**SUPERINTENDENT REPORT**

**FDK:** As a result of last month's FDK Report to the board and follow up discussion, the Superintendent will work closely with members of the board to conduct a detailed analysis of program, space, and resource requirements. The results of this detailed analysis will be provided to the Board prior to the February Board meeting for consideration and vote.

**Regional Calendar Task Force Report:** CT State legislation requires the formation of a Regional School Calendar Task Force to develop guidelines for a regional school calendar to be used by each regional educational service center. The Task Force has one representative from BPS – David Hayes, President of the BFT. The Task Force has drafted guidelines and recommendations including:

- At least 180 days of school; A uniform start date; Not more than 3 uniform school vacation periods; Implementation in 2016-17; November election day shall be a Professional Development Day with no students attending school; Common student/non-student days for Columbus Day, Veterans Day, etc.

**SEED Revision Process:** Dr. Rosie Vojtek. Principal at Ivy Drive ES will serve as Bristol's representative for a State Department of Education On-line Focus Group that will continue work to revise the current SEED Teacher Evaluation process. Specifically - the focus group will examine revisions to the Common Core Teaching Rubric for Effective Teaching.

**Department of Emergency Management/Homeland Security:** The DEMHS has submitted three detailed documents to the Education Committee for consideration. These documents include:

- All-Hazards School Security and Safety Plan Standards
- All-Hazards School Security and Safety Plan Template
- All-Hazards School Security and Safety Summary Sheet

If approved by the Education Committee, the standards and the plan, (*over 200 pages*) will become law and will be implemented for the 2014-15 school year. A School Safety and Security training module developed by the DEMHS will also be provided to all school and district leadership personnel beginning this month.
