Regular Meeting – July 11, 2012

The regular monthly meeting of the Bristol Board of Education was held on Wednesday, July 11, at 7:00 p.m., at the Board of Education Administration Building, located at 129 Church Street, Bristol, Connecticut.

CALL TO ORDER, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE, MOMENT OF SILENCE

Chairman Wilson called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. and invited the audience to join him in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chairman Wilson introduced and welcomed Dr. Ellen Solek to the Board of Education; Dr. Solek came to us from East Haddam upon the departure of Dr. Streifer's at the end of April. Dr. Solek said that she is honored to be in Bristol, and she thanked the Board and her colleagues for such a warm welcome. She is excited to be here, and she is looking forward to a wonderful and successful year.

STUDENT RECOGNITION

Kid's Court Finalists - Chippens Hill Middle School

Chippens Hill Middle School teachers TaLoria Vance and Darlene Lefevre were present in the audience to introduce students from Chippens Hill that had participated in the annual Kids Court/Kids Speak essay competition sponsored by the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO). Chippens Hill took two of the top three spots: - Jaymie Bianca - 1st Place - Blue Team/ LA teacher - Janice Rustico, Pat Kjornattanawanich - 3rd Place - Gold Team/LA teacher- TaLoria Vance and Kelsea Wyrebek - 5th Place - Gold Team/LA teacher - TaLoria Vance. This is the second year in a row that Chippens Hill has taken first place in the middle school division. Jaymie Bianca and Pat Kjornattanawanich were present and stood to be recognized. Jamie shared her winning essay on Autism with the audience.

Madrigal Singers

Chairman Wilson announced that the Madrigal singers from Bristol Eastern, also known as A La Mode are participating in world choral games in Cincinnati. The group received silver while competing against choirs from around the world and several U.S. states. Such an accomplishment is indicative of the quality leadership provided by Michael Coderre, music director and the strong music program at Bristol Eastern. Hopefully we can get the group to attend the next Board meeting to showcase their talents.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Student Achievement

Commissioner Amara reported that the committee met on June 20th and reviewed six curricula; four of which will appear later on the agenda. The other two will appear at the August meeting for a second reading. The next meeting of the Student Achievement committee will be held July 23rd at 6:30 p.m. in Room 36.

Personnel Committee

Commissioner O'Brien reported that the committee met with respect to what was discussed at the inception of the budget – asking each of the unions to come in to review contracts and see if they are willing to extend the contract which would reduce the amount of salary increases so that we can stay within a reasonable budget. The most recent group to do so would be the secretaries union (Local 3551); they have agreed to a 1% increase over the next two years versus the 2% they were due. We want to thank them for their cooperation and their understanding of our situation. We will be ratifying the contract with Local 3551, so he wanted to bring that to the attention of the public.

Finance Committee

Chairman Wilson reported that the Finance committee met earlier this evening and Gary Franzi, Business Director went over our financials to date. He is in the process of closing out the year; we do not have a finalization of the all the accounts, but everything seems to be in good order. Secondly, the committee received copies of a report from Blum Shapiro in which they have made recommendations regarding our use of the Munis System and our accounting processes. We will be deliberating and perhaps implementing some of the recommendations within the next several months as well as sharing that report with the City side. The committee also received an update on the Conditional Funding Grant which administration is putting together; right now they are compiling data and the required information for submission to the State; we hope that we will be successful. We are one of 30 towns to receive this grant. Dr. Moreau added that Bristol is the birthplace of the model the State of Connecticut uses for school improvement and reform. This grant allows us to take initiatives we already have in place that we have proven with data to be effective and move them forward and expand upon them to improve our students education.

Operations Committee

Commissioner Fitzgerald reported that the committee met on June 19th. The Landtek Group, Inc. presented a proposal to the committee to fund an artificial turf field at Bristol Eastern High School in exchange for placement of solar panels throughout the district that generate the equivalence of 20% of our electricity usage annually. The Director of Sales, Peter Mielach presented a proposal to the committee and discussed a plan to install an athletic field at Bristol Eastern High School in exchange for the development of a renewable energy project. The execution of any agreement would require a multi-step process which the Operations Committee recommended be forwarded the proposal to the full Board for consideration.

Grants

Inter-district Cooperative Grant - Adventures in Peace Making and Diversity 2012-2013.

Denise Carabetta presented the Inter-district Cooperative Grant - Adventures in Peace Making and Diversity 2012-2013. We have participated with this grant for several years, it is for \$107,760.00. This grant had been funding programs at O'Connell School it will now switch to the West Bristol School. The program is for students in grades 3-5, they are engaged in multiple activities throughout the school year, often science based linked to the curriculum. This grant is administered through Bristol Youth Services.

Bristol Business Foundation Grants

The Bristol Business Education Foundation received a grant in the amount of \$2,500 from the Bridgestone Americas Trust Fund to purchase a SmartBoard specifically for Kimberly Hazelton's vocational education classroom at Bristol Eastern High School. This was facilitated through her association with Walter Dorman Manager of Safety and Human Resources at Firestone Building Products and awards the funds to the Bristol Board of Education for this purpose.

The Bristol Business Educational Foundation would like to present a grant for \$750 to purchase a projector for Bristol Central health teacher Christopher Carrier's classroom and awards the funds to the Bristol Board of Education for this purpose. Part of this grant comes from a \$250 restricted grant from Stop and Shop.

The Bristol Business Education Foundation would like to present the Board of Education with \$3,075 from their "Creating 21st Century Classrooms" initiative and awards the funds to the Bristol Board of Education to purchase advanced robotics kits to support the technology curriculum.

The Business Education Foundation received a grant in the amount of \$5,000 from the Frances Dewey Foundation to support the West Bristol Leadership Academy a peer-to-peer mentoring program at West Bristol School and awards the funds to the Bristol Board of Education for this program.

Main Street Foundation Grant

The Bristol Board of Education Mentor Program received a grant in the amount of \$2,500 from the Fuller and Myrtle Barnes Fund of the Main Street Community Foundation to support the West Bristol Leadership Academy a peer-to-peer mentoring program at West Bristol School.

Seamless Learning Grant

This is competitive grant. The application needs to be submitted by June 30th, and award notification will be given by July 31st. This grant proposal is for funds to provide educational and basic needs services to students in Bristol, who are or become homeless. These funds are used to meet needs for tutoring, clothing, school supplies, extended day and extended year programs, and other basic needs. This grant requires a match of \$5000; the source of the matching funds is the Title I, Part A grant required allocation for homeless students. The application is for \$20,000 of federal funding plus \$5000 of matched funding. An additional \$310 is awarded by the State Department for program evaluation purposes. At any time during the school year the district could have approximately 17 to 20 homeless students.

Intramural Program

Ellen Benham presented the newly established Middle School Intramural Program. There will be 5 intramural sessions per year. Each session will be 4 weeks long. Intramural groups will meet 2-3 times per week for approximately 2 hours. Each school can have up to 4 activities per session. Student interest will determine which activities will be offered each session. At the end of the four week session, participants from the four schools will come together for a round-robin jamboree, to be held on a Saturday. The location of the jamborees will rotate among the school sites.

Discussion continued regarding: the level of competitiveness, instructors, the start date of the program, how the groups will be divided, referees and stipends.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Paige McLaughlin – 110 Old Farm Road. She addressed the board regarding middle school sports, and her desire to bring middle school back in its previous form.

Will Cushing – 214 Brentwood Drive. He addressed the board seeking clarification of the difference in the school day hours at the middle schools and the K-8. If you do the math the extra time at the K-8 results in seven (7) additional instructional days. Dr. Moreau explained that the additional 15 minutes added at the K-

8's is needed for transitioning as it is a larger building; so there will be an additional five minutes for recess, lunch and music. He also read an excerpt from an article that appeared in the Bristol Press on July 4th regarding the arrival of Dr. Solek, a former music teacher, and the hope that she can restore the music program which was once a great source of pride for the city.

Rich Plantamauro - 56 Pond View Lane. He addressed the board regarding middle school sports. He was wondering about the number of coaches per child, uniforms, referees, umpires and, etc. He feels that this change is unfortunate, because Bristol has such a proud history of sports. The bonds that are formed when students participate in the arts, music and sports are immeasurable. Middle school is like a minor league system for the high school, and with the new program it is really going to water it down. He wonders how it will pan out and that for some parents it may become another form of babysitting. He feels that over time this structure will just water down the entire program. Having structured teams gets families involved, you would be surprised who would come out to watch the students.

William Cushing - 214 Brentwood Drive. He addressed the board regarding reconsidering the addition of music for the 2013-2014 school year. He also had a question regarding the intramural program; he does not like the more popular sports, so what would happen if the not-so-popular are not chosen for a 4-week session? Chairman Wilson said unfortunately if there are not enough participants, the program may not run, but he should the illicit his friends to vote for activities that they enjoy.

DELIBERATED ITEMS

Report on Dress Down Days for the 2011-2012 School Year

Dr. Moreu presented the Report on Dress Down Days for the 2011-2012 School Year. This year staff donated a total of \$28,966.00.

The Board of Education agreed to waive the staff dress code for monthly dress down days that would benefit local charities; there have been days for national charities, but now they are only for our children in need, our staff in need or local organizations that ask us to raise money on their behalf. The only exception to this rule is the Henry Barnard Fund, which is for destitute, retired teachers. We are their most generous donor every year and we get the most gracious letters thanking us for helping with that fund. Every December we raise funds for the local food pantries and divide the fund up into thirds for the three different food pantries in town.

Team Mentor/Cooperating Teacher Applicant

Denise Carabetta presented the Team Mentors/Cooperating Teachers Applicant. Teachers trained to serve as TEAM (Teacher Education and Mentoring) mentors and cooperating teachers provide assistance and support to student teachers and first year beginning teachers in the district in areas such as lesson design and classroom management and provide feedback and support in the areas of instructional planning and student assessment. Cooperating teachers are those teachers who are trained to work with student teachers. We need to increase the number of cooperating teachers in the district in order to meet the need of student teachers. Mentors must be assigned to first-year teachers to provide mentoring and support to newly certified teachers; this program is required by the State Department of Education. Principals recruit teachers to apply to be a TEAM mentor/cooperating teachers; the applications are reviewed by the TEAM Coordinating Committee. The following teachers were approved by the TEAM Coordinating Committee and are recommended to be TEAM Mentors/cooperating teachers. Approved teachers must attend a three day training program and update their training every three years.

Student Accident & Athletic Insurance Program

Dr. Moreau presented the Student Accident & Athletic Insurance Program. The Student Accident & Athletic Insurance Program is put out for bid on an annual basis. This insurance covers students who participate in our athletic programs and is available for purchase by parents for other students. The voluntary student insurance program is available for \$64 per student. The current provider – Bollinger, Inc. – was the only bidder for this service. This cost was negotiated to a lower rate by \$19,430.00 from the original quote of \$69,930.00.

OLD BUSINESS

There was not Old Business to come before the board.

NEW BUSINESS

Commissioner Amara wanted to personally welcome Dr. Solek to Bristol. It was his thought that with so many new board members and a new superintendent, perhaps now is the time to hold a workshop to establish goals of the Board of Education. It would be an opportunity to communicate to find out where we are, and where we want to go. Chairman Wilson stated that he planned to speak on that later in Information.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Greene-Hills

Commissioner O'Brien reported that as of the last meeting we were ensured that we would be open on time. There is an issue with the way the lights were installed which could end up costing us a considerable amount of money. The manufacturer has guaranteed that what we did was proper, but apparently our electrical inspector has a different opinion. Dr. Moreau reported that they have come up with three possible fixes, all of which are about a fourth of the original cost estimate. We have been told that we would get a temporary certificate of occupancy if all of the lighting work is not done when it's time to open the schools. Our occupancy date for staff is still August 23rd and no one has told her anything other than that. We meet every week, and communicate daily on both projects.

West Bristol

Dr. Moreau reported that the committee expects the school to be completed by the end of July and ready to move equipment and furniture in. We did have an issue with the sub-base of the roadways, and all of the roadways had to be ripped up and redone. The responsibility for that is with the vendor of the product that was not what it should have been in the layer that is underneath the asphalt. They will argue amongst themselves as to who will pay for what, but we are grateful that it was discovered before the second layer was added.

Commissioner Dolan asked what the timeframe was for the demolition of the old Greene-Hills School. Dr. Moreau said that it will not be imploded, and it will be taken down in sections. The process will begin on July 20th. It will take a month or so for the entire building to come down. They are finishing the abatement work right now. It will be a work site when school opens because they will be working on the parking area where the current school stands.

INFORMATION

Commissioner Bourassa reported that she spoke at the Northeast 8th grade promotion ceremony; her nephew graduated, it was an honor to attend.

Commissioner Dolan reported that he attended the AVID awards dinner at Bristol Eastern. It was an interesting evening, the students active in the program are very enthusiastic about it, and so are their parents. He was stopped by a father on his way out to thank him for his interest in the program; he in turn thanked

the father for his involvement and interest in promoting his son, because we need more fathers like him. He fully supports the program.

Commissioner Fitzgerald reported that she attended and spoke at Chippens Hill 8th grade promotion ceremony. She commended the administration for their work. Despite the heat, it was organized and very well managed by the staff. She was honored to attend.

Chairman Wilson reported that we would be changing the agenda slightly upon the request of Dr. Solek and her desire to provide a Superintendent's Report. He also wanted to inform the board about a couple of educational/professional development opportunities. He and Commissioner Dolan will be attending a CABE workshop on July 25th at The Saybrook Point Inn about the role of the boards in creating district success and an update of the Performance Evaluation Advisory Council's work. Also, new members should consider attending the CABE conference being held November 16th and 17th. It allows for networking with other board members from other districts, and provides informational sessions that keep you update with what is happening in Connecticut. He also attended the CREC meeting this month. They were fortunate to have Commissioner Pryor attend. He spoke mostly about the Sheff agreement and took questions from the CREC Board. He reiterated the difficult and critical balance that must exist between Sheff, CREC and the local school districts especially as it results to funding. They reemphasized the fact that there is a great opportunity for school districts to take CHOICE students. One school district that is local to us is receiving almost \$11,000 per student because there are a couple of other grants that are available outside of the Sheff grant. He knows that Bristol has not taken CHOICE students in a long time, but a lot of districts are using it to supplement their full day kindergarten or some of their magnet school costs; so you have a revenue stream coming into the district, not just going out. That is probably something that we could explore and look at in the future especially if we want to implement a full day kindergarten as most of us would support. The group also had the opportunity to watch a performance by The Greater Hartford Academy of Arts Jazz Band. This group has been selected to perform at the opening ceremonies of the Olympics in London. They were an extremely talented group students.

Finally, Chairman Wilson called the Commissioners attention to the two items that were left at their places. The first was an evaluation framework that Dr. Solek provided. Each Commissioner is being asked to devise 3 to 5 measurable goals that the Superintendent should have, and she will do the same. We will hold an Executive Session to discussion the goals and hopefully reach an agreement on them.
