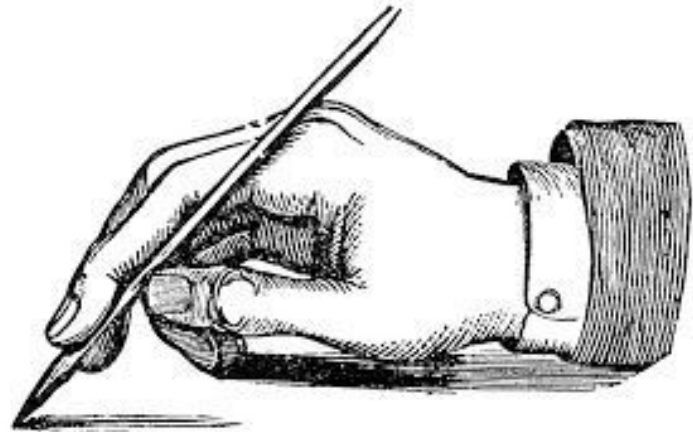

Mathematics Performance (11th Grade – Pre vs. Post Graduation Requirement)

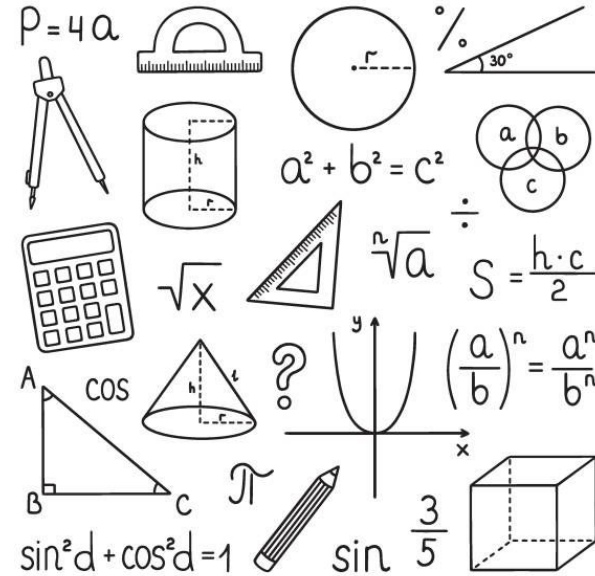

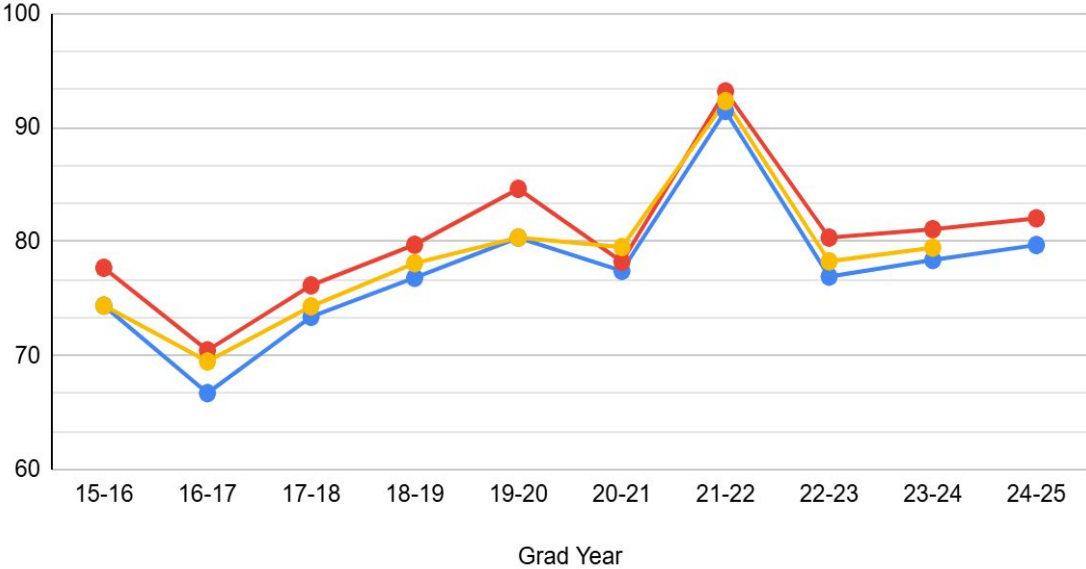
How are Graduation Rates Calculated in Oregon?

- **The Cohort:** A group of students who enter high school for the first time in a specific year.
- **Adjusted Cohort (Denominator):** The original cohort plus students who transfer in, minus students who transfer out, emigrate, or are deceased.
- **Graduates (Numerator):** Students who earn a regular or modified diploma within four years.
- **Four-Year Rate:** $\text{Students earning diploma in 4 years} / \text{Adjusted Cohort}$
- **Five-Year Rate:** An extended rate measuring students who earn a diploma or equivalent (including GED) in five years.

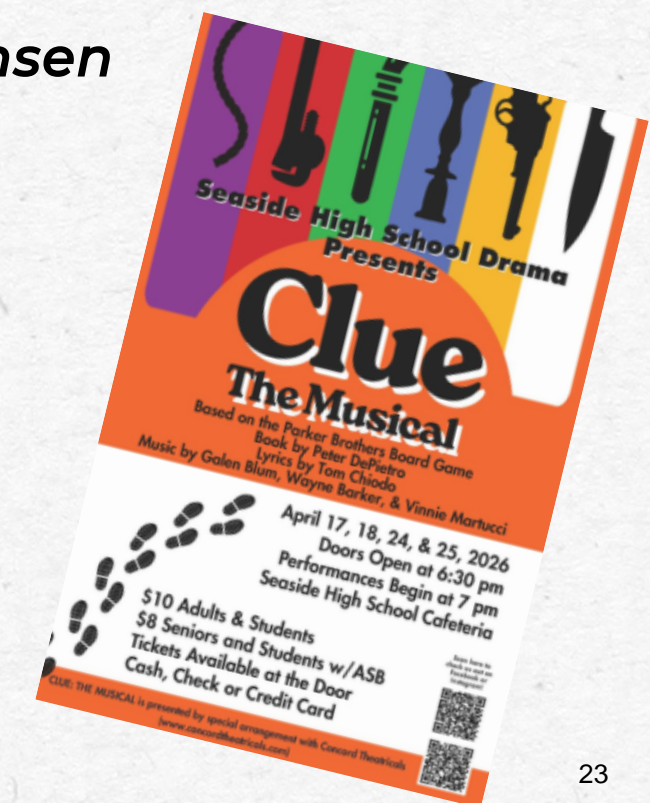

Big lessons at small coastal school take root in the dirt

Cannon Beach Academy focuses on gardening, the environment and more

On a breezy stretch of Oregon's North Coast, where forests meet the Pacific and driftwood lines the shore, a group of elementary school students learn how to care for the planet — not from textbooks, but from the soil in their hands.

They build birdhouses and worm bins. They plant seeds and harvest carrots. They talk to strangers about composting and pollinators with a kind of earnest authority only children can carry.

This spring, their classroom is expanding beyond school grounds.

Cannon Beach Academy is hosting EcoFest, a community celebration focused with the city's 12 Days of Earth Day, blending environmental education with a practical goal: helping sustain the small charter school.

"It's a little bit of both—something new and something we hope becomes annual," said MaryEllen Rogozinski, the school's executive director and PE teacher said. "We wanted to create an event that brings the community in, shows what the students are doing and help support the school financially."

The school, which serves about 25 students from kindergarten through fifth grade, operates with partial public funding, receiving roughly 80% of what it needs through Clatsop County School District. The rest must be raised independently — a challenge that prompted school leaders to think creatively.

EcoFest, Rogozinski said, became a solution with broader purpose. But the event of the effort stretched beyond the school itself — shaped in part by the decades-long work of volunteer Betty Gearen.

Two years ago, Gearen helped launch the school's garden program, stepping in as a volunteer and later expanding it into a thriving after-school Eco Kid Club that now draws most of the school's budget.

A longtime educator with a background in fire arts from the University of

Hawaii, Gearen spent decades teaching and developing curriculum, including environmental education programs across Honolulu. She founded The Green House in Hawaii, an initiative focused on sustainable living, and worked with organizations like Kohala Hawaii Foundation as garden coordinator for the ANA in Schools Program.

Now based primarily in Cannon Beach, Gearen has brought that experience with her to Cannon Beach Academy, a small coastal school with big ambitions.

"We have 35 little kids, and they're all being trained to be caretakers of our Earth," she said. "They're going to go into our communities and lead that change. It gives us hope for the future."

Under her guidance, the school has taken on an ambitious goal: becoming a "green school," where waste is minimized and sustainability is woven into daily life.

In February, Cannon Beach Academy became the first school on the Oregon coast to join the Eco-School Network, a Portland-based initiative connecting elementary schools working toward environmental sustainability. The designation is both a milestone and a starting point.

"This waste means thinking about everything differently," Gearen said. "It's a piece of paper comes

in, we use it on one side, then the other, then it goes into the worm bin and turns back into soil. It's a full-cycle way of thinking."

That cycle is visible across campus. Food scraps from the cafeteria feed into worm bins or compost piles built by students, eventually returning to the garden beds as nutrient-rich soil.

The lessons are practical, but also philosophical. "We're trying to teach the circle of life — how humans fit into it, and how we can help," Gearen said.

For students, those ideas are not abstract.

Last year, during Cannon Beach's Earth Day parade and fair, children dressed as bees, butterflies, trees and birds — many in costumes made from recycled materials — and staffed a booth where they explained composting, pollution and waste reduction to visitors.

"They're not excited to tell people what they know," Rogozinski said. "And when a child is explaining something to you, it's just different. People listen."

Gearen has seen that shift firsthand.

"In the past, adults were doing the teaching," she said. "Now the kids are."

That change, she added, can ripple outward in unexpected ways. "When kids are doing something, families follow," she said. "It's powerful when it comes from

a child."

EcoFest will build on that momentum. Visitors will be invited to make seed balls, create envelopes from recycled materials and learn how to mix environmentally friendly cleaning products — small, tangible steps toward what Gearen describes as a larger cultural shift.

"How easy it is to be green, and how much fun it is — that's what we want people to see," she said. "The event also marks both the beginning and the culmination of the school's Earth Day celebration. Students will participate in the parade and fair, and later, on Earth Day itself, return to campus to plant trees and pollinator gardens in their new outdoor learning space."

For Gearen, the work is as much about hope as it is about urgency.

Rather than focusing on the scale of climate change, she focuses on the scale of what children can do. "I don't talk about climate change in a way that's scary," she said. "I talk about what they can do to help. That's where they feel powerful."

That sense of empowerment can be seen in small moments, Gearen said. Like when students harvest vegetables they've grown themselves.

"They were pulling carrots out of the ground, washing them and eating them," Gearen said. "They were taking handfuls of them. When you grow it, you're connected to it."

Back in the garden beds and classrooms, those connections are already taking root.

For Rogozinski, EcoFest is simply an extension of what is happening every day. "The kids are our biggest advocates," she said. "They walk it all up, and then they go out and teach everyone else."

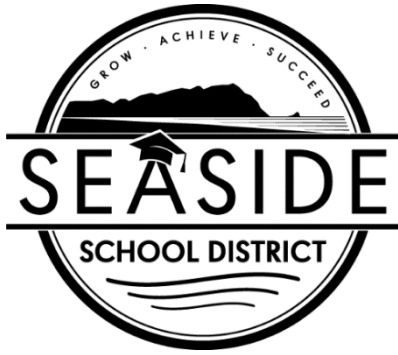

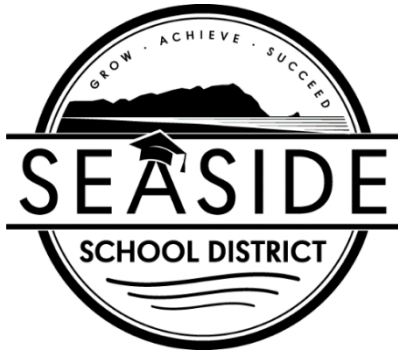

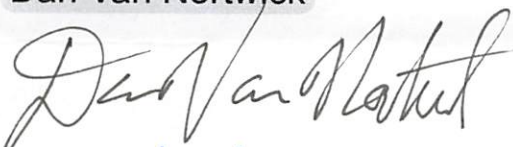

WORK AGREEMENT

It is hereby agreed between the Board of Directors of Seaside School District 10, Clatsop County, State of Oregon, and the undersigned Speech Language Pathologist that:

1. The Speech Language Pathologist shall perform assigned duties in the schools of the District for the period indicated below.
2. For such services, lawfully and properly performed, the District shall pay to the Speech Language Pathologist, at the times specified herein, the amount due, according to this work agreement, pursuant to the District's payment plan.
3. This work agreement is subject to the limitations imposed by the provisions of the local budget law.
4. This work agreement is binding unless the Speech Language Pathologist gives sixty (60) days written notice of termination to the District Superintendent.

Salary — For the period from August 24, 2026 and ending June 11, 2027 (190 days), the District shall pay the Speech Language Pathologist a salary based on the salary schedule in Appendix A.

Duties — The duties of the Speech Language Pathologist are outlined in the Speech Language Pathologist Job Description. The Speech Language Pathologist shall devote full time, skill, labor and attention to District assignments. The Speech Language Pathologist shall perform assigned responsibilities in accordance with the laws of the State of Oregon, the Oregon Administrative Rules and written District policies.

Evening Events — The Speech Language Pathologist is expected to attend evening events that are related to school district health services, per guidance from the Special Services Director.

Evaluation — The Speech Language Pathologist shall receive one formal evaluation each year.

Dismissal — The Board may dismiss the Speech Language Pathologist at any time during this work agreement for any of the reasons specified in ORS 342.865 or pursuant to ORS 342.934 (5).

Paid Leaves

Sick Leave – Any Speech Language Pathologist holding a regular full time position in the District shall be eligible for sick leave benefits of ten days a year, accumulative to an unlimited number of days. For staff not working a full school year, sick leave will be pro-rated at the rate of one day per month employed.

Personal Leave – The Speech Language Pathologist will be allowed three (3) personal leave days per year for personal matters. Unused personal leave days will accumulate and, at severance, unused personal leave will be paid at \$150 per unused day.

Bereavement Leave – Up to three (3) days shall be granted for bereavement leave for each occurrence of death in the family. A family member is defined by the Oregon Family Leave Act. The Superintendent may grant additional days.

Funeral Leave – When the Speech Language Pathologist serves as a pallbearer or in some other way participates in a funeral ceremony, they will be granted time off to perform such duty up to but not to exceed one day. The Superintendent may grant additional time.

Jury Duty – Leave of absence may be authorized for jury duty or under subpoena as a disinterested witness. There will be no deduction in pay for absence as described above, on the condition that any fees received for services performed during working hours shall be remitted to the Business Office.

Other Paid Leaves – The Superintendent may approve other paid leaves of absence

Professional Development and Renewal — Requests for workshops, seminars, conferences and in-service courses from which the District will benefit shall be made to the Superintendent. Requests for professional membership reimbursement may be submitted to the Director of Special Services. The District will pay incurred expenses agreed to by the Speech Language Pathologist and Superintendent.

Insurance — Effective September 2026 (October premium), the District shall contribute \$1,900.00 per month towards the premium for the composite rate for Medical, Dental, Orthodontia, and Vision. When an educator chooses a healthcare plan that costs less than the District provided benefit dollars, the District will contribute 100% of the excess benefit dollars to an employer funded Section 125 flexible spending account (FSA), HRA/VEBA, or HSA. Eligibility is limited to educators with excess benefit dollars provided by the employer. The Speech Language Pathologist may choose the opt out stipend of \$800 per month if they meet the qualifying conditions.

Life – The District shall provide \$25,000 of group term life insurance with accidental death and dismemberment benefits.

Term — This work agreement is effective August 24, 2026 through June 11, 2027.

Re-Employment of Retired Employees – Employees who retire from Seaside School District may be rehired to complete the current school year after retirement at the sole discretion of the District. If the employee is interested in continuing employment past the current school year, they must submit an application.

1. These employees shall remain in this employment group.
2. Employees will continue to receive health benefits, as stated per this agreement.
3. No PERS or OPSRP contributions will be made after the retirement date, unless required by law.
4. Sick leave will be in accordance with ORS 332.507 and Article 13 of this Agreement. Accumulated unused sick leave reported to PERS at retirement is not available for use thereafter.
5. Employees who have retired from the District and are subsequently re-hired, seniority shall commence with their first day of actual service following the re-hire.

Modification — The parties may, during the term of this agreement, mutually agree to modify any of its terms. Any modifications will be in writing, signed by the parties and attached to this document.

RESOLUTION #5 – 2025-2026

A RESOLUTION OF SEASIDE SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 10, CLATSOP COUNTY, OREGON AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF A TAX AND REVENUE ANTICIPATION NOTE, SERIES 2026A; AUTHORIZING PARTICIPATION IN THE OREGON EDUCATION DISTRICTS SHORT-TERM BORROWING PROGRAM SERIES 2026A; APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF DOCUMENTS; PLEDGING FULL FAITH AND CREDIT AND FUNDS DEPOSITED IN A SPECIAL ACCOUNT; AND DESIGNATING A DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVE.

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Seaside School District No. 10, Clatsop County, Oregon (the “District”), finds a need for the District to enter into a short-term note (the “Note”) to meet the District's on-going expenses; and

WHEREAS, the District has adopted or will adopt a budget, providing for the collection of ad valorem property tax revenues and other budgeted revenues; and

WHEREAS, Oregon Revised Statutes (“ORS”) Section 287A.180 permits the issuance of a tax and revenue anticipation note in a principal amount which does not exceed 80% of the taxes or other revenues, except grant moneys, that the District has budgeted or otherwise reasonably expects to have available to pay the Note and which matures within thirteen (13) months after the Note is issued; and

WHEREAS, the Oregon Education Districts Short-Term Borrowing Program (the “Program”) allows participating Oregon school districts, education service districts and community colleges (the “Participating Districts”) to simultaneously issue their notes and, collectively, provide for the issuance of the Certificate of Participation, Series 2026A (the “Certificate”) representing undivided proportionate interests in the aggregate amount of all notes of the Participating Districts; and

WHEREAS, each Participating District under the Program is required to create a special account to be known as the Series 2026A Tax Anticipation Note Payment Account, to which each Participating District shall deposit, on a date to be determined by each Participating District’s note purchase agreement (the “Note Purchase Agreement”), ad valorem taxes and other District legally available funds in anticipation of which the Note is issued in an amount sufficient to pay principal and interest on the Note at maturity, as security for the Participating District’s payment of its Note; and

WHEREAS, the District determines it is desirable to issue a Note under the Program; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF SEASIDE SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 10, CLATSOP COUNTY, OREGON RESOLVES, as follows:

Section 1. Issuance of the Note. The District is hereby authorized to enter into the Note in a principal amount not to exceed \$6,530,000. The proceeds of the Note shall be used to pay on-going expenses of the District, as well as the estimated cost of issuance of the Note and the District’s proportionate share of the estimated cost of issuance of the Certificate. The Chair, Superintendent, or Business Manager or a designee of any of those officials is designated as the District Representative (each a “District Representative”) to act on behalf of the District under this Note Resolution.

Section 2. Participation in Program. The District hereby authorizes and approves of participation in the Program with other Participating Districts. The District Representative is authorized to submit this Note Resolution to Piper Sandler & Co., as evidence of the participation by the District.

Section 3. Distribution, Use of and Provision for Payment of the Note. The Note proceeds less costs of issuance shall be deposited in the District's general fund, as a budget resource, as appropriated by the District. The District covenants to appropriate sufficient funds for the payment of principal and interest on the Note to its maturity date. The District shall establish a separate Series 2026A Tax Anticipation Note Payment Account, to which the District shall deposit, on a date determined by the Note Purchase Agreement, funds to pay the Note before the maturity date. Investment earnings, after full funding of the Series 2026A Tax Anticipation Note Payment Account may be transferred to the District's general fund.

Section 4. Security for the Note. The Note is payable from the District's legally available funds including the District's ad valorem property taxes subject to the limits of Article XI, Sections 11 and 11b of the Oregon Constitution. Pursuant to ORS 287A.315, the District hereby pledges its full faith and credit and taxing power to the payment of principal of and interest on the Note. The District also hereby pledges the amounts in the Series 2026A Tax Anticipation Note Payment Account to the payment of principal and interest on the Note.

Section 5. Estimated Cost of Issuance of the Certificate. The District agrees to pay its proportionate share of the estimated cost of issuance of the Certificate from proceeds of the Note.

Section 6. Notice of Events to Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board. If required by the Note Purchase Agreement, the District agrees to provide or cause to be provided to the MSRB, in a timely manner not in excess of ten business days after the occurrence of the event, notice of any of the following events with respect to the Note:

- a. principal and interest payment delinquencies;
- b. non-payment related defaults, if material;
- c. unscheduled draws on debt service reserves reflecting financial difficulties;
- d. unscheduled draws on credit enhancements reflecting financial difficulties;
- e. substitution of credit or liquidity providers, or their failure to perform;
- f. adverse tax opinions, the issuance by the Internal Revenue Service of proposed or final determinations of taxability, Notices of Proposed Issue (IRS Form 5701-TEB) or other material notices or determinations with respect to the tax status of the security, or other material events affecting the tax status of the security;
- g. modifications to rights of security holders, if material;
- h. bond calls, if material, and tender offers;
- i. defeasances;
- j. release, substitution, or sale of property securing repayment of the securities, if material;
- k. rating changes;
- l. bankruptcy, insolvency, receivership or similar event of the obligated person; (Note: For the purposes of the event identified in this paragraph 1, the event is considered to occur when any of the following occur: The appointment of a receiver, fiscal agent or similar officer for an obligated person in a proceeding under the U.S. Bankruptcy Code or in any other proceeding under state or federal law in which a court or governmental authority has assumed jurisdiction over substantially all of the assets or business of the

obligated person, or if such jurisdiction has been assumed by leaving the existing governing body and officials or officers in possession but subject to the supervision and orders of a court or governmental authority, or the entry of an order confirming a plan of reorganization, arrangement or liquidation by a court or governmental authority having supervision or jurisdiction over substantially all of the assets or business of the obligated person.)

m. the consummation of a merger, consolidation, or acquisition involving an obligated person or the sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the obligated person, other than in the ordinary course of business, the entry into a definitive agreement to undertake such an action or the termination of a definitive agreement relating to any such actions, other than pursuant to its terms, if material;

n. appointment of a successor or additional trustee or the change of name of a trustee, if material;

o. incurrence of a financial obligation of the District if material, or agreement to covenants, events of default, remedies, priority rights, or other similar terms of a financial obligation of the District, any of which affect security holders, if material. For the purposes of this paragraph and the paragraph below, “financial obligation” means a (i) debt obligation; (ii) derivative instrument entered into in connection with, or pledged as security or a source of payment for, an existing or planned debt obligation; or (iii) a guarantee of (i) or (ii); the term “financial obligation” shall not include municipal securities as to which a final official statement has been provided to the MSRB consistent with the Rule; and

p. default, event of acceleration, termination event, modification of terms, or other similar events under the terms of a financial obligation of the District, any of which reflect financial difficulties.

The District may from time to time choose to provide notice of the occurrence of certain other events, in addition to those listed above, if, in the judgment of the District, such other event is material with respect to the Note, but the District does not undertake any commitment to provide such notice of any event except those events listed above.

Section 7. Delegation of Authority. The District Representative is hereby authorized, on behalf of the District and without further action by the Board, to:

a. determine the principal amount, interest rates, payment dates, prepayment rights and all other terms of the Note;

b. execute a Trust Agreement to certificate the Note payments with the payment of the notes of other Participating Districts, execute the Note Purchase Agreement and execute other documents and take other actions required by the Program and to provide for the issuance of the Certificate;

c. approve and authorize the distribution of a preliminary official statement and a final official statement, if required by the Program;

d. obtain one or more ratings or credit enhancement for the Note, if required by the Program;

e. if applicable, designate the Note as a “qualified tax-exempt obligation” within the meaning of Section 265(b)(3)(B) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the “Code”);

f. determine whether the Note will bear interest that is excludable from gross income under the Code and enter into covenants to maintain the excludability of interest on the Note from gross income; and

g. execute and deliver any other documents and take any other actions which the District Representative determines are desirable to carry out this Note Resolution.

Section 8. Execution of Program Documents. The District Representative shall provide certified copies of the proceedings of the District as contemplated by this Note Resolution, executed documents authorized for execution herein and such other documents as may be necessary or desirable under the Program for the closing of Note.

Section 9. Professionals. The District selects Piper Sandler & Co., as Underwriter or Placement Agent for the Note, and Hawkins Delafield & Wood LLP as Bond Counsel for the Note.

Section 10. Effective Date. This Note Resolution shall take effect on the date of its adoption by the Board.

Admission of Nonresident Students

The district may enroll nonresident students as follows:

1. **Interdistrict Transfer Agreement.** By written consent of the affected school boards, the student becomes a resident student of the attending district thereby allowing the attending district to receive State School Fund moneys;
2. **Tuition Paying Student.** By admitting nonresident student with tuition, whereby neither affected districts are eligible for State School Fund moneys;
3. **Court Placement.** If a juvenile court determines it is in the student's best interest, a student placed in a substitute care program outside the district will continue to be considered a resident student and allowed to attend the school the student attended prior to placement. The public agency placing the student in a substitute care program will be responsible for the transportation of the student, if public agency funds are available.

The Board shall deny regular school admission to nonresident students who are under expulsion from another district for a weapons policy violation. The Board may, based on district criteria, deny regular school admission to nonresident students who are under expulsion from another district for reasons other than a weapons policy violation.

Consent for Admission of a Nonresident Student by Interdistrict Transfer or Consent for Admission of a Tuition Paying Student

Annually, by April 1, the Board shall establish the number of student transfer requests into the district, and out of the district, to which consent will be given for the upcoming school year.

The Board may not consider nor ask for any information from the student about race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, ethnicity, national origin, disability, health, whether a student has an individualized education program (IEP) or the terms of that IEP, identified as talented and gifted, income level, residence, proficiency in English, athletic ability, or academic records. The Board may not request or require the student to participate in an interview, tour any of the schools or facilities, or otherwise meet with any representatives of the school or district prior to the district deciding whether to give consent.

The Board may only ask for the student's name, contact information, date of birth, grade level, whether the student may be given priority on consent for admission (see the following paragraph for priorities), information about which schools the student prefers to attend, and whether the student is currently expelled.

If the number of students seeking consent exceeds the number of spaces, the Board will use an equitable lottery selection process. The process may give priority to students who have siblings currently enrolled in

the district; who previously received consent for admission because of a change in legal residence; or who attended a public charter school located in the same district in which the student seeks to attend, for three consecutive years, completed the highest grade offered by the public charter school, and did not enroll and attend school in another district following completion of that highest grade in the public charter school.

The Board may revise the maximum number of students to whom consent will be given at a time other than the annual date established by the Board if there are no pending applications for consent.

If the Board decides not to give consent to a student the Board must provide a written explanation to the student.

The district may require minimum standards of behavior and/or attendance once the student has been accepted. The minimum standards must be the same for all students that are given consent. The district is not allowed to establish minimum standards for academics as a criteria for the student to remain in the district. Students whose consent is revoked for violation of set attendance and/or behavior standards will not be allowed to apply for consent to return to this district in the same or the following school year.

The Board may determine the length of time the consent is given. Any limitations in length of time must be applied consistently among all students to whom consent is given.

The district is not required to provide transportation outside the boundaries of the district. The student will be allowed to use existing bus routes and transportation services of the district. Transportation will be provided if required by federal law.

The attending district is responsible for a free appropriate public education for those students on an IEP.

Safe Public School Choice Transfer Requests

An interdistrict transfer¹ may be permitted in the event a student has been a victim of a violent criminal offense occurring in or on the grounds of a school the student attends, or the student attends a school identified as persistently dangerous and all other district schools the student may transfer to are also identified as persistently dangerous or there is no other district school to which the student may transfer. The transfer must be to a safe school.

Homeless Student

A homeless student residing in the district and the student's parent, or in the case of an unaccompanied student, the district's liaison for homeless students, may request that the student attend their school of origin² located out-of-district. The request will be considered based on the best interest of the student. The

¹ Districts are encouraged, but not required, to explore other appropriate options such as an agreement with a neighboring district to accept transfer students if there is not another school in the district in which the student legally resides for the transferring student.

² "School of origin" means the school that a student attended when permanently housed or the school in which the student was last enrolled. When the student has completed the final grade served by the school of origin, the term "school of origin" shall include the designated receiving school at the next grade level for all feeder schools.

student may continue in their school of origin for the duration of the student’s homelessness. Transportation will³ be provided in accordance with law.

The superintendent is directed to establish procedures for the review of any student request to attend school in another district. See policy JECBD and its administrative regulation.

Admission of Nonresident Students

By January 15 of each year, the principals will establish an approximate number of nonresident students their respective buildings can accommodate for the following school year.

Nonresident students may only be admitted with tuition, with the exception of students who become “resident pupils” by one of the following methods:

1. By written consent of affected school boards (interdistrict transfer);
2. A foreign exchange student attending a district school on a J-1 Visa; or
3. A court placement.

The amount of tuition will be established by July 1 of each year. Each admitted tuition paying student will be charged the same amount of tuition.

The district is not required to provide transportation outside the boundaries of the district. The student will be allowed to use existing bus routes and transportation services of the district. Transportation will be provided if required by federal law.

A written appeal for a denied request may be made to the Board whose decision, based upon review, will be final.

Consent for Admission of a Nonresident Student by Interdistrict Transfer

1. The Board shall establish the number of student transfer requests into the district, to which consent will be given for the upcoming school year, by April 1.
2. The application for admission must go through the district office, which will then submit the petition to the superintendent’s office.
3. Admission and annual renewal must be approved by the superintendent.
4. Students receiving consent for admission may remain in the district for the school year. The student will not need to seek permission more than once from the same district of origin, to transfer to this district.

Consent for Admission of a Tuition-Paying Student

1. The application for admission must go through the district office, which will then submit the petition to the superintendent's office.
2. Admission and annual renewal must be approved by the superintendent.
3. Admission of students paying tuition will result in a tuition agreement between the parties and will be filed with the business office for billing and payment control.
4. The business manager shall prepare semester bills for all tuition paying students, and any student whose tuition remains unpaid 15 days after presentation of bills shall be excluded; the superintendent may grant additional time for payment should circumstances warrant it.
5. Students receiving consent may remain in the district for the school year.

Interdistrict Transfer – 2026-2027

In compliance with ORS 339.133 and amended by HB 2747 (2013) and HB 4007 (2014), Seaside School District will accept the following number of students from other school districts for the 2026-2027 school year.

Kindergarten – Eighth Grade	0
Ninth – Twelfth Grade	20

A Request for Nonresident Student Admission form, that includes the student’s name and 2026-2027 grade level, must be received by the Superintendent at 2600 Spruce Drive, Suite 100, Seaside, Oregon 97138 by June 30, 2026.

If the number of students seeking consent exceeds the number of spaces, the Board will use an equitable lottery selection process. The process may give priority to students who have siblings currently enrolled in the district; who previously received consent for admission because of a change in legal residence; or who attended a public charter school located in the same district in which the student seeks to attend, for three consecutive years, completed the highest grade offered by the public charter school, and did not enroll and attend school in another district following completion of that highest grade in the public charter school.

Enrollment of transfer students will be based on each student maintaining regular attendance (no more than 15 absences each year), no drug or alcohol suspensions, and no behaviors that result in multiple suspensions. Students must also meet the participation guidelines for all activities overseen by the Oregon School Activities Association.
