OLD BUSINESS

Banquet - Chief verified the guest list total for the May 15 event. We expect close to 45 in attendance. Chris Lee feels we have enough space to fit everyone downstairs as well as the patio for socializing.

NEW BUSINESS

Donation - We received a check and card from SMPA as a thank you for our work. The donation was for \$272.00 and was requested to go directly to our Special Funds.

Historical Society - The department received an invite to their 50th anniversary event on July 8 at 5pm at the Wright Opera House.

Pre School - The Pre-school event at the fire house on May 18 at 10 AM. Tom Tyler, Danny Wilbur, Max Austin and Chris Lee are going to help out.

July 3 - Dave Turner recommended buying some fence barricades to better block off the bar area (these are metal and, as such, far more stable). Chief agreed with Turner but acknowledged that we can get away without it. For the event itself, we will need help monitoring the park fence at the event itself. Along with that, the department will need to breakdown/rearrange the border fence for kids games.

Yonder Mountain is all set for the event. Everything is in motion. The band is officially announced on May 17. 4000 tickets are for sale online now. 1000 are being kept aside for day of sales and friends/family.

Patches - There was some miscommunication on patches. Fire fighters can "trade" shirts with other fire fighters but patches are not available for trade or give aways. Members were reminded to never offer patches in trade.

MAMS - Chief reminded the department we have the fourth and fifth weeks (June 23 and 30). We'll need to setup the tent at 9 or 10 AM. The bar gets set up around 3 PM and all are required by 5:30 PM to start pouring. Members were reminded. Chris Lee noted he'd be out on June 23 and was looking for someone he can train on his tasks so that they're covered for the one night he's out this year.

Tree Cutting - There is a house on Main (211) who asked for fire mitigation help removing some trees. The family would be happy to donate to the department for the help. Chris Lee is coordinating and will need 4-6 members to help (traffic coordination, etc.). This would, of course, count for training hours. Chris is available any time after Wednesday. Dack Klein noted we should be done and clear by 11 AM before the traffic picks up. Tim Pasek and Max Austin offered to help.

City Administrator
Report for July 5, 2022 City Council
June 20 – July 1, 2022:

Geothermal Line Replacement Project (Box Canon):

Williams Construction has been notified the valves and pipe for the geothermal line replacement project should be delivered next week. They plan to begin the project as soon as the materials are received. I have communicated the project timing with the Nixons and Howells.

Waste Water Treatment Project Update:

90% plan review meeting took place on June 28, 2022 with JVA, each of the design trades and Moltz Construction. Based on all of the changes between the 75% and 90% plans, because of the building design update, we have agreed to give Moltz a full five weeks to create the cost estimates.

New Project Timeline is in Joe's Public Works report. We will have Copper Best of JVA on Zoom at our next meeting to discuss next steps and how the CMAR process works at this stage of the project.

Concerts in the Park:

A huge thank you to the board of Mountain Air Music Series for a successful 2022 schedule. The events were well planned and executed, and I am not aware of any issues. We had many proactive conversations prior to the events and I am happy to report we were all on the same page.

Lifeguard Certification Bonus via State of Colorado:

Governor Polis announced the "Pools Special Initiative 2022" which offers a \$1,000 training bonus to new lifeguards. The City of Ouray has been directly impacted by a shortage of lifeguards and we appreciate the efforts being made to address this issue.

I do want it to be clear that this incentive for new lifeguards is not through the City, does not include city funding, nor does the funding come to the City for distribution to the lifeguards. This funding will come directly from the state to the individual lifeguards after becoming a certified lifeguard and for CPR and first aid certifications.

Water Treatment Plant - Perimeter Trail Update:

Steve Boyle, Ouray Trail Group President, and I walked the potential Perimeter Trail realignment necessary to accommodate the new Water Treatment Facility last week. The project will take a small amount of trail engineering through the Ouray Trail Group; however, he believes the work could be completed late this fall, through volunteers, to accommodate our early spring of 2023 construction.

Perimeter Trail Parking – East of Visitors Center

Steve Boyle, Ouray Trails Group President and I met last week in the future larger parking lot area east of the Visitors Center. The survey work was completed and we are looking at taking out some of the walkway on the south of the property. This will push the start of the trail to the east and in exchange allow for a second row of parking to help alleviate Hot Springs Pool parking issues. Steve was on the same page on the small reduction in trail to the benefit of parking.

Ouray Trail Group Perimeter Trail Master Plan Update:

The U.S. Forest Service, Steve Boyle of the Ouray Trail Group, and I met last week to finalize the Perimeter Trail Master Plan. The City Council adopted the plan at the April 4th Council meeting, at the request of the USFS, prior to their review. There were some final tweaks to the document based on comments back from the USFS. The document was re-written by Steve Boyle after the meeting to the agreed upon language. Once the final draft is accepted, I have been asked to place the final copy in front of the City Council for approval.

Ouray Volunteer Fire Department Report for June 2022

The Fire Department has been working with Mountain Air Music Series for the July 3rd Fire Department fund raising event.

There were 3 training opportunities in the County for the month of June including a Driver training Course.

OVFD has been planning the fireworks show and the other 4th of July events.

Sheriff Justin Perry, Ridgway Fire Chief Chris Miller, and I are in constant communication about the possibility of Fire Restrictions within the County.

Public Works June 2022 Update

Water

- Water Usage Numbers for **May**:
 - Influent (Water from spring) – 62,915,424 Gallons
 - Effluent (Water to town) – 18,896,341 Gallons
 - Micro Hydro Plant – 17,458,816 Gallons
 - Mineral Farms – 374,800 Gallons
- Damage was reported by the Police Department to a Fire Hydrant located at 2nd St, 5th Ave. City staff was able to rebuild the fire hydrant, and it is back in service.
- Repair on the City's overflow line from the water tanks was completed.
- Submitted loan application for SRF (State Revolving Fund) through CDPHE (Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment). Application deadline was June 15th.
- Continued to monitor and sample chlorine residuals at the two entry points of the distribution system. The City has been in compliance and meeting all CDPHE requirements.

Sewer

- Continued effort working with JVA and Moltz Construction on 90% design. On Tuesday June 28th we held a team meeting and went through the entire 90% design plans. It was a very productive meeting. Below is the current schedule:
 - Brief presentation by JVA at Council Meeting to discuss next steps – 7/18/22
 - Presentation from architect at Council Meeting – 8/1/22
 - 90% GMP – 8/1/22
 - Notice to Proceed – 8/15/22
- Continued to clean head works three to four times daily.
- Continued to skim lagoons of debris as needed.
- Crews responded to a call of a plugged sewer in a private residence. After some investigation, it was determined to be a plug on the homeowner's sewer service line.

Streets

- Removed trees and other debris on the 200 block of 9th Ave in order to extend the width of the road.
- Road maintenance in the 400 block of 2nd Ave. Material was added and the road was widened.
- Curbs along HWY 550 (Main St) were painted yellow where appropriate.
- Bridge repair on 9th Ave – damage was reported by the Police Department and Crews rebuild guard rails along the side of the bridge.
- Placed large rocks around the bathroom at Rotary Park.
- Assisted with placing the planters and mining equipment out for the flowers on HWY 550 (Main St).
- Hauled sand to the shooting range for the Police Department.
- Cleaned out catch basin located in Fellin' Park.
- New "No Parking" signs were placed outside the Visitors Center.
- Placed the Police Department's traffic calming devices out on Oak St.
- Installed speed bumps on Oak St.

City Resources Department

July 5, 2022

- The Hot Springs Pool has begun daily 'Members Only' time between 10 am and noon. During this time people with valid memberships may participate in fitness classes, lap swimming, and soaking. Limiting this time to members only has been positive, especially with lap swimmers and Polar Bears fitness members.
- The June session of swim lessons is completed. The next session of swim lessons will be July 11 – 21.
- An all-staff training took place at the Hot Springs Pool on June 16. Training included in water lifeguarding skills, slide safety, staff communication, customer service and on-deck classroom style training.
- Pool staff continues to work closely with Human Resources for recruitment of additional employees. The Hot Springs continues to be short staffed but currently has sufficient staffing to open all pools, water slides, climbing wall, and inflatables.
- Low water flow from geothermal sources continues to plague the Hot Springs Pool. On some days in June the Overlook Pool was closed so more hot water could be directed to larger pools.
- Governor Polis has made funding available to assist with lifeguard recruitment, training, and retention. Funds are available through two sources: the Montrose Workforce Center and through a Dept. of Local Affairs grant opportunity. The City has applied for the grant funds. New hires are directed to contact the Workforce Center.
- Hot Springs and other City staff met with a representative from the Historic Hot Springs Loop program with the Colorado Office of Economic Development (OEDIT).
- The Hot Springs Association presented a webinar in June to highlight the activities of the association.
- Recent high winds damaged one of the shade covers over the Hot Pool. The shade cover was taken to Grand Junction for repair and should be back in place prior to the 4th of July weekend.
- A valve actuator seized in the open position overnight causing the hot pool to drain completely. Maintenance staff corrected the problem and had the pool refilled and hot by the time the pool opened to the public that same day.
- The increase in prices for daily admission to the Hot Springs that was approved by City Council was implemented on July 1.
- The Wolf Pack swim team competed in the state-wide summer games held in Grand Junction in mid-June. The four athletes who participated brought home seven medals for their successes in freestyle and backstroke swimming events.
- Flowers were placed in planters on Main Street and hanging baskets installed in mid-June.
- The truck mounted flower watering equipment broke down early in the watering season. Staff was able to continue using the equipment while waiting for repair parts to be delivered. The City mechanic installed the new components once they were delivered.
- Staff has worked closely with Mountain Air Music to coordinate porta-potties, sprinkler watering, trash removal, etc.
- Parks staff have been participating in regularly scheduled safety training work sessions. These trainings are provided by the City's insurance company. Topics include heat stroke prevention, personal protective equipment, lawn mower safety, etc.
- The Center for Outreach Research and Education provided a special training on playground safety and inspection.

- Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado, Ouray Trail Group, and City staff inspected sections of the Perimeter Trail near Cascade Falls for a volunteer work weekend that will be in September.
- Black Swifts have arrived at the Box Canon Falls and are currently building nests near the waterfalls. One nest has been observed with a bird setting on an egg.
- Work continues on the City offices project at the Ouray Community Center with completion of office space estimated to be soon.
- Have worked with Ouray County Arts Association for relocating art that had hung in what is now offices.
- City Resource Dept. staff has been preparing for the 4th of July.

TOURISM & DESTINATION MARKETING REPORT

Visitor Center

- Hours have been changed to 9 am - 3 pm everyday
- We have obtained the Colorado Concierge Gold Business classification. All employees who work in the Visitor Center took training classes that discussed everything Colorado, passed tests, and applied for the certification. With this achievement, Colorado Tourism Office highlighted us in their Tourism Tuesday newsletter and will add us to their website (Please see certificate at the end).
- Visit Ouray is officially a Care for Colorado Stewardship Member
- We have been cleaning out old brochures and guides
- Started a list for creating new content (Hot Springs, OHV ordinance, Ghost Towns, Jeeping, Hiking, Scenic Drives, True Grit)
- Consistently updating information, especially in regards to trail openings
- Put a call out to all businesses in the monthly newsletter for free advertising in the Visitor Center. They just need to bring us their brochures to display.
- Visitor Guide is being worked on. We have started gathering the written content and started searching for photography to use.
- The gift shop area has been cleaned up. We have started making purchases such as maps, trail guides, postcards, and photographs to be sold. We have been working with IT to set up our point-of-sale system so we can start selling smaller items soon. Carmen and Avery from the Hot Springs Pool have been a tremendous help with training.
- We had 2,136 visitors and 601 phone calls as of June 29, 2022

- Karsh Hagan (Branding Company) is wrapping up their audit process for their destination research, will be conducting interviews with 4-5 stakeholders in the community, and planning on a day and time for a community workshop.

Visit Ouray Continued

- Tangram Design will be coming July 18th to start their assessment. July 19th, during the TAC meeting, we will have a workshop from 6-8 pm for the kick-off and community engagement portion of the research.
- Kailey Rhoten attended the Colorado Associations of Destination Marketing Organizations (CADMO) in Durango, Colorado
 - Most destinations are struggling with workforce, housing, retainment (workforce), and over tourism
 - According to Colorado Tourism Office (CTO): 41% of travelers have said that their plans have been impacted because of gas prices. 40% said they are more likely to do staycations / travel close to home.
 - Two campaigns the state is pushing "Shine a Little Brighter" and "Do Colorado Right." They are encouraging destinations to do their own version of "Do Colorado Right" ("Do Ouray Right")
 - The mindset of most destinations is now managing versus marketing

DECLARATION NO. 2, 2022
A DECLARATION OF CITY OF OURAY, COLORADO RESCINDING
STAGE I FIRE RESTRICTIONS

WHEREAS, City Council of the City of Ouray, Colorado pursuant to the City of Ouray Charter Section 2.3 (A) and City of Ouray Code Section 2-8 has the authority to declare a local disaster emergency to exist when, there is an occurrence or imminent threat of widespread or severe damage, injury, loss of life or property, resulting from any cause of human origin, including but not limited to fire,

WHEREAS, the Mayor of the City of Ouray, Colorado instituted Stage I Fire Restrictions with Declaration 1, 2022 on June 15, 2022 at 12:01am; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Ouray, Colorado ratified Declaration 1, 2022 at a Special Meeting on June 27, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Ouray, Colorado and the Chief of the Ouray Volunteer Fire Department believe fire risk is decreased due to recent and predicted rainfall; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT DECLARED BY THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF OURAY, COLORADO, that: the City Council of the City of Ouray, Colorado hereby rescinds Stage I Fire Restrictions effective June 29, 2022 12:01am.

RESOLUTION NO. 12, SERIES 2022

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE MULTIMODAL TRANSPORTATION AND MITIGATION OPTIONS FUND (MMOF) GRANT APPLICATION AND MATCH COMMITTEMENT FOR THE CREATION OF A REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION SERVICE BETWEEN THE CITY OF MONTROSE, TOWN OF RIDGWAY, AND CITY OF OURAY

WHEREAS, the Multimodal Transportation & Mitigation Options Fund (MMOF) was created within the State Treasury under Colorado Senate Bill 2018-001 and amended under Colorado Senate Bill 2021-260 to provide the state program with steady, annual funding for multimodal transportation projects; and,

WHEREAS, the Colorado Department of Transportation is seeking grant applications for multimodal projects from across the state of Colorado; and,

WHEREAS, Ouray County has a 25% grant match requirement per the Transportation Commission Resolution 2021-12-10, adopted December 16, 2021; and,

WHEREAS, Ouray County has struggled for more than a decade with obtaining the necessary workforce to support our businesses, government entities, and the local economy in general and a transportation option between the City of Montrose, Town of Ridgway, and City of Ouray is believed to greatly assist meeting the workforce needs; and,

WHEREAS, transportation between the City of Montrose, Town of Ridgway, and City of Ouray was identified in the Gunnison Valley TPR Project List for the Gunnison Valley 2045 Regional Transportation Plan through project # 1130 PGV7018 and also mentioned in the Region 10 Region Implementation Plan; and,

WHEREAS, to create a successful regional transportation system in Ouray County, *All Points Transit* has been identified as being able to provide this service and has agreed to be the grant program manager and fiscal agent, if awarded; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Ouray is committed to this project and agrees to split the 25% grant match requirement over the next three years with Ouray County and Town of Ridgway, if the MMOF grant application is awarded; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OURAY, COLORADO THAT:

Additional regional transportation is recognized as a need to assist our citizens, businesses and government entities and the City fully supports the MMOF Grant Application and agrees to

provide their share of the 25% match requirement which is estimated at \$28,000 during year one and \$15,616 for year two and three of the grant project.

RESOLUTION NO. 13, SERIES 2022

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OURAY, COLORADO AUTHORIZING MONEY SET ASIDE IN THE CITY'S BUDGET TO THE OURAY COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT TO BE USED SOLEY FOR HIGH ALPINE REGULATION ENFORCEMENT.

WHEREAS, the City continues to invest in and develop outdoor recreation areas and together with Ouray County and Town of Ridgway, the City is negatively impacted when high alpine regulations are violated with no opportunity for redress due to lack of resources; and

WHEREAS, City Council set aside ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in the 2022 Tourism Fund budget to be used by the Ouray County Sheriff's Department for enforcement in the high alpine areas of Ouray County; and

WHEREAS, City Council desires this money be provided directly to the Ouray County Sheriff's Department to be credited to the budget-line item for high alpine and backcountry regulation enforcement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OURAY, COLORADO as follows:

City Council directs the City Administrator to issue a check to the Ouray County Sheriff's Department for ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) from the 2022 Tourism Fund to be used for high alpine and backcountry regulation enforcement.

RESOLUTION NO. 11 (SERIES 2022)

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OURAY, COLORADO, APPROVING ALTERNATE JUDGES TO PRESIDE OVER OURAY MUNICIPAL COURT FOR MAY 12 AND JUNE 9, 2022 AT NOON AT THE OURAY COUNTY COURTHOUSE.

WHEREAS, sitting Judge Zachary Martin has resigned as the Ouray Municipal Judge and his last day is February 10, 2022.

WHEREAS the City and the Town of Ridgway share the same judge and clerk for municipal court which begins at noon once per month for both dockets, at the Ouray County Courthouse.

WHEREAS, on February 7, 2022, City Council appointed Jock Fleming and Anna Cooling of Fleming, Lowenberg & Cooling, 144 S Uncompahgre Ave, Montrose, CO 81401 to be alternate municipal judges for March and April, respectively.

WHEREAS, while City Council determines the best way to proceed with appoint a new permanent judge, it is necessary to appoint alternate judges for May 12th and June 9th.
