October 1, 2014 – Regular Meeting**

The regular meeting of the Bristol Board of Education was held on Wednesday, October 1, 2014 at 7:00 p.m., at the Board of Education Administration Building, located at 129 Church Street, Bristol, Connecticut.

PRESENT: Commissioners: Genard Dolan, Jennifer Dube, Jill Fitzgerald, Karen Hintz, Jeffrey Morgan, Karen Vibert, Christopher Wilson; and Ellen Solek, Superintendent, Susan Moreau, Deputy Superintendent, Sam Galloway, Director of Human Resources, Henry Martin, Council Liaison, and Student Representatives Sophia Dtikas and Nick Savino.

CALL TO ORDER, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE, MOMENT OF SILENCE

Vice Chairman Dolan called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. and invited the audience to join him in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

On motion by Commissioner O'Brien, seconded by Commissioner Morgan it was unanimously

VOTED: That the Board of Education approve the September 10, 2014 Regular Meeting Minutes as written.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Finance – Commissioner Fitzgerald reported that the committee met September 18, 2014 and Gary Franz presented the Summary of the Operating Results for 2013-2014.

NATIONAL ANTHEM

Students from Chippens Hill Middle School performed the National Anthem for the Board.

COMMITTEE REPORTS – continued

Personnel - Commissioner Dolan reported that they are continuing negotiations with BFT; the next meeting is October 14th.

Student Achievement – Commissioner Dube reported that the Student Achievement Committee met on September 17th to discuss the status of the middle school sports program. While many students participate in intramural sports, members of the community have expressed interest in restoring some more competitive sports. Athletic Director Chris Cassin reported that the current budget would support the addition of girls' and boys' basketball teams at all four of Bristol's middle schools. The committee voted unanimously to request the Board of Education to support such a move. Beyond that, a question was raised as to whether softball and baseball could be added in the spring. Mr. Cassin will explore that possibility and present a proposal in November.

On motion by Commissioner Dube, seconded by Commissioner O'Brien it was unanimously

VOTED: That the Board of Education add the reinstatement of the intercity Basketball program to the agenda for a vote.

On motion by Commissioner Dube, seconded by Commissioner Hintz it was unanimously

VOTED: That the Board of Education reinstate middle school intercity girls' and boys' basketball teams for the winter 2014-15 seasons, re-appropriating funds identified by the Department of Physical Education, Health and Athletics in its current fiscal year budget.

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT:

Dr. Solek announced the appointment of Mrs. Tracy Youngberg as the Principal of Stafford Elementary School. Mrs. Youngberg has served as an educator, an assistant principal and as a principal with distinction - for many years in the Bloomfield Public Schools. She currently leads the Carmen Arace Intermediate School in Bloomfield. Tracy will officially begin her tenure at Stafford Elementary School on Monday October 27th. Mrs. Youngberg was present in the audience and stood to be acknowledged.

Full Council will meet tomorrow to further its work regarding district and school improvement planning. Literacy remains the primary K-12 goal and will be measured using a variety of local and state benchmark assessments - as well as standardized SBAC, CMT/CAPT Science testing scheduled to begin in late March of 2015. We have not received feedback regarding the 2014 SBAC results. We will bring them to Board once they are received from the State. Building level and district data teams are meeting throughout the year to identify and measure effective adult-based interventions that positively impact student performance across the district.

Congratulations to Bristol Central Senior and Percussionist, Philip Andrews, who has been selected to perform as a member of the U.S. Army All-American Marching Band. This past Monday the Band Selection Tour visited the Bristol Central where faculty, band students and guests honored Phil with his selection credentials. We are very proud of his accomplishments.

Special Education Presentation

Dr. Solek introduced Dr. Kim Hapken, Special Education Director who presented the BCBA program that Bristol is utilizing now.

Dr. Hapken reported that several factors led to the decision to contract with a BCBA (Board Certified Behavioral Analysts) agency:

2% of students with disabilities are identified as Emotionally Disturbed – educated in self-contained programs. In 2012-2013 one of our elementary schools had 6 – 7 students in this program with 1 special education teacher, 2 paras. From that program there were:

- 40 calls to EMPS for assessment/evaluation
- 5 ambulance calls
- 2 police calls – student were assaultive/ injuring staff
- 15 staff injuries requiring medical follow – up. (Ranging from bites to concussions)
- 65 days of suspension
- 60 Restraints
- 8 Seclusions
- Aggressive/uncontrollable behavior led to 5 out-of-district placements
 - Cost approximately \$500,000 (inclusive of transportation)
- More than 10 DCF referrals for the class of 6-7 students
- Principal, Special Services Supervisor, Psychologist, Resource Room Teacher
 - Average time spent in class was upwards of 2 hours per day

2013-2014 School year

- District contracted with BCBA agency who provided 3 Full-Time BCBA's
- Cost \$237,000
- BCBA assigned Full-Time to each of the 2 elementary programs
- 1 BCBA Full-Time split between the 2 middle school programs
- Purpose of BCBA's was to decrease school disruptions and potentially increase participation in general education
- Collect data, and works with staff on how to collect data
- Proactively intervene to decrease likelihood of uncontrollable behavior

Results

- The district maintained students in-district
- Staff were well supported and increased their competencies relative to managing significant student behaviors, data collection, proactively intervening to prevent an explosive outburst
- Injuries decreased
- Instruction increased
- Significant decrease in student suspensions
- Increased opportunities for students to participate in general education
- Principal/Special Services Supervisor able to spend more time as instructional leaders

2014-2015

- Once programs are stabilized, BCBA's will be providing support to regular and special education staff in general education
- Continue PD for management of dysregulated students

Questions followed regarding: the number of students in the program, identification of kindergarten students and the re-introduction of out-placed students.

Board of Education Student Representatives – Dr. Solek introduced and welcomed Nick Savino (BC) and Sophia Dtikas (BE) to the Bristol Board of Education. Seniors Nick Savino and Senior Sophia Dzikas were selected from a highly qualified group of student applicants. Both Nick and Sophia participated in a rigorous application process, including an hour long interview with Commissioners Amara, Dolan, Hintz and Vibert and District Leaders Members (DLT). Student applicants who were not selected have been invited to participate in a newly formed student leadership group - Student Advisory Council. The council will meet four times throughout the year with me and members of the DLT and the board to discuss a variety of important educational issues.

Nick Savino reported on Bristol Central activities. A College fair was held last week, it was the first fair in 10 years; several colleges, trade schools and branches of the military were represented many students from Bristol Central and the surrounding area participated. There is a new School Resource Officer in the building; the students welcome Officer George Franek to the BC Community. Two Band Students, brothers Phil and Simon Andrews have been selected to represent Bristol at the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade Nick shared the cross town match up results and upcoming events. This Friday will be the first Home football game of the season; the game will be focused around military appreciation where veterans and active duty soldiers will be recognized for their service. Money will be raised to benefit the VA hospital in West Haven. Last week's football game was covered by NBC-30 as the High School Game of the Week. Later this month, Student Council will be hosting the annual spirit week; the week culminates with the homecoming football game and dance. The dance is one of the largest fundraisers of the year and benefits Student Council and Senior Class.

Sophia Dzikas reported on Bristol Eastern activities. They have completed auditions for the fall production of "The Nerd". There have been two home football games under the newly installed lights, both games had good attendance. Last week a Club Fair was held at all of the lunch waves; student reps were available for freshman and new students to see the wide range of activities at Bristol Eastern. Study Halls are trying to become Service Halls, so students have been going over to Page Park and cleaning up and fulfilling community service. Student Council will be hosting a blood drive later this month. Boys Soccer teams volunteered with Bristol TOPS; they are playing and teaching soccer with disabled children. The math team is preparing to host the first Math Team Meet at BE, and the Bristol Eastern marching band performed in the Mum Parade on Sunday.

In Venice, "Queen of the Adriatic", students will take a vaporetto ride (motorized boat, like a ferry, holds 25-30 people) on a two mile tour of Venice's "main street", the S-shaped Grand Canal which winds through four centuries of Gothic-Renaissance palaces. Students will view the Bridge of Sighs, St. Mark's Basilica and the Piazza San Marco. Students and chaperones have the option of taking a gondola ride for approximately \$20. Venice sightseeing is conducted by a local guide with commentary by the Tour Director. The gondola ride is not included in the price.

Florence Sightseeing:

A comprehensive introduction to the art and architecture will recall the days when Florence was the undisputed leader of the Renaissance world. Visit the Cathedral embellished by Brunelleschi and Michelangelo. The Cathedral is a stupendous example of Tuscan and Gothic architecture. Next to the cathedral is Giotto's 14th century Bell Tower, which rises to a height of 292 feet. See the East Door of the Baptistry of San Giovanni, described by Michelangelo as the "Gates of Paradise". A highlight is a visit to the Accademia di Belle Arti, where you will see Michelangelo's most famous statue, "David". In Florence, we'll take part in a **Cucina Fiorentina**. We'll cook up a three-course traditional Italian meal with the help of a local chef. Then sit down, relax, and mangia! Upon arrival, groups will have non-alcoholic drinks and small snacks. There will be a brief introduction to the activity given by the chef. Then, the groups will be split into two smaller groups and the participants will have cook up a starter, a main course, and a dessert. Students will learn how a traditional Italian meal is prepared, before testing what they've created. Later, we ride south along the Highway of the Sun. We'll stop at a Tuscan Farm and San Gimignano. We shall see the rolling vineyards, the basilica built in the 1200s and the beautiful countryside, filled with sunflowers.

Then we'll head to **Pompeii, Sorrento, and Capri**. We'll ride along the rolling Alban Hills, past Monte Cassino, where one of World War II's greatest battles was fought, to Pompeii to see the remarkably well-preserved ruins. We'll visit the excavation of this city which was buried on August 24, A.D. 79 by the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius. After visiting Pompeii, we drive along the breathtaking coastal road to the picturesque town of Sorrento, where the Roman Emperors had their summer palaces. From Sorrento, students will board a boat for the isle of Capri. This pint-sized paradise is an island four miles long, two miles wide in spots, and more than 1,900 feet high. Capri's most celebrated wonders are natural. The fabled Blue Grotto is beautiful. If the weather is calm, the students, with a chaperone, may have the option of entering the Blue Grotto (approximately \$25). All students will have the opportunity to stroll among the villas and to shop.

Finally, we're off to **Rome**. The best way to see Rome is on foot, as many of the streets and monuments are inaccessible to vehicles. We'll start with the Capitoline Hill and climb the stairs designed by Michelangelo. The Capitoline Museum houses the fabled mosaics and the celebrated sculpture of the "Satyr of the Capitol". Nearby is the cage of the she-wolf who suckled Romulus and Remus, founders of Rome. Not far is the Piazza Venezia dominated by the monument dedicated to Vittorio Emmanuele II, the Roman Forum, the Palatine Hill and the Arch of Constantine. This will be a comprehensive introduction to the classic sights of

the “Eternal City”. Popes, the Borgias, Michelangelo, and Mussolini have left their physical and spiritual mark on Rome. We’ll visit the Roman Forum, center of political, judicial, and business life in ancient Rome. Also, St. Peter’s Basilica, the largest church in the world, a masterpiece of Renaissance architecture and art. We’ll view Michelangelo’s “Pieta” at St. Peter’s, the Vatican Museums, the Sistine Chapel, the Arch of Constantine, and, of course, the Colosseum, where Christians, gladiators, and beasts fought and died. We’ll also witness the fantastic open valley of the Circus Maximus. Only in Italy can one find such remarkable displays of antiquity casually blended in with 20th century scenery. In Rome, we’ll also attend “Caesar’s Gladiator School”. We’ll pick up our **gladii** (wooden ones, of course) and learn the basic moves of hand-to-hand combat at gladiator school. This experience begins with a presentation with the Gladiators. We’ll continue with a visit to the museum followed by an introduction about the history of Gladiators. After we train like gladiators, we’ll become gladiators. We’ll choose our names, get fit to fight in the arena and learn how to use the **gladius**. Finally, we’ll use our newly acquired skills in a competition where the best will win a prize.

As a result, International Discovery is not liable for any negligent or willful act or failure to act of any such person or entity, or of any third party.

Participant assigns to International Discovery all rights, titles, and interest in or to any and all media related to a International Discovery trip without any remuneration to participant, including photographs provided directly to International Discovery or through websites in which his or her name or

International Discovery reserves the right to decline to accept or retain any person as a member of any trip. In the event a member is expelled from a trip, no refund of any kind will be made. Participants understand that they are solely responsible for their pre-program, program, and post-program medical care in all respects, including, but not limited to, obtaining and taking necessary medication(s), vaccinations and any other medical care and treatment.

Medical Release: If participant becomes ill or incapacitated, their teacher/group leader, or International Discovery may take such actions as they consider necessary, including securing medical treatment. Participant (or participant's Parent/Guardian if participant is a minor) hereby releases International Discovery and participant's teacher/group leader from any and all liability for the quality or timeliness of any such medical care and agree to indemnify International Discovery for any expenses it incurs. The arbitrator and not any federal, state, or local court or agency shall have exclusive authority to resolve any dispute relating to the interpretation, applicability, enforceability, conscionability, or formation of this contract, including but not limited to any claim that all or any part of this contract is void or voidable. In any such arbitration, the arbitrator may, but is not required to, award attorney's fees to the prevailing party. PRICE AND PAYMENT INFORMATION

Price Adjustments: The price quoted is based upon a minimum number of travelers, the content of the program as outlined in your trip proposal and the date of your registration. A registrant may receive a special price by registering by the registration deadline stated on the proposal. The price quoted is also subject to adjustment if the minimum enrollment is not met, if the program content changes, or in the event of circumstances beyond International Discovery's direct control. These include, but are not limited to, increases in travel security charges, government-imposed fees and taxes (e.g., European V.A.T. increases), increases in airport fees and taxes, airline fees and taxes, and airline, vendor, or group-imposed schedule changes or delays. Unless a price guarantee has been provided in writing: (a) fuel surcharges and other airline ticket related fees and taxes will fluctuate until group ticketing has occurred, and (b) any exchange rate guarantees applicable to your account will be shown on your invoices. In all instances, an additional fee may be added to your price if your Program Leader makes a substantive change to your itinerary or program content after your registration has

been accepted and any enrollment based adjustments will be finalized no later than 150 days prior to trip departure.

Program Fees Not Included: Unless specifically stated in your registration letter, International Discovery's program prices do not include optional additional college credit fees, passport fees, visa fees, Cancellation Protection Plus fees, lunches, beverages with meals, excess baggage charges, expenses incurred during free time periods, portage at airports and hotels, transportation from your home to the origination point of the International Discovery program and back, tips to guides and long-distance bus drivers, overnight lodging and meals in the United States prior to departure or upon return of an international flight, any mandatory new or increased taxes or inspection fees levied on airline tickets, hotels, transportation, land services, or at ports of entry/exit.

All such late registrations must clear waiting list procedures and may involve additional airline and other charges and your program space is not guaranteed until your account has been paid in full and you have been advised in writing that all conditions for your being able to travel have been satisfied. If you register prior to 110 days prior to the scheduled departure of your program but your account is not paid in full by that date, International Discovery charges a \$150 late payment fee. The fee for any late payments made after any scheduled installment date is \$15. No personal checks or business checks will be accepted after the final payment deadline. All fees are denominated in US dollars.

Program Information Letter: Approximately two to three weeks prior to departure, your program leader will be sent details regarding flight and hotel information, departure and return times, packing tips, drop off/pick-up locations, etc.

Travel/Medical Insurance: All participants are provided accident, illness, and accident-related dental insurance coverage (underwritten by Travel Guard) up to \$7,500 with no deductible for medical expense and up to \$50,000 for medical evacuation and repatriation. Pre-existing conditions are not covered. Any charges not covered are the responsibility of the participant. Please refer to the policy for a full description of coverage and limitations.

Further, all participants are provided with limited additional travel insurance coverage (underwritten by ACE American Insurance Company) that provides for a PARTIAL REFUND of cancellation fees up to \$300 for a covered reason (up to \$3,000 if you cancel due to "terrorism," including travel warnings), up to \$250 of extra airfare that may be required due to a covered injury, sickness or death of you or a family member. Please refer to the policy for a full description of coverage and limitations.

Participants may also consider purchasing, at additional cost, optional additional protection afforded by the participation in International Discovery's Cancellation Protection Plus program (see below).

Supervision/Behavior: International Discovery, the Program Leader, and chaperones establish behavior rules and directions for all student participants. Failure to abide by the rules or directions may result in the student being sent home at the parents' expense without any right to a refund. Consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages or drugs of any kind for which you do not have a valid prescription, behavior infringing upon the ability of others to enjoy the Program, or compromising your own or others' safety, or is otherwise inappropriate, or violates the law as well as violation of certain other rules, constitute grounds for immediate expulsion. All program participants will be responsible for their own actions at all times and Program Leaders and chaperones are responsible for the actions of all participants in their group. On occasion, program participants may be allowed by the Program Leader and with the consent of International Discovery to leave the group and to explore on their own. International Discovery has no responsibility for those participants when they are on their own, and it is the sole responsibility of those participants to take whatever actions are necessary to rejoin the group, if that is their intent, at their own cost. You also acknowledge that if you are late in appearing for a scheduled departure, International Discovery has no duty to delay the Program to wait for you.

Damage or injury caused deliberately or by carelessness to International Discovery property, or to any property or individual without limitation must be paid for by the person responsible for such damage.

All program participants are responsible for their own food intake while overseas and understand that language differences may impede their understanding of certain ingredients contained in various recipes and that neither my International Discovery Tour Director nor other staff can provide reliable translation, or make any special arrangements for me. I understand that neither International Discovery nor my Institution will be liable for any incident that arises as a result of my allergy. I also understand that I will not be compensated for any uneaten meals.

I agree that I am fully responsible for any costs arising from the damage, loss or theft of any of my personal property during the Program, including my airline ticket. I understand that each airline has its own procedures for dealing with lost tickets and that if I lose my airline ticket, I may be required to purchase from the airline a full fare replacement ticket. I accept that in these circumstances it is entirely my own responsibility to pursue any refund directly from the airline.

Participants understand that Program Leaders and chaperones receive support for their work through discounted travel with their group, opportunities for additional educational and professional development, the ability to provide scholarships for needy and deserving students, and/or through salary or stipends. Annual price increases may be limited by multiple-year commitments.

Name Changes: Name changes may not be available or allowed within 110 days of departure. Should changes be allowed, International Discovery will assess a \$250 fee to any individual who requires a name change on his/her ticket within 110 days of departure. Any request for a name change within this period may be denied by the air carrier and will be subject to additional fees.

Young Travelers: Parent/guardian agrees that WorldStrides can use participant email and/or cell phone contact information in the context of this program. Registration for children under the age of 11 is subject to individual review by International Discovery. The decision to allow participation in a trip is at the sole discretion of International Discovery.

Travel Documentation: Every participant must have the required documentation necessary to participate in the trip prior to the date of departure, including needed identification that fully matches the name provided to International Discovery for inclusion on travel documentation and airline tickets, and must meet any other applicable compliance requirements issued by the Transportation Security Administration or related agencies.

International Discovery provides online and customer service means for keeping the program participant's information current and it is the participant's sole responsibility to assure that this information is fully up to date no later than 110 days prior to the group's departure date. If changes occur after that date, the participant must contact customer service and additional change fees might apply. Visit the Transportation Security Administration website at www.tsa.gov for more information.

In the case of international travel, including Canada, Costa Rica, and Mexico programs, the participant is additionally and solely responsible for obtaining a passport or visa in order to travel. Passports must be valid for at least six months after your return date. It is the responsibility of the participant to check and fully comply with the requirements for travel between the United States and the countries that you will be traveling to or through. Visit the Department of State at www.travel.state.gov for more information.

If a participant is unable to travel due to the lack of a proper identification, passport or visa, or necessary inoculations, the standard cancellation policy will apply.

Privacy: Because the nature of our business requires coordination with various providers who deliver the travel services you request, it is necessary to share some personal information that you have provided.

Stay-behind Options: You may wish to spend time at your destinations after the scheduled tour. Where possible, International Discovery will provide altered flight arrangements according to your request. You are responsible for making all your arrangements to and from the hotel or airport as well as all land arrangements pertaining to your individual itinerary. Because we will arrange your airline tickets separately from your group's, we cannot guarantee that you will share any of the same flights. International Discovery charges a \$150/ non-refundable fee for this service plus any additional costs incurred. This option is not available if your group has less than 10 traveling participants. All requests must be made within two weeks of registration and no later than 150 days from departure, whichever occurs first.

Adults: International Discovery tours involve a great deal of walking, and are unsuitable for participants who have difficulty walking or carrying baggage, or who require special assistance. Adults are welcome, but should consider carefully whether this active, learning-centered itinerary, suits their travel needs.

International Discovery's published Program Fee is based on student discounted rates. Participants 24 years and older (on the last day of the program) are required to pay \$50 per hotel night twin supplement. In the event that a twin room is not available on a given night and you are required to share a triple, the twin supplement will be refunded upon receipt of a written request to International Discovery within 10 days of your return to the United States. This refund applies to hotel and cruise nights only. Single and Double accommodations are not available on trains and ferries. If at the time you enroll you do not have a companion with whom you can share a double room, you will be required to pay a single-room supplement of \$80 for each hotel night. If you are subsequently able to find a roommate, at least 75 days prior to your departure, the single supplement will be refunded.

Changes to your Program: Group travel requires a certain amount of flexibility in order to offer quality programs at the lowest rates possible. For operational reasons, and to meet the numbers required to qualify for group rates, International Discovery reserves the right to make the following changes, which will not constitute grounds for a refund:

Change in departure date, but not to exceed 2 days on a program leaving between November 1 and April 30. International Discovery is not responsible for individual arrangements that conflict with a date reassignment.

Changes in itinerary, including reversing the itinerary, and changes to the order in which cities or countries are visited, the duration of the stay in each city, addition and omission of cities or countries. Participants, including those enrolled in Cancellation Protection Plus, will be charged the Program Fee applicable to the revised itinerary.

Omission, alteration, and/or substitution of services may be necessary due to scheduled or unscheduled closures, holidays, strikes, disease, civil unrest, war (declared or otherwise), government order or advice, or for any reason whatsoever beyond International Discovery's control. Whenever possible, suitable alternatives will be provided.

CANCELLATIONS

Cancellations: All cancellations must be made in writing by or on behalf of the person listed on the registration form to International Discovery Tours and must be postmarked prior to the group's departure, and must include account number, registrant's name, and complete address. Refunds are only issued to the person listed on the account. All refunds are issued in the original payment form that was made to the account; the refund process takes approximately four to six weeks. There will be no refunds for unused services or program features.

Cancellation Protection Plus (CPP) Program Benefits: At each participant's option and for an additional fee of \$25/day, participants can receive the following additional benefits beyond the insurance coverage included in the Program Fee and described above:

a) You may cancel for any reason and International Discovery will refund all Program Fee payments, less Non-Refundable Fees (together, "Cancellation Fees") and less any amounts covered by the Travel Insurance if you cancel for a reason covered by Travel Insurance. If you cancel for any other reason, your Cancellation Fees (see chart in "Cancellation") will be refunded in the form of fully transferable travel vouchers for amounts of up to \$1,500, and all remaining amounts will be refunded in cash. To receive this benefit you must have made all scheduled Program Fee payments. Vouchers must be used for travel on an International Discovery program in either of the following two years. Some restrictions apply.
