2/11/2024 23:33:54	Rob Dakers	15 Trifiro Circle	<p>Chair Foyle and Members of the Board, thank you for this chance to share my concerns regarding the Superintendent's recommended 2024-25 Open Choice seat declaration. I regret not being able to join you in person.</p> <p>Open Choice is an important response to one of the moral, educational, and workforce development imperatives facing school systems and their leaders. Open Choice also fosters greater understanding and empathy among students from varying situations and backgrounds; vital preparation for the world that awaits them.</p> <p>The recommended seat declaration for 2024-25 involves 1 seat each for kindergarten and high school and 15 for a pre-K program I didn't know existed. Even with these seats, we'd be 6 seats short of 2022-23's declaration.</p> <p>I'd been heartened by the Board's seeming interest in exploring more broad-based Open Choice participation similar to Avon, Farmington, Simsbury, South Windsor, West Hartford, and other districts. Our DRG peers' commitment to Open Choice is reflected in their higher enrollment rates.</p> <p>Examples of practices employed by these other districts include:</p> <p>Seats for Older Students. For 2023-24, Avon and South Windsor had one or more accepted Open Choice offers in 6 of the 9 grades from 3rd to 11th, while it was 8 of 9 grades for Simsbury and West Hartford.</p> <p>Seats for Middle/High School Applicants. Data shows other districts as more responsive to bumps up in applications for the first year of these upper levels, with Avon, Simsbury, South Windsor, and West Hartford having 2023-24 accepted offers in grades 6, 7, and 9.</p> <p>Enrolled Sibling Applicant Acceptance. Avon had accepted offers from 6 of 6 applicants in 2023-24; Simsbury 10 of 15 and West Hartford 7 of 9.</p> <p>Choice Students in More Than One Elementary School. All our DRG peers have Choice students in more than one elementary school. Only 9 of 26 districts don't; some likely having just one elementary school.</p> <p>Open Choice seat declarations are a public policy decision made annually by our elected Board of Education; decisions reflecting our values and commitment to overall excellence. I urge your action ensuring 2024-25's declared seats be set, minimally, at the 2023-24 level of 23 seats, with seats declared across all grades.</p> <p>I urge this action confident in the demonstrated dedication and competency of our teachers, administrators, and staff in creating a welcoming, supportive environment for students from lots of places and circumstances.</p>

I believe that Open Choice is an important vehicle to increase diversity in our school populations. Encouraging the enrolment of siblings in different grades would make sense for both the families involved and our school system and so I ask the Board to ask the administration to make more places available in higher grades. I have not seen the financial numbers, but I understand that the State reimburses Glastonbury for Open Choice student costs and so to the extent that the costs of additional students is offset by the State, it makes sense to make the available places in higher grades available.</p> <p>Thank you for your service to our town.</p>

Beckett	295 A Dayton Rd	<p>As you again address the issue of accepting Open Choice students from Hartford, I hope that you will find a way to increase your declared available seats. Certainly, we should be accepting the older siblings of our exiting students. Giving families the opportunity to have all their children attend schools in the same district encourages them to share experiences and educational achievement together.</p> <p>We are all familiar with the benefits of good quality integrated education. We do our own children a disservice not to offer them more opportunities to learn to interact with those who might look different from them. When our children leave our mostly lily-white town, they will be entering a far different world than they have experienced. Be it college, work, the military or something else, we are presently denying our children that piece of education. Currently most will be unprepared for the diverse world they are entering. Through the Open Choice Program, we have a unique way to expose our children to that needed learning experience. They will be provided with the opportunity to interact, work, and play together, thus providing kids from both groups the opportunity to gain these needed skills.</p> <p>Certainly admitting a few children into the gateway grades of 6 and 9 should be offered. Here in Glastonbury all kids entering 6th and 9th grades are starting in fresh surroundings. That's the perfect time to bring on a few new students at each level to start the process of offering better interaction of all kids regardless of what they look like.</p> <p>Our sister towns of Avon, Farmington, Simsbury, and Wethersfield have lower school populations than we - ranging from about 2,500 to 4,104 yet they manage to offer considerably more seats ranging from 122 - 178. We have a school population of 5,677 but only have projected 81 accepted students for the 2024-25 school year. We should be able to do better.</p> <p>Although I'm grateful that over the years more seats have been offered. I would urge you to increase your open seat declarations this year for the benefit of all children.</p> <p>Sincerely, Patti Beckett</p>

If the district works with our ethnically, racially, and linguistically diverse staff members to identify ways to attract and retain diverse employees, then we will increase staff diversity.

- 100% of job postings use inclusive language to attract a diverse range of candidates

- Interview current staff who identify as a member/s of an underrepresented group (Director of EDI)

- Attend at least 3 recruitment fairs to meet and engage with diverse candidates (Director of EDI, Assistant Superintendent of Administration and Personnel)
- Review every job post to ensure the language is inclusive and illustrates our commitment to hiring ethnically, racially, culturally, and linguistically diverse staff (Director of EDI, Assistant Superintendent of Administration and Personnel)
- Create internship opportunities that invite 5th-year NEAG IB/M students to be part of Glastonbury's EDI commitment and work (Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, Director of EDI)
- Train TEAM Mentors who host student teachers and interns on cultural competency (Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, Director of EDI)
- Use various methods to market and advertise open positions in the district (Director of EDI, Assistant Superintendent of Administration and Personnel)

Indicators of Progress (How will we know we are on track?)

- A spreadsheet that includes a list of staff and responses
- Project managing document that includes: goals of the event, planning details, owner, and dates
- Increased number of diverse candidates from NEAG IB/M
- Increased candidate pipeline

- Planning team for the yearly event

- Attendance for the networking event could be low so we will advertise and make personal calls to increase attendance odds

- Screen all applications objectively without bias (Administrators)
- Review and revise (when needed) selection criteria to ensure it is relevant to the position and free from bias (HR, Administrators)
- Hold training sessions on hiring bias for staff who serve on hiring/interview committees (Director of EDI, Assistant Superintendent of Administration and Personnel)
- Hold structured interviews using a consistent process that includes non-bias standardized interview questions free of bias (Hiring Teams)

Indicators of Progress (How will we know we are on track?)

- Tracking system to monitor hiring training that includes staff names and dates
- Increased number of candidates advancing to each stage that identify as ethnically, racially, culturally, or linguistically diverse
- Whenever possible, hiring teams are racially, ethnically, culturally, and linguistically diverse

Resources Required (What people, time, money, and technology will be needed?)

- Time to screen applications
- Time to provide necessary training to reduce bias
- Time to design/prepare interview process and questions

Risks and Mitigation (What could go wrong? How will we make that less likely to happen?)

- Not enough diversity among people interviewed so will ensure multiple people are viewing applications
- Hiring Team may not recognize biases, so the team will discuss and reflect on hiring biases and practices before interviews

- HR Team: message the requirement for hiring training
- Leadership Team: plan time to meet with Hiring Team to design the interview process and questions

Legislative Mandate: Public Act 23-167 Section 10 (Effective July 1, 2023)

(a) Not later than March 15, 2024, each local and regional board of education shall submit the increasing educator diversity plan described in subsection (a) of section 10-220 of the general statutes, as amended by this act, to the Commissioner of Education for review and approval.

(b) The Commissioner of Education shall review each increasing educator diversity plan submitted pursuant to subsection (a) of this section. The commissioner may approve such plan or may return such plan to the local or regional board of education that submitted such plan with instructions to revise such plan. Not later than May 15, 2024, any such board shall revise such plan in accordance with such instructions and submit such revised plan to the commissioner for approval. (c) For the school year commencing July 1, 2024, and each school year thereafter, each local and regional board of education shall implement the increasing educator diversity plan approved by the commissioner pursuant to subsection (b) of this section. Each such board shall make such plan available on the Internet web site of such board. (d) The Department of Education shall make each increasing educator diversity plan available on the Internet web site of the department.

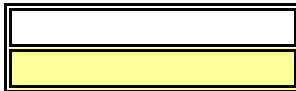

This summer, we again hope to offer a variety of tuition-based enrichment opportunities to our students in grades K-12. Summer enrichment camps are self-supporting and are designed and facilitated by Glastonbury Public Schools staff. There is no cost to the Board of Education budget as camp tuition covers the costs of teacher salaries and supplies.

For Summer 2024, we received 32 program proposals, with 17 being for NEW camp programs that promise new learning and FUN! We are also thrilled to have many of our most popular programs returning for another summer.

With the school year likely to end unusually early in June this year, many of our enrichment camp opportunities are proposed to run during the month of June for a minimum of three hours per day and for no less than four days in a week. We are also proud to offer additional full-day camps for our elementary students. The change in hours and the increase in camp offerings during the “front end” of the summer aim to provide consistency for and meet the needs of our Glastonbury families, particularly those in need of childcare options.

Attached is the Summer 2024 Enrichment Camp Catalog. This catalog is a reflection of our talented and dedicated staff for whom we are most grateful. Proposed camps and camp coordinators are listed below.

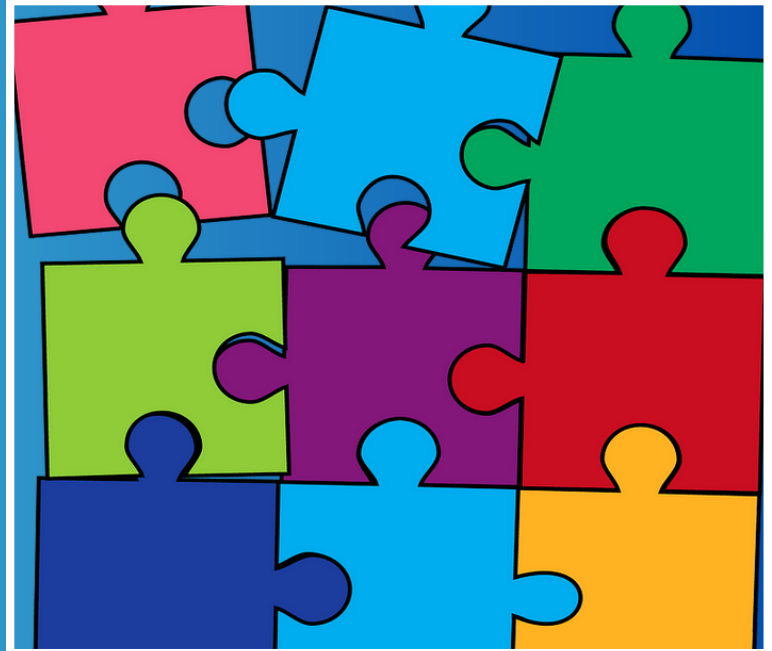

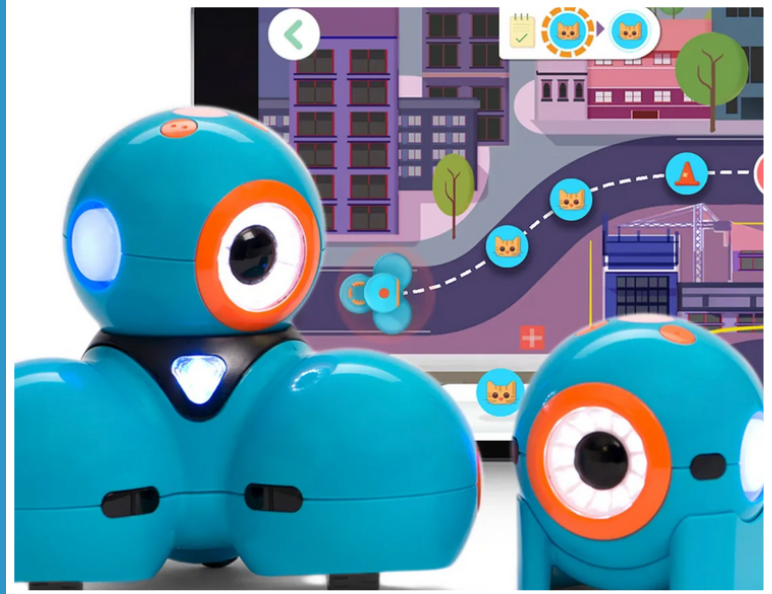

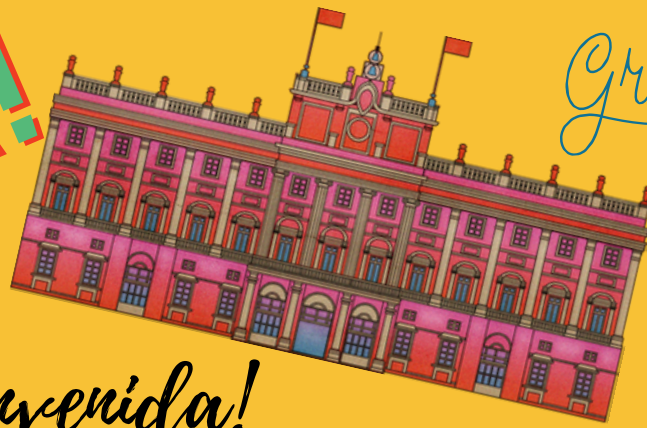

1. What are some notable school successes that have occurred within this past year?

Schoolwide Connections

Throughout the year we gather as a school community for *Family Meetings* to build relationships and learn together. Topics this year include self-awareness, self-motivation, empathy, and relationship skills, all aligned to the *Second Step Framework*. The meetings are student-centered with students playing an active role by writing teaching points, skits, and role play scenarios. Students attend the assembly with their buddy class, and all students participate in the songs and team trivia. Our last family meeting focused on self-motivation and we have extended that learning with Nayaug's Goal-Setting Journey. Every class identified an area for improvement or new learning and set both long and short-term goals to work towards in the coming months.

2nd Annual Open Choice Welcoming Day

We welcomed 20 new families in K&1 after school ended in June as part of our second annual Open Choice Welcoming Day. This well-attended event included Open Choice families, teachers, administrators, Community Connectors, and students. Participants enjoyed a tour of Glastonbury, participated in breakout sessions, enjoyed a pizza lunch, and engaged in meaningful discussions with district staff and families. Guests parted with backpacks full of school supplies, star books, and Nayaug swag. We look forward to growing this day each year.

Student Academic Supports & Enrichment

Our student intervention process is continuously refined to best meet the academic needs of our students. Based on student outcomes, target areas for instruction are identified, instructional practices discussed and at times modeled, and planning for small-group instruction takes place. Simultaneously, academic intervention plans are developed for those students in need of more targeted and specific instruction to close academic gaps. Beyond the classroom, a number of enrichment opportunities are also offered to students to support their growth, creativity, and excitement for learning.

- Our PACE teacher offers math-thinking challenges to all students in grades 1-5. We are growing our students' math problem-solving skills and at the same time learning about having a growth mindset and perseverance. Many students set the goal to make it to *The Problem Solving Hall of Fame* board by solving 100, 200 or 300 thinking challenges/problems correctly within the year.
- Students who have a love of writing and want to express their creativity may join the newspaper club. Nayaug's student newspaper, *The Midnight Gazette*, is published once a month and includes school happenings, teacher and student interviews, book and restaurant reviews, recipes, and comics.

- There are also opportunities for students to get creative by honing their acting and singing skills through the Drama Club or Midnight Singers. Student Council affords students the opportunity to be school leaders and role models. Student-council members help facilitate and participate in school activities such as food drives, planning spirit days, playing roles in school assemblies, and are mentors for student-to-student connections.

PTSO Mini Grants

The PTSO awarded Nayaug teachers with three mini grants this year - Nayaug Community Connectors, Chill Spaces, Story & STEAM - helping to support innovative and creative projects.

2. Please share any new school initiatives that were introduced recently.

Nayaug Community Connectors

A shared vision of community connectedness and building trusted relationships between Hartford and Glastonbury families gave way to the Nayaug Community Connectors. After surveying the whole-school community for interest in this endeavor, we began with 26 Community Connector families. The first Community Connector mingle “Family Game Night” was a huge success with over 110 people in attendance. The location of monthly meetings now alternates between Glastonbury and Hartford. The second “Magic Mingle” will take place in March at The Hartford Boys and Girls Club.

Full Implementation of New Instructional Tools

This year we are in a full K-5 implementation using San Francisco math resources and scope/sequence. Reflex Math, a fact fluency program piloted by Nayaug’s second grade team last year, was adopted by the district and is now being used in grades 2-5. The use of the DIBELS assessment in grades K-3 provides information to teachers identifying areas in need of development and drive small-group phonics instruction. Kindergarteners are using *My Journey Into the Alphabet* this year to guide the acquisition of handwriting skills.

Collaborative Problem-Solving Model

In a collaborative problem-solving model, adults work with students to identify, teach, and practice lagging social-emotional skills. We are in the beginning stages of implementation, including professional learning for teachers and administrators, followed by modeling and coaching across the district. We have started to implement strategies to support this work across the building by reflecting on classroom environments that support student learning, creating chill spaces in classrooms, and creating systems for teachers to bank time with students.

STEAM Initiatives

The growing amount of STEAM experiences for students across the building is exciting to see.

- STEAM bins, organized boxes filled with open-ended manipulatives for students to create with, have been integrated into many classrooms. Students have the autonomy to be creative and apply personalized learning strategies to make changes to existing concepts or develop their own ideas, methods, or products. STEAM Challenges often begin with a real-world question or a problem, and the children take the lead to find a solution.
- PTSO mini-grant funded initiative in our library media center - Story & STEAM. Students are provided STEAM-related activities related to favorite books, bringing those stories to life while strengthening comprehension of the story and fostering their scientific and engineering skills through use of the engineering design process.

- March is STEAM Celebration Month! We will culminate in an evening event promoting: engineering challenges, coding with BeeBots and robotics demonstrations, LEGO challenges, green screen, fraction golf, and more. Students create STEAM-related projects from K-2/3-5 project menus and are on display at the event. Last year over 250 students and their families participated. STEAM night is always a highly anticipated event at Nayaug.

3. Describe the social-emotional supports in place for students.

Districtwide Implementation

Teachers utilize the *Second Step Framework* in grades K-5 to teach competencies such as emotion management, friendship and social skills, problem-solving, and assertiveness. We have also included a five-lesson Bullying Prevention Unit where student lessons learn bullying prevention techniques and identify trusted adults. In grade 3, *Gizmo's Pawsome Guide to Mental Health* curriculum is taught. Gizmo and his therapy-dog pals walk children through the process of caring for their mental health. The curriculum teaches students about their thoughts, feelings and actions, and the importance of having a trusted adult in their school setting.

Schoolwide Social-Emotional Practices

Social-emotional-behavioral learning is embedded into our day-to-day practice. Our Positive Behavior Intervention Supports framework fosters the explicit instruction of school expectations. Students are taught expected versus unexpected behaviors for all areas of the school. Students are active participants in writing classroom contracts and are involved in collaborative problem solving and restorative practices as situations present themselves. Kindness initiatives are embedded throughout the school-year to give students the opportunity to practice and embrace this life-long mindset. We focus heavily on peer-to-peer and adult-to-student connections. All classes have a buddy class and all students are paired with a buddy. Schoolwide activities are planned to foster these relationships and help build a family feel at the school.

4. What are the long-term plans that support your school's interests and needs in accordance with the 6th Generation Strategic Plan?

Our work and forward thinking is driven by the district's Strategic Plan. To that end, we will continue our focus on maintaining safe and supportive and inclusive learning environments for all students.

- Support play-based learning in kindergarten classrooms through targeted professional learning and school-based pilot implementation.
- Continue to learn about and implement Collaborative Problem Solving and Restorative Practices.
- Support the district multi-tiered systems of support framework and create a building-based team to ensure all students have access to support for both academic and social-emotional growth.
- Foster authentic family partnerships by offering meaningful opportunities to build relationships and collaborate to support students' social, emotional, and academic development.
- Continue to foster a culture and learning environment in which students feel safe, connected, and empowered to meet rigorous standards.
- Continue to grow and support our staff's health, wellness, and connectedness. A variety of wellness activities have been offered from our staff-led Be Well Team including wellness raffles at staff meetings, pickleball pick-up games, team lunches, De-STRESS-ber menu of activities, A New Year reflection and more to come.

1. What are some notable school successes that have occurred within this past year?

We have a lot to be proud of at Smith Middle School. Below are some highlighted successes:

- 2024 Niche Best School recognizes Smith Middle School as #10 Best Public Middle School in CT and #3 Best Public Middle School in the Hartford Area.
- The Smith Middle School girls won first place, and the boys team won second place at the 30th Annual CT Middle School Cross Country State Championship.
- Seven SMS students received recognitions of either Best in Show, Gold Key, Silver Key, and/or Honorable Mention at the CT Regional Scholastic Art Awards.
- An 8th Grade student came in 3rd place out of 116 Mathletes at the Hartford Chapter Competition for MathCounts.
- Glastonbury's First Lego League Team 61854, the Glastonbury GOATS won the state championship and will represent the State of Connecticut at the upcoming World Championships in Houston, Texas. Four out of the six team members are SMS students.
- Students from our Money Matters class placed 2nd in the Middle School Division for the Connecticut Stock Market Game sponsored by Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association.
- Smith Middle School's literary magazine, the Cosmic Chronicle received the rank of Superior in the 2023 National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) Recognizing Excellence in Art and Literary Magazines (REALM) program.
- Several teachers were awarded a series of mini-grants from PTSO. The grants awarded focus on projects that align with SMS's commitment to creating more STEAM pathways and creating inclusive learning opportunities for all students.
- We have recognized over 100 SMS students as members of the Hall of Stars. Students are selected by their respective team and elective teachers. Students are chosen based on their efforts in putting into action our school's core values of Respect, Responsibility, Honesty, and Safety.
- Our school PBIS Committee has organized and run a series of student-based activities focused on the development of a positive school culture.
- Our Music Department has made significant contributions to our school and town community. They have represented us very well.
 - Spring, Fall and Winter Concerts and Performances, along with visits to elementary schools, participation in Veterans Day ceremony, GHS Football games, and Hartford Wolfpack games.

- The SMS Student Council has not only planned and implemented a series of Spirit Days and a middle school dance “A Night in Paris,” but most importantly raised awareness and thousands of dollars for the Red Cross (wildfire relief) and Childhood Cancer (PJ Day- CCMC).
- Our World Language Department has continued to offer immersion opportunities for our students to locations like Quebec (French), Salamanca (Spanish), and Brighton Beach (Russian).
- SMS was the recipient of a High Dosage Math Tutoring Grant via the state of CT. These tutors will support students in meeting their goals, boosting their math confidence, and increasing their proficiency with several math competencies assessed by the state.
- Our extracurriculars have continued to expand in order to meet the needs of our students. To date we offer close to 40 clubs and activities, with new proposals coming in annually.

2. Please share any new school initiatives that were introduced recently.

- In line with Glastonbury Public Schools 6th Generation Strategic Plan, there is a concerted effort to increase awareness and implementation of restorative practices.
 - Professional development for administrators and teachers to educate on how to improve school climate, build positive relationships, and most importantly, foster/maintain a safe and supportive environment for all students.
 - Collaborative Problem Solving (CPS) with students, staff, and parents in an effort to work together to meet the needs of students in meeting behavioral expectations.
 - Ongoing work across all stakeholder groups to proactively address issues within our school community.
- Smith Middle School established a relationship with the Anti-defamation League in an effort to earn the “No Place for Hate” school designation. We created a committee composed of 20 students and 10 staff, whose aim is to develop school-wide activities aligned with the district’s core value of “Be Kind.” Our committee is working hard to vertically integrate the work taking place at Gideon Welles School and Glastonbury High School through the development of lessons that meet the needs of our students and school.
- The Unified Basketball Tournament will make a return to Smith Middle School this year, which will bring together over a dozen middle schools across CT to recognize and celebrate our students, while upholding our commitment to maintaining an inclusive environment for all students.
- While not new, the School Counseling Department continues to expand “Lunch and Learn” opportunities for our 7th and 8th graders to learn about a specific career, meet with a community volunteer that performs a specialized job, training and education required for the profession, along with Q&A. Some examples include meeting with a labor and delivery nurse and lawyer.

3. Describe the social-emotional supports in place for students.

There is a renewed commitment in our school to focus on building positive relationships with our students. Building the capacity of students to develop and practice skills in self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making takes many forms at Smith Middle School.

- The Student Support Center provides services to students on a multitude of levels and continues to adapt to the ever-changing needs of our student body. Support services include, but are not limited to:
 - Partnering with students to facilitate collaborative problem-solving sessions
 - School avoidance interventions
 - Crisis Management

- Check ins/outs
- Small group support for executive function skills
- Liaison between part time hospitalization programs and students full return to school
- Stress and organization workshops provided through our School Counseling Department and school psychologists focus on both individual needs and overarching issues adolescents deal with in the middle school years.
- Peer Support Groups are offered to assist in creating a safe place for students to process issues like grief together and most importantly make connections with others.
- Tiered support systems to assist students and families with a variety of issues are collaboratively developed and implemented among a student's support team.
- The ongoing relationship with Youth and Family Services with the placement of a social worker at SMS has been very successful in unifying town and school-based resources for families.

4. What are the long-term plans that support your school's interests and needs in accordance with the 6th Generation Strategic Plan?

The work of our teachers, staff and administrators is ongoing to implement the initiatives outlined within the 6th Generation Strategic Plan. We are dedicated to creating conditions for our students and staff to learn and work in a safe and supportive environment.


Goal 1: Through the efforts of teachers, curriculum directors, and building administrators, we stand committed in meeting the district's Vision of a Graduate. Identifying and communicating what "Good Teaching" and "Active Learning" is and looks like at Smith Middle School was an important first step in working towards a student-centered model of instruction with high expectations for all. This work will continue through various committees, the creation of professional learning opportunities, and the continuation of school-wide professional discussions.

Goal 2: Providing a safe, supportive, and inclusive learning environment is the most important thing we can do for our students. Our commitment to restorative practices is thoughtful as it involves the participation of all partners in our school system. We will continue to implement these practices where appropriate and examine ways to foster and maintain an environment conducive for all learners to feel safe and supported in order to positively interact and learn with each other.

Goal 3: The health and well-being of students and staff continues to be a top priority and long-term focus for us at Smith Middle School. Our school-based committees work hard to create and offer events throughout the year that create a sense of belonging and community within our school. In addition, wellness activities for staff are growing in number and have the same aim of building community.

SUBJECT: Self Insurance Reserve Update January 2024

The attached report summarizes the Self Insurance Reserve fund through January 2024. The total reserve is \$14,986,425 allocated \$5,180,504 and \$9,805,921 between Town and Board of Education, respectively. As of January the fund is experiencing a \$2,114,352 loss for the fiscal year.

There are 15 large loss claims which are defined as any claims that exceed \$50,000. BOE has 6 while the Town has 9 large loss claims. There are 6, 3 for BOE and 3 for the Town, that have exceeded the individual Stop Loss limit. The Individual Stop Loss limit is \$200,000 for BOE and \$150,000 for the Town.

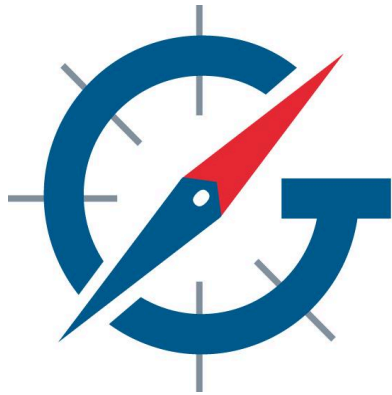

Transportation

Fifth grade participants are strongly encouraged to review the activity bus guidelines with their parents/guardians prior to riding the activity bus. This bus leaves Gideon Welles at 3:55 pm and goes to the high school where the students board another bus that drops students at a district stop. 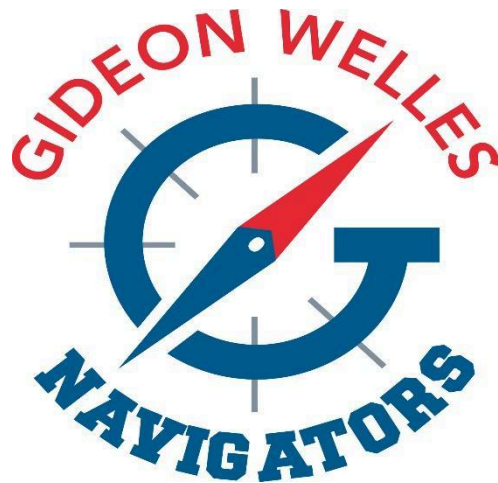
