Capital and Construction Update

Title I Update

Dr. Joan Bramble explained this history of the Title I federal funding allocation that supports low-income students. Granite School District received 15.3 million dollars last school year. The largest portion of Granite's funding (41%) goes to schools with the other portions for required set-asides and optional set-asides. Schools are ranked by poverty level and school funding allocations are determined by eligibility and ensuring those designated are given enough funds to effectively operate a Title I program. Each year Title I designations are revisited because Title I funding is determined by poverty levels and poverty levels in communities are dynamic. The list of rankings for this school year was included in the presentation.

Heidi Smith read a statement from Mary Anne Davies. She urged the board to avoid unnecessary segregation and to expand resources for vocational rehabilitation for transition age students.

President McDermott granted Julie Jackson a few minutes for personal privilege to share a statement with the Board.

Julie Jackson is running for the House of Representatives; she won the primary election and is unopposed in the general election and will therefore resign her seat at the end of December 2026.

President McDermott accepted Julie Jackson's resignation effective December 31, 2026. The board will take applications beginning August 5 through August 19. Interviews will be on August 25 with time reserved on September 1 for a second round of interviews.

Population Analysis Consultant

Steve Hogan, Planning and Boundaries Director, stated that the district selected MGT as the consultant to conduct population analysis and provide recommendations to the board. The MGT representatives; Chris Grigo, Dr. Lance Richards, and Christine Steenport presented an overview of the services they will provide.

President McDermott summarized that MGT will provide unbiased analysis which will allow the board to receive recommendations based on their data and community engagement by September 2027. School closures will not take effect until August 2028. A document outlining expectations of the board will be drafted by board leadership and shared with board members.

FIRST READINGS

Article VII.G.1. Annual Student Population Analysis Procedures

This first reading updates the existing policy to clarify student population analysis procedures, establishes deadlines for creating a study list and other District processes, and establishes deadlines for Board actions related to boundary changes and for school closures. Changes related to deadlines are in conformity with statutes and provide clarity regarding District procedures. In addition, the policy is intended to provide maximum input from parents and the community.

Clarke Nelson recommended changing the language from *sooner* to *at least* in sections F.1. and G.1.

Article VIII.A.24. Electronic Devices and Acceptable Use of Technology

This policy establishes separate policy exceptions for high school electronic devices use and requires schools to designate an area where electronic devices may be used during non-instructional time. This policy also requires schools to adopt accountability practices to ensure they are compliant with state and district goals.

TRUTH IN TAXATION HEARING

Truth in Taxation Presentation

Todd Hauber began with a summary of the items he will cover in the presentation. Mr. Hauber then made the required statements. (3:00)

- The 2026-27 budget includes a proposed tax increase that exceeds the certified tax rate per 59-2-919(4)(a)(ii).
- The approximate amount of tax increase is \$21,115,465.
- The purpose of the tax increase is to fund various operational and capital priorities — see the published Property Tax Impact Schedule for further details.
- The approximate percentage of tax increase will be 10.26% higher than the certified tax rate.

The remainder of the presentation covered the property tax impact schedule, the Salt Lake County Notice, budget highlights and priorities, a sample property tax notice, and property value appeals and statutory tax relief process. Tax relief forms and copies of information were available at tables outside of the meeting room.

Public Comment

President McDermott opened the public hearing and stated the guidelines for public comment, each patron who wishes to comment has 3 minutes to speak. A total of 15 residents commented expressing concerns, opposition or support of the tax increase. Monty Hawkins participated online, Michele Jones, Street Fortenberry, Heidi Jensen, Jay Blain, Lance Parker, Liz Shellum, Danielle Housman, Mike Glower, Monica Wilbur, Janelle Williamson, Jeff Larson, and Kylie Jones participated in person. There were technical difficulties for the final online participant, so he emailed his comments and President McDermott read them aloud. One patron emailed their comments which are included in the agenda backup.

President McDermott made a final call for comments. President McDermott closed the public hearing portion of the meeting at 7:32 p.m.

Superintendent Horsley thanked everyone for coming to this hearing. He invited attendees to leave their contact information if they had additional questions.

**AMENDMENT TO EMPLOYMENT CONTRACT
BETWEEN
BENJAMIN HORSLEY
AND
THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF
GRANITE SCHOOL DISTRICT**

Whereas, on or about June 2, 2026 the Board of Education of Granite School District approved that certain "Employment Contract" with Superintendent Benjamin Horsley attached hereto as Exhibit "A" renewing his appointment as Superintendent of the District for a two-year term commencing July 1, 2026 and ending June 30, 2028.

Whereas, paragraph 4.A. of the Employment Contract, setting forth the Superintendent's annual salary was set forth incorrectly in that it failed to take into account prior increases to the Superintendent's salary that became effective during the term of his prior contract.

Whereas, the Parties mutually desire to correct the error in paragraph 4.A. to properly reflect the intent of the Parties with respect to the Superintendent's annual salary.

Based on the foregoing, the Parties agree that paragraph 4.A. is hereby amended as follows, retroactive to July 1, 2026, with all other provisions of the original Employment Contract as approved on June 2, 2026 to remain otherwise unchanged and in full force and effect:

4. COMPENSATION

A. Salary. The Board shall pay Superintendent an annual salary of two hundred eighty-one thousand seven hundred fifty-six dollars and no cents (\$281,756.00).

- 1) Guaranteed Adjustments. Superintendent shall receive the same annual percentage increase in salary received by employees on the District's teacher salary schedule, unless a mutual agreement is reached otherwise.
- 2) Other Adjustments. The Board and Superintendent may mutually agree to adjust the salary of Superintendent during the term of this contract, but in no event shall he be paid less than the salary set forth above. Any other adjustment in salary made during the life of this contract shall be in the form of an amendment and become part of his contract, but it shall not be deemed that the Board and Superintendent have entered into a new contract or that the termination date of the existing contract has been extended.

This Amendment to Employment Contract Between Benjamin Horsley and the Board of Education of Granite School District was approved by vote of the Board of Education at a public meeting duly held on September 2, 2026.

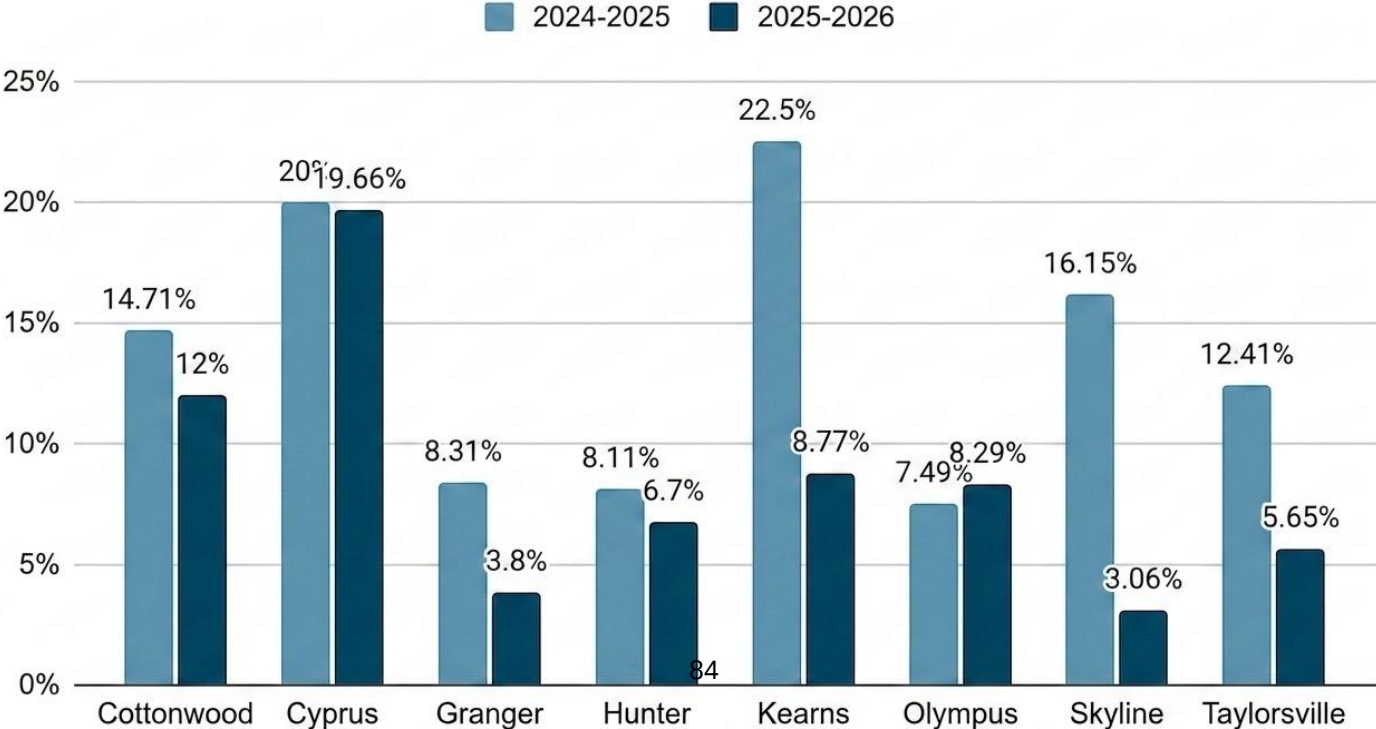

The same issue is with female coaches and their office space vs. the men's office space. The original plans provide much more space for the men's office. Our female wrestling team also grew this year and we had our largest girls team on record. We feel that our students are given equitable opportunities to participate in sports and that the discrepancy has more to do with students being involved in other extra curricular and community based teams and programs.

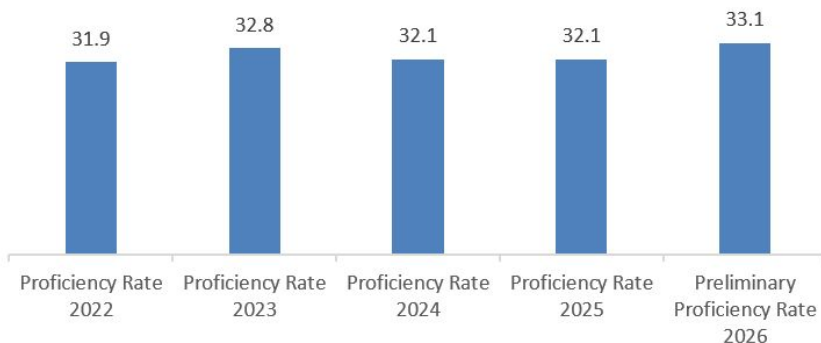

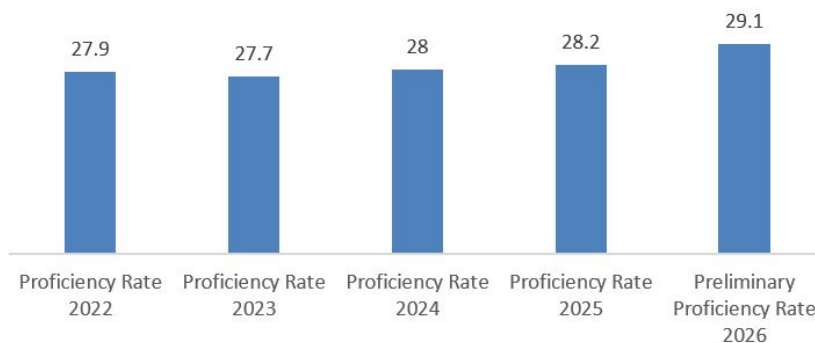


Strategic Goal 2: Increase Proficiency by 1% yearly in ELA and Mathematics

RISE ELA Overall (3rd-10th)



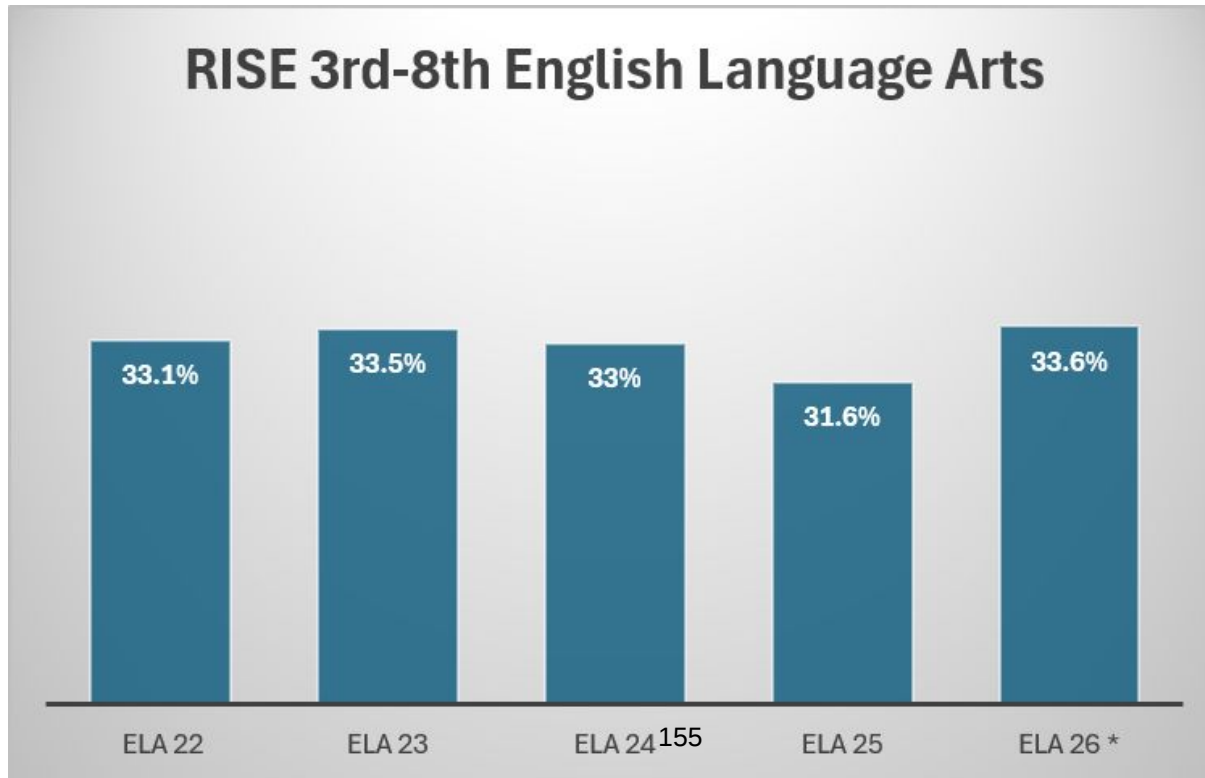
RISE Math Overall (3rd-10th)

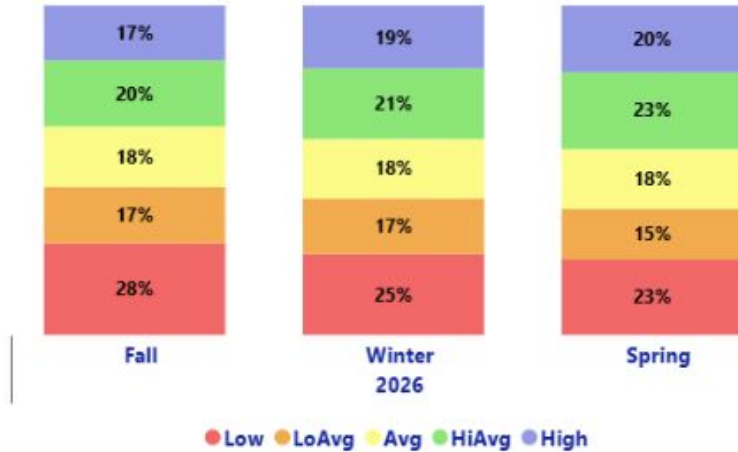

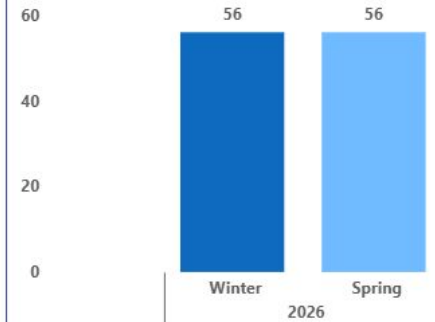

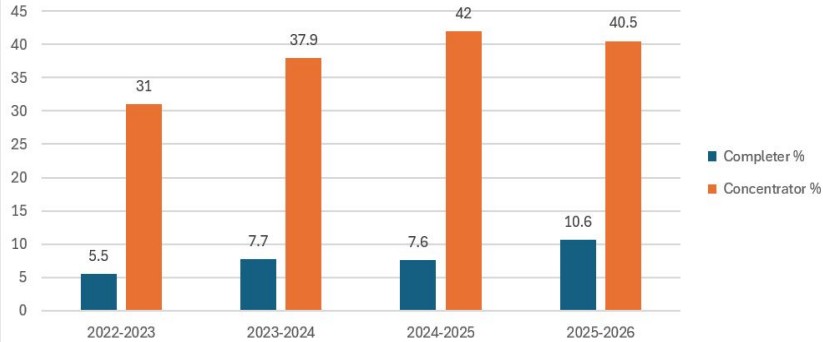

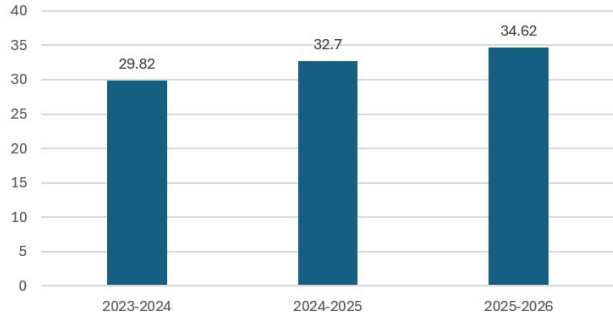
CTE Concentrator and Completer Percent by School Year

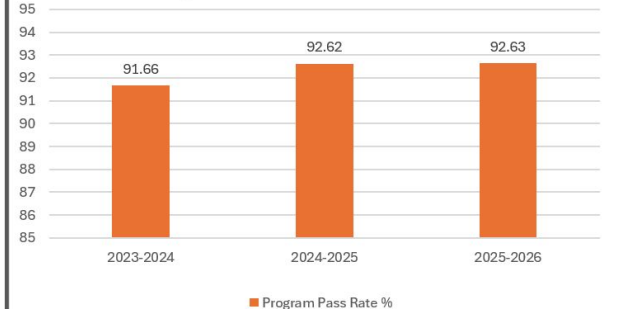
Student Participation % in AP or CE by School Year

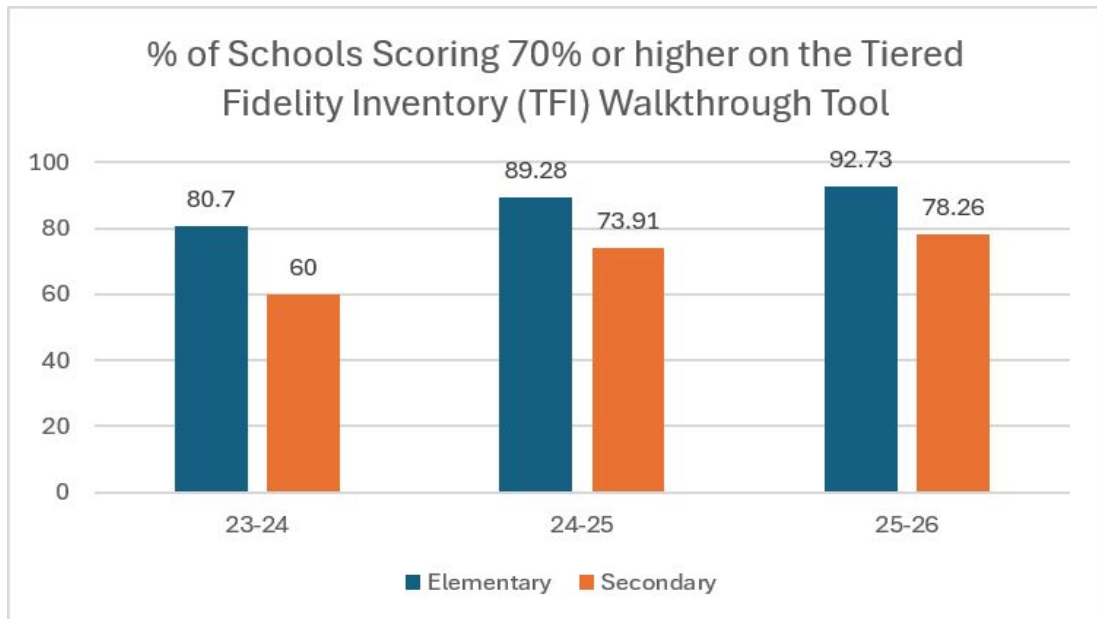

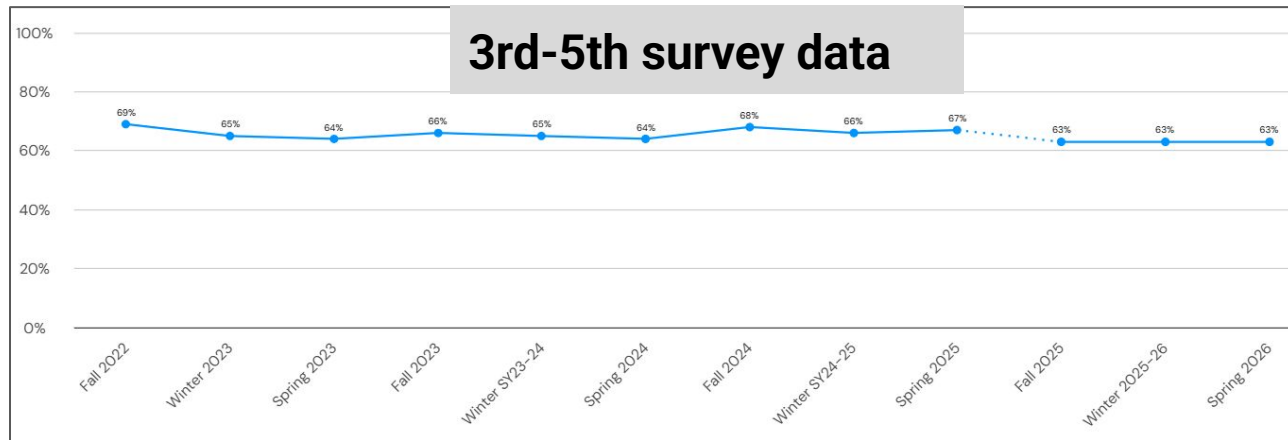

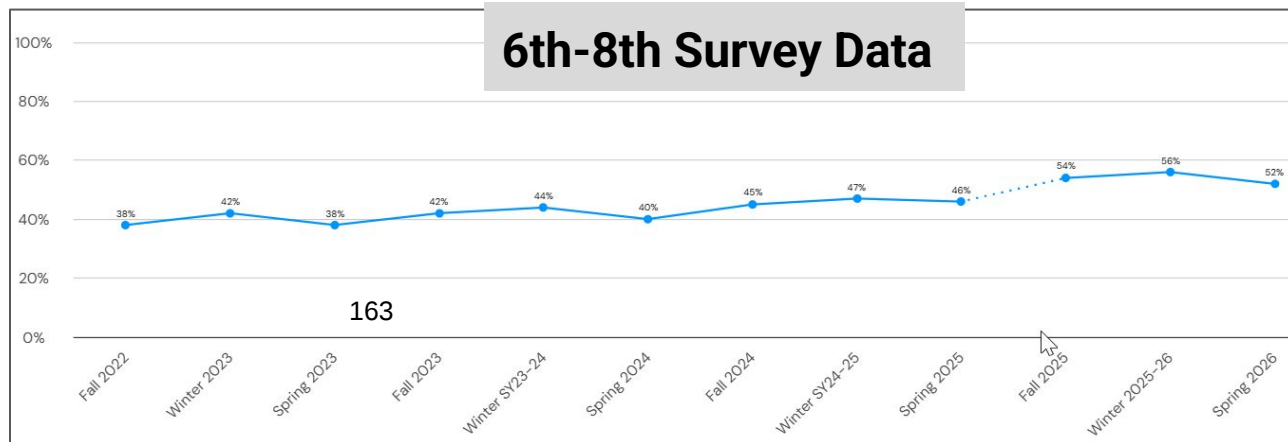

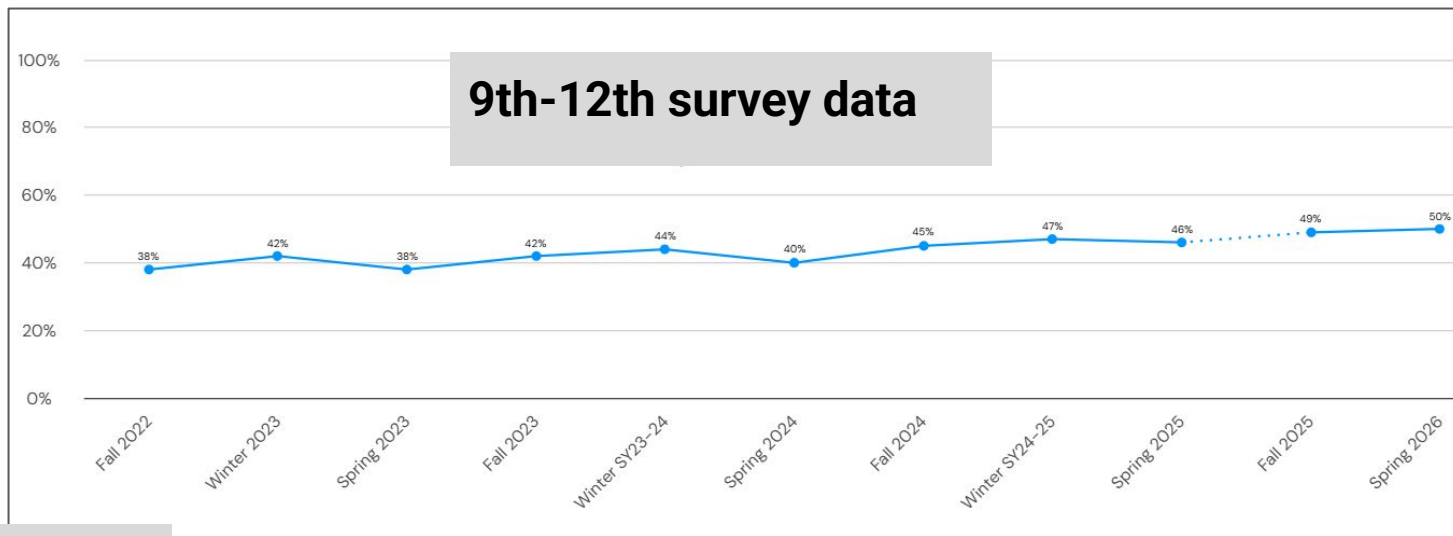

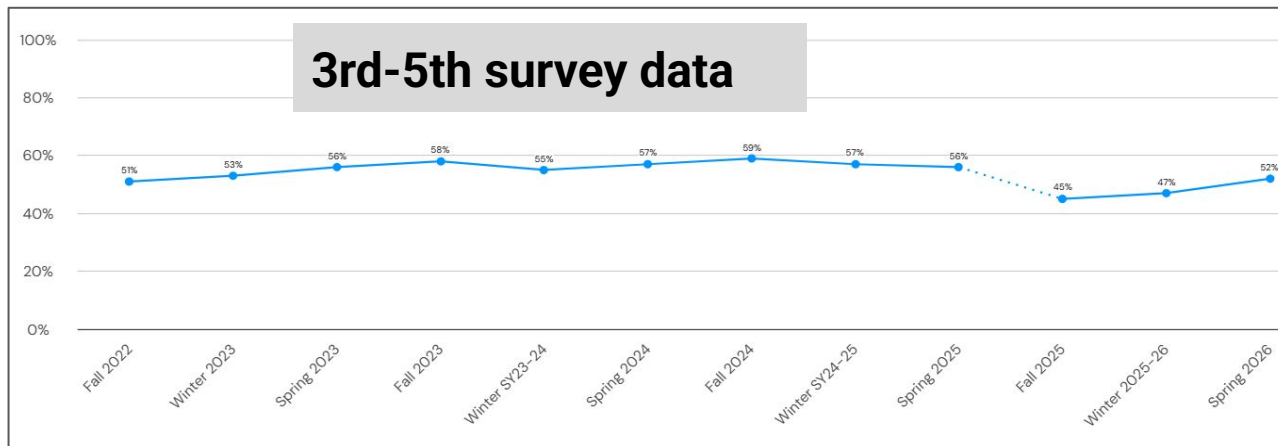

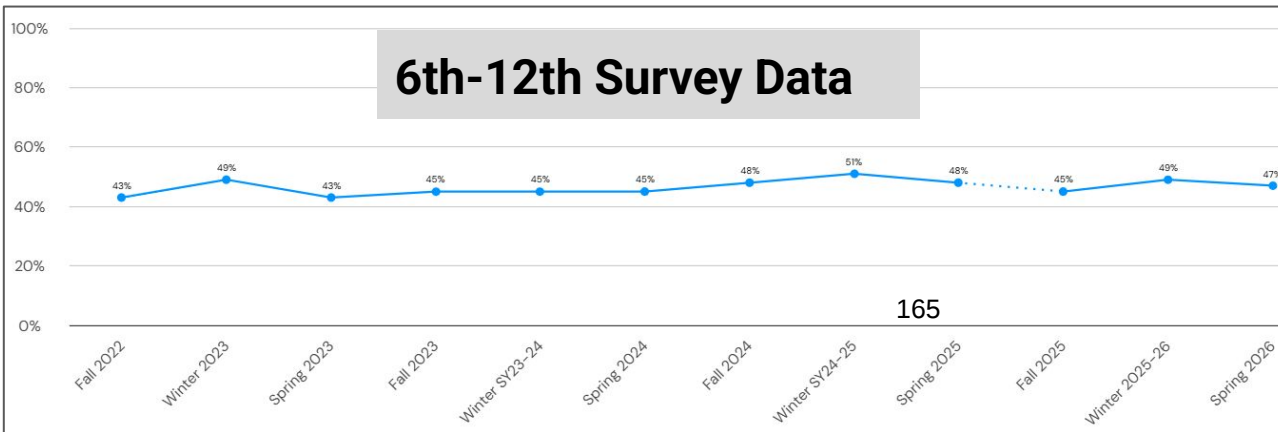

What does SEP stand for?

Student Education Plan (SEP) Conferences are structured opportunities for students, families, and educators to come together as partners in a student's learning.

During these conferences, participants:

- review the student's academic progress and strengths
- identify areas for continued growth
- set meaningful learning goals
- discuss the supports and strategies needed for success.

SEPs strengthen the school–family partnership by ensuring that students and families understand where the student is academically, where they are headed, and how everyone can work together to help them get there.

Let's Think About Student Ownership of Learning for Just a Moment

- Students who take ownership of their learning are more likely to invest greater effort and persistence
- We can create a conference experience in which students, not adults, become the owners of their learning

Consider Our Current Reality:

As we think about our current parent-teacher conference model, consider both its strength and its limitations

What's Working?

- Parents value opportunities to connect directly with teachers
- Conferences can create conversations about student progress

Where the Current Model Is Challenging

Attendance: Are we reaching the families we most need to reach?

Time: At just 5 minutes per conference, we can meet with only **36 families in three hours**.

Depth: Can a 5-minute conversation truly be meaningful and productive?

Student Ownership: Is the student an active participant—or simply the subject of the conversation?

Parent Engagement: Are parents participating in the learning process or primarily receiving information?

Teacher Workload: Is the current model sustainable and an effective use of teacher time?

Follow-Through: What happens after the conference? Does the conversation lead to action?

The question isn't whether conferences have value—it's whether our current structure creates the greatest possible value.



Build Self-Efficacy

Student self-efficacy is a student's belief in their ability to achieve academic outcomes.

If students know where they are headed, it will help them own their learning. Build systems to provide feedback and help students know where they are right now.



Student-Centered Critical Questions of Learning



Student-Led Conferences

- Does every student know exactly what they are expected to learn?
- Can students explain where they currently are?
- Do they know what they need to do next?
- Can they explain their progress without the teacher speaking for them?
- If a parent asked, "How are you doing in school?" could the student confidently answer?
- *If students cannot explain their learning, have they truly taken ownership of it?*

Policy and Legal Services will present one First Reading during the next Board of Education meeting. A description of the policy under consideration is provided below.

Article IX.A.1.1. Military Leave

This first reading contains an important update to our existing Military Leave policy that includes changes that were agreed upon in the most recent negotiated agreements. This policy update establishes that the District will provide up to fifteen (15) days of full pay per year for all approved military leave requests as approved by Human Resources.

Article IX.A.1.1. Military Leave

A. Statement of Policy

~~Mandatory military leave, not to exceed 15 days per contract year, may be granted to contract employees who are members of the organized reserve or guard units of the Army, Navy, Air Force or Marines.~~ Granite School District will provide up to fifteen (15) days of full pay per year for all approved military leave requests. Official orders must be submitted by the employee to the Human Resources office, prior to the leave, attesting to the official directive to perform such duty.

Where possible, this duty shall be performed at times which will not conflict with contract working days or work assignments.

Employees who have been approved to attend a military duty assignment on contract working days will be paid in the following manner: The District will pay the difference between the military pay received, excluding travel pay and per diem, and the regular pay the employee would have received from the District, providing the military pay is less than the regular District pay. For computation purposes, one day of military duty constitutes an eight-hour day. If the military pay is more than the regular District pay, the employee will be on leave of absence without pay status.

Military leave requests for a longer period (to attend basic training, extended active duty, schools, etc.) will be considered individually on a leave without pay status only.

Contract employees on regular appointment who are called to active duty shall be granted advancement on the appropriate salary schedule at the following rate: one step on the salary schedule for each year, or major part thereof, of active military service, not to exceed three years credit.

Policy and Legal Services will present six Second Readings during the next Board of Education meeting. A description of the policies under consideration is provided below.

Article VII.G.1. Annual Student Population Analysis Procedures

This second reading updates the existing policy to clarify student population analysis procedures, establish a clear timeline for creating a study list, and conform with new legislation. This policy creates separates timelines for boundary changes and for school closures.

Article VIII.A.24. Electronic Devices and Acceptable Use of Technology

This second reading updates the existing electronic devices policy to conform to state law. This policy establishes separate policies for high school electronic devices use and requires schools to designate an area where electronic devices may be used during non-instructional time. This policy also requires schools to adopt accountability practices to ensure schools are compliant with state and district goals.

Article VIII.A.18. Student Travel

This second reading updates the existing Student Travel policy to include a change required by state law regarding fee waivers and action plans. Under these new changes, students who qualify for a fee waiver and wish to attend a second trip in one school year will need to follow an action plan with school administration to provide service to the school community.

Article VIII.A.3. Fees in Public Schools

This second reading updates the existing policy on fees in public schools to reference the fee waiver and action plan changes in the student travel policy.

Article X.F.7. Medicaid Claims

This second reading is a new policy that establishes requirements for District employees involved in providing or documenting services or claims for Medicaid reimbursement. This policy also covers false claims and other improper practices related to Medicaid reimbursement.

Fiscal Policy Manual §18 – Reporting Fraud, Waste, and Abuse

This second reading is an update to our Fiscal Policy Manual that addresses reporting fraud, waste, and abuse, and includes protection for whistleblowers. This policy defines waste, fraud and abuse, provides examples, and outlines procedures for reporting suspected violations.

Article VII.G.1. Annual Student Population Analysis Procedures

A. Purpose

Based on its statutory responsibility and authority to do all things necessary for the maintenance, prosperity, and success of schools and for the promotion of education, the Board of Education of Granite School District (Board) establishes the following procedures in order to provide for the ongoing, systematic, and orderly review of student populations, school boundaries, and school facility issues. The Board reserves the right to exercise its authority and modify the following procedures to better serve its objectives consistent with Utah Code 53G-4-402.

B. Definitions

1. “Facility Master Plan” means a plan regarding capital projects, including new construction, building replacement or major upgrade, consolidation of existing facilities, and property acquisition for future sites. The plan is updated and approved by the Board of Education annually.
2. “Population Analysis Committee (PAC)” means a committee of district employees with expertise in student population, school boundary, and school facility issues. The committee studies the issues and advises the Board regarding solutions to resolve the issues.
3. “Study List” means a list of population, boundary, and facility issues identified by the PAC, including considerations for boundary changes and/or school closures.

C. Study List Development

1. The PAC shall prepare and recommend a Study List to the Board. The Study List shall be developed based on Board recommendations and consider concerns and suggestions received from district employees, patrons, parents, community organizations, municipalities, governmental agencies, and other stakeholders.
2. The PAC shall notify principals, school community councils, and school patrons of the schools being studied and provide the rationale for the school being placed on the Study List.
3. The Study List is subject to approval by the Board. The Board shall retain discretion to add to, delete from, and modify the Study List at any time. The Board shall consider feedback on the Study List from stakeholders.

D. Population, Boundary, and Facility Analysis

1. The PAC shall initiate a study designed to: (1) understand current conditions; (2) clarify problems, concerns, or issues to be resolved; (3) conduct research and gather data; and (4) develop initial findings and recommend potential solutions calculated to resolve problems, concerns, or issues identified.

2. In consultation with the Board, the PAC may use all appropriate methods to gather data and conduct analysis including, but not limited to interviewing employees, patrons, and other school community stakeholders; meeting with school community councils and local elected officials; conducting community meetings with school patrons; engaging consultants and commissioning studies; and conducting surveys and focus groups.
3. In conducting its study and in developing potential solutions, the PAC may consider factors that include, but are not limited to the following:
 - a. Age and condition of buildings
 - b. Busing and transportation needs
 - c. Contiguous boundaries
 - d. Efficiency of property use and disposition
 - e. Enrollment and programming
 - f. Environmental factors (air quality, geological conditions, flood hazards, hazardous waste, etc.)
 - g. Feeder patterns
 - h. Fiscal considerations
 - i. Natural disasters or other extraordinary circumstances (safety, potential for property damage, etc.)
 - j. Protection of vulnerable or at-risk student populations
 - k. Residential developments
 - l. Safe walking routes
4. The PAC may consider consolidation of existing facilities when:
 - a. A facility is identified on the Facility Master Plan as needing replacement or remodel.
 - b. The enrollment of a school being studied could be combined with neighboring schools.

E. Initial Report

1. The PAC shall prepare a written initial report or presentation outlining the findings of the study. This initial report shall be presented to the Board in a study session or board meeting allowing the Board an opportunity to gain an in-depth understanding of the issues being studied and potential solutions.

2. The PAC shall schedule and conduct open houses to discuss potential school closures or boundary changes. Additionally, the PAC shall formally solicit feedback from patrons by posting the initial report on the District's website and allowing at least thirty (30) days for written public comment. Public comment from all sources shall be gathered, analyzed, and catalogued by the PAC.
3. The PAC shall refine the initial report based on feedback from impacted schools or school community councils, public comments, and the Board's direction.

F. Notice and Comment

1. Based on findings from the study and feedback from stakeholders, the Board shall specifically identify any schools being considered for school closure or boundary changes. The Board shall make and approve a motion in a duly noticed board meeting that initiates formal notice of the same. In compliance with state statute, formal notice shall include notification by typical means of communication, and by mail using U.S. Postal Service, to all parents of students enrolled in schools that may be affected by school closure or boundary changes and parents of students at other schools that may be affected by school closure or boundary changes. In addition, formal notice shall include communication to governing councils and mayors of municipalities where the schools are located. Formal notice to affected parents and local officials shall be delivered no sooner than ninety (90) days prior to Board approval of a school closure and/or at least thirty (30) days prior to a boundary change.
2. In accordance with Utah Code 53G-4-402(23) the Board shall receive public comment on a proposed school closure during two (2) school board meetings or during one (1) school board meeting on a proposed boundary change.
3. The Board shall hold a public hearing on the proposed school closure and/or boundary change at the location of the school under consideration if feasible. Consistent with state law, notice for the public hearing shall be class A notice at least 10 days prior to public hearing; shall indicate the name of the school or schools under consideration for closure or boundary change; and shall identify the date, time, location of the public hearing.
4. In addition, the District shall provide formal notice of the public hearing no sooner than thirty (30) days in advance to all parents of students and local government officials in the same manner as described in F.1. above.

G. Board Action and Implementation

1. The Board shall take final action to approve proposed school closures after a public hearing at a Board meeting before that occurs no sooner than ninety (90) days after formal public notice has been given to affected parents and local officials as described in F.1. above. Final action to approve proposed boundary changes shall be taken no sooner than thirty (30) days after formal public notice described in F.1. above.
2. State law requires the Board to approve any school closures or boundary changes before December 31 for closures or boundary changes to go into effect at the beginning of the next school year.
3. Students whose boundary school changes as a result of implementation of the final plan shall be assigned to schools as follows:
 - a. Elementary and junior high students are expected to attend the new boundary school at the beginning of following school year. Students may apply through the open enrollment process if they wish to remain at the school they attended at the time the change was approved by the Board.
 - b. High school students may opt to complete high school at the school they were attending at the time the change was approved by the Board. Students opting to complete high school in the former school shall signify an intent to remain by submitting an open enrollment application.

H. Contingencies

1. The Board retains discretion to modify the process above to accommodate potential or unforeseen contingencies.
2. In lieu of, or in addition to the foregoing, the Board retains discretion to employ the services of consultants to prepare recommendations for the Board. At such time the Board exercise its discretion under this subsection, the Board shall establish timelines for the discussion of information, reports, or recommendations provided by consultants.

Article VIII.A.24. Electronic Devices and Acceptable Use of Technology

A. Statement of Purpose and Authority

Based on its statutory responsibility and authority to do all things necessary for the maintenance, prosperity, and success of schools and for the promotion of education, the Board of Education (Board) requires schools to introduce and maintain procedures for electronic devices and the acceptable use of technology during school hours. As part of its mission, the Board seeks to promote educational environments that are conducive to teaching and learning, and the Board recognizes the potential for technology use to enhance or disrupt the educational process. This policy provides direction and specific prohibitions on student use of electronic devices during school hours to mitigate disruption and to provide consistency for students.

B. Definitions

1. “District-owned electronic device” means an electronic device purchased by the district to which access is granted to students. Such electronic devices may include but are not limited to desktop or laptop computers, cellphones, tablets, servers, routers, wi-fi connections hubs, or any other device used for audio, video, text communication, or recording.
2. “Electronic device” means a device used for audio, video, or text communication or any other type of computer or computer-like instrument including, but not limited to:
 - a. a smart phone;
 - b. a smart or electronic watch;
 - c. ear buds and headphones;
 - d. a tablet, Chromebook, laptop; or
 - e. a virtual reality device.
3. “Instructional time” means the time between the start of each class period and the end of that class period.
4. “Personal electronic device” or “privately owned electronic device” means devices used for audio, video, and/or text communication, or any other type of computer or computer-like instrument that is not owned or issued by the District to a student.
5. “School hours” means the time between when the morning bell rings for students to proceed to their first class until the last bell rings for dismissal. School hours apply to any day educational instruction is held at a school.

C. Statement of Policy

1. With respect to personal or privately owned electronic devices and technology, schools shall create and maintain school-wide procedures that are consistent with district policy and communicate school policies to students. Regarding the use of district-owned technology and school internet access, all use is a privilege that may be granted as well as withdrawn. Students are expected to be aware of and abide by the District technology terms and conditions.
2. All devices, personal or district-owned, that are on district property during school hours or connected to district networks or district systems shall comply with the contents of this policy, other applicable board policies and district administrative procedures, and acceptable use terms and conditions.
 - a. School procedures shall limit the use of personal electronic devices during school hours. In elementary and junior high schools, subject to specific exceptions detailed in Administrative Memorandum 130 - Electronic Devices and Acceptable Use of Technology, students shall not use personal electronic devices during school hours. Students may possess personal electronic devices, but they shall be kept out of sight and notifications turned off during school hours.
 - b. In senior high schools, subject to specific exceptions detailed in Administrative Memorandum 130 - Electronic Devices and Acceptable Use of Technology, students shall not use personal electronic devices during instructional time. School administration, in coordination with school community councils, parents, and students, may limit the use of personal electronic devices further up to and including limiting use entirely during the school hours.
4. Schools shall permit parents or guardians to make reasonable requests for accommodations as part of a student's IEP, 504 Plan, or Health Plan. Additionally, each school shall designate an area of the school where students are allowed to briefly use electronic devices during non-instructional time. Students may also use electronic devices for emergency purposes as outlined in Administrative Procedure 130 - Electronic Devices and Acceptable Use of Technology.
5. District-owned electronic devices shall be used for instructional or programmatic purposes only subject to state law and Administrative Procedure 130 - Electronic Devices and Acceptable Use of Technology.
6. Non-essential screen time shall be eliminated during school hours. School hours are for students to engage in learning and be free from excessive screen interaction. Students shall use Chromebooks or other electronic devices during school hours for the specific purpose of participating in planned learning—not to keep students passively occupied.

7. Schools shall adopt internal monitoring and accountability practices and procedures to ensure compliance with state and district goals regarding student use of electronic devices.
8. Violations of acceptable use of District-owned electronic devices shall result in restricted access.

Article VIII.A.18. Student Travel

A. Statement of Purpose

The Board of Education (Board) for the Granite School District (District) believes that students should devote as much time as possible to the pursuit of their educational program at their assigned school. The Board also believes that student travel may enrich school activities. Therefore, student travel may be a valid part of the educational experience. Administrators must balance the costs and benefits considering the time students are away from home and/or school and the economic burden travel costs can have on families. For information on implementing this policy, see Administrative Memorandum 151 - Student Travel.

B. Definitions

1. “Action Plan” means a written agreement between a principal and a student that outlines specific, reasonable steps the student will take to contribute to the school or community in exchange for a fee waiver for a second school trip.
2. “Association” means an organization that governs or regulates a student’s participation in an athletic activity.
3. “Trip” means a school sponsored travel activity of two or more nights that requires a student to pay a fee for participation in the activity. “Trip” does not include a travel activity of two or more nights related to an in-state activity sponsored by an association as that term is defined in Section 53G-7-801.

C. Statement of Policy

The Board authorizes the administration to approve requests for student travel based upon the following guidelines and other reasonable considerations:

1. All travel shall relate directly to the curriculum or activities for which the group is organized.
2. Day trips within the State of Utah are acceptable for all students.
3. Out-of-state/overnight travel is limited to high schools, limited to the contiguous 48 United States, and subject to approval by the principal and School Leadership and Improvement Services Director.

4. Standard application forms for student travel shall be submitted to the principal and appropriate School Leadership and Improvement Services Director for approval as soon as possible to secure the best accommodations and pricing. Arrangements for student travel shall not be made until the request has been approved by the principal and School Leadership and Improvement Services Director.
5. Overnight travel is limited to a maximum of three school calendar days per trip. The principal may recommend exceptions to the School Leadership and Improvement Services Director for review and recommendation to the Superintendent and Board of Education. Exceptions shall be rare and shall require approval from the Board of Education.
6. In most cases, overnight travel within the state will be provided by District transportation or insured commercial carriers. The principal may recommend exceptions to the School Leadership and Improvement Services Director. Without exception, travel outside of the state shall be provided by insured commercial carriers. (*See Administrative Memo No. 58 - Private Cars as Transportation.*)
7. Schools shall limit fee waivers for trips to no more than two trips per student per year. A student who qualifies for a fee waiver shall only receive a waiver for the fee of a second trip if the student meets with the principal or designee and completes an action plan with the principal that includes school-related contributions.
8. Schools shall design their action plans to match a student's abilities and availability, consider a student's individual circumstances, specify the type and duration of the contribution to the school or community, and avoid interference with a student's academic and personal responsibilities.
9. Lodging for overnight trips shall be provided in a commercial lodging facility. The principal may recommend exceptions to the School Leadership and Improvement Services Director in consultation with the Assistant Superintendent of School Leadership and Improvement Services and/or the Superintendent.
10. There shall be at least one adult, either a chaperone or a supervisor, for every 10 students, with both male and female chaperones if there is a co-ed group. A District employee/teacher shall supervise all travel, and parents may be included as chaperones. Chaperones shall not bring additional guests that could have access to students without explicit permission from the school administration and all guests shall follow District policies and procedures for having access to students.

11. The Board of Education annually establishes a fee schedule that specifies the maximum fees that can be required for travel costs. All fees are subject to waivers for eligible students.
12. Students may be given opportunities to participate in school-sanctioned fundraisers to raise all or some portion of the costs. Alternatively, students may elect to pay their own -travel costs. Fundraising for travel shall conform with District policy Article V.C.11., Fundraising. Schools shall work closely with the school community regarding decisions on student travel options and only approve travel that does not exceed the District Fee Schedule and precludes students from traveling with peers.
13. The parent or legal guardian of each student participant shall submit a written release to the advisor prior to all travel events indicating permission to participate and assuming liability for foreseeable risks. The release shall also indicate acknowledgement of the school's right to send a student home from any event or activity for disciplinary reasons at the parents or guardians' expense.
14. If a student withdraws from participation or cancels travel plans, all funds generated during fundraising will remain in the team or organization's account. Fees paid out-of-pocket by students are refundable unless the fees have been spent on the student's behalf and cannot be recovered by the school. Students shall receive a disclosure containing a provision clearly establishing deadlines for payment and an explanation that non-recoverable expenses will not be refunded.
15. All costs shall be subject to the District's purchasing procedures.
16. Parents shall be offered reasonable opportunities to provide input regarding travel events for their student(s) and fundraising activities before travel plans are finalized.

B. Student Foreign Travel

The Board of Education recognizes the educational value of foreign travel. However, foreign travel does not fit within the basic program of study for which the District can assume cost or liability. Therefore, the Board does not authorize foreign travel in connection with the District, schools, or employees in their District capacities. Credit can be arranged for students participating in pre-approved study programs.

Article VIII.A.3. Fees in Public Schools

A. Purpose

The Granite School District Board of Education (Board) ensures that a free public education is provided to all Granite School District (District) students consistent with Utah Code §§53G-7-501 through 505. Pursuant to Utah laws and regulations, fees may be assessed according to an annual fee schedule adopted by the Board, and according to appropriate fee waiver and refund procedures. The purpose of this policy is to outline the District's system of assessing fees, to provide for an annual notice of the District fee schedule, and to establish appropriate fee waiver and refund procedures.

B. Definitions

1. “Fee” means any charge, deposit, rental, or other payment assessed to a student or the student’s family, however designated, whether in the form of money or goods, requested or required as a condition to a student’s participation in an activity, class, or program provided, sponsored, or supported by a school.
 - a. Fees include: (i) money or something of monetary value raised by a student or the student's family through fundraising; (ii) charges or expenditures for a school field trip or activity trip, including related transportation, food, lodging, and admission charges; (iii) payments made to a third party that provides a part of a school activity, class, or program; (iv) charges or expenditures for classroom textbooks, supplies, or materials; and (v) charges or expenditures for requested or required school activity clothing, equipment, or supplies.
 - b. Fees do not include: (i) charges related to the National School Lunch Program; (ii) student fines specifically approved by the Board for failing to return, losing, wasting, or damaging private or school property; (iii) improper use of school property; (iv) a deposit that is a pledge securing the return of school property, refunded upon the return of the school property; or (v) a charge for insurance, unless the insurance is required for a student to participate in an activity, course, or program.
2. “Fee waiver” means a full or partial release from the requirement of payment of a fee and from any provision in lieu of fee payment.
3. “Instructional equipment” means course related tools or instruments required for a student to use as part of a secondary course that becomes the property of the student upon exiting the course.

4. “Requested or required as a condition of a student’s participation” means something of monetary value that is impliedly or explicitly mandated or necessary for a student, parent, or family to provide so that a student may:
 - a. fully participate in school or in a school activity, class, or program;
 - b. successfully complete a school class for the highest grade; or
 - c. avoid a direct or indirect limitation on full participation in a school activity, class, or program, including limitations created by: (i) peer pressure, shaming, stigmatizing, bullying, or the like; or (ii) withholding or curtailing any privilege that is otherwise provided to any other student.
5. “School-sponsored activities” are District or school programs or events approved by the school principal that:
 - a. are initiated, managed, or supervised by schools, teachers, staff, or administrators;
 - b. use school facilities, equipment, or other school resources (not part of a rental or other contractual arrangement); and
 - c. are supported or subsidized by school or District funds, including the public school’s activity funds or minimum school program dollars.
6. “Textbook” means instructional material necessary for participation in a course or program, regardless of the format of the material (e.g. a book, workbook, or materials similar in function, which are required for participation in a course of instruction). “Textbook” does not include instructional equipment.

C. Fee Schedules

Consistent with this policy, the Board annually adopts a separate District fee schedule for elementary, junior high, and senior high schools in a regularly scheduled public Board meeting after two public readings. District fee schedules shall be made available to parents/guardians before the start of the school year and shall be published on the District’s website and included in registration materials. The fee schedules shall include at least the elements described below.

1. A specific maximum amount for each fee that may be charged to a student, including required group fundraising.
2. The total amount a student may be charged for any given activity, class, or program.
3. A per-student maximum fee that represents an annual aggregate amount a student may be charged for a reasonable number of activities, courses, or programs.

4. Spend plans based on projected expenditures.
5. Other fees as deemed necessary by the Board.

D. Spend Plans

The spend plans contained in District fee schedules are developed with estimates and the best information available at the time of adoption by the Board. In order to provide better information to parents/guardians, schools shall develop detailed budgets for every activity, course, or program requiring assessment of student fees. More detailed spend plans are generated from the detailed budgets and shall be published to parents prior to the commencement of the applicable activity, course, or program (season). More detailed spend plans shall include a description of anticipated types of expenditures for the current fiscal year, or as carryover for use in a future fiscal year, funded by the fee charged. Spend plans shall be regularly updated (not less than annually).

E. Notice

1. Registration materials shall include a notice to parents/guardians regarding fees and fee waivers including links to this policy and other information. The registration materials shall also include a copy of the fee schedule, a copy of forms parents may use to apply for fee waiver, and forms to appeal a fee waiver determination. Students who enroll during the school year shall also receive the same information.
2. Information shall be made available to parents/guardians in the language spoken by the family, or an administrator shall meet with parents/guardians with an interpreter to allow the parents/guardians to understand the fee waiver forms and policies.
3. The District shall seek input on the fee schedule annually from parents/guardians or other school community members. Parents shall be given notice of board meetings when the fee schedule is on the agenda. Parents are welcome to provide input on the fee schedule by speaking to school or District administrators through established communication channels.

F. Assessment of Fees

Students shall be able to enroll and participate in any class and have the opportunity to acquire all skills and knowledge to obtain full credit and the highest grades at no cost to

students or families with the exception of reasonable fees listed in the applicable fee schedule, consistent with the provisions below.

1. No general charges or fees shall be assessed for textbooks and classroom materials to elementary students. All other programs, activities, and materials considered essential or required, such as newspapers, movies, field trips, and similar items shall be made available free of charge to elementary students. A fee may be assessed for approved extracurricular and co-curricular activities at the elementary level if approved on the District fee schedule. For purposes of this policy, an elementary student is a student attending a school that provides instruction to students in kindergarten through grade 5 or 6. (Students in grade 6 served in a junior high or middle school shall be considered secondary students.)
2. Secondary students may be charged course-related fees. For purposes of this policy, a secondary student is a student enrolled at a junior high school, middle school, or senior high school that provides instruction to students grades 6 or 7 through 12. (Students in grade 6 served in an elementary school shall be considered an elementary student.)
3. Secondary students may be required to provide student supplies. For the purpose of this policy, student supplies are items that are the personal property of a student, which, although used in the instructional process, are also commonly purchased and used by persons not enrolled in the class or activity in question and have a high probability of regular use outside school-sponsored activities.
 - a. Student supplies include: pencils, paper, notebooks, crayons, scissors, basic clothing for healthy lifestyle classes, and similar personal or consumable items over which a student retains ownership.
 - b. Student supplies do not include the items listed above if the school requests or requires a specific color, brand, or specific imprint intended to create a uniform appearance not related to the basic function.
4. Materials for class projects and enrichment activities required for a secondary course shall be included in the course fee. Students may be allowed to choose optional projects or enrichment activities but shall not be required to select an optional project or enrichment activity as a condition of enrolling in or completing a course. The cost of materials for such optional projects or enrichment activities is not considered a fee and is not waivable. Costly optional projects and enrichment activities shall be avoided if they result in pressure by teachers or peers to select those options.

5. Fees may be charged to secondary students for school-sponsored extracurricular and co-curricular activities. All such fees shall be disclosed on the fee schedule and are subject to fee waiver. Such fees may include, but are not limited to the following:
 - a. charges for summer camp or other out-of-season, school-sponsored activities;
 - b. charges for uniforms, costumes, clothing, and accessories (other than items of typical student dress) which are required for participation in choirs, drill teams, athletic teams, bands, orchestras, or other student groups;
 - c. charges for specialized instruction, choreography, assistant coach stipends, or other contracted services;
 - d. charges for student travel as part of a school team, student group, and other school-approved trips, up to one trip per student per year, and a second trip if an action plan is included (See VIII.A.18 Student Travel);
 - e. charges for transportation; and/or
 - f. charges for supplies, materials, food, or other items used in a school-sponsored activity.
6. Schools may assess fees for school-sponsored driver's education programs. Fees for driver's education programs are subject to fee waiver except for costs required by the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). Fees for driver's education programs provided by a community education program are not subject to fee waivers.
7. Schools may charge a reasonable admission fee for attendance at school dances, performances, competitions, or games when those activities are not held during the school day. Admission fees may also be charged at activities sponsored by the Utah High School Activities Association (UHSAA) or by the local competitive region to which the high school belongs. Secondary students may be issued activity cards, which allow free or reduced-price admission to school-sponsored, extra-curricular activities.
8. Fees may not be charged to a student trying out for a team, program, or activity. Fees shall only be assessed after participants are selected.
9. Federal law permits schools to charge for food or drink provided as part of the Child Nutrition Program in both elementary and secondary schools. Parents may submit an application online to request free or reduced-price meals. The cost of food items available to students from vending machines, concession stands, or school stores are not fees and are not waivable.
10. A reasonable charge may be assessed to cover the cost of duplicating student transcripts when such transcripts are to be provided to the student or mailed to

colleges, universities, or places of employment. A charge will not be assessed for transcripts that are required as part of a transfer to another public or private elementary or secondary school. These charges are not considered fees. Transcripts shall not be withheld based on a student's outstanding fee balance.

11. Personal or discretionary charges or purchases for personal, consumable items such as yearbooks, class rings, letterman jackets, or other similar items are not fees and are not waivable charges except when requested or required by the school or District. Such items are subject to sales tax.
12. Charges for college credit related to a concurrent enrollment classes and charges for advanced placement examinations are not fees and are not waivable.

G. Limitation on Fees

1. No employee or duly appointed volunteer may require a fee unless it has been approved by the Board and listed on the applicable fee schedule.
2. A fee charged to a student must be equal to or less than the expense incurred by the school in providing for student activities, courses, or programs for which the fee is charged.
3. A fee charged to a student must be equal to or less than the maximum amount approved by the Board on the fee schedule.
4. No fee may supplant or subsidize any other fee.
5. Schools shall not assess higher fees to offset loss of revenue due to fee waivers.
6. Individual fundraising may be offered to offset out of pocket fees, but individual fundraising shall not be required. Group or team fundraising may be required in a non-discriminatory manner. Employees shall be sensitive to the needs and limitations of students related to fundraising. (See District Policy, Article V.C.11., Student Fundraising and Article V.C.8 Donations).

H. Fee Waivers and Appeals

Fees shall be waived for students who qualify for fee waiver under Utah law. Fees may be waived for other reasons at the discretion of the principal. Fee waivers are subject to the provisions below.

1. A parent/guardian may apply for a fee waiver by submitting a Fee Waiver Application to the school for each student. Application forms shall be made available to parents/guardians prior to the beginning of each school year.
2. A student's family may be granted a fee waiver if total household income does not exceed the amount set by the state superintendent; if the student receives Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments; if the family is receiving Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (food stamps); if the student has been placed with a foster family; or if the student is in state custody.
3. Parents/guardians, at their discretion, may apply for partial fee waiver. Those requests shall be processed in the same manner as requests for waiver of all fees. Unless parents/guardians have specifically requested a partial fee waiver, all fees must be waived completely for eligible students.
4. If a family is having a financial emergency caused by job loss, major illness, or other substantial loss of income beyond the family's control, the student may be eligible for fee waiver even if other eligibility criteria are not met. The school principal is empowered to make a determination of eligibility in such cases.
5. The following documentation may be used to verify fee waiver eligibility:
 - a. bona fide tax returns representing all household income; or secondarily, the three most recent pay stubs, which demonstrate the total contributions to the household income;
 - b. a benefit verification letter for SSI;
 - c. a letter of decision for TANF or SNAP covering the period for which the fee waiver is sought from Utah Department of Workforce Services (DWS); or
 - d. a required student-in-custody intake form and/or school enrollment letter, for students in foster care provided by the case worker from the Utah Division of Child and Family Services (DCFS).
6. Approval or denial of fee waiver applications will be determined by the school administration based on established state and federal guidelines. If the application is denied, a school administrator shall provide to the parent/guardian a Decision and Appeal Form. The form will explain the reason the application was denied and provide instructions on how to appeal the decision. If a parent/guardian appeals the denial of a fee waivers the requirement to pay the fee is suspended until the appeal is decided.

7. All information provided in the Fee Waiver Application shall be kept strictly confidential. Following the final determination of eligibility, documentation shall be returned to the parent or destroyed. The school shall keep a record of the application (the fees being requested for waiver), the fee waiver determination, and the appeal information until four (4) years after the student has left the District. Thereafter, the records shall be destroyed.
8. Fee waiver documentation may be required at any time by the school, and a parent may ask for review for good cause. Schools may transfer fee waiver information to other schools within the District to which students advance or transfer, or at which students are dually enrolled.

I. Alternatives to Fees

1. At a parent or student's request, administrators may allow service in lieu of fees or make other appropriate arrangements to allow students who cannot pay a fee the opportunity to participate in a school-sponsored activity. Service in lieu of fees may not be required of students. Principals shall work out alternative arrangements for students in a non-discriminatory manner and in consultation with parents on a case-by-case basis.
2. Alternatives to fees may include such things as a reasonable school or community service, tutoring of other students, custodial work or other service at the school, or an assignment to help on a fundraising activity.
 - a. School or community service requirements and fundraising activities must be appropriate to the age, physical condition, and maturity of the student and must be conducted in such a way that students are not subjected to embarrassment, ridicule, or humiliation.
 - b. School or community service requirements and fundraising activities must comply with federal and state regulations, avoid excessive burdens on students and families, and give proper consideration to a student's education, transportation needs, and other responsibilities.
 - c. The credit issued to a student must at least equal the minimum wage for each hour of service performed.
3. Schools may allow, but not require parents/guardians, at the school's discretion, to pay fees in installments.

J. Refund of Fees in Secondary Schools

1. Refunds of co-curricular and extracurricular fees will be determined by the school based on costs already incurred at the time of a student's withdrawal. Refunds of course and basic fees are to be given according to the following schedule:

<u>Full Year Courses</u>	<u>Semester Courses</u>	
First Four Weeks	First Two Weeks	Full Refund
First Term	First Five Weeks	3/4 Refund
Second Term	First Term	1/2 Refund
Third Term	-----	1/4 Refund
Last Nine Weeks	Second Term	No Refund

2. In the event of unpaid student fees and/or negative lunch balances, money scheduled to be refunded to a student may be applied first to outstanding school debts.
3. In the event a student transfers to a school within the District during the school year, any refund due shall be transferred to the student's new school to cover fees at that school.
4. Refunds may be made to students in cash, subject to payment procedures established by the director of accounting.

Article X.F.7. Medicaid Claims

A. Purpose

The Granite School District (District) Board of Education (Board) is committed to the appropriate use of public funds and compliance with federal and state requirements governing Medicaid claims and protecting whistleblowers.

B. Medicaid Claims and Compliance

1. The District shall submit Medicaid claims in accordance with applicable federal and state laws, regulations, Medicaid requirements, and District procedures. Claims shall be based on eligible services that were actually provided and appropriately documented.
2. Employees, contractors, and agents involved in Medicaid claims shall maintain complete and accurate records consistent with applicable Medicaid documentation and record-retention requirements. No employee, contractor, or agent shall knowingly or recklessly submit, cause to be submitted, approve, or facilitate a false or misleading Medicaid claim.

C. False Claims

1. The District prohibits false claims and other improper practices related to Medicaid reimbursement. Federal and state law prohibit conduct that includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. knowingly or recklessly submitting or causing the submission of a false or fraudulent claim;
 - b. using a false record or statement material to a claim;
 - c. billing for services that were not provided or were not provided as represented;
 - d. misrepresenting the type, quality, quantity, or nature of services provided;
 - e. improperly avoiding an obligation to repay government funds; or
 - f. offering, paying, soliciting, or receiving an unlawful payment, kickback, rebate, or other compensation related to Medicaid-funded services.
2. Violations may result in repayment obligations, civil or criminal penalties under Utah State law, exclusion from participation in Medicaid or other federal health care programs, employee discipline, contract remedies, or other relevant legal remedies.

D. Reporting and Whistleblower Protections

1. Employees, contractors, and agents are expected to promptly report any suspected fraud, waste, abuse, false claims, misuse of public funds, or other potential violations of Medicaid requirements and this policy. Reports may be made through established District reporting processes, including reporting to the Director of Accounting, the District's Financial Fraud Hotline, the District's anonymous email reporting system, or the Utah State Auditor's Fraud Hotline.
2. The District prohibits retaliation against an individual who, in good faith, reports suspected fraud, waste, abuse, including false Medicaid claims or other unlawful activity, or who participates in an investigation or other lawful activity protected under federal or state law. Individuals reporting concerns are protected as provided by the federal False Claims Act, the Utah Protection of Public Employees Act, and other applicable federal and state laws and District policies.

§18 – Reporting Fraud, Waste, and Abuse

*See also: Board Policy Article X.F.7. Medicaid Claims,
Board Policy Article V.C.14. Employee Code of Conduct*

A. Purpose

Granite School District (District) is committed to detecting, correcting, and preventing fraud, waste, and abuse. Because the District is supported by taxpayer funds, the District must maintain an educational program that is free of any fraud, waste, or abuse.

B. Policy

Reporting suspected fraud, waste or abuse for proper investigation and disposition is the responsibility of all District employees. This policy provides information, guidance, and procedures to enforce this requirement.

C. Definitions

1. “Abuse” means excessive or improper use of a thing, or to use something in a manner contrary to the natural or legal rules for its use. Examples include the following: intentional destruction, diversion, manipulation, misapplication, maltreatment, or misuse of resources; the extravagant or excessive use of something to abuse one’s position or authority. Abuse can occur in financial or non-financial settings.
2. “Fraud” means wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain. Fraud includes false representation of fact by making false statements, or by concealment of information. A person who commits fraud may do so with the intent to personally profit from the act, but this is not always the case. Fraud can be perpetrated with the intent to benefit another party, such as family members, friends, or even the District or one of its schools.
3. “Waste” means intentional or unintentional, thoughtless, or careless expenditure consumption, mismanagement, use, or squandering of resources to the detriment or potential detriment of the District. Waste also includes incurring unnecessary costs because of inefficient or ineffective practices, systems, or controls.
4. “Whistleblower” means any District employee, student, or community member who in good faith reports waste, fraud, abuse of authority, gross mismanagement, or violations of District fiscal policies to official reporting channels.

D. Examples

Examples of fraud, waste, and abuse may include but are not limited to:

1. Violations of District and/or state procurement policy.
2. Excessive or unnecessary purchases.
3. Conducting personal business on district time.
4. Inappropriate expenditures.
5. Embezzlement.
6. Forgery or alteration of documents (checks, contracts, purchase orders, invoices, time sheets, etc.)
7. Theft, unauthorized removal or willful destruction of district records or district property.

8. Misappropriation of funds, equipment, supplies, or any other asset.
9. Improprieties in the handling and reporting of financial transactions.
10. Authorizing or receiving payments for goods not received or services not performed.
11. Vendor kickbacks.
12. Misuse of authority for personal gain.
13. Any computer-related activity involving alteration, destruction, forgery or manipulation of data for fraudulent purposes.

E. Reporting

1. Each employee should be familiar with the types of improprieties that might occur within their area of responsibility and be alert for any indication of fraud.
2. Any fraud, waste, or abuse that is detected or suspected shall be reported as soon as possible. Employees who are not under the supervision of a school principal should report the activity to the administrator who oversees the employee's site or department.
3. Employees and patrons have the following avenues for reporting waste fraud and abuse:
 - a. The Granite School District contains a link titled "Report Fraud" that has instructions for submitting a report;
 - b. Employees and patrons may report to a school administrator;
 - c. The Fraud Tip Hotline, a phone number that does not record the name, email address, phone number, or location of the person reporting the irregularity. The identity of the person will remain unknown unless they choose to disclose their personal information when they submit their message. The Fraud Tip Hotline phone number is (385) 646-2049.
 - d. The Utah State Auditor's Office maintains the Utah State Auditor's Office Fraud Hotline and email address.
4. The identity of the complainant is considered protected information under the Utah Government Records Access and Management Act (Utah Code Section §63-2-304) if the complainant requests anonymity from parties outside the office. Additionally, the State whistleblower statute (Utah Code Section §67-21-3) protects government employees from reprisal by an employer for reporting, in good faith, suspected illegal acts, or waste of public funds. A complaint made to the "Report Fraud" link or the "Fraud Tip" Hotline identifying yourself, will provide the necessary communication to invoke the protection of the whistleblower statute.
5. The reporting individual must not contact the suspected individual for information. Employees shall not make any attempt to investigate the suspected activity prior to reporting it. An employee shall not destroy, or allow to be destroyed, any document or record of any kind that the employee knows may be relevant to a past, present, or future investigation of fraud, waste, or abuse.
6. Any retaliation for reports made in good faith pursuant to this policy is strictly prohibited and may result in disciplinary action. All employees shall be free of intimidation or harassment when reporting to public bodies about matters of public concern, including offering testimony to or testifying before appropriate legislative panels. All reports made under this policy are subject to federal and state whistleblower protections.
