to implement a mobile panic alert system capable of connecting diverse emergency services technologies to ensure real-time coordination between multiple first responder agencies. **HB1244\*\*** \$ST BD ED-HEALTH MEALS FOR ALL (REP. WEST, II M) Appropriates \$209,000,000 from the General Revenue Fund to the State Board of Education for costs associated with the Healthy School Meals for All Program. Effective July 1, 2025.

**HB1250\*\*** SCH CD-PUPIL TRANSPORTATION (REP. VELLA D) Amends the Transportation Article of the School Code. Provides that each school board may provide free transportation for any pupil residing within a one-half mile (rather than one and one-half miles) from the school attended where conditions are such that walking, either to or from the school to which a pupil is assigned for attendance or to or from a pick-up point or bus stop, constitutes a serious hazard to the safety of the pupil due to either vehicular traffic or rail crossings or a course or pattern of criminal activity.

**HB1275\*\*** SCH CD-TRANSPORTATION-R3 ZONE (REP. WEST, II M) Amends the Transportation Article of the School Code. Requires the school boards of certain school districts to provide free transportation for pupils residing at a distance of 1/2 mile or more from the school to which they are assigned for attendance if the school is located completely or partially within or directly adjacent to an R3 zone, as designated by the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority, and is outside of a county with a population of 3,000,000 or more residents, except for those pupils for whom adequate transportation for the public is available.

**HB1346\*\*** SCH CD-SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER (REP. DAVIS J) Amends the School Code. Requires the State Board of Education to establish the School Resource Officer Grant Program to fund salaries and any other costs associated with the hiring of an active or a retired law enforcement officer as a school resource officer. In a provision concerning school resource officers, provides that a school or school district that hires an active or a retired law enforcement officer as a school resource officer shall be reimbursed for salary and additional costs through the School Resource Officer Grant Program.

- HB1599\*\*** SCH CD-ALTERNATIVE SCH-FUNDING (REP. DAVIS W) Amends the Safe Schools Law of the School Code. **SB71\*\*** IEMA-SCHOOL SAFETY (SEN. MURPHY L) Amends the Illinois Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act. **HB31\*\*** OMA-AUTOMATED REQUEST (REP. DIDECH D) Amends the Freedom of Information Act. Defines "automated request" as a request that a public body has a reasonable belief was drafted with the assistance of artificial intelligence or submitted without any specific, affirmative action taken by a human. Provides that a public body shall respond to an automated request within 5 business days after receipt and provide certain types of notice to the requester. Provides procedures for the requester to dispute having the request treated as an automated request. Adds automated requests to certain provisions regarding requests for a commercial purposos...

**HB1777\*\*** OPEN MTGS-REGIONAL ASSOCIATION (REP. DIDECH D) Amends the Open Meetings Act. Provides that a public body may hold closed meetings to consider self evaluation, practices and procedures, or professional ethics, when meeting with a representative of a statewide or regional association (rather than only a statewide association) of which the public body is a member.

**HB2882\*\*** FOIA-RESPONSE PERIODS (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Freedom of Information Act. Provides that each public body shall, promptly, either comply with or deny a request for public records within 15 business days (rather than 5 business days) after its receipt of the request, unless extended for an additional 10 business days (rather than 5 business days) for specified reasons. Provides that commercial requests must be responded to within 30 business days (rather than 21 working days).

**HB2883\*\*** FOIA-PUBLIC INFORMATION (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Freedom of Information Act. Provides the each public body shall post a brief description of itself and other specified information on its website (rather than at each of its administrative or regional offices). Provides that, if a public body does not maintain a website, it shall also post that information at each of its administrative or regional offices.

**HB2884\*\*** FOIA-CLOSED MTG MINUTES (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Freedom of Information Act. Provides that, if the denial of a request includes a request for minutes or a verbatim record of a meeting of the public body closed to the public as provided in the Open Meetings Act that have not been previously made available for public inspection, suit may be filed under a specified provision only after a 60-day period following (i) the receipt of the request by the public body or (ii) the issuance of a binding or non-binding opinion from the Public Access Counselor, whichever is later, to allow for review of the requested records as provided under th...

**HB2885\*\*** FOIA-EMPLOYEE LIABILITY (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Freedom of Information Act. Provides that a public body and any officer or employee of a public body (rather than only a public body) that discloses records in accordance with an opinion of the Attorney General is immune from all liabilities by reason thereof and shall not be

liable for penalties under the Act.

**HB2886\*\*** OPEN MTGS-ATTENDANCE (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Open Meetings Act. Allows attendance by a means other than physical presence under certain circumstances if a member of a public body is prevented from physically attending because of any reason designated in rules adopted by the public body in accordance with certain provisions in the Act.

**HB2887\*\*** FOIA-RECURRENT REQUESTERS (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Freedom of Information Act. Reduces the number of record requests that must be made for a person to be considered a recurrent requester under the Act. Provides that public bodies must respond to requests from recurrent requesters with 30 (rather than 21) days after receipt of a request. Specifies that notice that requests are being treated as recurrent requests must be provided only once every 30 days. Provides that it is a violation of the Act for persons designated as recurrent requesters to knowingly obtain a public record without disclosing their status as recurrent requesters.

**HB2888\*\*** FOIA-FEES AND COSTS (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Freedom of Information Act. In provisions regarding the authority to charge fees and the imposition of a fee for a voluminous request, removes requirements for an accounting of all personnel hours in connection with the request for public records.

**HB2890\*\*** OPEN MTGS-NOTICE OF CHANGES (REP. COSTA HOWARD T) Amends the Open Meetings Act. In provisions regarding notice of changes to regular meeting dates, deletes requirements for publication in a newspaper or, in certain cases, posting in at least 3 prominent places within the governmental unit. Adds a requirement that notice of changes to regular meeting dates shall also be posted on the website of the public body.

**HB3032\*\*** OPEN MEETINGS-ADVISORY BODY (REP. YANG ROHR J) Amends the Open Meetings Act. Provides that an advisory body may conduct an open or closed meeting by audio or video conference without the physical presence of a quorum of its members if certain conditions are met. Defines "advisory body" and "decision-making body". Makes technical changes.

**HB3083\*\*** TRUST ACT-SCHOOLS (REP. ORTÍZ A) Amends the Illinois TRUST Act. Adds schools and school employees to provisions regarding law enforcement agencies and law enforcement officials. Defines "school".

**HB3497\*\*** REGULATORY SUNSET REPORTS (REP. NESS S) Amends the Regulatory Sunset Act. Provides that, in the calendar year 2 years before a regulatory agency or program is scheduled for termination (rather than annually), the Governor's Office of Management and Budget shall study the performance of each regulatory agency and program scheduled for termination under the Act and report to the Governor the results of the study. Requires the Governor to review the report of the Governor's Office of Management and Budget and, no later than December 1st of the year preceding the year of termination (rather than in each even-numbered year), make recomme...

**HB3810\*\*** FUNDS AND MANDATES-VARIOUS (REP. DAVIS W) Amends the State Salary and Annuity Withholding Act, the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois, the Technology Advancement and Development Act, the Women's Business Ownership Act of 2015, the State Finance Act, the Illinois Insurance Code, the Illinois Public Aid Code, the Illinois Vehicle Code, the Franchise Tax and License Fee Amnesty Act of 2007, the Day and Temporary Labor Services Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, and the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act to remove provisions concerning spe...

**HB3501\*\*** HOLIDAY-1ST DAY OF RAMADAN (REP. SLAUGHTER J) Amends the Election Code, the Illinois Procurement Code, the School Code, and the Promissory Note and Bank Holiday Act to designate the first day following the beginning of Ramadan as a State holiday. Makes conforming changes.

**HB1654\*\*** UNEMPLOYMENT INS-SCHOOLS (REP. WILLIAMS J) Amends the Unemployment Insurance Act. Provides that, subject to appropriation, school districts and public institutions of higher education are eligible to receive unemployment insurance aid. Sets forth provisions concerning the calculation of the amount of unemployment insurance aid to be given to each school district and public institutions of higher education. Provides that, if the total unemployment insurance aid for a fiscal year is greater than the annual appropriation for that year, the State Board of Education or the Board of Higher Education shall proportionately reduce the aid payme...

**HB3309\*\*** EDU LABOR RELATIONS-NOTICE (REP. EVANS, JR. M) Amends the Illinois Educational Labor Relations Act. Provides that employers shall provide the State labor organization with a copy of the information provided to the exclusive representative. Effective immediately.

**HB3330\*\*** UNEMPLOYMENT INS-ACADEMICS (REP. HOFFMAN J) Amends the Unemployment Insurance Act. Provides that, with respect to a week of unemployment beginning on or after June 1, 2025, benefits shall be payable to an individual on the basis of wages for employment in other than an instructional, research, or principal administrative capacity performed for an educational institution or an educational service agency, as long as the individual is otherwise eligible for benefits. Effective immediately.

**HB3483\*\*** FAMILY & MEDICAL LEAVE PROGRAM (REP. MOELLER A) Creates the Paid Family and Medical Leave Insurance Program Act. Creates the Division of Paid Family and Medical Leave within the Department of Labor. Requires the Division to establish and administer a paid family and medical leave insurance program that provides benefits to employees. Provides that the program shall be administered by the Deputy Director of the Division. Sets forth eligibility requirements for benefits under the Act. Provides that a self-employed individual may elect to be covered under the Act. Contains provisions concerning disqualification from benefits; compensation for ...

**HB3573\*\*** SCH CD-NONINSTRUCTIONAL SERVIC (REP. SYED N) Amends the School Code. In a provision concerning third party non-instructional services, allows a board of education to enter into a one-time contract (rather than a contract), of no longer than 3 months in duration, with a third party for non-instructional services currently performed by an employee or bargaining unit member for the purpose of augmenting the current workforce in an emergency situation

that threatens the safety or health of the school district's students or staff, provided that the school board meets all of its obligations under the Illinois Educational Labor Relations Act pr...

**HB3762\*\*** EXTREME WORKPLACE TEMPS (REP. GONZÁLEZ, JR. E) Creates the Workplace Extreme Temperature Safety Act. Provides that the Director of Labor shall adopt rules to establish excessive heat and excessive cold standards. Sets forth temporary excessive heat and excessive cold standards. Provides that, on or before January 1, 2026, the Director shall establish by rule an occupational temperature-related illness and injury prevention plan. Sets forth provisions concerning retaliation; violations; penalties; and enforcement of the Act.
