Briefing Paper

SUBJECT: Potential Use of YourTexasBenefits.com to Facilitate Enrollment in the Nueces Aid Program

Purpose

To brief the Board of Managers regarding the potential use of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission's YourTexasBenefits.com integrated benefits portal as an additional pathway to facilitate enrollment in the Nueces Aid Program.

Background

The Nueces Aid Program is the District's local indigent health care program for Nueces County residents who do not qualify for other state or federal medical assistance. The program operates as the District's implementation of the County Indigent Health Care Program under Chapter 61 of the Texas Health and Safety Code and provides hospital, clinical, pharmacy, and primary care services to eligible residents.

Enrollment is currently administered independently by the District through its own online and paper application processes. Applicants must provide information and documentation concerning residency, household composition, income, resources, other coverage, and identity. Eligibility is determined after the required documentation is received.

Current Enrollment Process

The District currently accepts Nueces Aid applications through its online enrollment system and by paper application. Applicants are responsible for separately gathering and submitting supporting documentation even when similar information has previously been provided to or verified by another governmental benefits program.

There is presently no direct connection between YourTexasBenefits.com and the Nueces Aid Program. Consequently, an individual who applies for Medicaid through the state portal and is denied must separately identify the Nueces Aid Program and initiate another enrollment process with the District.

Potential YourTexasBenefits.com Pathway

YourTexasBenefits.com is the State's integrated benefits portal for programs including Medicaid, SNAP, CHIP, and TANF. A Medicaid application submitted through the portal collects substantially the same applicant information used in determining Nueces Aid eligibility, including identity and address, county of residence, household composition, income, assets and resources, insurance status, Social Security number, and Medicaid eligibility status.

The briefing identifies photo identification as the principal Nueces Aid documentation requirement not collected through YourTexasBenefits.com. This requirement could be addressed through a supplemental verification step rather than requiring an applicant to repeat the entire application process.

Enrollment Pathway Models

The briefing identifies three potential approaches for using YourTexasBenefits.com information to facilitate Nueces Aid enrollment. The first would provide for automatic referral following a Medicaid denial, with applicant consent, allowing verified eligibility information to be transmitted to the District and used to initiate a Nueces Aid application.

A second approach would establish a direct County Indigent Health Care Program intake pathway within YourTexasBenefits.com, allowing an applicant to initiate a Nueces Aid application through the state portal without first completing a Medicaid application.

A third approach would use an administrative coordination arrangement under existing authority. Under this approach, the District could accept income, household, and other information already verified through

a YourTexasBenefits.com Medicaid application to satisfy corresponding Nueces Aid documentation requirements. Unlike the first two approaches, this model would not depend upon an automated data-transfer system.

Potential Administrative Benefits

Use of verified YourTexasBenefits.com information could reduce duplication in the enrollment process by allowing information already collected and verified by HHSC to be used for Nueces Aid eligibility purposes. This could reduce the amount of documentation applicants must submit separately and lessen administrative processing associated with collecting and verifying duplicative information.

The approach could also provide a more direct connection between Medicaid ineligibility and the local indigent health care program. Medicaid-denied Nueces County residents whose income and resources fall within Nueces Aid standards could be more readily identified and directed to the District's enrollment process.

Eligibility Considerations

The Nueces Aid Program maintains eligibility standards established by the District under its statutory authority, including an income limit of 150 percent of the Federal Poverty Guidelines and a resource limit established by the District. These standards differ from the minimum eligibility requirements applicable to County Indigent Health Care Programs generally.

Use of YourTexasBenefits.com would therefore function as an enrollment and information-sharing pathway rather than as a replacement for the District's eligibility standards or responsibility for making final Nueces Aid eligibility determinations.

Legal and Operational Considerations

Implementation of the more integrated enrollment approaches would require coordination with HHSC and, for the automatic-referral and direct-portal models described in the briefing, statutory changes contemplated as part of a broader County Indigent Health Care Program streamlining framework.

Any data-sharing arrangement would require applicant consent. The briefing contemplates affirmative authorization for the sharing of applicant information with the applicable local program administrator and provides that refusal to consent would not affect eligibility for other benefit programs.

Operational issues would include establishing data-transfer or documentation procedures, confirming how previously verified information would be accepted by the District, addressing the remaining photo-identification requirement, coordinating referral and applicant-contact processes, and maintaining the District's responsibility for final eligibility determinations.

Potential Phased Approach

The briefing identifies a phased approach under which the District could initially pursue administrative coordination using existing authority while more integrated portal and automatic-referral mechanisms are considered through the legislative and state implementation processes.

Such an approach could allow the District to begin reducing duplicative documentation and enrollment barriers without waiting for development of a fully integrated state-local data pathway.

Fiscal and Administrative Impact

The briefing does not establish a specific fiscal impact or funding requirement. Potential effects would depend upon the enrollment model ultimately pursued, the extent of HHSC coordination or system development required, implementation arrangements, and any changes in enrollment volume or administrative workload.

Potential administrative benefits include reduced duplicative data collection and verification, a more streamlined application process, and improved identification of individuals who may qualify for the Nueces Aid Program following Medicaid denial.

Board Consideration

The Board is being asked to receive and discuss the briefing regarding the potential use of YourTexasBenefits.com to further facilitate enrollment in the Nueces Aid Program. The briefing provides a framework for considering administrative coordination under existing authority as well as potential future integration with the state benefits portal.

Summary

YourTexasBenefits.com collects much of the information required to determine Nueces Aid eligibility and therefore presents an opportunity to streamline enrollment by reusing verified applicant information and reducing duplicative documentation. The briefing identifies administrative and potential statutory pathways ranging from immediate coordination using existing authority to future automatic referral and direct portal integration. Under any approach, the District would retain its eligibility standards and responsibility for determining enrollment in the Nueces Aid Program.

Summary

The Nueces County Hospital District supports targeted legislative action to strengthen medical education, expand healthcare workforce capacity, improve access to behavioral health services, and streamline access to indigent health care services in South Texas.

Countywide Benefits

- Increased physician retention.
 - Improved behavioral health access.
 - Complemented medical infrastructure.
 - Strengthened medical education pipelines.
 - Enhanced healthcare resilience.
 - Expanded access to indigent health care services through streamlined CIHCP eligibility determination.

I. Graduate Medical Education (GME)

Support increased investment in GME to expand physician training and retention.

Advocacy Position:

- Increase Medicaid GME supplemental payments
- Fund existing and new residency slots
- Incentivize expansion of training slots
- Support teaching hospitals
- Expand funding through General Revenue and budget riders

Data Point:

Nueces County faces persistent physician shortages in primary care and specialty fields, limiting access to care.

Impact on Nueces County:

- Expanded local residency and fellowship opportunities.
 - Improved long-term physician retention.
 - Reduced reliance on temporary providers.
 - Enhanced capacity at local teaching hospitals.
 - Greater continuity of care.
 - Stabilized medical workforce pipeline.

II. Medical Workforce Development

Authorize NCHD to address shortages in essential specialties.

Advocacy Position:

- Allow local designation based on community health needs assessments
- Financial incentives: loan repayment, housing support, income guarantees
- Professional protections: malpractice limits and liability protections
- Recruitment supports: relocation and startup assistance
- Require minimum service commitments

Data Point:

Several high-need specialties remain underrepresented in coastal South Texas.

Impact on Nueces County:

- Improved recruitment in shortage specialties.
 - Increased access to essential services.
 - Greater competitiveness for healthcare talent.
 - Reduced patient outmigration.
 - Strengthened provider networks.
 - Enhanced sustainability of service lines.

III. Regional Behavioral Health Infrastructure

Expand access to mental health services and support planning for a state-supported mental health facility in the Coastal Bend.

Advocacy Position:

- Establish state-supported regional facilities
- Serve adults, children, and justice-involved populations
- Partner with LMHAs and community providers
- Integrate inpatient, crisis, and outpatient services
- Request state appropriation to fund a feasibility study for establishing a state-supported mental health facility in the Coastal Bend region

Data Point:

Behavioral health wait times in South Texas frequently exceed recommended standards, and the Coastal Bend region lacks a state-supported inpatient mental health facility, requiring patients to travel long distances for acute psychiatric care.

Impact on Nueces County:

- Expanded access to behavioral health services.
- Reduced emergency department boarding.
- Shorter wait times for treatment.

- Improved system coordination.
 - Better outcomes for high-risk populations.
 - Reduced strain on hospitals and first responders.
 - Potential establishment of a regional mental health facility, reducing patient transfer distances and improving access to acute psychiatric care in the Coastal Bend.

IV. CIHCP Streamlining — Integrated Benefits Portal Access

Streamline eligibility determination for the County Indigent Health Care Program (CIHCP) by extending the state’s YourTexasBenefits.com integrated benefits portal to all program administrators, including hospital districts.

Legislative Pursuit:

- Amend Chapter 61, Health and Safety Code, to designate YourTexasBenefits.com as an authorized CIHCP application pathway for counties, public hospitals, and hospital districts
- Authorize HHSC to share Medicaid eligibility data with all CIHCP program administrators (new §61.0046)
- Require automatic referral of income-eligible Medicaid denials to the appropriate CIHCP administrator within three business days of denial (new §61.0047)
- Amend Chapter 531, Government Code, to extend the integrated eligibility mandate to county CIHCP programs and hospital districts, and require HHSC to build and maintain a CIHCP intake pathway and county-to-administrator service area mapping on YourTexasBenefits.com
- Add new §285.092 to Chapter 285, Health and Safety Code, clarifying that portal-verified eligibility data satisfies the financial inquiry requirement applicable to all hospital district types under Chapters 281, 282, 283, and 286

Data Point:

CIHCP serves Texans at or below 21% of the federal poverty level who are ineligible for Medicaid and have no other health coverage — among the most economically vulnerable residents served by hospital districts. The current application process is administered independently by each of 143 county programs and hospital districts, with no uniform portal, inconsistent documentation requirements, and no automatic referral pathway. Applicants must first be denied Medicaid and then separately locate and apply to their local CIHCP administrator — a duplicative burden that causes eligible individuals to go without care. The proposed legislation eliminates that duplication while preserving local program administration.

Impact on Nueces County:

- Reduced administrative burden on NCHD CIHCP intake staff through automatic electronic referrals from HHSC upon Medicaid denial.
- Elimination of duplicative income and household verification for patients already screened through YourTexasBenefits.com.

Preliminary Draft – Not Final; For Discussion Purposes Only

- Explicit statutory clarification (new §285.092) that portal-verified data satisfies NCHD’s financial inquiry obligation under its creating statute, reducing legal ambiguity.
- Increased identification of eligible uninsured residents who would otherwise fall through the gap between Medicaid and NCHD’s charity care programs.
- Alignment of NCHD intake procedures with a statewide standardized process, reducing training costs and error rates.
- Preservation of NCHD’s authority to conduct independent financial inquiries for non-CIHCP services and cost recovery.

Background and Analytical Basis:

This proposal emerged from a comparative analysis of the CIHCP and SNAP application processes that identified significant structural disparities. Key findings:

- CIHCP applicants must first be denied Medicaid (establishing a precondition), then independently locate their county or hospital district CIHCP administrator, then complete a separate application — with no statewide online option and no automatic connection between the two processes.
- The SNAP application through YourTexasBenefits.com already collects substantially all information required for CIHCP eligibility determination (income, household composition, county of residence, assets, insurance status), but no legal mechanism currently permits HHSC to share that data with county or hospital district CIHCP administrators.
- CIHCP's income threshold (21% of FPL) and SNAP's threshold (165% of FPL) serve largely non-overlapping populations; the bill therefore focuses on the Medicaid denial pathway rather than SNAP cross-referral as the primary trigger.
- Existing law (§61.024(b)) already permits counties to use less restrictive procedures than HHSC's baseline, meaning some elements of this reform could be adopted by individual administrators without legislation. However, the critical data-sharing authorization and auto-referral trigger require explicit statutory change.
- Chapter 281 hospital districts (including NCHD) face a specific interpretive risk: §281.071 requires the administrator to independently inquire into a patient's financial circumstances. New §285.092 resolves this by providing that portal-verified data satisfies that obligation for CIHCP purposes across all hospital district types under a single Chapter 285 provision.

Briefing Paper

SUBJECT: Proposed 90th Texas Legislative Session Agenda — Advocacy Positions and Legislative Pursuits

Purpose

To brief the Board of Managers regarding the District's preliminary agenda for the 90th Texas Legislature and to distinguish between matters presented as Advocacy Positions and matters identified as a Legislative Pursuit.

Overview

The proposed agenda identifies four healthcare priorities intended to strengthen medical education, expand healthcare workforce capacity, improve access to behavioral health services, and streamline access to indigent health care services in South Texas.

The working document places the first three priorities—Graduate Medical Education, Medical Workforce Development, and Regional Behavioral Health Infrastructure—under the heading “Advocacy Position.” The fourth priority—CIHCP Streamlining through YourTexasBenefits.com—is expressly identified as a “Legislative Pursuit.” This distinction reflects a difference in the specificity and intended method of pursuing the respective priorities.

Distinction Between Advocacy Positions and Legislative Pursuits

For purposes of the proposed agenda, an Advocacy Position expresses a policy, funding, or programmatic objective that the District supports and may advance with legislators, State agencies, healthcare organizations, and other stakeholders. An Advocacy Position establishes the outcome or direction the District favors without necessarily committing the District to seek enactment of a particular bill or specified statutory language.

A Legislative Pursuit is more specific. It identifies an objective for which changes to State law are proposed and describes the statutory provisions, new authorities, or implementation requirements that would be sought through legislation. A Legislative Pursuit therefore contemplates active development, sponsorship, introduction, or support of legislation designed to accomplish the identified changes.

The distinction does not mean that an Advocacy Position could never result in legislation. Legislative action, appropriations, budget riders, or statutory authority may ultimately be necessary to accomplish an advocacy objective. Rather, the distinction describes the current level of specificity and commitment in the working agenda: Advocacy Positions identify outcomes the District supports, while a Legislative Pursuit identifies a defined statutory initiative the District proposes to advance.

Advocacy Position I — Graduate Medical Education

The District's first Advocacy Position supports increased investment in Graduate Medical Education to expand physician training and retention. The agenda calls for increased Medicaid GME supplemental payments, funding for existing and new residency slots, incentives for expansion of training slots, support for teaching hospitals, and additional funding through General Revenue and budget riders.

This priority is appropriately characterized as an Advocacy Position because it identifies funding and policy outcomes the District supports rather than a specific amendment to State law. The District could advocate for these objectives through the State appropriations process, budget riders, agency funding decisions, or legislation developed by other parties.

Advocacy Position II — Medical Workforce Development

The second Advocacy Position seeks authority and tools for the District to address shortages in essential medical specialties based on local community health needs. The agenda identifies potential financial incentives, professional protections, recruitment assistance, and minimum service commitments.

Although portions of this objective—particularly new District authority or liability protections—could require legislation, the working agenda presently describes the desired policy framework rather than identifying specific code sections or proposed statutory amendments. It therefore remains classified as an Advocacy Position at this stage. If the District later develops specific statutory language to confer or clarify these authorities, that portion of the priority could appropriately become a Legislative Pursuit.

Advocacy Position III — Regional Behavioral Health Infrastructure

The third Advocacy Position supports expansion of regional behavioral health infrastructure and planning for a State-supported mental health facility in the Coastal Bend. The agenda supports State-supported regional facilities, services for adults, children, and justice-involved populations, partnerships with local mental health authorities and community providers, integration of inpatient, crisis, and outpatient services, and a State appropriation for a feasibility study.

This priority is framed primarily as advocacy for State investment, planning, and regional infrastructure rather than as a request for specified statutory amendments. The District could pursue the objective through appropriations, budget riders, agency planning, legislative studies, and support for related legislation without necessarily sponsoring a stand-alone statutory proposal.

Legislative Pursuit IV — CIHCP Streamlining and Integrated Benefits Portal Access

The fourth priority is expressly identified as a Legislative Pursuit because it proposes defined changes to State law to integrate the County Indigent Health Care Program with YourTexasBenefits.com and the State's existing eligibility infrastructure.

The proposed pursuit includes amendments to Chapter 61 of the Health and Safety Code to establish the portal as an authorized CIHCP application pathway; new statutory authority for HHSC to share eligibility data; automatic referral of qualifying Medicaid denials; amendments to Chapter 531 of the Government Code to expand the integrated eligibility mandate and require development of a CIHCP intake pathway and statewide service-area mapping; and a new provision in Chapter 285 addressing hospital district reliance on portal-verified financial information.

Unlike the three Advocacy Positions, the CIHCP initiative identifies specific existing statutes to amend, new statutory sections to create, duties to impose on HHSC, and an implementation schedule. It therefore represents a defined legislative proposal rather than a general policy or funding position.

Practical Differences

Characteristic	Advocacy Position	Legislative Pursuit
Primary purpose	State the policy, funding, or program outcome the District supports.	Seek a defined change in State law or statutory authority.
Level of specificity	Broad to moderately specific objectives.	Specific statutory changes, new provisions, or mandated actions.
Method of advancement	Advocacy, appropriations, budget riders, agency engagement, coalitions, or support of related legislation.	Bill development, legislative sponsorship, statutory amendments, and direct legislative advocacy.
Need for District-sponsored legislation	Not necessarily.	Generally contemplated by the proposal.
Current agenda items	GME; Medical Workforce Development; Regional Behavioral Health Infrastructure.	CIHCP Streamlining — Integrated Benefits Portal Access.

Potential Evolution of Agenda Items

The classifications need not be permanent. An Advocacy Position may evolve into a Legislative Pursuit if the District determines that a specific statutory change is necessary and develops a defined legislative proposal. Conversely, the District may continue to advance an Advocacy Position through appropriations, agency action, stakeholder partnerships, or support for legislation initiated by others without developing its own bill.

This distinction allows the Board to support broad healthcare policy priorities while separately identifying those matters for which the District intends to pursue specific legislation.

Fiscal and Administrative Considerations

The preliminary agenda does not itself appropriate District funds or establish a specific fiscal commitment. Fiscal and administrative effects would depend on the particular advocacy activities undertaken, legislation ultimately pursued or enacted, State appropriations, program design, and any local participation requirements.

A Legislative Pursuit may require a more focused implementation effort, including development and review of statutory language, legislative sponsorship, stakeholder coordination, testimony or other legislative support, and subsequent implementation planning if enacted. Advocacy Positions may involve similar external engagement but do not necessarily require development of District-specific legislation.

Board Consideration

The Board is being asked to receive and discuss the preliminary legislative agenda and the distinction between the District's Advocacy Positions and its Legislative Pursuit. The Board may use these classifications to clarify which priorities represent general policy and funding objectives supported by the District and which priorities are intended to be advanced through specific changes to State law.

Summary

The proposed agenda contains three Advocacy Positions and one Legislative Pursuit. Graduate Medical Education, Medical Workforce Development, and Regional Behavioral Health Infrastructure are presented as Advocacy Positions reflecting policy, funding, and program objectives the District supports. CIHCP Streamlining through YourTexasBenefits.com is presented as a Legislative Pursuit because it proposes specific amendments and additions to State law and defined implementation requirements. The distinction provides a practical framework for communicating both the District's broader legislative priorities and the particular statutory initiative it intends to pursue.

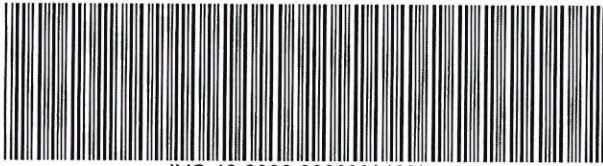
