RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Samuel Evans began teaching Government at Alamo Colleges District - Palo Alto College as an adjunct/dual credit instructor in 2016 and became a full-time instructor in 2017;

WHEREAS, he earned the rank of Assistant Professor in 2021 and Associate Professor in 2024;

WHEREAS, he became Chair of the Behavioral Sciences Department in 2024;

WHEREAS, he earned a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte;

WHEREAS, he earned a Master of Science in International Relations from Troy University;

WHEREAS, he earned a Master of Arts in Education with a Political Science Concentration from St. Mary's University in San Antonio;

WHEREAS, he earned a Graduate Certificate in Political Science from Sam Houston State University;

WHEREAS, he was working towards a Master of Public Administration from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill;

WHEREAS, his work with the Palo Alto College Honors program contributed to student success, student excellence, and experiential learning opportunities through advising the Honors Legacy Club, co-directing the Palo Alto College Honors program and helping to rebuild the program during the Covid era effectively doubling its enrollment, and co-founding the San Antonio Honors Program Consortium—a county-wide association of college and university honors programs—which held its first major honors research symposium at Palo Alto College in 2024;

WHEREAS, he went to great lengths to support students and provide them additional educational opportunities through offering independent study courses above and beyond his normal teaching expectations and also offering his study abroad course;

WHEREAS, he consistently volunteered to serve the needs of Palo Alto College through activities such as volunteering for PACfest and representing the Social Sciences Department on the Palo Alto College Faculty Senate;

WHEREAS, he maintained a close relationship with the San Antonio community after teaching at Harlandale High School for several years;

WHEREAS, he was a proud United States Air Force veteran and was able to utilize that background to connect with other students and colleagues across campus;

WHEREAS, he was a highly respected colleague and close friend to those he worked with;

WHEREAS, he always demonstrated the utmost care and concern for his students providing them with a supportive environment;

WHEREAS, he always maintained high standards in his teaching, and;

WHEREAS, Samuel Evans passed away suddenly on December 6, 2024;

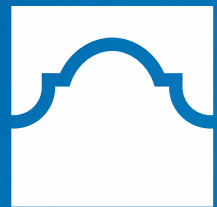

PURPOSE

The former briefing room within the Santikos Micronaut Center will be renamed to recognize the naming donation made by the Boeing Company in support of the Pre-kindergarten to third grade immersive Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) experiences of this program.

Since its opening in 2023, the Santikos Micronaut Center has engaged more than 2600 students and 1300 adults with immersive space mission simulations to inspire STEAM career pathways to enrich our community.

The briefing room is where every Micronaut begins and ends their mission with the reminder that they were in a special program at “San Antonio College” and we encourage them to come back often as they pursue their lifelong learning.

BACKGROUND:

The Boeing Company has been a donor of the Scobee Education Center since our work with them in 2023 with the eclipse educator and public programming. The Boeing Company funded educator programming during the 2024-25 academic year and the naming of the Boeing Briefing Room within the Santikos Micronaut Center will recognize their naming donation and their support of STEAM education programming at San Antonio College and within the Alamo Colleges District for generations.

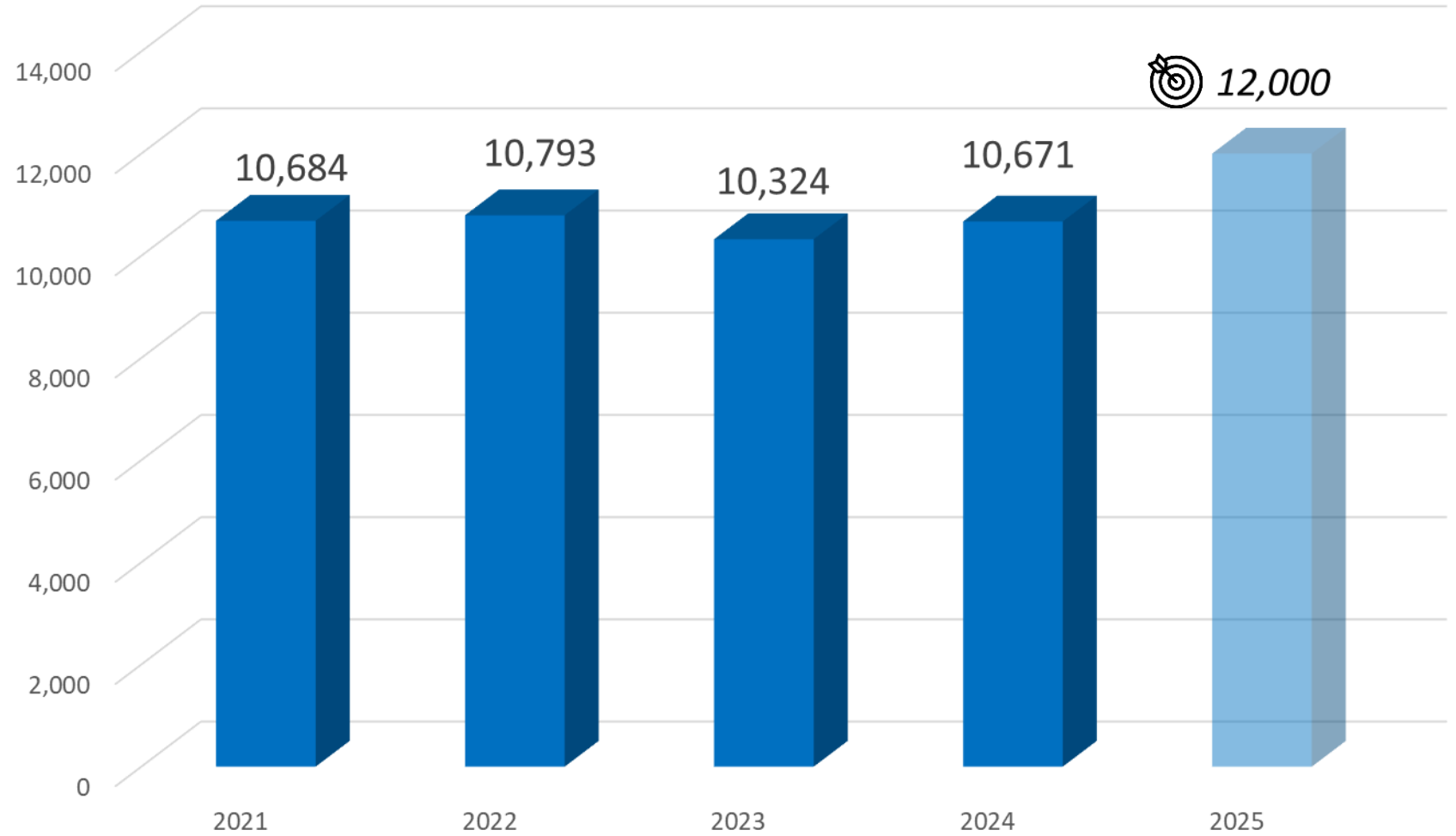

These two actions result in a Combined tax rate of \$0.149150/\$100 of assessed valuation for FY 2025/26 which is less than the No-New-Revenue tax rate of \$0.151134/\$100 of assessed valuation and less than the Voter-Approval tax rate of \$0.165621/\$100 of assessed valuation. The Board hereby ratifies its implied delegation to the Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration or delegate to calculate the no-new-revenue tax rate and the voter-approval tax rate relying on the Bexar County Tax Assessor-Collector and hereby authorizes and directs the Vice Chancellor or delegate to provide the public notices on appropriate dates as required by the Texas Tax Code. Following such notice, the Board of Trustees shall deliberate and vote on the final tax rate, within the applicable time frame set out in the Texas Property Tax Code.”

PURPOSE

The Alamo Colleges District strives to make higher education readily affordable while making every effort to keep its tax rates as low as possible.

In accordance with the Debt Management Plan approved by the Board in June 2025, there is no recommended change to the property tax rate - the Combined rate will remain at \$0.149150/\$100 of assessed valuation.

BACKGROUND

For the 2025 tax rate, Alamo Colleges District has developed a stable rate strategy to address the fiscal needs of the college. The District’s stable rate strategy results in the following:

- Debt Tax rate: No change to the debt portion of the tax rate because revenues produced are sufficient for required FY26 Debt Service Payments on Capital Improvement Program G.O. Bonds and Maintenance Tax Notes.
- Maintenance & Operations Tax rate: No change to the M&O portion for a balanced operating budget funding inflationary cost pressure and strategic student success initiatives (AlamoADVISE, AlamoPROMISE, and continuing AlamoBOOKS+ which funds the costs of Instructional materials for students.

The proposed Combined tax rate is \$0.149150/\$100 of assessed valuation. The recommended M&O tax rate of \$0.107760/\$100 of assessed valuation is lower than the current year calculated No-New-Revenue tax rate of \$0.109767/\$100 of assessed valuation, and lower than the Voter- Approval rate of \$0.118548/\$100 of assessed valuation. The Debt rate of \$0.041390/\$100 of assessed valuation will raise the revenue needed for FY 2025/26 debt service payments and other actions per the approved FY 2026 Debt Management Plan. The Combined tax rate of \$0.149150/\$100 is lower than the No- New-Revenue tax rate of \$0.151134/\$100 of assessed valuation, and lower than the Voter-Approval rate of \$0.165621/\$100 of assessed valuation.

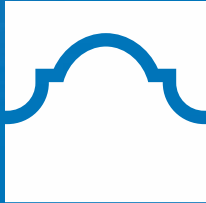

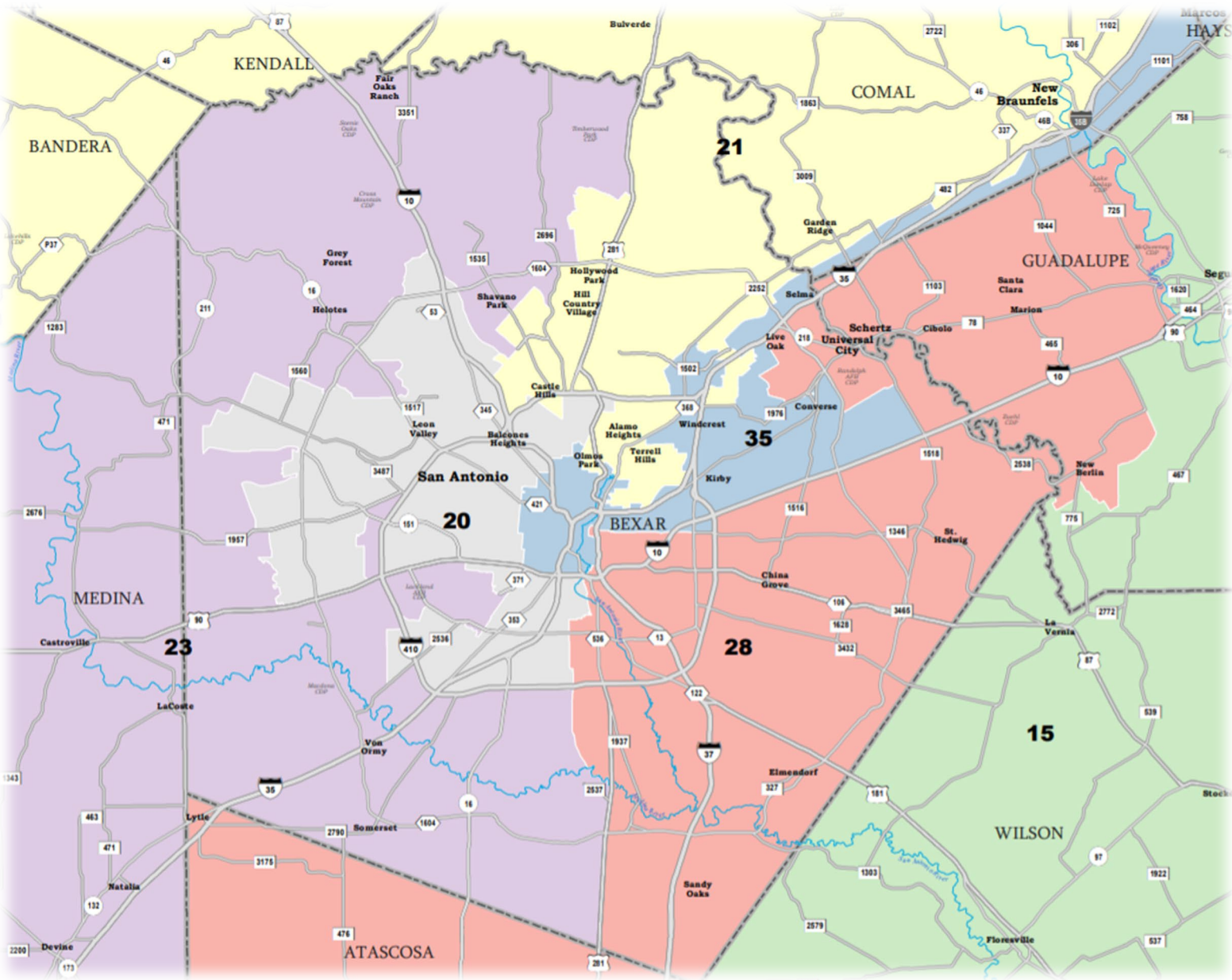
- **What does the bill do?**
 - Restricts use of certain spaces based on sex
 - Defines sex as male or female
 - Restrictions specifically focused on multiple-occupancy private spaces
- **Exceptions** provided for custodial work, maintenance, rendering medical care, providing assistance to an individual with special needs, law enforcement, and safety.
 - **Exception also for children under the age of 9** who are with a parent and entering a multiple occupancy private space of the opposite sex.
- **Complaints:**
 - Can be filed by a resident to the Office of the Attorney General
- **Penalties:**
 - \$25,000 for the first violation
 - \$125,000 for the second violation
 - Each day the entity is violating the statute is considered a separate violation

The Alamo Colleges District is committed to fostering equitable access to higher education. In alignment with Texas Education Code §51.931, this policy enables applicants to restart their academic journey by excluding college-level coursework completed five or more years prior to enrollment from admissions consideration.

Eligibility

Applicants may request Academic Fresh Start if they meet the following criteria:

- Are a Texas resident applying for undergraduate admission to any college within the Alamo Colleges District.
- Have completed college-level coursework five (5) or more years prior to the semester of intended enrollment.
- Submit a written request for Academic Fresh Start to the Office of Admissions and Records at their respective colleges.

Policy Statement

Upon approval of an Academic Fresh Start request, all academic credits and grades earned for a time period specified in the request, which must have been credited five or more years prior to enrollment, will be excluded from degree requirements, GPA calculations, or academic standing.

Consideration for Professional Programs

Students admitted under Academic Fresh Start who later apply to professional programs will be evaluated based on their academic performance following Fresh Start enrollment, along with any additional criteria established by the specific program.

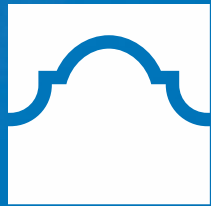

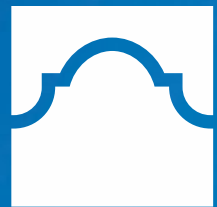

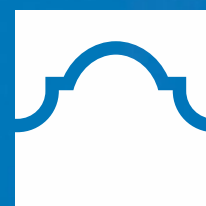

- The Academic Boycotts and International Academic Engagement Policy is required by Texas Education Code § 51.987.
- Section 51.987 prohibits academic boycotts that would prevent a student or faculty from studying or conducting research in or about, or interacting with the scholars or representatives of, a country not included by the United States Department of State on a list of state sponsors of terrorism.
- The policy is drafted to harmonize the requirements of § 51.987 and Texas Executive Order GA-48 restricting interactions with foreign adversaries

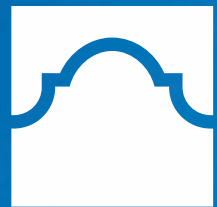

F.09.02 Academic Boycotts and International Academic Engagement Policy

Responsible Department: Vice Chancellor of Academic Success

Board Adoption: 09-16-25

Last Amended:

This policy affirms the Alamo Colleges District's commitment to academic freedom, international collaboration, and compliance with law. It curtails academic boycotts that restrict the ability of students and faculty members to engage in international scholarly activities.

The College District recognizes that the free exchange of ideas is essential to the academic mission and to fostering an informed and inclusive educational environment.

To uphold these values, the College District prohibits academic boycotts that would interfere with the ability of students or faculty members to participate in international scholarly activities. Specifically, no academic boycott may prevent students or faculty from studying or conducting research in or about a foreign country, restrict interaction with scholars, academic institutions, or representatives of a foreign country, or limit participation in academic conferences, joint research, exchange programs, or other scholarly collaborations.

Exceptions to this prohibition are permitted only when the target of the boycott is a country officially designated as a state sponsor of terrorism by the U.S. Department of State or as required by Texas law or Executive Order. The College District will review the most current list of countries so designated annually to ensure accuracy and compliance.

All academic departments and units are responsible for complying with this policy. Academic boycotts are strongly disfavored and any proposed must be submitted in writing and receive prior approval from the Department of Academic Success. Non-compliance with this policy may result in disciplinary action in accordance with applicable procedures.

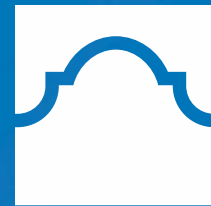

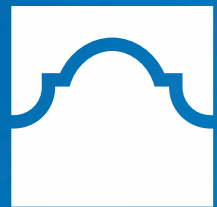

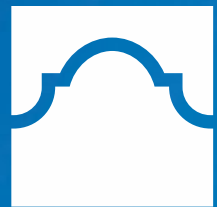

Dear Mr. Kingsbery:

Added by Senate Bill 2 during the second special session of the 88th legislature, Section 6.0301 of the Texas Property Tax Code applies to appraisal districts established in counties with populations of 75,000 or more and modifies the structure of the Bexar Appraisal District Board of Directors. As a result of this change, three members were elected by majority vote in the May 2024 general election. These elected members joined the five directors appointed by the taxing units that participate in the district, as prescribed by Section 6.03, Texas Property Tax Code.

In accordance with Section 5.13(d) of the Texas Property Tax Code, the appointed members drew lots at the board's first meeting in 2025 to determine the length of their terms: three members serving a term of three years, starting January 1, 2025, and ending December 31, 2027, and two members serving a term of one year, starting January 1, 2025, and ending December 31, 2025. Moving forward, all members appointed after December 31, 2025, will serve four-year terms.

To begin the appointment process for the **two** four-year terms, beginning January 1, 2026, and ending December 31, 2029, each taxing unit authorized to vote may nominate one candidate for each position. Nominations for the two positions must be submitted to the chief appraiser **by October 15th via a resolution of the governing body of the tax unit.**

To serve as a member of the board of directors, your nominee must meet the following requirements:

- Be a resident of the district for at least two years immediately preceding the date they take office (*Section 6.03(a)*)
- Not be an employee of a participating tax unit unless also a member of the governing body or an elected official (*Section 6.03(a)*)

- Not have engaged in the business of appraising property for compensation or has represented property owners for compensation in proceedings under this title in the appraisal district at any time during the preceding three years or be related within the second degree by consanguinity or affinity, as determined under Chapter 573, Government Code, to an individual who is engaged in the business of appraising property for compensation or has represented property owners for compensation in proceedings under this title in the appraisal district (*Section 6.035(a)(1) & (a-1)(2)*)

- Not own property on which delinquent property taxes have been owed for more than 60 days after the date the person knew or should have known of the delinquency. This restriction does not apply if the person is paying the delinquent taxes or has deferred or abated a suit to collect delinquent taxes (*Section 6.035(a)(2) & 6.412(a)(2)*)

- Not have served as a member of the board of directors for all or part of five terms unless the individual was the county assessor-collector at the time the individual served (*Section 6.035(a-1) (A)*)


The number of votes each taxing unit is entitled to cast in this year's appointment process has been calculated and included. Before October 30, the chief appraiser will mail a ballot to the presiding officer of each taxing unit. After receiving the ballot, each eligible taxing unit must cast its allotted votes by resolution of its governing body and submit the votes to me before December 15.

Please note, under Section 6.03 of the Texas Property Tax Code, any taxing unit with at least 5% of the total votes in the appointment process must adopt its resolution at the first or second open meeting of the governing body held after receiving the ballot.

Votes will be counted as soon as possible after the December 15 deadline, and the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be declared appointed. The chief appraiser will submit the results to the taxing units by December 31.

"The voting entitlement of a taxing unit that is entitled to vote for directors is determined by dividing the total dollar amount of property taxes imposed in the district by the taxing unit for the preceding tax year by the sum of the total dollar amount of property taxes imposed in the district for that year by each taxing unit that is entitled to vote, by multiplying the quotient by 1,000, and rounding the product to the nearest whole number. That number is multiplied by the number of directorships to be filled. A taxing unit participating in two or more districts is entitled to vote in each district in which it participates, but only the taxes imposed in a district are used to calculate voting entitlement in that district."

***A recent amendment to Section 6.03, Texas Tax Code states "A taxing unit with at least 5% of the total votes in the election for Bexar Appraisal District Board of Directors must determine its vote by resolution adopted at the first or second open meeting of the governing body that is held after the date the chief appraiser delivers the ballot to the presiding officer of the governing body."**

Please find attached the Alamo Colleges District Police Department's Monthly CLERY Act activity report through August 2025 and the yearly totals summary page. Please note that the report reflects new CLERY reporting activity categories enacted in 2008 and required beginning in 2009 when a bias motivation is present, including the Theft / Larceny category, which was not part of the previous CLERY reporting requirement; however, it was previously included for informational purposes. None were motivated by bias or hate. The CLERY Act was amended in 2011, effective for reporting year 2011, to include reports received for Simple Assault that are motivated by bias or hate. Simple Assaults are included in this report for information purposes; however, none were motivated by bias or hate. The CLERY Act was amended in 2014 as per VAWA and Campus SaVE Acts, effective 2015, to include reports of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking.

Burglary of a motor vehicle is considered a theft from a vehicle under Uniform Crime Reporting definitions and therefore is included in the Theft category for CLERY purposes. For CLERY reporting purposes the Theft / Larceny category includes all thefts and burglary of motor vehicle reports made to the Alamo Colleges District Police Department and is reported as one total when reported to the Department of Education and published by the Department in its annual report. They have, however, been separated for this report.

Theft totals listed on this report include all thefts of district property and personal property belonging to students, faculty and staff reported to the Alamo Colleges District Police Department.

The CLERY Act was amended in 2014 as per VAWA and Campus SaVE Acts, effective 2015, to include reports of Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking.
None of the activities reflected in this report were bias-motivated but are provided for informational purposes.

Significant Activity in August:

*The reports below include arrests by being booked into 201 N. Comal (The Justice Intake Assessment Annex), by being issued a citation (other than traffic), or by being detained and released with possible pending charges being filed with the Bexar County District Attorney's Office.

- 1) **SAC (077330 – Felony Warrant)** On 08/01/2025, Officers were patrolling SAC when dispatch alerted officers of a male suspect who was reported as appearing intoxicated. The suspect description was relayed by dispatch, and the suspect was in the SAC courtyard between the Science Building and the Nursing Allied Health Building. Upon contacting the suspect and identifying him (non-student), he was discovered to have warrants out of Bexar County. He was arrested and transported to the Bexar County Jail.
- 2) **SAC (077340 – Criminal Mischief)** On 08/03/2025, while patrolling parking garage two at SAC, an Officer found burnt debris in the stairwell. The debris was against the wall in the stairs and had charred the wall. The damage was reported to facilities. No suspects were identified for this incident.
- 3) **SWC (077343 – Theft)** On 08/04/2025, Officer was dispatched to the Campus Police Office at SWC for a report from an employee regarding a stolen trailer. The employee stated they last saw the trailer on August 2, 2025, in the afternoon, around 5 pm. The trailer was hooked up to a truck in Parking Lot 11. The employee noticed the trailer was gone on August 4th at 5 am. The case was assigned to detectives for follow-up investigation.
- 4) **ACCESS (077357 – Emergency Detention)** – On 08/05/2025, Officers patrolling ACCESS encountered a male (non-student) who was appearing disoriented and confused. The officer approached and asked if the male needed assistance. The male stated he believed someone was following him. He then said he was on medication but hadn't taken his medication in some time. Officers offered to take the male to the hospital, and he accepted the offer. MEDCOM was notified, and he was handcuffed and transported to the San Antonio Behavioral Center.
- 5) **SPC (077394 – Burglary of a Vehicle)** On 08/12/2025, an Officer was dispatched to parking lot #13 at St. Phillips College for a burglary of a vehicle. Dispatch described the suspect. Upon arrival at parking lot 13, officers located the suspect in the area. The suspect ran in an attempt to evade arrest. After detaining him and conducting further investigation, the male suspect (non-student) was found to have tools that the vehicle's owner described as missing from her vehicle. He was placed under arrest and transported to the SWC Campus Police Office. The suspect was questioned at the office and informed that charges would be filed for the burglary of a vehicle and evading arrest.
- 6) **SPC (077398 – Burglary of a Vehicle)** On 08/12/2025, an Officer was dispatched to parking lot #1 at St. Phillips College for a report of burglary of a vehicle. The reporting party could not identify a suspect. This burglary is consistent with a burglary that happened earlier, where the suspect was identified and arrested. The vehicle was a Kia, which was similar to the other burglarized vehicle on the same campus. This suspect in that case will be added to this case.
- 7) **SAC (077399 – Felony Warrant)** On 08/13/2025, an officer was dispatched to SAC for suspicious activity. Upon arrival, officers located individuals who reported that a male was hiding in the bushes near the ECO Central. The officer made contact with the male (non-student). The male cooperated and identified himself. The male had a warrant for his arrest and was transported to Bexar County Jail.
- 8) **SAC (077412 – Graffiti)** On 08/14/2025, an Officer was patrolling Parking Lot 23. During the patrol, the officer observed graffiti on a brick wall facing the "Commonwealth Coffee Shop". No suspects were identified in this incident. Facilities Department was notified about the graffiti.

- 9) **SAC (077421 – Emergency Detention)** On 08/15/2025, Officers were dispatched to a vehicle accident that occurred at Cypress and San Pedro. When the officer arrived, they found a female (non-student) had been struck by a vehicle. San Antonio Fire/EMS was called out to attend to her injuries. The driver of the vehicle was uninjured. After identifying both parties, the female appeared disoriented and claimed she was a police officer. The female refused to be transported to the hospital by EMS. A witness to the accident stated that the female walked into busy traffic without recognizing the oncoming traffic. MEDCOM was notified, and the female was transported to Methodist Hospital downtown. The driver of the vehicle had insurance but no valid license. The driver was cited for driving without a license.
- 10) **NVC (077438– Theft)** On 08/15/2025, Officers were dispatched to the Desert Willow Building for a female (employee) who wanted to report a stolen charging station. The employee stated that the charging station was in the center of her desk. There are no suspects identified for this incident. The case will be forwarded to detectives to determine if any camera footage can be obtained.
- 11) **SAC (077445 – Graffiti)** On 08/16/2025, Officers were patrolling the Loftin Center and observed graffiti on a wall on the third floor. There were not suspects identified for this incident. Facilities Department was notified, and this case will be referred to detectives.
- 12) **PAC (077451 – Vehicle Theft)** On 08/18/2025, Officers were dispatched to Palo Alto College Lot #6. A student reported that his truck had been stolen from the parking lot. The truck was a black Ford F250. A description of the truck was entered into the stolen vehicle database. There were no available suspects for the theft. The case has been referred to detectives.
- 13) **SAC (077472 – Criminal Mischief)** On 08/20/2025, the Officer was patrolling Palo Alto College and was dispatched to Lot #1 for a damaged vehicle. Upon arrival, the officer met with an employee who said someone had broken into his vehicle. The window was damaged, and the lock on the door had been removed and was on the ground. The owner of the vehicle did not report any items missing from the vehicle. This case has been referred to detectives.
- 14) **SAC (077475 – Possession of Drug Paraphernalia)** On 08/20/2025, Officers were patrolling Garage #2 and noticed a suspicious vehicle parked and running. The officer approached the vehicle and observed a male(non-student) in the driver's seat, lying back. Officers inquired about his welfare and smelled the odor of marijuana. Officers asked the individual if he was ok. The officers asked the individual to step out of the vehicle, and they searched for marijuana. Officers found a pipe containing marijuana. The individual was in a wheelchair and stated they were going to roll into traffic. The officer arrived and located the individual. The individual was disoriented and exhibited danger to themselves. MEDCOM was notified, and the individual was transported to Downtown Baptist Hospital.
- 16) **SAC (077500 – Emergency Detention)** On 08/22/2025, the Officer was patrolling SAC and dispatched to an emergency phone near the Jean Longwith building. The officer observed a male (non-student) going through a mental episode. The person was disoriented and verbalizing, causing harm to himself and others. 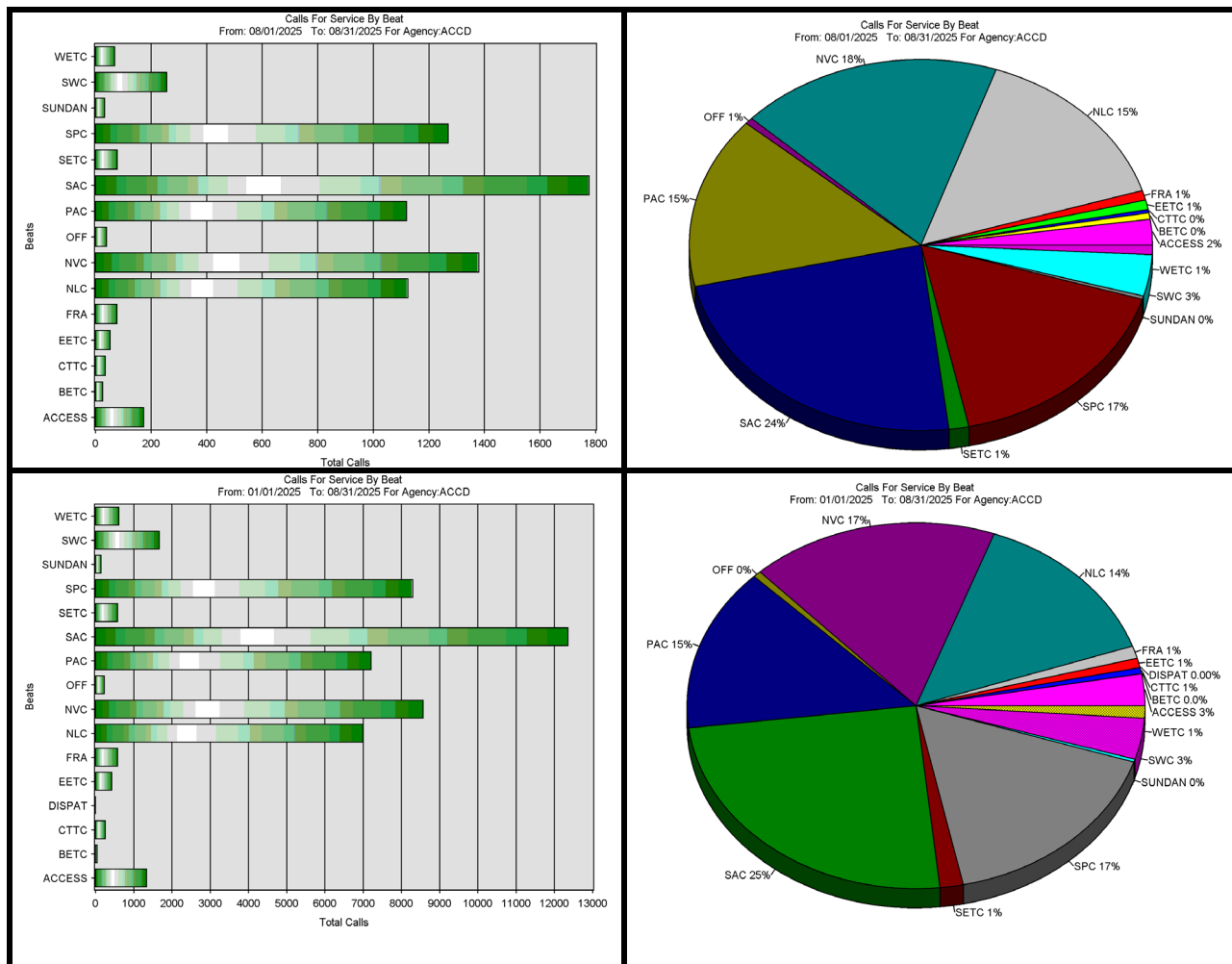
come and pick him up. The Facilities Department was notified of the damage to the tree and bushes, which were run over.

The officer arrived on the scene and located the male individual (non-student) matching the dispatch description. Upon contact with the individual, the officer observed the person to be intoxicated. The person admitted to taking the cones for their personal use. The cones were retrieved, and the individual was cited for Theft and transported to the city Magistrates for Public Intoxication.
- 22) SPC (077612 – Assault)** On 08/28/2025, the Officer was patrolling SPC and dispatched for a report of alleged sexual assault. Upon arrival and interviewing the individual (employee), she stated that she was grabbed from behind by her supervising coworker. The supervisor admitted to grabbing the female from behind. He said the hug was to console her. The male was reported to HR, and the incident was documented and is being handled administratively.

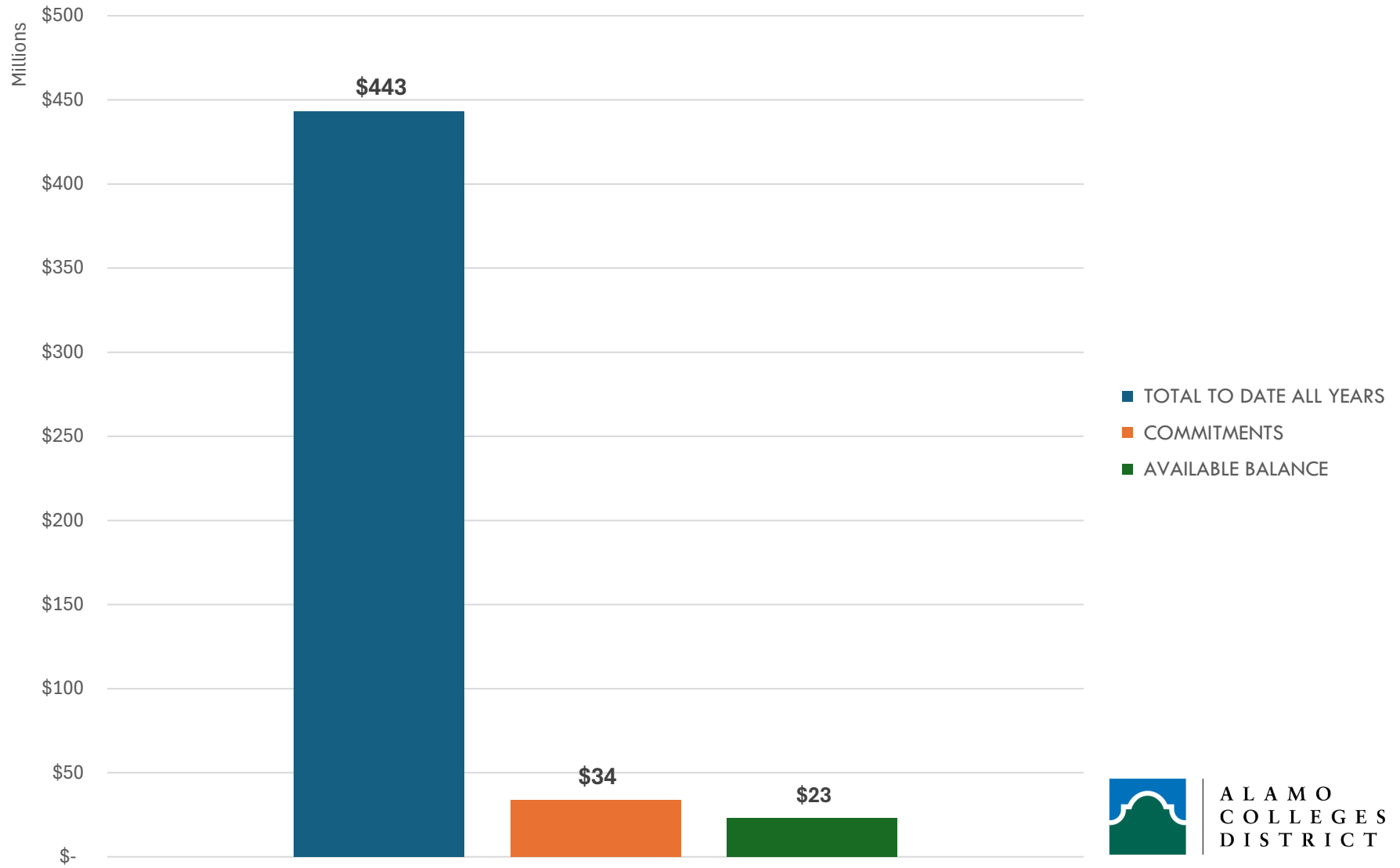

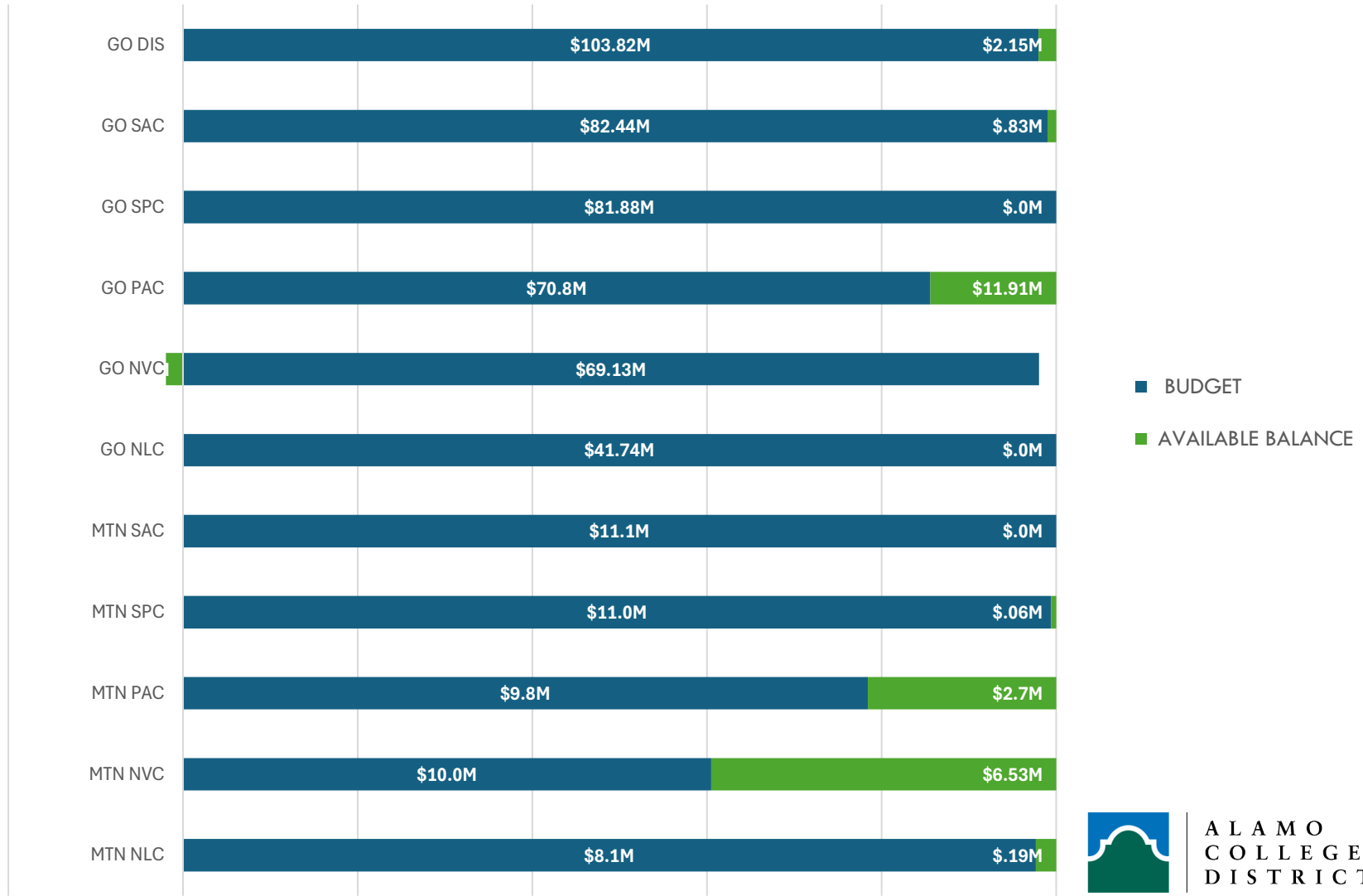

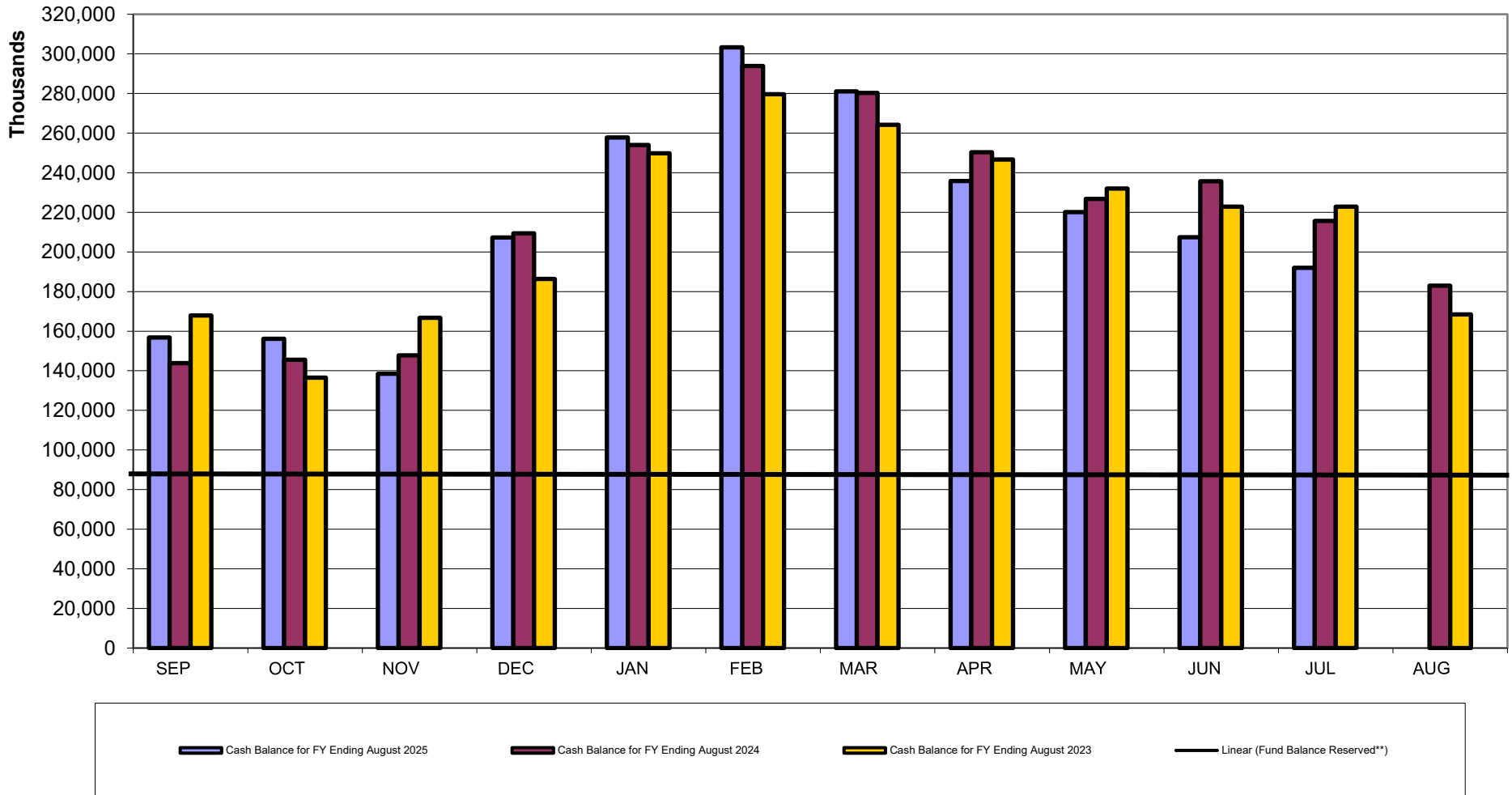

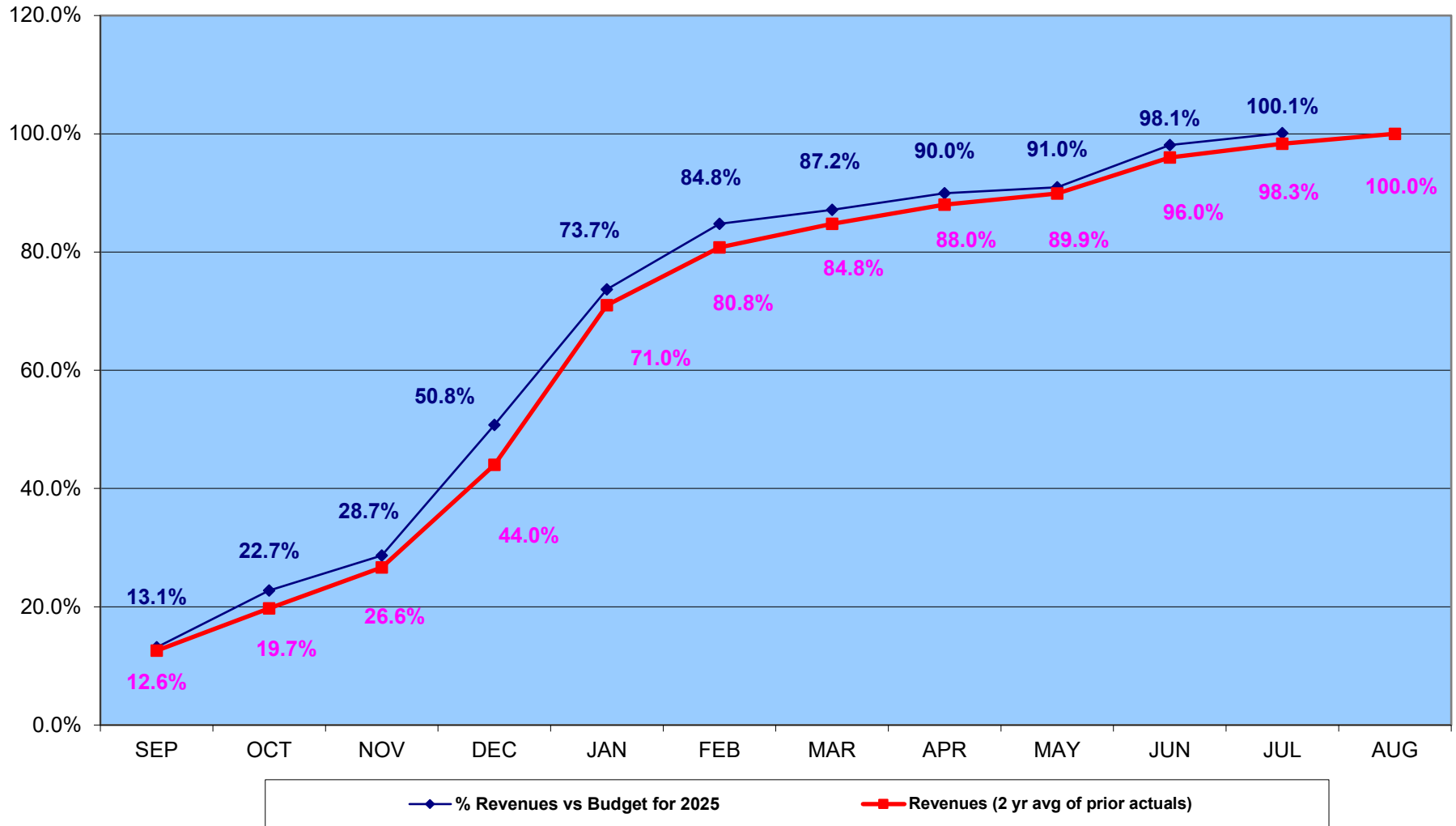

Through July 2025



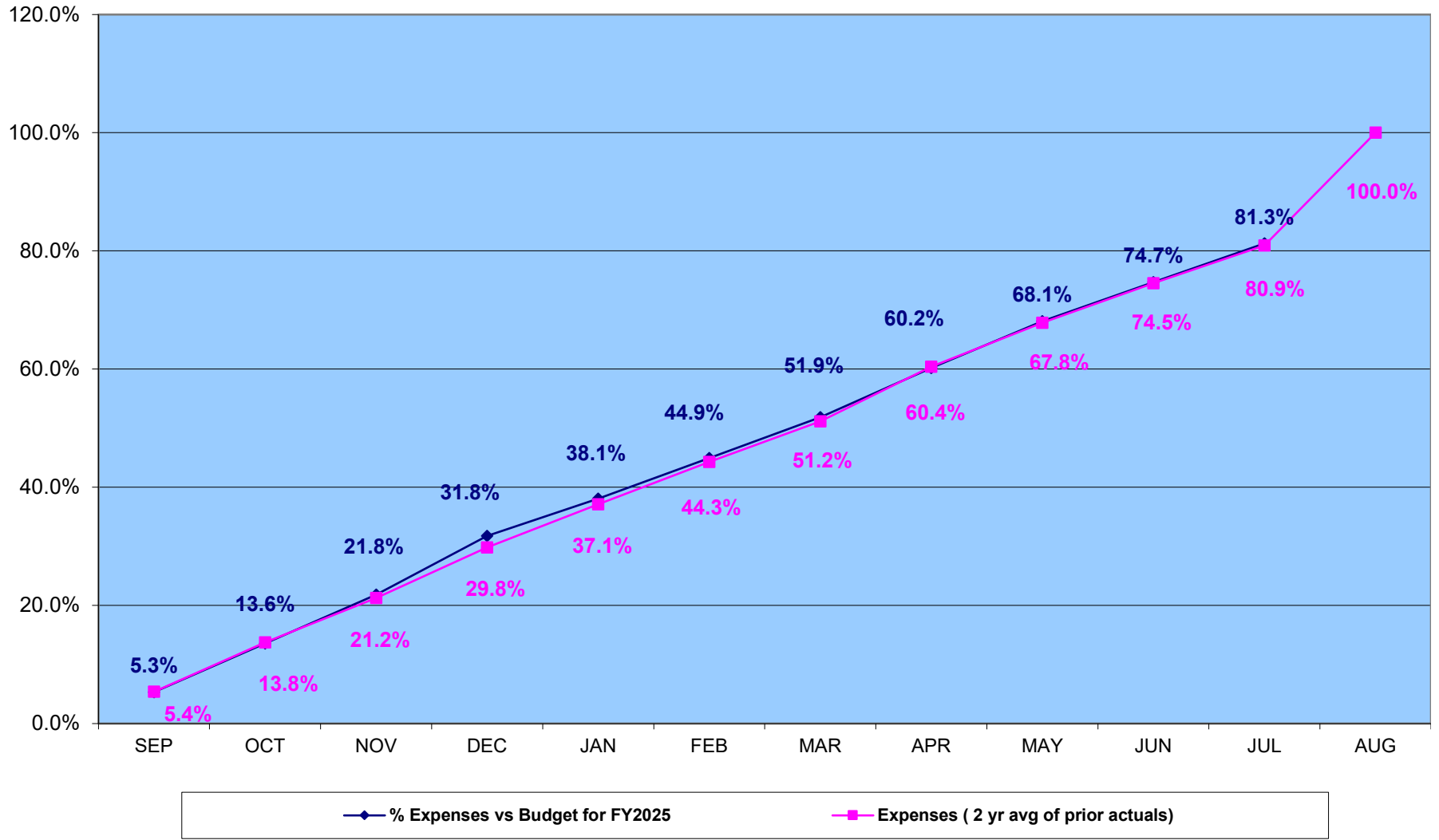

(1) Revenue Variance:

For the eleven-month period ended July 31, 2025, operating revenue grew by 3.3%, or \$17.1 million, reaching \$532.9 million—up from \$515.8 million in the prior year. This growth was driven primarily by a \$12.5 million increase in tuition and fee revenues and a \$7.7 million rise in tax revenue. These gains were partially offset by a \$3.1 million decline in other income.

- a) Tax revenues for FY25 and FY24 are \$263.7 and \$256.0 million, respectively. This represents a 3.0%, or \$7.7 million, increase over last year. The budget for tax revenues for FY25 and FY24 stand at \$271.4 million and \$255.4 million. The District continues to benefit from increasing taxable values in Bexar County. The projected ad valorem taxes increase as the taxable assessed value of properties across Bexar County providing a 6.3% increase in budgeted tax revenues, with no change to the property tax rate. This increase will continue to fund critical facilities maintenance and operations, expansion of workforce programs like nursing and high demand programs.
- b) Tuition and fees for FY25 increased by 10.7%, or \$12.5 million, compared to FY24. FY25 revenues are \$130.0 million, or 103.1% of the budget, versus FY24 revenues of \$117.5 million, or 100.6% of the budget. The positive variance in regular tuition is attributed to a strong increase in headcount and semester credit hours, offset by the Board's decision to reduce Out-of-District and Non-Texas/Non-Resident tuition rates to make the cost of attendance more affordable. Headcount enrollment for Fall 2024 increased by 10.9%, or 7,849 students, to 79,680. Fall 2024 semester credit hours also showed a similar increase of 11.1%, or 55,481 hours, reaching a total of 557,511 semester credit hours (as of 10/23/2024). Headcount enrollment for Spring 2025 increased by 12.0%, or 8,179 students, to 76,260. Spring 2025 semester credit hours also showed a strong increase of 4.6%, or 22,356 hours, reaching a total of 509,709 semester credit hours (as of 02/24/2025). Headcount enrollment for Summer 2025 increased by 19.6%, or 5,714 students, to 34,924. Summer 2025 semester credit hours also showed a strong increase of 24.0%, or 32,704 hours, reaching a total of 168,924 semester credit hours (as of 06/05/2025).
- c) State appropriations for the current and prior years are \$117.9 million and \$117.7 million, respectively, representing 102.2% and 100.8% of their respective fiscal year budgets. State appropriations include state-paid benefits (group health and retirement). Budgeted appropriations for FY25 are \$114.0 million, compared to \$116.8 million in the prior year.

(2) Expense Variance:

- a) The total All Funds expense budget approved by the Board of Trustees for FY 2024-2025 is \$976.9 million, comprised of \$528.6 million in operating expense and \$448.3 million in restricted funds. The goal of the operating expense budget is to continue to the momentum that we have created in positioning the Alamo Colleges District for "smart growth," which makes the most effective use of every dollar of revenue to support the economic and social mobility of the members of our community and the success of our students initiatives. The President of each of the five colleges maintains local control of their operating funds and distributes their respective allocated budget to: (a) funded employee positions, and (b) departmental operational expense accounts, based on the strategic initiatives and priorities at that location. The driving force behind the FY25 operating budget is funding the strategic priorities of the Alamo Colleges District (ACD) for our students. ACD, the largest higher education institution in South Texas and the only community college system to win the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award (twice), is working to fulfill Chancellor Dr. Mike Flores' moon shot vision of ending poverty in San Antonio through education. To make this bold vision a reality, the District and its five colleges - St. Philip's College, San Antonio College, Palo Alto College, Northwest Vista College and Northeast Lakeview College - are working to make access to a college education and successful completion of a degree or certificate accessible to all residents in its eight-county service area. ACD has implemented various investment strategies based on several identified community needs to provide accessible college education and opportunities for achieving student success.
- b) Operating expenses for FY25 and FY24 for the same period stand at 81.3% and 80.3% of the budget, respectively. Actual expenses for FY25 and FY24 are \$469.0 million and \$419.8 million, respectively, representing an increase of \$49.2 million

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Minute Order is to provide a monthly report of purchases exceeding \$200,000 and any fees charged by the various local, state, and national providers of Cooperative Purchasing (COOP) programs during June 2025 and July 2025. Not all COOP programs charge fees, and some COOP's offer cash rebates paid directly to Alamo Colleges. The Purchasing and Contract Administration Department utilizes the COOP programs to gain greater access to goods and services, cost savings through leveraged buying, and reduced administration costs by issuing fewer competitive bids and proposals. The combined buying power of public institutions throughout the State of Texas and nationally translates into savings and provides an efficient, cost effective and legal means for providing goods and services to departments throughout the Alamo Colleges in an expedited fashion.

BACKGROUND

Vendor contracts awarded through approved federal, state or cooperative purchasing agreements are a statutorily approved alternative to competitively procured vendor contracts. Only the following such contract purchases require prior Board approval:

- a. Purchases valued at \$200,000 or more in any 12-month period that will result in additional gross square footage (permanent or otherwise) that will require cleaning and maintaining and have at least two utilities present.
- b. Purchases valued at \$200,000 or more in any 12-month period that in the judgment of the Chancellor or Purchasing & Contract Administration would commit the College District or one of the colleges to an entirely new technology that would be pervasive for subsequent years.

For any cooperative purchasing contract valued at \$25,000 or more, Purchasing & Contract Administration shall document any contract-related fee, including any management fee. At least annually, Purchasing & Contract Administration shall present a written report regarding any contract-related fees, including any management fees, to the Board of Trustees at a properly posted open meeting.

PURPOSE

To cause the colleges of the Alamo Colleges District to adopt as programs of study and include within their catalogs, their existing Continuing Education programs and courses.

BACKGROUND

Career and technical education (CTE) certificates are a postsecondary credential, other than a degree, which a student earns upon successful completion of a CTE workforce or continuing education program offered by an institution of higher education. A CTE course earns either semester credit hours or continuing education units toward satisfaction of a requirement necessary to obtain an industry-recognized credential, certificate, or applied associate degree.

For CTE programs offered through continuing education programs to be reported to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, they must be part of the colleges' Programs of Study. Programs of Study work to align college and career readiness standards and career and technical education standards with the knowledge, skills, and abilities students are expected to demonstrate. Programs of Study incorporate multiple entry and exit points, which include industry-recognized certifications, Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degrees, and credit transfer agreements between community colleges. All courses in the Program of Study curricula must be adopted as published.

The Alamo Colleges District wishes to report CTE programs and courses offered through its continuing education division and as such approves their inclusion in the District's colleges Programs of Study and course catalogs.

The MTN22 Program includes 65 separately named projects, District-wide – grouped into 25 contract packages to simplify contracting activities.

The increase covers change orders to reconfigure the central plant mechanical system and equipment room to allow for safe access, workspace around the new equipment, and code compliance. The scope of the currently awarded contract primarily includes upgrades and improvements and/or replacement of HVAC systems including air handlers, air terminal boxes, exhaust fans, and automated HVAC controls; upgrades to LED lighting and lighting controls; and various mechanical, electrical, and plumbing system improvements to the buildings. Architecturally it consists of floor replacements including carpet and vinyl tile, ceilings, wall paint, new overhead doors, exterior doors and a manual gate upgrade.
