Course Description:

Supervised Agricultural Education is a structured, work-based learning program for agricultural education students that combines foundational career development with hands-on immersion projects.

Special Notes (i.e., extended periods, team teaching, etc.):

Ideally this class would be offered during the seventh hour to allow flexibility in scheduling student work-place visits. Students will be expected to physically attend class, however immersion SAEs could also include work place supervision and visits by the agriculture instructor.

RATIONALE, OBJECTIVES, STRATEGIES

1. Course Rationale

A) What is the evidence of student need for this course? What student data shows that students are interested in this course?

Students currently keep record books on their own time and will schedule recordbook checks either after school, during lunch or a current agriculture class. If the SAE class was implemented students would have a set time to focus on SAE and career development, allowing for more success with record book interviews and a deeper understanding of the record keeping process.

B) What departmental needs/goals would this course meet?

It will strengthen the Ag Business career pathway in all Agriculture career pathways by providing a Group 5 Work Place Experience opportunity for students.

C) What institutional needs/goals would this course meet?

Our new strategic plan has a goal that focuses on Career and Technical Education programming. This course also allows students to demonstrate higher level thinking skills. Students will have the opportunity to strengthen their established Supervised Agriculture Experience Programs (SAEPs) and will be encouraged to participate in Section level interviews and the State Degree process with their projects.

Course Description:

This course will concentrate on expanding students' knowledge and experiences with agricultural mechanics utilized in the agricultural industry. Units of instruction will include: personal safety, project planning and design, electrical systems, small gas engines, land surveying, and employability skills. Students will gain basic knowledge of each of these areas that can be applied to various industries. Participation in FFA is an integral course component.

RATIONALE, OBJECTIVES, STRATEGIES

1. Course Rationale

A) What is the evidence of student need for this course? What student data shows that students are interested in this course?

Our XELLO student survey data shows that 23% of students want courses with hands-on learning activities, and 25% of students selected hands-on or mechanical work for an environment they would enjoy in the future. Current course requests are more than seats available.

B) What departmental needs/goals would this course meet?

It will add a career pathway in Agriculture so that we have two pathways: an agriculture business pathway and an agriculture mechanics/construction pathway.

C) What institutional needs/goals would this course meet?

Our new strategic plan has a goal that focuses on Career and Technical Education programming. This course also allows students to demonstrate higher level thinking skills.

What is the potential impact of this course on the other department offerings? This course will provide more opportunities for students interested in agriculture and will bring students into the program who are interested in the construction side of Career and Technical Education.

Course Description:

This course will focus on the knowledge, hands-on skills, and work place skills applicable to construction in the agricultural industry. Units of instruction will include: personal safety, hand tools, power tools, blueprint reading, surveying, construction skills in carpentry, plumbing, electricity, concrete, block laying, drywall, and painting. Careers such as agricultural engineers, carpenter, plumber, electrician, concrete and block layers, finishers, safety specialists, and other related occupations will be examined. Participation in FFA is an integral course component.

We will need a shop space in order to run this course.
