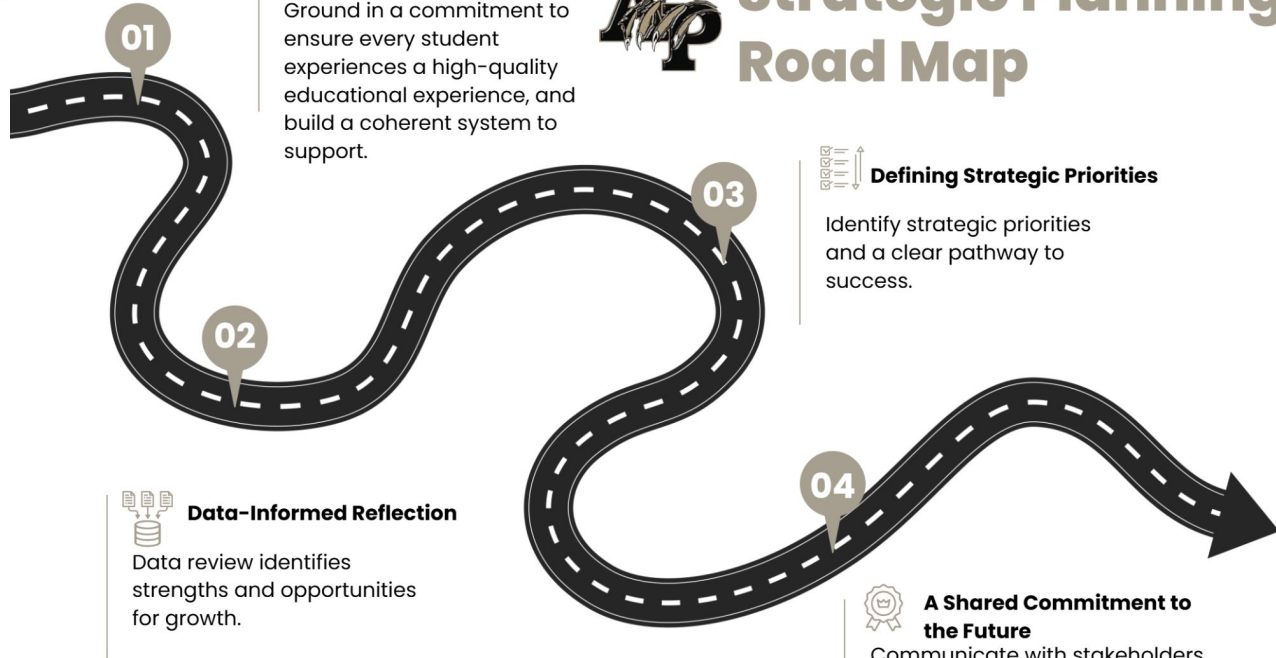

TSL Update

All grade levels are currently completing End-of-Year NWEA MAP testing. This norm-referenced assessment compares student performance and growth to students nationally. Students are taking assessments in Reading, Math, and Science.

For 3rd grade teachers, as well as 3rd and 4th grade science teachers, student growth scores from these assessments are used as part of the data considered for TIA eligibility.

Unlike the STAAR test, MAP Growth is not a pass/fail test. Its primary purpose is to track academic growth and provide teachers with information to make decisions. At AES we use the NWEA Map test to:

- *Understand a student's instructional level: It helps us differentiate instruction, ensuring that each child receives challenges and support at their "just right" level.*
- *Track progress over time: By testing in the fall, winter, and spring, we can see a clear picture of each student's academic journey throughout the school year.*
- *Identify students needing extra support or enrichment: We use this information to determine who is in need of extra support through our RTI program.*
- *Set personalized learning goals: Our teachers use the information to set goals with students so that they can track their growth.*

3rd Grade Math Fact Celebration

Our 3rd grade students have worked incredibly hard this year mastering their multiplication facts through 12×12 , and they will soon be celebrating their success with a special ice cream party! Every student will receive ice cream, and for each set of multiplication facts they have mastered, they will earn an additional topping.

It may be a little messy, but it is always a delicious and exciting reward that students absolutely love! We are especially thankful for our PTO volunteers who are helping serve and celebrate our students with us!

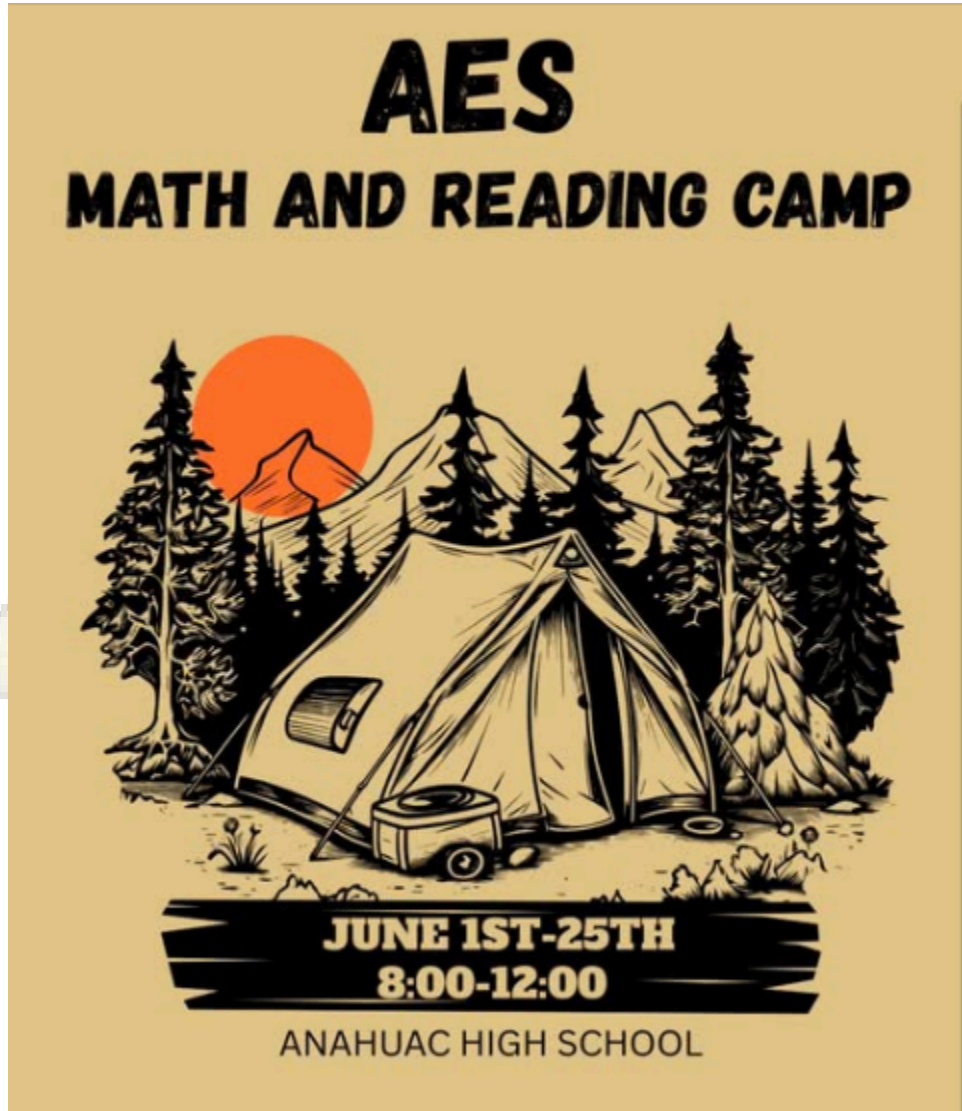

Math Dept

- Algebra 1 just took the STAAR test this week, prior to that Mr. Lugo had been reviewing for it and was very busy with Tennis competitions.
- Geometry has just finished Area of 2-dimensional shapes. We are preparing to Review for our Final Exams. The year has just flown by.
- Algebra 2 has completed our unit over exponential functions. We will be completing NWEA testing next week before doing final exams.
- Math Models is finishing up a unit over financial literacy, discussing simple and compound interests and comparing them over time.
- College Prep. Math just finished Testing over Sets and Conditional Probability.
- Precal just completed and tested over the Graphs of Sine and Cosine Functions. They will start their last topic of Trigonometric Identities on Monday.
- College Algebra is reviewing for next week's Final Exam.

ELA

- As the school year comes to a close, students across all English courses are demonstrating growth in literacy, critical thinking, and writing skills through a combination of assessments, targeted instruction, and engaging end-of-year activities.
- **ELA I-** Students are completing end-of-year assessments designed to evaluate their development in foundational literacy skills, including reading comprehension, written expression, and analytical thinking. Instruction throughout the year has emphasized close reading, vocabulary development, and evidence-based writing. These assessments will provide valuable data to guide future instruction and support continued student growth as they advance to the next grade level.
- **ELA II-** Students successfully completed STAAR testing last month. We are optimistic that their hard work and dedication will be reflected in the results when scores are released in June. As the year concludes, students are participating in engaging and creative activities, including a poetry unit featuring blackout poetry, which has generated strong student interest. One student, Megan Burroughs, was recognized by her peers for creating a standout blackout poem. Additionally, students are completing free-writing assignments through NoRedInk and an end-of-year reflection project, encouraging them to evaluate their progress, set goals for the future, and provide feedback to inform instructional practices.
- **ELA III-** Students are engaged in end-of-year testing to assess their mastery of key skills in reading, writing, and critical analysis. These assessments measure student growth and readiness for postsecondary expectations. Instruction has focused on rhetorical analysis, comprehension of complex texts, and the development of well-supported written responses. Assessment results will be used to identify strengths and target areas for continued growth as students transition into their senior year.
- **AP ELA Language and Composition-** Students have been preparing for the AP exam through focused writing practice and skill development. Students recently completed a synthesis essay, demonstrating their ability to evaluate multiple sources and construct cohesive arguments. Current instruction emphasizes argumentative writing strategies and the effective use of evidence, with

- students maintaining evidence logs to strengthen their analytical writing. These efforts are designed to ensure students are well-prepared for the rigor of the AP exam.
- **ELA IV**-Students recently completed a unit on Romantic poetry, studying the works of John Keats, Lord Byron, and Percy Bysshe Shelley. The unit focused on key themes of the Romantic era, including emotion, nature, and individualism, with an emphasis on the structure and analysis of odes. Through close reading and literary analysis, students strengthened their critical thinking and interpretive skills as they prepared for postsecondary opportunities.

Social Studies

- The Social Studies department is finishing the year strong with STAAR testing over for the U.S. History group and AP testing for World History and US History set to take place within the next week. Students are coming into finals and the different subject areas are finishing up the final lessons in preparation for Finals week.
- World Geography, students finishing their unit in Africa.
- World History students are finishing their lessons on the World Wars and the Cold War.
- U.S. History students have been learning about the U.S. from 2016 to today.
- Economics the students just finished their last unit on Globalization and the Information Age.
- The year has been a tremendous year of growth with our students and they have learned so much about the United States, its history, government, and future. Students are better prepared in their understanding of different world cultures and how the other countries' histories have affected the United States.

Science

- **Biology**-Students recently visited the Houston Museum of Natural Science, where they explored evolution and real-world science careers in a hands-on setting. Students really enjoyed the experience and were able to connect classroom concepts to real-life applications. To wrap up the year, students are beginning their final exam project, where they will research an endangered species and apply concepts from each unit. This includes reproduction, habitat, food chains, and the role of natural selection. It is a fun and meaningful way to bring all of biology together.
- **Chemistry**-Students are finishing up the final portion of their curriculum and transitioning into final exam review. Students will take their final exams on May 13. This time is focused on reinforcing key concepts and ensuring students are prepared to successfully close out the year.
- **Physics**-Students are currently working on their final exam project, known as Coach Moore's Rube Goldberg Machine. This project allows students to apply their understanding of key concepts in a hands-on and engaging way as they prepare for the end of the course.
- **Forensic Science**- Students will complete their final exam through a group project where they create and present their own crime scene based on a given scenario. Students will apply the investigative skills and concepts they have learned throughout the year, including evidence collection, analysis, and interpretation.

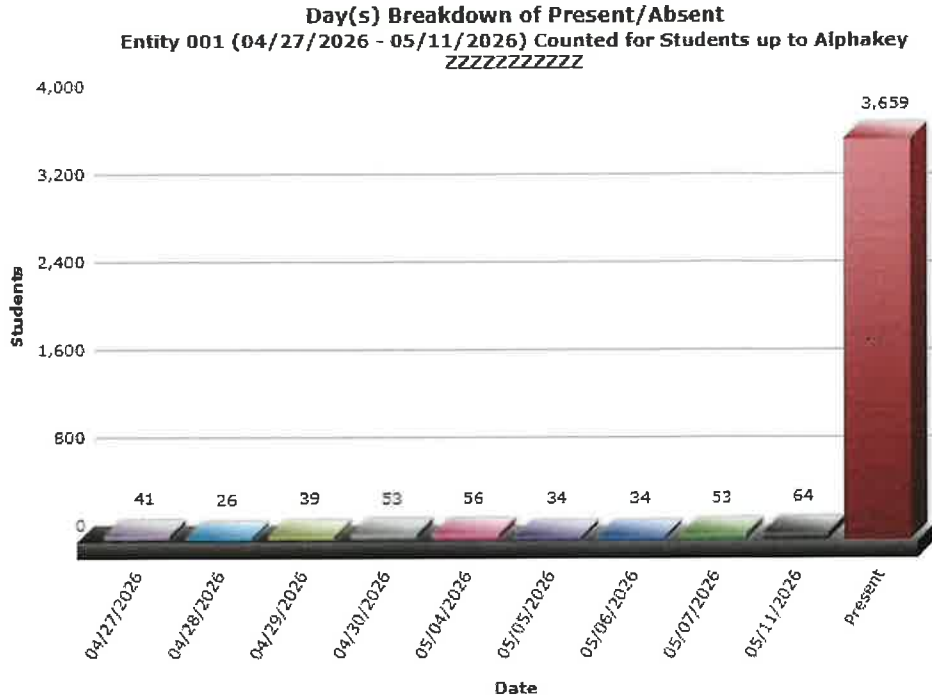

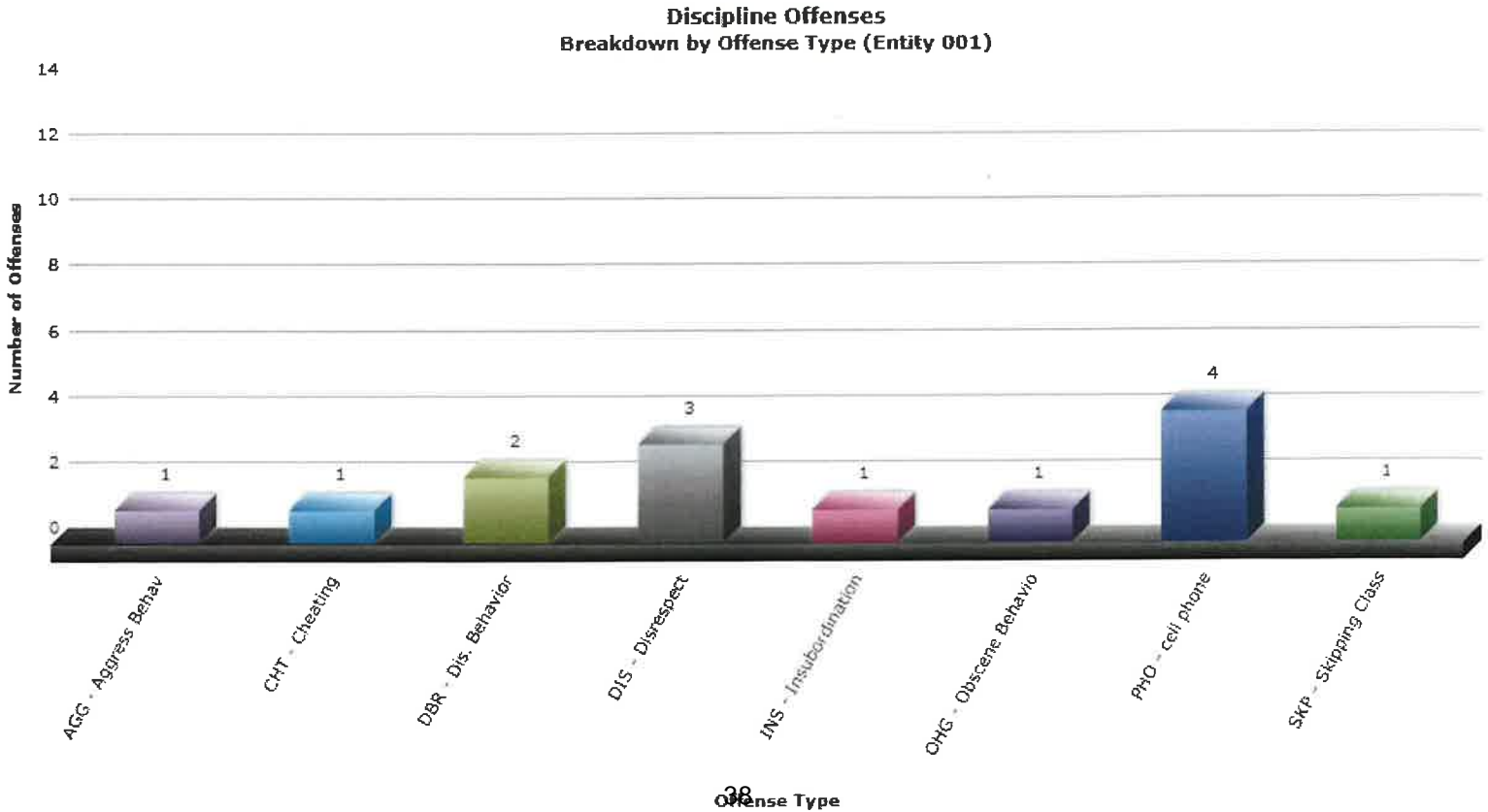

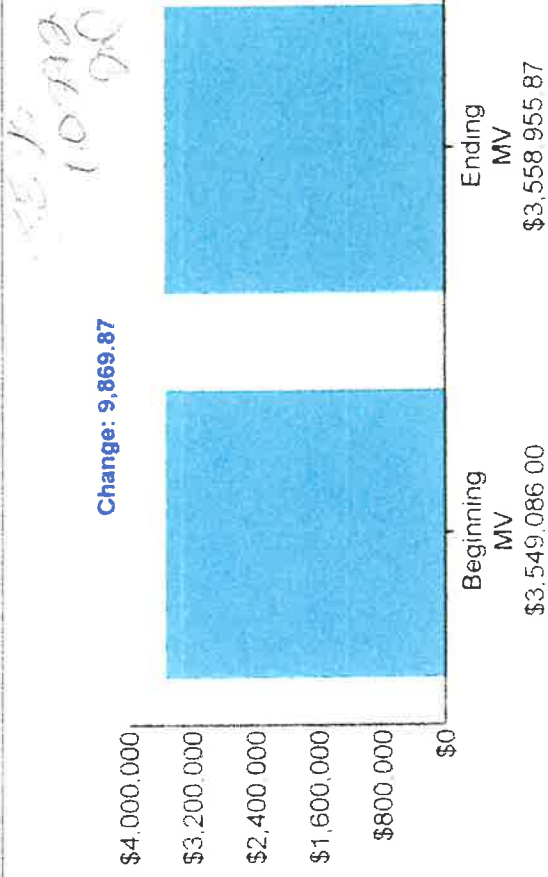

**RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ANAHUAC INDEPENDENT
SCHOOL DISTRICT SB 546 SEAT BELT REQUIREMENTS - FINANCIAL INABILITY
DETERMINATION**

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 546 (89th Texas Legislature) requires that all school buses operated by or contracted for use by a school district be equipped with three-point seat belts for every passenger, including the operator, with full compliance required no later than September 1, 2029; and

WHEREAS, Anahuac ISD currently operates a fleet that includes a significant number of buses that do not meet the newly mandated safety equipment requirements; and

WHEREAS, the estimated cost to replace or retrofit the non-compliant buses creates a substantial financial burden on the District, and current budget conditions do not permit full compliance within the required timeframe; and

WHEREAS, SB 546 authorizes a school district to determine, through Board action, that the District's budget does not permit the purchase of compliant buses or retrofitting of non-compliant buses at this time, provided that required reporting to the Texas Education Agency (TEA) is completed; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has reviewed the fleet inventory, cost projections, and multi-year capital replacement requirements and finds that full compliance by the statutory deadline is not financially feasible under current funding conditions; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The Board of Trustees of Anahuac ISD hereby determines that the District's current budget does not permit full compliance with SB 546 by September 1, 2029.
2. The Board directs the Superintendent to submit the required SB 546 reporting to the Texas Education Agency, including the fleet inventory, cost estimates, and this Resolution.
3. The Board further directs the Superintendent to develop a phased, fiscally responsible replacement and/or retrofit plan and to provide updates to the Board as part of annual budget planning.
