The financial forecast for FY24 general fund, as of December 31, 2023, shows an unfavorable full-year forecast of \$227K which is \$38K better than the previous month. Regular education is projected to be underbudget \$18K which is \$93K better than the previous month. Salaries and substitute services continue to fluctuate, but the major drivers in the forecast continue to be electricity and substitute services. Having completed the sixth month of the fiscal year, forecasted decreases in spending will be implemented in several line items in order to offset the overbudget categories.

The special education forecast is overbudget \$245K which is \$54K worse than the previous month. The main driver of the overbudget condition for special education is out-of-district transportation as student needs and placements continue to fluctuate.

Revenue to the Town is projected to be unfavorable \$130K which is \$43K better than the previous month. Contributing factors to the variance include special education services billed to other towns as well as the fluctuation in the special education excess cost reimbursement. This reimbursement will continue to fluctuate with changing needs of our students placed out-of-district. In addition, regular education tuition from other towns is expected to increase when the new per pupil expense is released later in January. Conversely, the Special Education Excess Cost grant is expected to decrease as the expected increase in the per pupil expense will increase the stop loss.

The forecast for the Quality & Diversity Fund continues to be positive which is due to the strong opening balance from the previous fiscal year. Expenses and revenues are holding steady at this time; however, tuition to magnet schools and Asununtuck Community College were higher than budgeted. Increased participation in both programs contribute to the variance as does the increase in magnet school tuition costs. New legislation is expected to provide financial relief for sending districts for magnet and vocational schools in FY25. There will be more information on this topic after the legislative session closes. The projected ending balance in the fund for FY24 is \$125K which is higher than budgeted by \$103K.

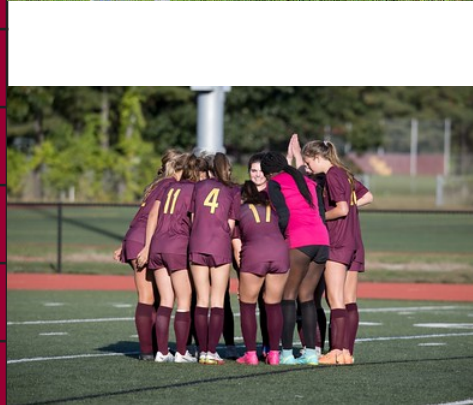





Graduation Requirements

Graduation from our public schools implies (1) that students satisfactorily completed the prescribed courses of study for the several grade levels in accordance with their respective abilities to achieve, (2) that they have satisfactorily passed any examinations and/or standards established by the faculty and approved by the Board of Education, and (3) that they have fulfilled the legally mandated number and distribution of credits.

Graduation Credit Requirements

The District conforms with state regulations and statute regarding credits for graduation from high school. Students must satisfactorily complete a minimum of 25 credits, including not fewer than:

Graduation Performance Standards (Cont'd)

Demonstrate fulfillment of the Vision of a Graduate by:

- Successfully completing fifteen (15) hours of community service in an approved program. Suggestions and recommendations for various programs and placements are available in the guidance office. Official documentation and a reflection paper must be submitted to high school administration upon completion of the community service. The SDE will grant a community service recognition award if a student earns at least 50 hours of community service and meets statutory criteria to earn one-half credit toward graduation.

Support and Remedial Services

In addition, the District will provide adequate student support and remedial services for students beginning in grade seven. Such student support and remedial services shall provide alternate means for a student to complete any of the high school graduation requirements, previously listed if such student is unable to satisfactorily complete any of the required courses or exams. Such student support and remedial services shall include, but not be limited to, (1) allowing students to retake courses in summer school or through an on-line course; (2) allowing students to enroll in a class offered at a constituent unit of the state system of higher education, (3) allowing students who received a failing score, as determined by the Commissioner of Education, on an end of the school year exam to take an alternate form of the exam; and (4) allowing those students whose individualized education plans state that such students are eligible for an alternate assessment to demonstrate competency on any of the five core courses through success on such alternate assessment.

Credits

A credit defined as the equivalent of one forty-minute class period for each day of a school year. One-half credit is given for courses that compile work in one semester. If physical education is not taken because of medical excuse, another subject may be substituted.

Only courses taken in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, and that are in accordance with the state-wide subject matter content standards, adopted by the State Board of Education shall satisfy this graduation requirement except that a student may be granted credit (1) toward meeting the high school graduation requirements upon the successful demonstration of mastery of the subject matter content described in this section achieved through education experiences and opportunities that provide flexible and multiple pathways to learning, including cross-curricular graduation requirements, career and technical education, virtual learning, work-based learning, service learning, dual enrollment and early college, courses taken in middle school, internships and student-designed independent studies, provided such demonstration of mastery is in accordance with state-wide subject matter standards; (2) for the successful completion of

Credits (Cont'd)

coursework at an institution accredited by the Department of Higher Education or regionally accredited. One three-credit semester course, or its equivalent, shall equal one-half high school credit. (3) A student may also be granted credit toward meeting a specified course requirement in grades seven or eight of any course, the primary focus of which corresponds directly to the subject matter of a specified course requirement in grades nine to twelve, inclusive.

A credit shall consist of not less than the equivalent of a forty-minute class period for each school day of a school year except for a credit or part of a credit toward high school graduation earned (1) at an institution accredited by the Board of Regents for Higher Education or State Board of Education or regionally accredited, (2) through on-line course work, or (3) through a demonstration of mastery based on competency and performance standards, in accordance with guidelines adopted by the State Board of Education.

All credits earned toward meeting any of the graduation requirements through the successful completion of online courses must be approved by the guidance department.

Student Success Plans

The District shall create a student success plan for each enrolled student, beginning in grade six. Such plan shall include a students' career and academic choices in grades six to twelve, inclusive. Beginning in grade six, such student success plan shall provide evidence of career exploration in each grade including, but not limited to, careers in manufacturing. The District shall utilize the Department of Education's issued and revised guidance regarding changes to such student's success plans. In creating such student success plans, consideration shall be given to career and academic choices in computer science, science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

The student success plans shall be created, if possible, in collaboration with each student and the student's parent/guardian and shall, to the extent it does not conflict with the career choices of the student or his/her parent/guardian, include an academic plan that is in compliance with the District's challenging curriculum policy.

Award of High School Diplomas

Students who complete all graduation requirements shall receive a diploma at the June commencement. Individuals also may satisfy graduation requirements by the satisfactory completion of the following:

1. Successful completion of a summer course or summer courses comparable (as determined by the Principal) to the subject(s) in which the student was deficient.
2. Withdrawal from high school prior to graduation to work on a job that assisted the war effort during World War II, December 7, 1941 through December 31, 1946, not receiving a diploma as a consequence of such work and has been a resident of Connecticut for at least fifty (50) consecutive years.

Graduation Requirements

Award of High School Diplomas (Cont'd)

Students meeting these requirements and wishing to graduate at the end of any semester other than their second semester in the twelfth grade may do so after submitting a letter of request to the high school.

Students receiving special education who do not successfully complete a prescribed program shall be granted a certificate of attendance at the completion of the school year following their 21st birthday.

Academic Advancement Program

The District permits students in grades eleven and twelve to substitute (1) achievement of a passing score on an existing national examination, as determined by the State Department of Education, or series of examinations approved by the State Board of Education, (2) a cumulative grade point average determined by the State Board of Education and (3) at least three letters of recommendation from school professionals (defined in 10-66dd), for the required high school graduation requirement. The State Board of Education will issue an Academic Advancement Program Certificate to any student successfully completing such program. The Academic Advancement Program Certificate shall be considered in the same manner as a high school diploma for purposes of determining eligibility of a student for enrollment at a Connecticut public institution of higher education.

The District shall permit a student to graduate from high school upon the successful completion of the above described academic advancement program.

I. Call to Order and Welcome

Monica Logan called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m.

II. Awards and Recognition

Ms. Logan recognized Meghan Atwood, parent, who initiated the #buildtogive campaign at Wells Road last year. This year, she brought the program to the middle school and for every heart built out of Lego blocks Lego sent a child a gift. Ms. Logan thanked Mrs. Atwood for her contributions to the Granby Public Schools.

III. Public Comment

Debbie Reelitz, Silkey Road, North Granby, stated she was happy to see a request in the budget presentation for more mental health staffing and was glad to hear this is getting attention. She stated, however, there is very little attention given to how a healthy diet has played an enormous impact on mental wellness providing happiness and focus. She informed the Board she would like to see diet included in strategies for children with regard to mental health challenges and would like to see dietary recommendations given out along with other resources for children suffering with mental health conditions.

Mike Kramarenko, Notch Road, Granby, shared the extended absences of the Family & Consumer Science and the Technology teachers at the middle school were causing multiple study halls being held. He stated that parents should have been informed about staffing. He also shared his concerns around disruptive students during class time at the middle school.

IV. Student Representative Reports

- Chase Alexander reported girls’ basketball is playing tonight vs. SMSA and has a 4-2 record; boys’ basketball is 2-2; boys’ ice hockey is 3-0; girls’ hockey played today in Enfield and have a 3-3 record; indoor track will participate in a meet on Jan. 4th with Glastonbury; swimming and diving will compete in a meet against Plainville on Jan. 5th at the YMCA; and, wrestling has a meet in Rockville on Jan. 4th at 6:00 p.m.
- Seniors presented their capstone projects this afternoon.
- Goodwin University visited the high school yesterday to speak with some students about programs.
- National Honor Society students have been serving as tutors to their peers for midterm review sessions. Sessions are available for each class at allotted times across this week and the following week.
- The chorus concert will be held tomorrow night, Jan. 4th at 7:00 p.m.

V. Reports and Discussion

A. FY25 Plus One Budget Approval

The Board continued to discuss the FY25 Plus One Budget. A motion was made by Rosemarie Weber and seconded by Heather Lombardo that the Granby Board of Education approve the Plus One Budget to be forwarded on to the Board of Finance. Ms. Burke stated she received a number of questions from the Board which she will answer this evening. She reviewed the Plus One Budget increase of 6.43% which is made up of 4.34% contractual increases; 2.43 special education; and 0.34% for other factors. Many questions centered around the small capital budget and she reviewed the list of items in priority order. The amounts listed on each item are estimates and final quotes are expected soon. The Board inquired why so much of the small capital budget needs to be spent on safety and security when a very large upgrade was done through grants

several years ago. Anna Robbins explained that due to rapid technology advances, etc. many items need to be updated. Ms. Burke emphasized that all buildings in the district are safe and secure. The Board would like to understand why so many upgrades are needed at one time. Ms. Burke stated Shannon Sullivan will attend a future meeting to further explain the district's safety and security needs. Liz Barlow inquired if the future large capital list can be shared going forward so the Board can see what is coming up in the future. A question was raised with regard to the amount of funding needed to address maintenance concerns and if there would be sufficient resources for mental health for students and safety for staff. Ms. Burke stated mental health is in the forefront of decision making. Another question was raised with regard to the special education budget and if it is expected this will increase further. Ms. Burke explained that the budget is estimated based on enrollment and information known at the time of budget preparation. There were a couple of questions related to the reading curriculum and the cost of its implementation. Ms. Burke shared the district is reviewing the approved list of materials in the event that our reading waiver is denied on appeal, and will request additional information and quotes for programs which will be part of the FY26 budget proposal. Questions were also raised regarding class sizes and class offerings and Ms. Burke stated that Central Office and high school administration will review needs and requests and determine how many sections of high school courses should run and will also look at the impact. Additionally, there was a question about the continuation of the strings program. Ms. Burke stated the expansion of the strings program can be pushed back if necessary. Additional questions were asked around personnel, specifically, administrative positions. Ms. Burke explained the roles of the administrators in the district as well as provided staff-to-student ratios for principals/assistant principals. Ms. Burke shared some data with regard to Granby administrator staffing and stated Granby is well below the recommended average of administrator staffing levels. With regard to a question about the necessity of the Mandarin language course, Ms. Burke stated there are currently 49 students enrolled at the middle school and 60 students at the high school. David Peling inquired what the enrollment numbers are for Spanish. Jennifer Parsons stated approximately 400 students take Spanish and approximately 350 students take French. Ms. Burke reviewed the timeline of the budget stating the Three-Board Meeting will be held on January 16th and after that meeting she will present the FY25 Administrative Budget to the Board on March 6th with opportunities for Budget Workshops on March 13th, 20th and 27th. Following approval of the FY25 Administrative Budget, the budget then becomes the Board's budget which will go forward to the town for a vote. Ms. Logan thanked Ms. Burke for the presentation and her thoroughness in addressing the Board's questions. This motion passed unanimously at 8:24 p.m.

VI. Business Requiring Action

A. Minutes

A motion was made by Whitney Sanzo and seconded by Rosemarie Weber that the Granby Board of Education approve the minutes of the December 20, 2023 Board of Education Meeting. This motion passed at 8:25p.m. with one abstention (Donna Nolan).

The Curriculum/Policy/Technology/Communications Subcommittee recommended Draft Policy 6141.51 - Advanced Courses or Program, Eligibility Criteria for Enrollment to the Board for a second reading and adoption, A motion was made by Whitney Sanzo and seconded by Donna Nolan that the Granby Board of Education adopt Policy 6141.51 - Advanced Courses or Program, Eligibility Criteria for Enrollment as recommended by the Curriculum/Policy/ Technology/ Communications Subcommittee. This motion passed unanimously at 8:26 p.m.

C. Second Reading and Adoption of Draft Policy 6141.52 - Challenging Curriculum

The Curriculum/Policy/Technology/Communications Subcommittee recommended draft Policy 6141.52, Challenging Curriculum, to the Board for a second reading and adoption. A motion was made by Whitney Sanzo and seconded by Donna Nolan that the Board of Education adopt Policy 6141.52, Challenging Curriculum, as recommended by the Curriculum/Policy/Technology/Communications Subcommittee. This motion passed unanimously at 8:27 p.m.

Additionally, two new policies were reviewed and one was moved forward to the full board and the other will remain in subcommittee.
