- Health classes miss discussion based learning, social norming, and skills based practice. Maintaining compliance with the new skills based standards would require in person and hands on classes.
- Due to loss of one staff member at the high school we cannot run several of our offered planned courses.
- High school health has 66% of students enrolled in online health. High school PE has 19% of students enrolled in online PE (26-27 school year). Drivers Education is 100% online.

Research and review current expectations of programing and maximize student opportunities, to align with our scope and sequence of planned courses.

- Every child active every year (elementary and middle levels, and maintain high school requirements)

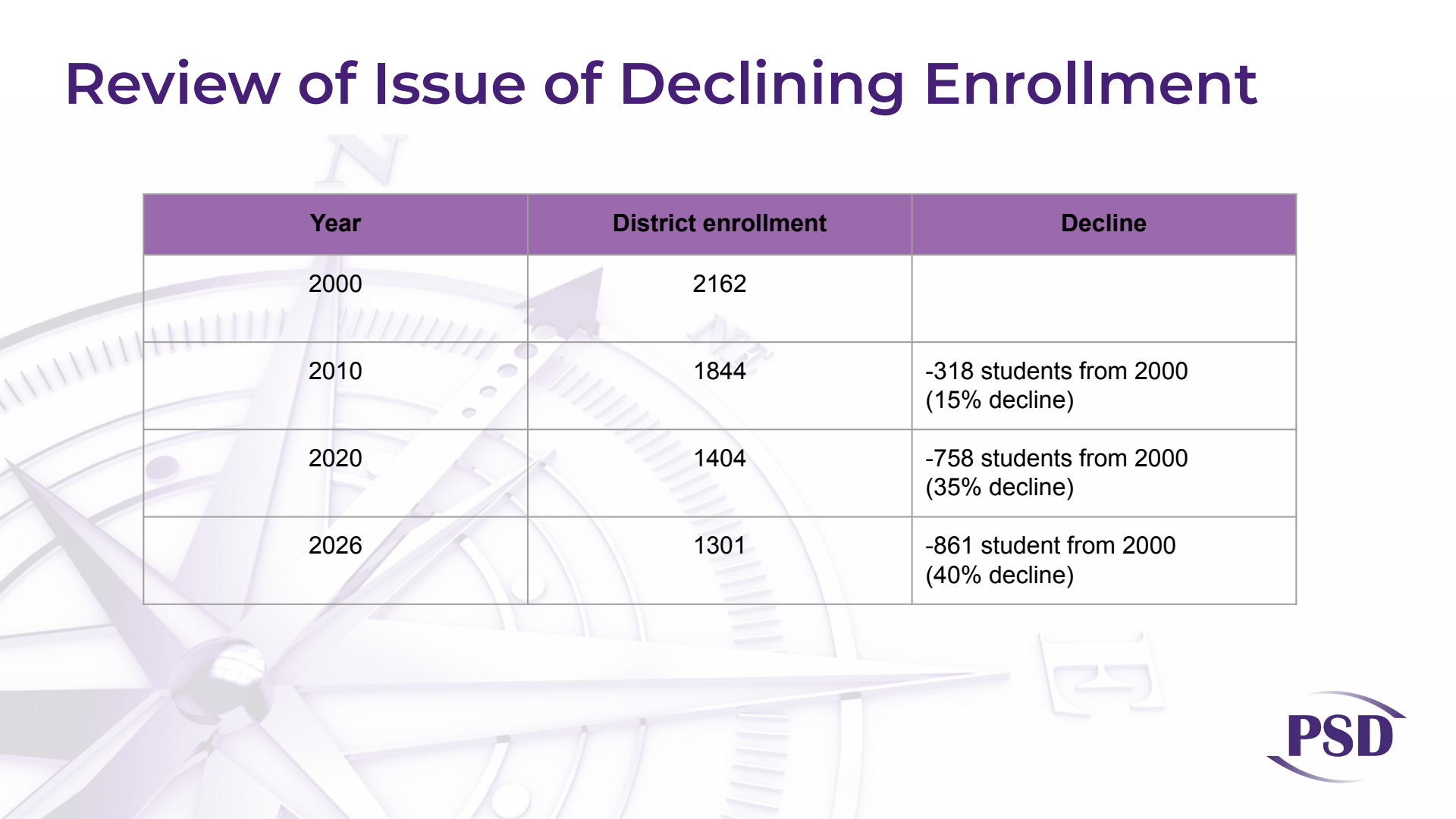

Review of Most Recent Meetings

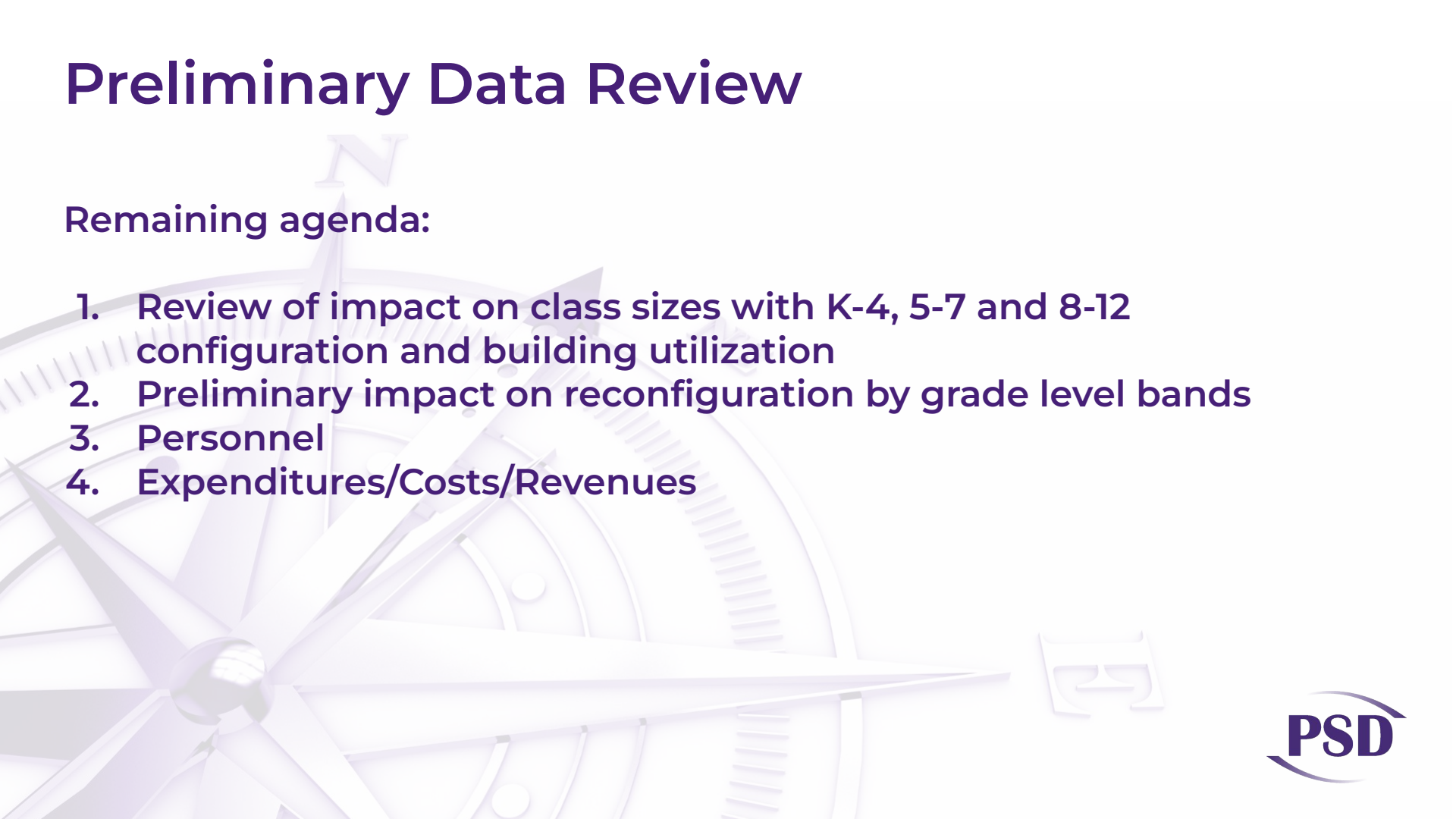
Fiscal Committee Meeting - July 20, 2026 - KCBA presented first of two presentations on district demographics and facilities use.

Findings: Two, K-5 buildings are possible with additions to each of the two buildings. Committee was not interested in pursuing a plan that included building expansion and requested another option. No discussion on selling any of the buildings.

Buildings and Grounds - August 26, 2026 - KCBA presented an option that consolidated buildings without building expansion.

Option: Two, K-4 buildings, one, 5-7 building, one 8-12 building. Committee was interested in further discussing this option in two weeks at Education Programs and Services meeting on September 9, 2026.

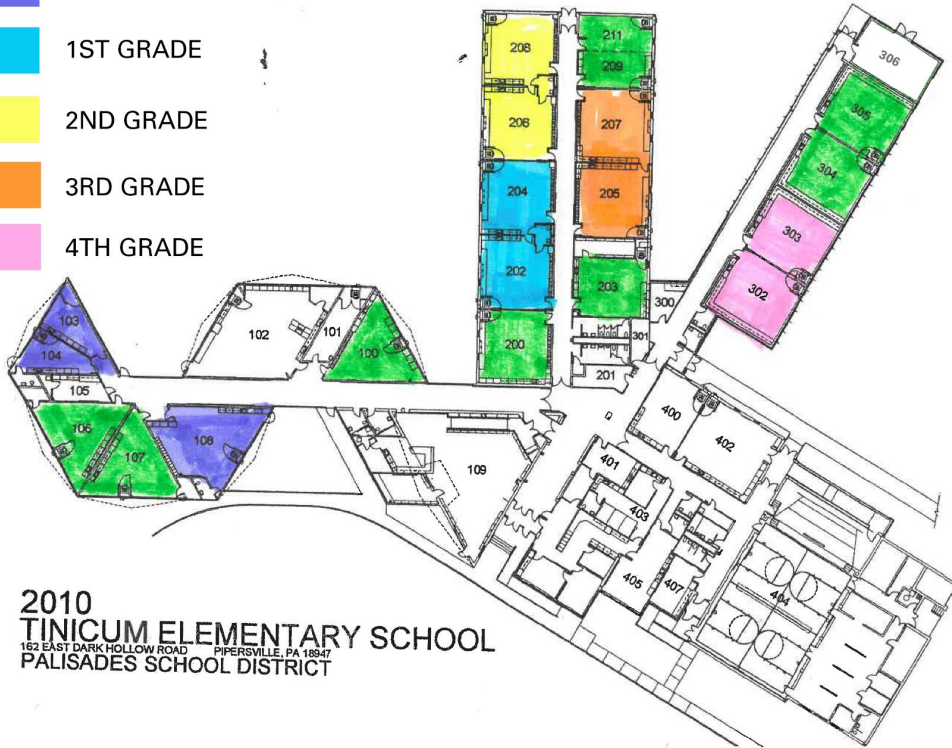

SECOND FLOOR PLAN

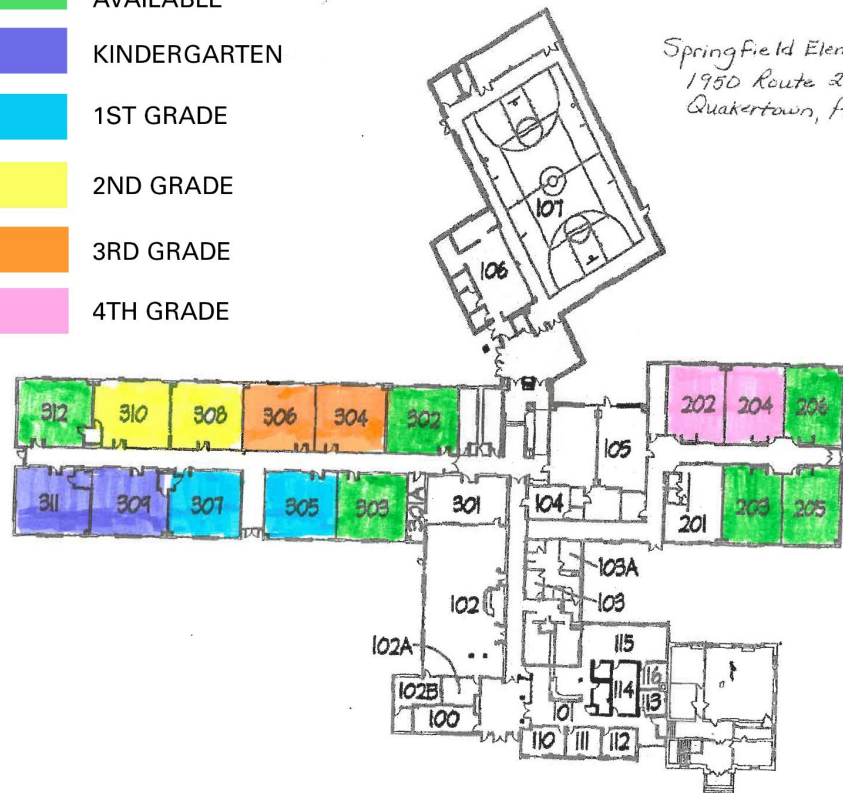


FIRST FLOOR PLAN

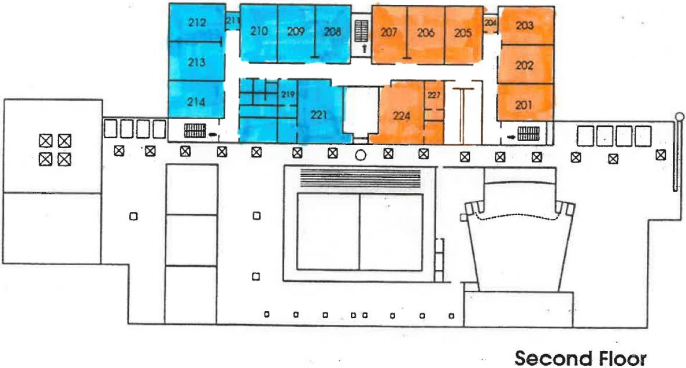

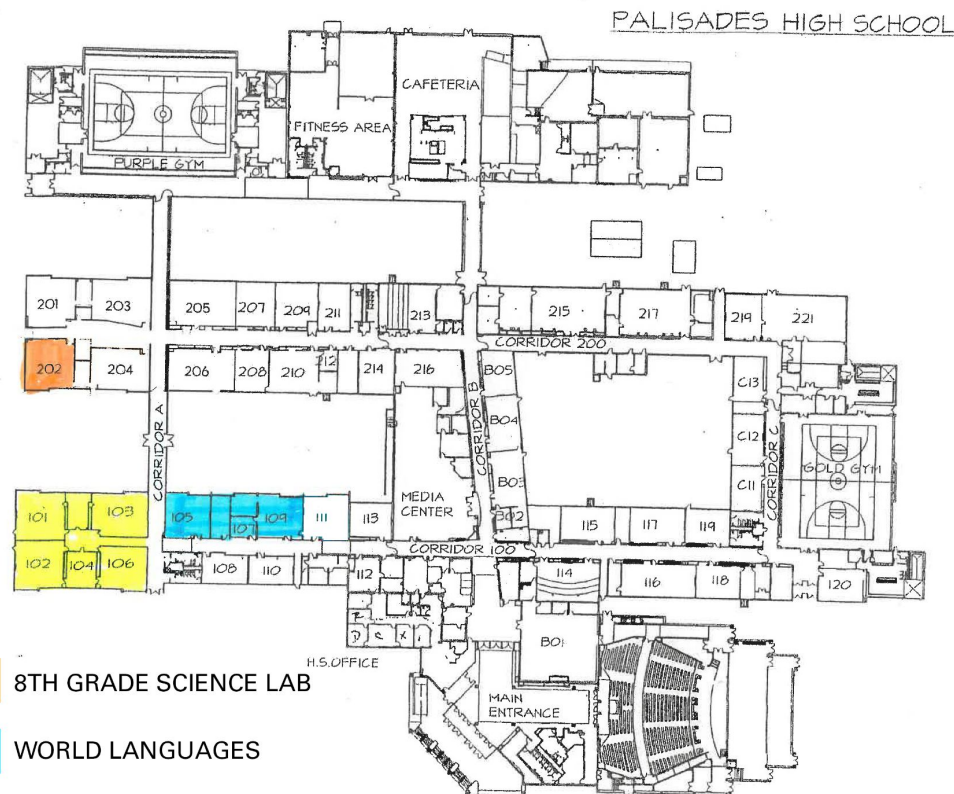

Preliminary Review of Impact of 2, K-4 buildings :

Considerations:

- Redistricting students from three buildings to two
 - Moving furniture/materials to accommodate grade levels in each building
- Transportation
 - Additional time is needed to create routes and determine length of time on the bus with two elementary buildings instead of three.
- No programmatic changes (schedule, specials, lunch/recess)
- Sufficient classroom space exists in all buildings to accommodate special programs including Pre-K, autistic support, emotional support and IU classrooms for students with multiple disabilities.

Preliminary Review of Impact: 5-7 Building

Considerations:

- 5th graders would have self-contained space on first floor and follow the current time allotment for elementary classes
 - 5th grade furniture and materials would need to move to PALMS
- 7th grade would be on the second floor and both 6th and 7th would follow the current middle school schedule
- Students in all grades have access to involvement in clubs and co-curricular activities (musical, ensemble groups, etc.)
- 7th graders assume building leadership roles/opportunities
- As per PA Law in 2026, K - 5 require 30 minutes of recess/day.
 - Additional outside equipment, like basketball hoops and permanent Gaga pit are considerations
- 5th graders would move to a secondary bus run which is earlier in the morning. Assigned seats in front of the bus behind the driver will keep 5th graders separate and supervised.

Preliminary Review of Impact: 8 - 12 Building

Considerations for 8th graders:

- Expanded academic opportunities for 8th graders:
 - Earn high school credit for level I world language^
 - Earn high school credit for Algebra 1 and Geometry^
 - Diverse elective* options
- Students that take advantage of early credit options will then have more room in their schedule as an upperclassman for dual enrollment, Advanced Placement and elective courses as well as early dismissal (work, college courses) and/or early graduation.
- Dedicated classroom space as a cohort including science lab.
- Earlier access to fitness center in PE curriculum
- Continued participation in co-curricular activities (music, cybersonics) with new opportunities such as Unified Sports
- Participation in the fall play and spring musical

^may require revision to Board policy

*PHS electives are currently under enrolled and range in class size from 4-24 students. Declining enrollment in electives is due to declining high school enrollment overall and 9th graders that attend UBCTS take all electives in their program area



Preliminary Review of Impact on Faculty

- While it is too early to provide specific implications of consolidation, the following statements are accurate:
 - Need for teachers to travel between buildings will be reduced or eliminated.
 - Should there be a reduction of (1) position at the elementary level, that position can be transitioned to become K - 7 PAL teacher without increasing staffing.
 - Elementary specialists will have full schedules* to teach in their primary area.
 - Secondary staffing may have reductions independent of consolidation. Comp plan includes review of class sizes and potential establishment of minimum enrollment to run a class.
 - Possible reclassification of (1) position as an interventionist for the middle school
 - Reassign an elementary counselor to provide services in new configuration to provide high level of support through transition.

*a full time schedule with 3 buildings is 36 classes in a 6 day cycle. Currently, due to single classes in certain grades in 2 buildings, specialists teach 27 classes in a 6 day cycle.

Preliminary Review of Expenditure Reduction/Revenue

Until a decision is made about building consolidation, these numbers are only estimates and are **conservative**.

Was fortunate to be involved in the hiring process for the new teacher and from applicants and from parents they want a balance for middle school students to be able to explore areas of interest. Shared that there needs to be more communication to parents and students about the schedule, how student needs will be met, and how teachers will be supporting students during the Pirate Block. Dr. Beerer also asked about what types of intervention programs are available for students at the middle level.
Director Landis	Shared some confusion about how Pirate Block is managed and scheduled.
Director LeBlanc	Likes the idea of Pirate Block (a more mature version of the elementary What I Need period) and is supportive of it.
Director Nilsen	Appreciated that the staff recommended to learn more about writing and that we are including that in the professional development schedule. Jennifer Weland (Springfield)	Concerned about Buccaneers (male music group) losing out when other activities, like sports, won't be, since sometimes students are dismissed early to travel a distance.
Tanya Reese (Nockamixon)	Asked about students who need the academic supports, but truly enjoy other activities, like music or band, etc.
Josephine Williams (Bridgeton)	What happens to students who are in WEB and need academic support during Pirate Block if they want other activities? Also asked about instrumental involvement. Shared that she believes if a student who struggles in reading and has a class for an hour and then 43 more minutes during Pirate Block for reading, it might be too much.
Kim Barbaro	Agrees about the resource period model going away. Shared that we are fortunate

(Nockamixon)	to have a small school and that we need students to be able to participate in lots of different things. Asked about the communication loop from parents to the school with comments or concerns.
Erin Shea (Reigelsville)	Asked how many students will be in each group and how long to develop the skills.
Drew Williams (Bridgeton)	Asked what the percentage is of students who require intervention in the building.
Linda Wenhold (Springfield)	Asked for clarification on the electives and number of them.
Jill Williams (Bridgeton)	Asked if we can guarantee that if a student wants to participate in band, chorus, and orchestra that they won't be pulled during lunch or before/after school because that would impact how strong these programs have been. Stated that it's important that students have the ability to do all of the activities/sports because we are a small district.
