MINUTES OF BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING
February 28, 2023

The Board of Education of Jordan School District met in study, general, and closed sessions on Tuesday, February 28, 2023, beginning at 4:03 p.m. at JATC South (Board Conference Room), 12723 S. Park Avenue (2080 West), Riverton, Utah. The sessions were also provided electronically via YouTube.

President Miller presided and conducted. The Board of Education met in a study session to discuss the following:

A. Continued Discussion on Fee Schedule for 2023-24

President Miller explained that Utah law requires the Board to have two public comment opportunities on the proposed fee schedule before it is approved. She invited Brad Sorensen and Cody Curtis, Administrators of Schools, to give a brief discussion about changes made to the schedule and noted the first opportunity for public comment will be during tonight's general session.

Brad Sorensen, Administrator of Schools, briefly reviewed the fee schedule changes, in particular the addition of wording that will allow for flexibility to reduce fees if costs are less than expected. He highlighted the approval process, forms, and notification required for all school fee assessments.

Cody Curtis, Administrator of Schools, noted all proposed fee schedules have been posted at proposedfees.jordandistrict.org and said accountability is handled at a school level, with Administrators of Schools meeting monthly with principals to review their budgets and spend plans. Mr. Larsen added that an independent auditor reviews the finances of all high schools, half of the middle schools, and one-third of the elementary schools each year.

B. Unfunded Bus Route for Western Springs Subdivision

Scott Thomas, Administrator of Auxiliary Services reported on the recent annual review of the infrastructure of the Western Springs property. He met with the engineering staff at Riverton City and asked about a timeline and intent to complete the area. He read a statement from the city stating that with unknown timelines, they are unable to provide safe passage for students in the area. Mr. Thomas

said there are 61 riders on one bus this year with as many as 90 riders projected in the near future. This creates the need for a second bus that could increase costs to \$80,000 for two buses.

Brian Barnett said he will continue discussions with Riverton City and all Board members agreed to not renew funding for the bus, as they feel the city should assume this responsibility. It was noted the deadline is April 1, 2023 to make a decision on funding.

By request from Mr. Robinson, Board President Miller called for a motion to table agenda item B.

MOTION: It was moved by Darrell Robinson and seconded by Niki George to table agenda item B until April 1, 2023. If there is no other city proposal by this date, notification will be sent to parents about the discontinued unfunded bus route for the Western Springs subdivision. The motion passed with a unanimous vote.

Mr. Thomas also gave an update about the other unfunded bus route by Herriman Main Street and Oakleaf Elementary School. He said city engineers assured him that work will be done on Herriman Main Street and a safe walking route will be established in order to eliminate the shuttle by August 1, 2023. Mr. Thomas said he will work with administration to get this information to parents.

C. Legislative Updates

Tracy Miller, Board President, thanked Dr. Mike Anderson, Associate Superintendent, for his open communication and good rapport with legislators and asked him to report on several current bills that affect public education. He shared a list of proposed funding, noting that overall approximately \$450 million is earmarked for public education, including the following:

- \$240 million for a teacher salary increase, with \$42 Million for private schools
- 6% increase in the WPU (Weighted Pupil Unit)
- \$175 million increase in Land Trust funds
- \$75 million one-time funds for capital improvements, not to be used for building schools
- \$64 million one-time funds for paid professional development for teachers
- \$30 million for one-time funds for WPU distribution among districts in small counties
- \$25 million for full-time kindergarten
- \$2.5 million for Beverly Taylor Sorenson Arts programs
- \$19 million public education funding equalization funds
- \$15 million one-time funds for teen centers for students experiencing homelessness
- \$3 million for foreign language education (DLI) funding

In addition, Dr. Anderson shared information on the following bills of interest:

- HB175, sponsored by Representative Strong, allocates \$35 million in one-time funding for elementary and secondary school fees and allows for a five year period to eliminate all curricular fees.
- HB372, sponsored by Representative Cobb, addresses actions of a local school district that may be subject to a referendum.
- SB55, sponsored by Senator Fillmore, allows for the school board to approve instruction materials districtwide. This bill recently passed and will be effective July 1, 2023.
- HB138, sponsored by Representative Ballard, requires vendors to notify districts if there are changes to established curriculum materials. This bill passed the House and is going to the Senate.
- HB308, sponsored by Representative Welton, removes letter grading of schools.
- SB183, sponsored by Senator Vickers, allows for educator salary amendments due to inflation.

Mr. Dunford requested a summary be sent to Board members and Dr. Anderson agreed to send out the presentation he is sharing with principals.

D. Board Priorities

President Miller explained Board priorities should define what the Board should be focused on at the current time. She asked Board members to rate suggested priorities included on the list the Board created at the last Board meeting (attachment #2). The following results are the Board's current priorities, decided by this process, in order of importance:

1. Education Support Professionals (ESP) shortages
2. Building plan and defining student success
3. Attracting and retaining quality licensed employees
4. Bringing unrestricted fund balance back to the 21-25% range

Mr. Barnett asked to define "quality" licensed employees and it was suggested to substitute 'qualified' or 'highly effective'. Ms. Richards also requested the Board look into ways to retain veteran teachers and it was decided this could be a future Board discussion. The Executive Committee agreed to bring back a plan to the March 14, 2023 Board meeting for addressing the top three priorities.

E. Continued Discussion on Ends Policy E404 *Safety and Security*

Niki George, Board First Vice President, said she posted a draft of Policy E404 with the addition of two items discussed in the last Board meeting regarding providing a safe learning environment:

1. Timely communication to families (coordinated with police) if an emergency should occur
2. Parents will receive a yearly communication containing safety procedures and protocol

Brian Barnett requested links be added in this Ends policy, particularly regarding the "updated District Plan" as well as in other online policies. In discussion, there was concern about updating and maintaining links and the possibility of inconsistencies. It was suggested to add an appendix with "helpful links" at a later date.

Mr. Barnett asked about assessing an emotionally safe environment for schools. Due to time limitations, President Miller requested the Board take a short break before and address this question in a second study session following the general session.

At 6:15 p.m., the meeting adjourned. The general session started at 6:32 p.m.

She also congratulated this school for completing all WIDA testing for 264 students.

Ms. Dean reported that West Jordan High School had a successful performance of “Midsummer Night’s Dream” and their boys and girls basketball teams, coached by Christian Wouden and Lei Lolohea, went to the State competition. In addition, Ms. Dean recognized nine members of the West Jordan High School wrestling team that qualified for the State competition and their coach, Matt Lloyd as well as the school’s swim coach, Sara Mitchell who has grown the program substantially in the past few years.

Marilyn Richards said she attended the State Drill competition and congratulated Copper Hills High, Herriman High, Mountain Ridge High, and Bingham High for their performances; she noted that Bingham High won first place in the state. Ms. Richards also reported School Community Council meetings are going well and they are busy getting TSSA and Land Trust plans ready for approval.

She also thanked all who helped with snow removal after the recent snow days. She noted that the Communications department did a great job getting important weather-related information out to parents and employees.

Darrell Robinson said he attended the State DECA competition and congratulated Jordan District DECA participants and CTE Director Jason Skidmore for their efforts. He invited a CTE representative from each school to address the Board, describing program highlights offered in their DECA clubs. The following schools were represented by students who gave a brief report on their experiences with DECA:

Mr. Robinson announced that districtwide 51 students will be going to the national DECA convention and he congratulated them for their accomplishments.

Superintendent's Recognitions

Superintendent Godfrey noted the many years of professional industry experience Mr. Redd brings to students in the classroom, and commended him for all he does for students. Dr. Godfrey said Andrea Call has been involved with DECA since 2017, has taken students to the national competition each year, and has been featured in a recent Supercast.

Both Mr. Redd and Ms. Call thanked the Board for their support of the program.

Review of the 2023-24 Fee Schedule

Brad Sorensen gave a brief review of the fee schedule process. He said schools put together spend plans which are reviewed by principals. They are then discussed with administration and support staff and posted on <https://proposedfees.jordandistrict.org/> where patrons can review them. Opportunity is given for patron comment and the final approval is due by April 1, 2023.

West Jordan City Mayor Dirk Burton said he appreciates the relationship between the District and West Jordan Police in handling emergency situations in schools. He commended the District and West Jordan High School for how they handled a recent perceived emergency situation and coordinated with the police to resolve everything quickly. Mayor Burton also thanked the Board for allowing the city to continue the D.A.R.E. program in schools in West Jordan.

Purpose: To purchase sixteen (16) new special education school buses to replace older existing busses for Transportation.

Budget: Transportation Capital Outlay Buses

Recommendation: It was recommended placing the order with Lewis Bus Group who was the only bidder on state contract with CNG buses available. The company complied with the specifications, terms, and conditions outlined in the bid documents. State Contract: MA066

MOTION: It was moved by Marilyn Richards and seconded by Niki George to approve the bid for Special Education buses for Transportation, as recommended. The motion passed with a unanimous vote.

1. What impact are you seeing by the changes implemented this year, regarding the Board-funded plan the superintendent presented in September of 2022?
2. What can be done to fill existing Education Support Professionals job vacancies? What ideas can you bring to the Board to help mitigate those vacancies or fill them?

Niki George, Government Relations Chair, said the committee has been diligent in meeting weekly during the legislative session to discuss new legislation and will continue to meet until the session concludes.

Tracy Miller, Utah School Board Association and Jordan Education Foundation Representative, gave a reminder of the USBA spring meeting on March 8, 2023. She also announced that during the next few weeks, the Foundation will be recognizing Outstanding Educators and a banquet will be held of April 14, 2023 for the top twelve. Ms. Miller will send out a schedule so Board members can be present when the award winners receive the news.

President Miller reminded Board members of the summer study session scheduled for July 18, 2023 beginning at 1:00 p.m.

President Miller presided and conducted. The Board of Education met in a study session to discuss the following:

A. Update to Board Policy E400 *Safety and Security*

Board First Vice President Niki George reminded Board members that in the prior Board meeting, there was interest in exploring ways to measure social and emotional wellness in schools. Travis Hamblin, director of Student Services, was invited to inform the Board of the measurement tools currently being used in the District.

Mr. Hamblin discussed the following Health and Wellness tools: Panorama, Positive Behavior and Intervention Supports (PBIS), Comprehensive School Threat Assessment Guidelines (CSTAG), Bark, SafeUT, Mental Health Access Program (MHAP), school wellness rooms, and school counselors.

Dr. Godfrey noted the District mental health resources are helping administrators better respond to concerns and the annual climate survey helps assess the perception of safety in schools. He agreed to adding a reference to "receiving reports" on the mental and physical safety in schools to policy E400 and said he will bring back a draft of the policy to the March 21, 2023 Board meeting.

B. Discussion on Proposed Graduation Speaking Assignments for the Class of 2023

Brad Sorensen, administrator of schools, asked Board members to decide the school(s) at which they would like to speak and/or attend for this year's graduation exercises.

Board members discussed the assignments and provided Mr. Sorensen with the information he requested. Mr. Sorensen stated that he would send a copy of the finalized list of assignments to each Board member and he would also inform principals and school personnel of the assignments so graduation program preparation can proceed.

C. Legislative Update

Dr. Michael Anderson provided a legislative update, reviewing bills that will impact Jordan School District and/or public education. He noted it was a record year for education funding and provided a quick guide on BoardDocs of the results of this year's legislative session.

Mr. Larsen expressed frustration that although there will be a significant increase in education-related funding, a majority of the funds are restricted. Dr. Anderson said this may reduce the flexibility for spending the funds, but expressed appreciation for legislators and the funding they allocated for education.

Dr. Anderson said the USBE will create State Board rule based on the new legislation and implementation will begin on July 1, 2023. Dr. Godfrey said he and Business Administrator John Larsen will attend a two-day meeting in April of 2023 where USBE will provide more training on the new legislation.

D. Board Priorities

President Miller said the Board is working on its top two priorities identified in the last Board meeting: 1) Education Support Professional hiring shortages, and 2) The five-year building and bond plan. She asked Dr. Godfrey to explain ways he has worked with Cabinet members and directors to help with the hiring and retention of employees and he highlighted the following:

- Increased time was allocated during the summer for elementary assistants to get work done.
- The following positions moved from part-time to full-time: hall monitors and high school Camp-and-Clinic aides.
- The following positions moved to a higher lane on the salary pay scale: Nutrition Services technical support staff and six-hour employees; full-time custodial assistants (if they complete the required training), maintenance workers, transportation routers, high school "lane 2" administrative assistants, and warehouse drivers.
- Valley High School daycare assistants received increased working hours
- Substitute teacher bonus incentives were offered to substitutes with no cancellations
- Special Education support staff received increases. This is the largest investment and changes go into effect April 1, 2023.

Dr. Godfrey thanked the Board for allocating more resources for Special Education staff and said he will send an update to Board members of what jobs still need to be filled. President Miller said they will continue looking into ways to address this priority in future Board meetings.

Due to time constraints, President Miller said the Board would adjourn and reconvene in study session after the Special Session.

At 6:30 p.m., the meeting adjourned. The Board convened in a special Board meeting beginning at 6:32 p.m.

President Miller addressed the second top priority identified by Board members, explaining the five-year building plan was in the process of being reviewed by the Facilities Committee. After they have revised the plan, it will be brought to the Finance Committee who will discuss ways to finance the proposed construction. Board members agreed with moving forward as planned with developing the five-year building proposal.

E. Housing and Enrollment Continuum

He shared an elementary and secondary chart that distinguished three categories of housing considerations: preferable, acceptable, and undesirable; and he asked Board members if there should be revisions.

After discussion, the decision was made to swap the order of two items on the elementary chart: “modified traditional” and “change boundaries.” The only change designated for the secondary chart was to change the wording “eliminate electives” to “reduce electives.”

F. Professional Development Board Book Study

President Miller invited Board members to participate in discussion on the third part of *Redefining Student Success* by Ken Kay and Suzie Boss. Board members commented on addressing the “why” of doing things, developing a good definition of what student success means, “going slower to go faster”, and keeping a “green light” culture in the District.

G. Board Member, Committee, and Superintendent Reports and Comments

Facilities Advisory Committee Chair Marilyn Richards reported the committee met March 7, 2023 and are working on the Ongoing Building Plan. She said they also recently took a tour of property owned by Jordan District with new Board members Brian Barnett and Lisa Dean.

Lisa Dean, Jordan Ethnic Advisory Committee Chair, said she attended a recent open house that was very informative.

Outside Close of Escrow:	The later of (i) thirty (30) days after expiration of the Feasibility Period, or (ii) fifteen (15) days after recordation of the plat creating the Property as a separate legal parcel.

Seller Closing Costs:	50% of escrow fees and recording costs, 100% of rollback taxes, if any, a standard coverage title policy and curative endorsements.

In the event there is a conflict between the terms set forth in this Summary and those in the Agreement, the terms of the Agreement shall control.

AGREEMENT

1. Agreement to Purchase/Sell.

Seller hereby agrees to sell, convey and assign to Buyer, and Buyer agrees to buy and accept from Seller, under the terms and conditions and for the purchase price hereinafter set forth, that certain real property located in West Jordan City (the “**City**”), Salt Lake County (the “**County**”), State of Utah and generally described in **Exhibit B**, and subject to adjustment as described in Section 3(c) below (the “**Land**”), together with any and all rights, privileges and easements appurtenant to the Land owned by Seller (hereinafter collectively referred to as the “**Property**”).

2. Purchase Price.

The purchase price to be paid by Buyer at the Close of Escrow for the Property (the “**Purchase Price**”) is Three Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,300,000.00).

Prior to the Closing Date, Seller shall retain an independent appraiser and shall, at its sole cost and expense, obtain an appraisal in order to determine the fair market value of the Property (“**FMV Amount**”). Notwithstanding the foregoing, Seller has agreed to sell the Property to Buyer for the Purchase Price and Seller and Buyer agree that the difference between the FMV Amount and the Purchase Price shall be deemed a donation by Seller to Buyer as consideration of the ongoing Seller/Buyer partnership to proactively plan for and locate schools and other educational amenities within walkable, sustainable neighborhoods to expand holistic learning opportunities and improve the quality of life for Wood Ranch residents and the broader community.

Buyer shall deposit into Escrow (as defined in Section 4) cash in the amount of \$100,000.00 within five (5) business days of the Opening of Escrow (the “**Deposit**”). The Deposit shall be placed by Escrow Holder in an interest bearing account at the written request of Buyer. Except as otherwise expressly provided herein, the Deposit shall be applied as follows: (i) in the event that Close of Escrow occurs, the entire amount of the Deposit and any interest thereon shall be credited against the Purchase Price concurrently with the Close of Escrow; or (ii) in the event this Agreement is terminated after the expiration of the Feasibility Period (as defined below) for any reason except as a result of a default by Seller or a failure of a condition precedent to Close of Escrow, the Deposit and any interest thereon shall be non-refundable to Buyer, shall be automatically released to Seller and shall constitute the liquidated damages of Seller pursuant to Section 12 below.

3. Contingencies.

Buyer’s obligation to purchase the Property is conditioned on the following conditions precedent to Buyer’s obligation to close:

(a) Title & Survey.

(i) Within five (5) business days following the Opening of Escrow, Seller shall cause to be delivered to Buyer a preliminary title commitment on the Property (the “**Title**”

Commitment”), together with legible copies of all documents (the “**Exception Documents**”) relating to the title exceptions referred to in the Title Commitment.

(ii) Within fifteen (15) business days of Buyer’s receipt of the Title Commitment and the Exception Documents, Buyer shall notify Seller and Escrow Holder in writing of all disapproved title matters (the “**Disapproved Title Matters**”). All matters shown on the Title Commitment, except for Seller Liens (as defined below), as to which Buyer does not provide a written objection before the end of such 15 business-day period shall constitute “**Permitted Exceptions**”. Buyer’s failure to so notify Seller and Escrow Holder shall be deemed to mean that all title matters set forth in the Title Commitment are Permitted Exceptions. Within ten (10) business days after Seller receives Buyer’s written notification of any Disapproved Title Matters, Seller shall notify Buyer and Escrow Holder in writing of any Disapproved Title Matters which Seller is unable or unwilling to cause to be removed or insured against to Buyer’s reasonable satisfaction. Seller’s failure to give such notice shall be deemed to be notice that Seller will not cause all Disapproved Title Matters to be removed or insured against. Buyer shall then, within seven (7) business days of its receipt of Seller’s notice (or deemed notice) stating that Seller will not remove or insure against any of such Disapproved Exceptions, elect, by giving written notice to Seller and Escrow Holder, either (A) to terminate this Agreement, or (B) to waive its disapproval of such exceptions (such exceptions shall then be deemed to be Permitted Exceptions). Buyer’s failure to give such notice shall be deemed an election to waive its disapproval of such exceptions.

(iii) If the Title Company, prior to Close of Escrow, discloses to Buyer a new exception, or amends any exception previously approved by Buyer, or amends the terms under which the Title Company is willing to issue its policy of title insurance, then Buyer shall have seven (7) business days from its receipt of such disclosure, together with legible copies of all documents mentioned in such disclosure, to disapprove the same by written notice to Seller and Escrow Holder. Buyer’s failure to so notify Seller shall be deemed to mean that such disclosures are acceptable to Buyer. Any such disapproved disclosures shall be treated as Disapproved Title Matters and the procedures therefor set forth in Section 3(a)(ii) above shall be implemented.

(iv) Seller shall not be obligated to remove or secure title insurance over any Disapproved Title Matters other than monetary liens and monetary encumbrances created or suffered by Seller (“**Seller Liens**”) which are to be released from the Property upon the payment thereof out of Seller’s proceeds from the Escrow.

(v) Buyer, at its sole cost and expense, shall, not later than twenty (20) business days after the Effective Date, obtain a survey of the Property (an “**ALTA Survey**”) and Buyer shall deliver a copy of the ALTA Survey to Seller. Seller shall cooperate with Buyer and the surveyor to enable the surveyor to prepare the ALTA Survey, including, without limitation, permitting the surveyor to have access to the Property at all reasonable times. Buyer shall have until the later of (i) ten (10) business days after Buyer’s receipt of the Title Commitment and the Exception Documents, and (ii) five (5) business days following receipt of the Survey to notify Seller of Buyer’s approval or disapproval of the any survey-related exceptions and/or any survey-related exceptions that Title Company indicates will appear on the ALTA Policy (collectively, the “**Survey Matters**”). Buyer’s failure to so notify Seller of any such disapproval of any Survey Matters shall be deemed to mean that such matters are acceptable to Buyer. Any such disapproved Survey Matters shall be treated as Disapproved Title Matters and the procedures therefore set forth in Section 3(a)(ii) above shall be implemented.

(vi) In any event, Buyer's review of all title and Survey Matters as set forth in this Section 3(a) shall be finalized on or before the expiration of the Feasibility Period set forth below in Section 3(b).

(b) **Feasibility Period.** Prior to the expiration of the Feasibility Period Buyer shall have the right to obtain and/or review the documents and matters listed in this Section 3(b) below. The "**Feasibility Period**" shall commence on the Effective Date and shall expire at 5:00PM, Mountain Time, sixty (60) days thereafter.

(i) The results of a physical inspection of the Property to be performed by or on the behalf of Buyer which Buyer deems to be advisable as more particularly described in Section 8(c) below. On and after the Effective Date and until the Closing or the earlier termination of this Agreement, Buyer and its agents, representatives, consultants and contractors shall have the privilege, opportunity and right of entering the Property, in order to inspect and examine the Property and perform boundary, topographic and like surveys and inspections of the Property, as well as other tests and inspections (including, without limitation, geotechnical and environmental tests, studies and examinations, soil tests, borings and other tests needed to determine surface, subsurface and topographic conditions), to conduct appraisals, market feasibility studies and to otherwise conduct such due diligence review of the Property and all of the items to be furnished by Seller to Buyer pursuant to Sections 3(b)(ii) and (iii) hereof, and all records and other materials related thereto as Buyer deems appropriate, all subject to and in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Access Agreement (as defined in Section 10 below).

(ii) Within five (5) business days after the Effective Date, Seller shall deliver to Buyer copies of the documents and information set forth on **Exhibit I** attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference (the "**Documents and Materials**"). Buyer acknowledges and agrees that all Documents and Materials made available by Seller are for informational purposes only, that Seller makes no representation or warranty with respect to the truth, accuracy, or completeness of any matters set forth in such documents. Buyer further acknowledges and agrees that it is not relying on any information contained in such documents and, instead, is relying on its own investigation of the Property and related matters as more particularly set forth below in Section 8(c).

(iii) Buyer shall have the right to approve or disapprove all contracts, licenses, plans, construction agreements, permits, approvals, licenses, laws, regulations, ordinances, warranties or other agreements, instruments or information (collectively, the "**Contracts**") affecting the Property. Seller shall provide Buyer with full and complete copies of all Contracts for the Property within seven (7) business days after the Effective Date.

(iv) Buyer may obtain and pay for the cost of an appraisal of the Property and shall have the ability to review and approve of the appraisal during the Feasibility Period. Seller shall cooperate with Buyer's appraiser by providing relevant information as reasonably requested.

If, at any time during the Feasibility Period, Buyer determines that it is dissatisfied with any aspects of the Property (including the appraisal) or with any of the Documents and Materials (including any Contract) or if Buyer otherwise elects to terminate this Agreement, for any or no reason, in Buyer's sole discretion, Buyer may terminate this Agreement and the Escrow by giving Seller and Escrow Holder notice of Buyer's termination. Buyer's failure to give timely written notice to Seller of its approval of the Property shall be deemed an approval of Buyer's inspections. In the event of such termination, the Deposit (including any interest earned thereon) shall be returned to Buyer less 50% of any title or escrow cancellation fees, and all documents deposited into Escrow by either party shall be returned to the party

which deposited the same, Buyer shall return the Documents and Materials to Seller, and neither party shall have any further right or remedy against the other except as may expressly survive the termination of this Agreement.

(c) **Platting.** The parties acknowledge that Seller would not normally create a parcel or parcels in the size and configuration of the Property, but is doing so solely to facilitate the purchase and sale contemplated hereby. If the plat for the Property has not yet been recorded, then an express condition to the parties' obligations hereunder is approval by all appropriate governmental entities of a new plat creating the Property as a separate legal parcel and the recording of such plat in the Official Records of Salt Lake County (the "**Property Plat**"); however, failure to obtain such governmental approval shall not be a default hereunder by Seller but instead shall be automatically treated as a failure of a mutual condition to Close of Escrow terminating this Agreement (whereupon any deposit provided by Buyer shall be returned to Buyer). The new legal parcel constituting the Property shall be subject to the approving agencies' standard plat conditions and dedications. The proposed Property Plat and the final Property Plat and any and all conditions or obligations imposed in connection with the preparation, approval or recordation of the Property Plat which shall be binding on Buyer from and after the Close of Escrow shall be subject to Buyer's review and prior written approval, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

(d) **Infrastructure.** Seller or Seller's affiliate, at its sole cost and expense, to the extent not already completed, shall prior to Close of Escrow or as mutually agreed by the parties in writing construct to substantial completion the infrastructure improvements described on Schedule 3(d) attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference at the time set forth below (the "**Infrastructure**"). Buyer acknowledges that its site plan shall provide for retention of storm water on the Property such that Buyer shall be solely responsible for the retention and storage of storm water generated on the Property and adjacent roads up to a 100-year rain event but will not provide for water retention of storm water generated from surrounding property or development. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed as requiring Seller or any of its affiliates to construct any improvements, amenities or services other than the Infrastructure. Buyer acknowledges that there may be limited water and utilities available on the Property during construction and that, due to construction of the Infrastructure, Buyer may have limited access to the Property and/or utilities at the Property until such time as the Infrastructure has been completed and is available for use. The Infrastructure shall be completed to the standards, rules and regulations of the City or other entity with jurisdiction to regulate the compliance of such Infrastructure. As used herein, "substantial completion" shall mean the Buyer could reasonably commence construction activities, even though there may be certain items which need to be repaired or there is a "punch list" of items to be completed. The Parties acknowledge that it is unlikely that the Infrastructure will be substantially completed by the Close of Escrow. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, if Seller has not substantially completed the Infrastructure and all other conditions to the Closing of Escrow have been satisfied or waived by Seller and Buyer, then Seller and Buyer shall proceed with the Close of Escrow and Seller shall substantially complete the Infrastructure within twelve (12) months of written notice from Buyer to Seller of Buyer's intention to promptly begin construction of the Elementary School after substantial completion of the Infrastructure; however, under no condition or circumstance is the Seller under any obligation to complete the Infrastructure earlier than September 1, 2026. If Buyer provides written notice at least twelve (12) months prior to the Construction Commencement Deadline set forth in Section 14(a) and the Infrastructure is not thereafter substantially completed before the Construction Commencement Deadline (subject to extensions due to force majeure events beyond Seller's control), Seller's right to repurchase the Property as set forth in Section 14 shall terminate and have no further force or effect and Seller and Buyer shall execute and record a release of the Notice of Repurchase Right (defined in Section 14(d)). Upon recording such release, Buyer's obligations pertaining to the commencement of construction of the Elementary School on the Property or the opening of an Elementary School to the public within certain time periods shall be deemed released. Seller's obligation

to construct the Infrastructure as provided in this paragraph shall survive Closing. This Section 3(d) shall also survive Closing.

(e) **Waiver; Failure of Condition; No Default.** Prior to Close of Escrow, Buyer may waive any of the contingencies set forth in this Section 3 by the delivery of written notice thereof to Seller and Escrow Holder. The failure of the Escrow to close by reason of Buyer's disapproval (or deemed disapproval) of any such contingency for Buyer's benefit described in this Section 3 (other than Section 3(d), which, if Buyer elects to proceed with the transaction contemplated hereby beyond the Feasibility Period, shall constitute both a condition precedent to Buyer's obligations hereunder as well as a contractual obligation of Seller), or Seller's failure to cure such disapproved contingency, shall not constitute a default by Seller under this Agreement.

(f) **Seller's Right to Studies.** Buyer shall within ten (10) business days after receipt of a request from Seller, deliver to Seller and Seller shall be entitled to retain, at no cost or expense to Seller, copies of all surveys, reports, studies, and test results prepared by Buyer's environmental consultants regarding the environmental conditions at the Property through the Buyer's environmental investigations; provided, however, that Buyer shall not be obligated to disclose any proprietary or confidential information, including any portion thereof that may be protected by the attorney/client privilege or work product doctrines. Seller may, subject to the rights of and limitations imposed by the third party providers of such documentation and information, use and distribute any and all such documentation and information as it shall elect in its sole and absolute discretion. All information delivered to Seller pursuant to this Section 3(f) is delivered without any representation or warranty by Buyer as to the completeness or accuracy thereof.

4. **Escrow.**

(a) **Escrow Holder.** An escrow account for the purchase and sale of the Property (the "**Escrow**") has or will be established at the office of the Escrow Company shown in the Summary of Key Terms (the "**Escrow Holder**").

(b) **Opening and Close of Escrow.** The Escrow shall be deemed open (the "**Opening of Escrow**") upon the date of this Agreement. Escrow shall close (the "**Close of Escrow**") on the later of (i) thirty (30) days after expiration of the Feasibility Period, or (ii) fifteen (15) days after recordation of the Property Plat creating the Property as a separate legal parcel (or such earlier date as mutually agreed upon by the parties) (the "**Closing Date**"). Escrow shall be deemed to have closed at the time the Deed is filed for record in the Official Records of the County.

(c) **Escrow Instructions.** This Agreement shall constitute the escrow instructions of Buyer and Seller to the Escrow Holder.

(d) **Seller Deposits into Escrow.** Seller shall deliver or cause to be delivered to Escrow Holder in a timely manner to permit the closing of the transaction contemplated hereby by the Close of Escrow, the following:

(i) A duly executed and acknowledged Special Warranty Deed in the form attached hereto as **Exhibit D** (the "**Deed**");

(ii) Three duly executed and acknowledged originals of the Notice of Purchase Rights ("**Notice of Purchase Rights**") in the form attached hereto as **Exhibit J**;

(iii) A duly executed Non-Foreign Affidavit in the form of **Exhibit E** attached hereto (the “**Non-Foreign Affidavit**”);

(iv) Such evidence, indemnification agreements, escrow agreements and other documents and all escrow funds as may be reasonably required by the Title Company relating to: (i) mechanics' or materialmen's liens to enable the Title Company to issue the Title Policy or the ALTA Policy, as the case may be, insuring that title to the Property is being conveyed free and clear of any mechanics' or materialmen's liens; (ii) parties in possession; (iii) the status and capacity of Seller and the authority of the person or persons who are executing the documents on behalf of Seller in connection with the sale of the Property; (iv) a gap indemnity; and (v) any other matters reasonably required to enable such Title Company to issue the Title Policy or the ALTA Policy, as the case may be, and endorsements thereto;

(v) A duly executed closing statement reflecting the adjustments and prorations required by this Agreement (the “**Closing Statement**”); and

(vi) Such other instruments as may be reasonably required to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Agreement.

(e) **Buyer Deposits into Escrow.** Buyer shall deliver or cause to be delivered to Escrow Holder in a timely manner to permit the closing of the transaction contemplated hereby by the Close of Escrow, the following:

(i) Except to the extent already placed into Escrow as the Deposit, the sum of \$3,300,000.00, plus or minus costs, expenses and prorations hereunder, in immediately available funds to be applied toward the Purchase Price at the Close of Escrow;

(ii) Three (3) duly executed and acknowledged originals of the Notice of Purchase Rights;

(iii) A duly executed Closing Statement; and

(iv) Such other instruments as may be reasonably required to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Agreement.

(f) **Authorization to Close Escrow.** Provided that Escrow Holder shall not have received written notice from Buyer or Seller of the failure of any conditions precedent or of the termination of the Escrow, Buyer and Seller have deposited into the Escrow the items required by this Agreement and the Title Company is irrevocably committed to issue the Title Policy (as defined in Section 7 below) in the form required in Section 7 below, concurrently with the Close of Escrow, Escrow Holder shall in the following order:

(i) Deliver to Buyer the Deed by causing it to be recorded in the Official Records of the County and requesting that it be mailed to Buyer after it has been recorded;

(ii) Cause to be recorded in the Official Records of the County one (1) original of the Notice of Purchase Rights; and deliver one (1) original of the Notice of Purchase Rights to each of Seller and Buyer;

(iii) Deliver to Seller or to Seller’s order the Purchase Price, less (X) all amounts to be paid by Seller hereunder, (Y) Seller’s share of liabilities and/or expenses to be prorated by

Escrow Holder to Seller's account under Section 6, and (Z) all amounts paid by Escrow Holder or the Title Company on behalf of Seller pursuant to written instructions from Seller in satisfaction of liens and encumbrances on the Property in order to put title to the Property into the state required by this Agreement;

(iv) Deliver to Buyer the Non-Foreign Affidavit; and

(v) Cause the Title Policy to be issued to Buyer and Seller by Title Company.

5. Closing Costs.

(a) Seller shall pay (i) 50% of all escrow fees of the Escrow Holder, and (ii) all rollback taxes due on the Property, if any.

(b) Buyer shall pay (i) the fees for recording the Deed, (ii) 50% of all escrow fees of the Escrow Holder, (iii) the cost of a survey of the Property, and (iv) the cost of any title endorsement requested by Buyer.

(c) Seller shall pay the cost of the Title Policy and the cost of any curative endorsement. If Buyer elects to obtain an ALTA Policy as provided below, Buyer shall be solely responsible for any difference in premium or charge between the Title Policy and the ALTA Policy and for all survey and other costs associated with such ALTA Policy. Buyer shall also be responsible for the additional premium for any separate lender's policy of title insurance.

(d) Any other costs of the Escrow or of closing pertaining to this transaction not otherwise expressly allocated between Buyer and Seller under this Agreement shall be apportioned in the manner customary in the County.

(e) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Section 5, if the Escrow fails to close for any reason (other than the breach of this Agreement by one or both of the parties), the costs incurred through the Escrow, including the cost of the Title Commitment, shall be borne equally by Buyer and Seller. Otherwise, the party who breached this Agreement first shall bear all the costs incurred through the Escrow, including the cost of the Title Commitment.

6. Prorations and Adjustments.

Current real property taxes and assessments shall be prorated as of 12:01 a.m. on the Close of Escrow, on the basis of a 365-day year.

7. Title.

(a) **Possession.** Buyer shall be placed in possession of the Property as of the Close of Escrow.

(b) **Deed.** Seller shall convey to Buyer good and marketable fee simple title to the Property by the Deed.

(c) **Policy.** On or before the expiration of the Feasibility Period, Buyer shall arrange with the Title Company that title to the Property to be conveyed to Buyer shall be insured by an ALTA Owner's Standard Coverage Policy of Title Insurance (form 6-17-06) (the "**Title Policy**") with liability in the amount of the Purchase Price, dated the date of the Close of Escrow, issued by the Title Company,

insuring that Buyer is vested with fee simple title in the Land, subject only to the Permitted Exceptions; provided, however, Buyer may arrange that in lieu of the Title Policy, the Title Company shall issue an ALTA Owner's Extended Coverage Policy of Title Insurance (the "**ALTA Policy**") with such liability and coverage. The issuance of the Title Policy is a condition precedent to the Close of Escrow, entitling Buyer to a return of the Deposit if not met prior to Close of Escrow. Notwithstanding the foregoing, however, the issuance of an ALTA Policy is not a condition precedent to the Close of Escrow and the failure of Escrow to close by reason of such failure shall not entitle Buyer to the return of the Deposit.

8. Representations, Warranties and Covenants of Buyer.

Buyer hereby represents, warrants and covenants to Seller that the following matters are true and correct as of the execution of this Agreement and also will be true and correct as of the Close of Escrow:

(a) Buyer is a body corporate and politic of the State of Utah duly formed, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the State of Utah.

(b) This Agreement and all the documents to be executed and delivered by Buyer to Seller pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, (i) have been or will be duly authorized, executed and delivered by Buyer, (ii) are or will be legal, valid and binding obligations of Buyer as of the date of their respective executions, (iii) are or will be enforceable in accordance with their respective terms (except to the extent that such enforcement may be limited by applicable bankruptcy, insolvency, moratorium and other principles relating to or limiting the rights of contracting parties generally), and (iv) to Buyer's knowledge, do not, and will not at, the Close of Escrow, violate any provisions of any agreement to which Buyer is a party.

(c) Buyer hereby agrees and acknowledges that, except as otherwise set forth herein, (i) it is buying the Property on an "**AS-IS**" basis; (ii) it has made or will have made its own investigations and inspections of the Property, including, without limitation, the physical aspects of the Property and the Property's compliance with all laws applicable to the Property's current or intended use or development; (iii) in connection with its investigations and inspections of the Property it has contracted or had the opportunity to contract with certain advisors and consultants, including, but not limited to, environmental consultants, engineers and geologists, to conduct such environmental, hazardous material, geological, soils, hydrology, seismic, endangered species, archeological, physical, structural, mechanical and other inspections of the Property as Buyer deemed to be necessary; (iv) it has reviewed, or will have reviewed by the end of the Feasibility Period, the reports of such advisors and consultants; (v) it is relying solely on such reports and its own investigations as to the Property, its condition and other characteristics and compliance with laws; (vi) except for the representations and warranties set forth in this Agreement, in any documents that survive Close of Escrow, and in the documents executed and delivered by Seller at the Close of Escrow pursuant to this Agreement, it is not making the purchase of the Property in reliance upon any statements or representations, express or implied, made by Seller or its agents or brokers, as to the condition of or characteristics of the Property, its fitness for use for any particular purpose, or the Property's compliance with any zoning or other rules, regulations, laws or statutes applicable to the Property, or the uses permitted on or the development requirements for or any other matters relating to the Property. Except as set forth in this Agreement, Seller has no liability nor responsibility to Buyer in connection with the matters set forth in this Section 8(c), including, without limitation, any liability under any laws, rules, regulations or ordinances regulating the environment, hazardous materials, or human health and safety, or any latent or patent defects.

BUYER'S INITIALS: _____

(d) Effective on the Close of Escrow, and except as otherwise set forth in this Agreement, Buyer hereby releases Seller from and waives all claims against Seller, at law or in equity, whether known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected which Buyer has or may have, arising out of or related to the physical condition of the Property, its compliance with applicable law or its fitness for Buyer's intended purpose.

BUYER'S INITIALS: _____

(e) Buyer represents and warrants that it is purchasing the Property for the construction and operation of an elementary school on the Property substantially as shown on the Site Plan (the "**Elementary School**") when the need for such school is established by Buyer and when sufficient funds are available for such construction as determined by Buyer. When those determinations are made and the funds are available, the Property shall be developed substantially as shown on the Site Plan. Any material changes to the Site Plan shall be subject to the approval of Seller and Buyer, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed. Seller, Buyer and the architect selected by Buyer shall work cooperatively to establish a site plan to determine the location of utilities and improvements on the Property and the layout for the Elementary School

(f) Buyer will exercise its best efforts to commence construction of the Elementary School as soon as a need for such school is established by Buyer in Buyer's reasonable discretion and when funds are available for construction, as prioritized by Buyer, and to complete construction and open the Elementary School to the public within 18 months thereafter. The Elementary School and balance of the Property shall be developed in accordance with the Site Plan and plans and specifications approved by Buyer and the City in accordance with the terms, conditions and requirements of this Agreement.

(g) The Property (including the Elementary School and landscaping) shall be adequately repaired and maintained by the Buyer to insure proper and safe use, appearance and longevity. Prior to commencing construction, the Buyer shall keep the Property in a clean and safe condition, controlling or removing weeds and any trash or debris thereon. During construction, the Buyer shall be responsible for keeping the Property safe. The Buyer shall operate, maintain and repair the Property and the improvements thereon in such a way as to avoid and prevent unreasonable disruption or interference with the activities of Seller in the development and sale of the land in the vicinity of the Property considering the use of the Property for an Elementary School.

(h) Seller shall have the opportunity to provide input to the Board of Education of Jordan School District ("**District**") for naming of the Elementary School, subject to the right of Buyer to make a final determination of such name.

(i) The provisions of this Section 8 shall survive Closing.

9. Representations, Warranties and Covenants of Seller.

Seller hereby represents, warrants and covenants to Buyer that the following matters are true and correct as of the execution of this Agreement and will also be true and correct as of the Close of Escrow:

(a) Seller is a limited liability company duly formed, validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the Utah.

(b) This Agreement and all the documents and items to be executed and delivered by Seller to Buyer pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, (i) have been or will be duly authorized, executed and delivered by Seller, (ii) are or will be legal, valid and binding obligations of Seller as of the date of their

respective executions, (iii) are or will be enforceable in accordance with their respective terms (except to the extent that such enforcement may be limited by applicable bankruptcy, insolvency, moratorium and other principles relating to or limiting the rights of contracting parties generally); (iv) do not and will not, at the Close of Escrow, violate any provisions of any agreement to which Seller is a party.

(c) To Seller's actual knowledge, except for the Permitted Exceptions and except for agreements entered into pursuant to this Agreement there are no other agreements or instruments in force and effect, oral or written, that grant to any person whomsoever or any entity whatsoever any right, title, interest, or benefit in or to all or any part of the Property which will survive the Close of Escrow or be binding upon Buyer.

(d) There are no actions, suits, condemnation or other taking by eminent domain, or proceedings pending or, to Seller's actual knowledge, threatened by any governmental agency against Seller with respect to the Property, nor does Seller know of any basis for such action. Seller has not submitted any currently pending application for changes in the zoning applicable to the Property or any portion thereof.

(e) There are no pending or, to Seller's actual knowledge, threatened proceedings that could have the effect of impairing or restricting access between the Property and adjacent public roads.

(f) To Seller's actual knowledge, Seller has not received any written notice of any violation of law, ordinances or other legal requirements with respect to the Property, except as may be disclosed in the Documents and Materials.

(g) To Seller's actual knowledge, other than Seller's rights hereunder, no person or entity (other than Buyer) has any right or option to acquire any portion of the Property.

(h) Seller is not a "foreign person" which would subject Buyer to the withholding tax provisions of Section 1445 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

(i) It shall be a condition precedent to Buyer's obligations under this Agreement that on the Closing Date, all of the representations and warranties of Seller set forth in this Section 9 shall be true, accurate and complete in all material respects.

The representations and warranties of Seller set forth in this Agreement shall survive the Closing for a period of one (1) year. Notwithstanding anything else contained in this Agreement, if any representation or warranty made by Seller hereunder is true and correct as of the execution of this Agreement but is not true and correct as of the Close of Escrow, so long as the same has not occurred by reason of Seller's willful act or omission, then Seller shall not be liable to Buyer in damages by reason thereof and Buyer's sole remedy shall be to terminate this Agreement and the Escrow, if, in the reasonable opinion of Buyer, any such disclosure constitutes or could constitute a material adverse effect on the Property, or the use thereof intended by Buyer, then Buyer shall have the right to terminate this Agreement as its sole remedy, in which event the Deposit shall be returned to Buyer, and neither party shall have further rights or obligations under this Agreement with the exception of the obligations which survive the termination of this Agreement. Seller's actual knowledge as used herein shall mean the actual knowledge, without independent inquiry, of Ty McCutcheon, Scott Kaufmann or Gary Langston.

10. Right to Enter Property.

Commencing on the Opening of Escrow, and continuing thereafter until the Close of Escrow or termination of this Agreement, Buyer and its consultants, contractors, agents and servants (collectively,

the “**Buyer Parties**”) shall have the right, at Buyer’s sole cost and expense, to enter onto the Property at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner for the purpose of making such tests and inspections as Buyer deems necessary in connection with this Agreement (including, without limitation, soil samples, geotechnical tests, environmental site assessments and surveys); provided, however, that Buyer and Seller first enter into an Access Agreement, the form of which is attached hereto as **Exhibit L**. Any liability of Buyer to Seller with respect to the indemnity contained in the Access Agreement shall not be limited to or defined by the liquidated damages provision set forth in Section 12 below.

11. Loss by Condemnation; Risk of Loss.

(a) In the event that prior to the Close of Escrow, the Property, or any portion thereof, is subject to a taking by a public authority, then Buyer shall have the right, exercisable by giving notice to Seller within 15 days after receiving written notice of such taking, either (i) to terminate this Agreement, in which case neither party shall have any further rights or obligations hereunder, and the Deposit shall be returned to Buyer less Buyer’s share of transaction costs determined pursuant to Section 5(e), or (ii) to accept the Property in its then condition and proceed to close this transaction, and to receive an assignment of all of Seller’s rights to any condemnation awards payable by reason of such taking. If Buyer elects to proceed under clause (ii) above, Seller shall not compromise, settle or adjust any claims to such awards without Buyer’s prior written consent, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Seller agrees to give Buyer prompt notice of any taking of the Property promptly after Seller receives notice of the same.

(b) Except as otherwise specifically set forth herein, all risk of loss and destruction of the Property, and all Property expenses and insurance, shall be borne by Seller until Close of Escrow, at which time all said risk shall pass to Buyer.

12. Default of Buyer or Seller.

(a) Substantial damages will be suffered by Seller in the event of failure to close due to Buyer’s default under this Agreement. The parties agree that it would be extremely difficult and impracticable, if not impossible, to ascertain with any degree of certainty the amount of damages which would be suffered by Seller in the event of Buyer’s default under this Agreement. Therefore, in the event Buyer defaults in its obligation to close the purchase of the Property for any reason other than Seller’s default, the Deposit shall be paid or delivered to and retained by Seller as liquidated damages which (subject to paragraph (b) of this section 12) shall be Seller’s sole remedy hereunder by reason of such default. The parties hereto expressly agree and acknowledge that the amount of the Deposit represents the parties’ reasonable estimate of Seller’s damages in the event of such default. Buyer and Seller expressly agree that the foregoing liquidated damages provision is not intended to define or limit any indemnity liability of Buyer to Seller under Section 10 above or any provision contained in this Agreement for the payment of attorneys’ fees.

(b) If Buyer shall default in its obligations hereunder and shall fail to cooperate fully in the immediate cancellation of Escrow and the release to Seller of the Deposit as liquidated damages then, notwithstanding the parties’ agreement to limit damages to liquidated damages, and in addition to all other rights and remedies, the following provisions will apply: (i) In the event Buyer agrees to cancellation of the Escrow but not to the release of the Deposit as liquidated damages, then the prevailing party in any dispute shall be entitled to recover its costs of enforcement, including reasonable attorneys’ fees. If Seller is the prevailing party in such dispute, Seller shall also be entitled to the Deposit as liquidated damages; (ii) In the event Buyer shall fail or refuse to agree to the cancellation of the Escrow

or shall commence an action for specific performance and/or file a notice of lis pendens, then the prevailing party in any such dispute shall be entitled to recover its actual damages (and Seller shall not be limited to liquidated damages), plus costs of enforcement including reasonable attorneys' fees.

(c) Should Seller default or fail to perform according to this Agreement, Buyer may: (i) terminate this Agreement, whereupon the Deposit shall be released to Buyer; and/or (ii) pursue any other remedy available at law or in equity, including an action for specific performance.

13. Right of First Refusal.

In the event Buyer determines to sell all or any portion of the Property prior to construction of the Elementary School, or receives an acceptable bona fide offer to purchase all or any portion of the Property prior to construction of the Elementary School which Buyer desires to accept (in both cases, an "Offer"), Buyer, before making any agreement to sell, shall give written notice to Seller stating Buyer's desire to sell and a copy of the Offer containing the amount and the material terms and conditions thereof. Seller shall have the exclusive right for forty-five (45) days after receiving such notice to elect to purchase the Property which is the subject of the Offer upon the terms of the Offer; provided, however, the purchase price for the Property which is the subject of the Offer shall be the lesser of (i) the purchase price set forth in the Offer, or (ii) the Purchase Price. The obligations of this paragraph shall survive any sale of the Property and be binding upon Buyer and its successors and assigns. The parties shall execute and cause to be recorded at the Close of Escrow a notice of Seller's right in the form attached as **Exhibit J** hereto, which notice shall be recorded on the title to the Property immediately following the recordation of the Deed. This Right of First Refusal shall automatically terminate and have no further force or effect on the date the Elementary School is constructed on the Property and opened to the public.

14. Repurchase Right.

(a) If Buyer fails to commence construction activities on the Property necessary to improve the Property for its intended use as an Elementary School on or before March 31, 2028 (the "**Construction Commencement Deadline**"), or complete construction of the Elementary School and open the Elementary School to the public by the beginning of the 2029/2030 school year (the "**School Opening Deadline**"), Seller shall have the right to repurchase the Property from Buyer upon notice thereof from Seller to Buyer.

(b) No sooner than March 31, 2029, Buyer may provide written notice to Seller offering Seller the right to repurchase the Property at the original Purchase Price. Seller shall then have sixty (60) days to notify Buyer of its intention to either repurchase the Property or waive the repurchase right (the "**Put Repurchase Acceptance Notice Period**"). Should Seller notify Buyer of its election to repurchase the Property within the Put Repurchase Acceptance Notice Period then such purchase shall be under the terms set forth in Section 14(c) below. Should Seller fail to notify Buyer of its election to repurchase the Property within the Put Repurchase Acceptance Notice Period, then Seller's right to repurchase the property at the original Purchase Price shall terminate and have no further force or effect; provided, however, the Property shall still be subject to the terms of the Right of First Refusal set forth in Section 13 above.

(c) If Seller exercises its right to repurchase the Property, Buyer shall sell the Property, to Seller, in cash, for an amount equal to the Purchase Price and otherwise on terms and conditions substantially similar to those contained in this Agreement; provided, however, that (i) Buyer shall make standard representations and warranties relating to due authorization and execution (such as those set forth in Section 9 hereof), and (ii) Buyer shall not retain any repurchase right or right of first refusal to the Property as set forth in this Section or Section 13. The closing costs shall be allocated between Seller and Buyer consistent with the terms of this Agreement, with Buyer paying Seller's closing costs, and Seller

paying Buyer's closing costs. Buyer shall cause any financial encumbrances, such as mortgages, deeds of trust and liens to be released at the closing.

(d) Seller's right to repurchase the Property shall be binding on any successor-in-interest to Buyer, subsequent owner and/or any other subsequent interest holder in the Property. Buyer's right to require Seller to repurchase the Property from Buyer under the terms of this Section 14 shall be binding on any successor-in-interest to Seller. If Buyer commences construction before the Construction Commencement Deadline and opens the Elementary School to the public before the School Opening Deadline, then Seller and Buyer shall execute and record a release of the notice of the repurchase right. This Section shall survive Close of Escrow and shall be binding upon any transferee, assignee or successor-in-interest of either party for a period of thirty-one (31) years. The parties shall execute and cause to be recorded a notice of Seller's repurchase right in the form attached as **Exhibit J** hereto (the "**Notice of Repurchase Right**"), which notice shall be recorded on the title to the Property immediately following the recordation of the Deed.

15. Broker's Commission.

Buyer and Seller each represent to the other that they have not entered into any agreement or incurred any obligation which might result in the obligation to pay a sales or brokerage commission or finder's fee with respect to this transaction. Buyer and Seller each agree to indemnify, defend, protect and hold the other harmless from and against any and all losses, claims, damages, costs or expenses (including attorneys' fees) which the other may incur as a result of any claim made by any person to a right to a sales or brokerage commission or finder's fee in connection with this transaction to the extent such claim is based, or purportedly based, on the acts or omissions of Seller or Buyer, as the case may be. The obligations of Buyer and Seller under this Section shall survive the Close of Escrow.

16. Notices.

All notices, requests and demands to be made hereunder to the parties hereto shall be made in writing to the addresses set forth below and shall be given by any of the following means: (a) personal service; (b) electronic communication, including facsimile or e-mail transmission (provided, however, that notice is also given by one of the other means set forth in Subparagraph 16(a), (c), or (d)); (c) certified or registered mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested; or (d) courier or delivery service. Such addresses may be changed by notice to the other parties given in the same manner as provided above. Any notice, demand or request sent pursuant to either subsection 16(a), (b) or (d) hereof shall be deemed received upon the actual delivery thereof, and, if sent pursuant to subsection 16(c) shall be deemed received five (5) days following deposit in the mail. Refusal to accept delivery of any notice, request or demand shall be deemed to be delivery thereof. If any party hereto is not an individual, notice may be made on any officer, general partner or principal thereof. Notice to any one co-party shall be deemed notice to all co-parties.

17. Miscellaneous Provisions.

(a) Incorporation of Prior Agreements. This Agreement contains the entire understanding of Buyer and Seller with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous written or oral agreements and understandings between the parties hereto pertaining to any such matter. No provision of this Agreement may be amended, modified or supplemented or added to except by an agreement in writing, expressly stating that such agreement is an amendment of this Agreement, signed by the parties to this Agreement or their respective successors-in-interest.

(b) Right to Assign.

(i) Buyer shall have no right to assign or transfer any of its rights or responsibilities hereunder to any person or entity without Seller's prior written consent which may be given, conditioned or withheld in Seller's reasonable discretion. Any attempt by Buyer to assign or

transfer any of its rights or responsibilities hereunder without Seller's written consent shall be void. Notwithstanding the above, Buyer shall have the right to assign this Agreement to any entity controlling, controlled by or under common control with Buyer, so long as such assignee enters into an assumption agreement for the benefit of Seller, assuming the obligations contained in this Agreement.

(ii) Buyer hereby agrees and acknowledges that, notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in this Agreement, Seller shall have the right, exercisable in its sole discretion, to transfer title to the Property to any other person ("**Seller's Assignee**"), at any time during the period between the Opening of Escrow and the Close of Escrow, provided that (A) Seller's Assignee assumes the obligation of Seller to transfer title to the Property to Buyer pursuant to the terms of this Agreement and all other obligations and liability of Seller under this Agreement, (B) Buyer and Escrow Holder are notified in writing as to the name and address of Seller's Assignee, and (C) Seller shall remain liable to Buyer with respect to all of its obligations to Buyer hereunder.

(c) **Attorneys' Fees.** If either party commences an action against the other to interpret or enforce any of the terms of this Agreement or because of the breach by the other party of any of the terms hereof, the losing party shall pay to the prevailing party reasonable attorneys' fees (based on such attorneys normal and customary hourly rates for services actually rendered), costs and expenses actually incurred in connection with the prosecution or defense of such action, whether or not the action is prosecuted to a final judgment, and including all such fees and expenses incurred with respect to appeals, arbitrations and bankruptcy proceedings.

(d) **Time is of the Essence.** Time is of the essence of this Agreement. No waiver of any breach of any covenant or provision in this Agreement will be deemed a waiver of any preceding or succeeding breach thereof, or of any other covenant or provision in this Agreement. No extension of time for performance of any obligation or act will extend the time for performance of any other obligation or act.

(e) **Successors and Assigns.** Subject to any limitations on the rights of the parties to transfer their respective interests in this Agreement set forth in Section 17(b), this Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of each of the parties hereto and to their respective transferees, successors, and assigns.

(f) **Governing Law; Choice of Forum.** This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with and governed by the internal laws of the State of Utah, without giving effect to any "conflict of law" rules of such state. Buyer and Seller each acknowledge and agree that the Third District Court of the State of Utah in and for the County and the associated federal and appellate courts shall have exclusive jurisdiction to hear and decide any dispute, controversy or litigation regarding the enforceability or validity of this Agreement or any portion thereof.

(g) **Counterparts.** This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which, when taken together, shall constitute one and the same instrument.

(h) **Interpretation.** Wherever possible, each provision of this Agreement shall be interpreted in such a manner as to be valid under applicable law, but, if any provision of this Agreement shall be invalid or prohibited thereunder, such invalidity or prohibition shall be construed as if such invalid or prohibited provision had not been inserted herein and shall not affect the remainder of such provision or the remaining provisions of this Agreement. Section headings of this Agreement are solely

for convenience of reference and shall not govern the interpretation of any of the provisions of this Agreement.

(i) **Construction.** The language in all parts of this Agreement shall be in all cases construed simply according to its fair meaning and not strictly against the party who drafted such language.

(j) **Exhibits.** All Exhibits attached hereto are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof for all purposes.

(k) **No Recordation.** This Agreement shall not be recorded or filed in the public records of any jurisdiction by either party. Any attempt to do so shall be a breach of this Agreement.

(l) **Business Days.** As used in this Agreement, a “business day” shall mean a day other than Saturday, Sunday or any day on which banking institutions in the City of Salt Lake are authorized by law or other governmental action to close. All other references to “days” in this Agreement shall refer to calendar days.

(m) **Further Assurances.** Buyer and Seller each agree to execute any and all other documents, instruments, deeds, writings, drawings, permits, applications relating to this Agreement, the Property as reasonably requested by the other party to better effectuate the terms and provisions of this Agreement.

18. **Confidentiality.**

(a) In connection with the transaction contemplated herein, Seller will be delivering or otherwise making available to Buyer information, documents and other materials related to the Property, which may include, without limitation, those Documents and Materials referred to in Section 3(b) herein, (collectively, the “**Information**”). Without Seller’s prior written consent, Buyer agrees, to the extent permitted by law, not to disclose the non-public information contained in the Information except (i) to Buyer’s directors, employees, auditors, counsel or professional advisors to whom it is necessary to show the Information, each of which shall be informed by Buyer of the confidential nature of the Information; and (ii) in any statement or testimony pursuant to a subpoena or order by any court, governmental body or other agency asserting jurisdiction over Buyer, or as may otherwise be required by law (provided that Buyer shall give Seller prior notice of the disclosure permitted by this clause (ii) unless such notice is prohibited by the subpoena, order or law). As a courtesy but not an obligation, Seller may designate information it provides to Buyer and deems non-public as “confidential.” However, a non-public designation does not affect whether the information is actually public or non-public. Such a determination shall be made using the standard developed in the following paragraph. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, Seller acknowledges that Buyer is subject to Utah Code Ann. § 63G-2-101 et seq. and United States Code § 5 USC 552.

(b) The Parties agree the term “non-public information” shall mean information that is not in the public domain. Information shall not be deemed to be in the public domain if either (1) Buyer through its actions or negligence caused or permitted the release of such Information into the public domain, or (2) Buyer knew or reasonably should have known that such Information was not in the public domain. As a courtesy but not an obligation, Buyer may contact Seller regarding whether Seller believes a piece of Information is in the public domain.

(c) In the event this Agreement is terminated for any reason prior to the Close of Escrow, Buyer will, upon demand, return to Seller all documents or other written material received from Seller

and all copies thereof made by Buyer which contain the Information which have not been properly disposed of by Buyer.

19. Joint and Several Obligations.

In the event that this Agreement is executed by more than one party as Buyer, all obligations of Buyer hereunder shall be deemed to be joint and several.

FORM OF ACCESS AGREEMENT

ACCESS AGREEMENT

_____, _____ (“Owner”) and _____, _____ (“____”) enter into this Access Agreement (“____”) effective this _____ and agree as follows:

1. GRANT OF ACCESS. Owner hereby grants to _____ and the consultants, contractors, agents, and servants of _____ (collectively “____ Parties”) the right to access and enter

_____ (the “Property”), to perform and obtain a variety of inspections, evaluations, surveys, sampling, and testing, including, but not limited to, soil samples, percolation and geotechnical tests, physical inspections of the Property, and Environmental Investigations (defined below) (collectively, the “Investigations”). The soil and other sampling and investigations completed relating to the environmental condition of the Property shall be referred to as the “Environmental Investigations.” Owner represents to _____ that, Owner possesses ownership interests in the Property sufficient to grant access to the Property and the rights granted hereunder to conduct the Investigations.

2. _____’S REPRESENTATIONS. _____ will notify Owner, either in writing or verbally, at least 24 hours prior to desiring to commence Investigations on the Property so that Owner may, in its discretion, have representatives present during the Investigations. _____ may perform such due diligence as it determines at its discretion. _____ will, and will cause the _____ Parties to, make reasonable efforts to: (a) minimize any inconvenience to Owner during its Investigations on the Property, (b) return the Property to the condition it was in at the time _____ first entered the Property, and (c) consult with Owner to address any concerns Owner may have about the Investigations. _____ shall use reasonable best efforts while completing the Investigations so as to not unreasonably disrupt or disturb any activities being conducted within the subdivision containing the Property, including any construction and sales activities being performed by Owner or any merchant builder or any of their employees or agents. _____ shall comply, and shall require the _____ Parties to comply, while on any portion of said subdivision or the Property, with reasonable safety standards, including (without limitation) all safety and security rules and regulations issued by Owner from time-to-time. To avoid causing any rumors concerning its Investigations, _____ shall make, and shall instruct the _____ Parties to make, reasonable efforts to avoid contact with others while performing the Investigations. _____ shall instruct all _____ Parties to not identify _____ or its affiliates as the parties for whom the Investigations are being completed.

3. SPLIT SAMPLE. _____ agrees to provide Owner with a sufficient portion of any sample taken on Owner’s Property to conduct the same analytical tests _____ intends to conduct.

4. TERMINATION. The access granted by this Access Agreement will terminate thirty (30) days following receipt of written notice from _____ stating the Investigations have been completed, but in no event later than _____.

5. INDEMNIFICATION. _____ hereby indemnifies, defends and holds harmless Owner, and its parents, subsidiaries and affiliates and their officers, directors, employees and agents (“Owner Parties”) from and against any and all suits, actions, legal or administrative proceedings, claims, losses, demands, damages, liabilities, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs)

(collectively, "Claims"), related to bodily injury, loss of life, or property damage caused by or arising from the acts or omissions of ____ Parties related to the performance of the Investigations on (a) the Property, (b) other real property owned by Owner or its affiliates, (c) streets within Wood Ranch that are not freely accessible to the public, and/or (d) other real property located within Wood Ranch owned by any third party. This indemnity shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, ____ shall not assume responsibility for, nor indemnify Owner or Owner Parties for any actions or claims not specifically described in this paragraph, including but not limited to the following: (i) pre-existing conditions on the Property, including hazardous materials; (ii) discovery or disturbance of any such pre-existing conditions or hazardous materials that may exist on the Property during the Investigations so long as the Investigations are consistent within industry standards and do not affect or sample groundwater; or (iii) Claims related to bodily injury, loss of life, or property damage caused by the acts or omissions of Owner and/or Owner Parties. Other than the actions described in this paragraph, ____ shall not indemnify Owner or Owner Parties for any other Claims, including those related to the release of information in violation of this Agreement. Nothing herein shall prevent either party from pursuing any rights or remedies available at law or in equity directly against the other party related to a violation or breach of this Agreement.

6. REPORTS AND CONFIDENTIALITY. ____ shall provide Owner, within ten (10) business days after receipt of a request from Owner, copies of all final reports, studies, and test results prepared by ____'s environmental consultants regarding the environmental conditions at the Property through the Environmental Investigations (i.e., Phase Is, Phase IIs, etc.) (collectively, the "Environmental Reports"). ____ shall not be obligated to disclose any proprietary or confidential information, including any portion thereof that may be protected by the attorney/client privilege or work product doctrines. Unless required by a court of competent jurisdiction, or other judicial or legal process, ____ and the ____ Parties shall hold the following information confidential: (a) the non-public information contained in the Environmental Reports, (b) all non-public information contained in reports and information provided by Owner and (c) all non-public information regarding the environmental conditions at the Property and within the Wood Ranch community obtained by ____ and the ____ Parties as part of the Environmental Investigations of the Property on behalf of _____. The preceding confidentiality obligation shall not pertain to any information obtained by any ____ Party in connection with any work or services performed for any other client, person or entity. As a courtesy but not an obligation, Owner may designate information it provides to ____ and deems non-public as "confidential." However, a non-public designation does not affect whether the information is actually public or non-public. Such a determination shall be made using the standard developed in the following paragraph. All information delivered to Seller pursuant to this Section 6 shall be delivered without any representation or warranty by Buyer as to the completeness or accuracy thereof.

The Parties agree the term "non-public information" shall mean information that is not in the public domain. Information shall not be deemed to be in the public domain if either (1) ____ or any ____ Party through its actions or negligence caused or permitted the release of such information into the public domain, or (2) ____ or any ____ Party, each in its individual position, capacity or knowledge, knew or reasonably should have known that such information was not in the public domain. As a courtesy but not an obligation, ____ may contact Owner regarding whether Owner believes a piece of information is in the public domain. Notwithstanding anything in this Access Agreement to the contrary, Owner acknowledges that _____ is subject to Utah Code Ann. § 63G-2-101 et seq. and United States Code § 5 USC 552.

____ and the ____ Parties shall use commercially reasonable measures to protect the confidentiality of such information with at least the same degree of care as each maintains for its own confidential information, and ____ agrees to use such information only as needed in connection with its possible acquisition of the Property. This confidentiality provision shall not inhibit ____'s ability to

obtain information from government agencies to complete its due diligence relating to the Property; provided, however, that no disclosure concerning the Environmental Investigations or the Environmental Reports shall be made to any such agency except with the prior written approval of Owner or in accordance with the procedure set forth in the immediately following sentences. If ____ or any ____ Parties discover a condition on the Property that it must report under state or federal statutes or regulations or else be subjected to a criminal or civil penalty or action, it shall consult with Owner to coordinate an appropriate response. The parties agree to use good faith efforts to coordinate a response and to comply with any and all reporting requirements; provided that such coordination shall not prevent ____ or any of the ____ Parties from complying with applicable reporting requirements.

SCHEDULE 3(d)

DESCRIPTION OF INFRASTRUCTURE

Seller shall construct four off-site roads to the south, north, east and west of the Property of which the road to the south is anticipated to be completed by December 2023. Upon completion of the north, east and west off-site roads, Buyer shall be responsible for reimbursing Seller for fifty percent (50%) of the actual hard and soft costs of construction of the portion of the roads adjacent to the Property. Seller, at Seller's sole cost and expense, shall be responsible for the cost of the south off-site road.

Grading of the Property shall be done according to the Master Grading Plan attached hereto as Schedule 3(d)-1.

Curb and gutter adjacent to the Property as well as asphalt paving in the bed of the road adjacent to the Property. Buyer will be responsible for installation of any sidewalks or paths as part of their construction on the Property.

Culinary Water and Sewer stubbed (without meter) at the Property line, together with the ability to identify the location of the same.

Electric, gas, internet and telephone service to the Property.

The Infrastructure shall be completed in compliance with this Agreement and the standards, rules and regulations set forth by the City or other governmental authority with jurisdiction to regulate the compliance of such Infrastructure.

Buyer is responsible for retention and storage of any storm water generated up to a 100-year rain event on the Property and adjacent streets, and as such Buyer will design and construct the site to accommodate storm water storage and adequate percolation to drain the stored storm water within 48 hours.

Seller is not required to install infrastructure within the Property adequate to provide water, sewer, electricity, gas, internet and telephone service capacity for use of the Property consistent with the entitlement for the Property at Closing as long as such infrastructure is available for future connections to serve the Property in reasonably close proximity to the Property.
