A. Policy 5135.1 - Bus Conduct

We want to change the policy to reflect NFES and to include K-3 as needing an adult. If a family has a special circumstance, there is a form to fill out.

B. Policy 5118.2 – Educational Opportunities for Military Children

This policy allows students to stay in the district if their parent is deployed or relocated with a grace period of how long they can remain. It gives more stability to the families.

C. Policy 5144.12 – Challenging Behavior Response Policy

This policy is required by the state. Our policy is a concise policy based on CAFE and Shipman, but made more specific to NFPS. It is intended to couple with the school climate policy that was adopted in the spring. This policy helps guide our response to the wide range of behaviors that the schools are experiencing. It also includes looking at it via a disciplinary lens. Dr. Woleck highlighted the district practices in regard to this policy. Samantha asked about what the levels are and how they are applied. They are located in the code of responsibility and respect. Kim and Sam questioned the impact of restorative practices versus other tools.

D. Policy 1321.2 - Public Videotaping of Educational Activity – Samantha brought this up as a concern for safety and that we need to audit policies to ensure that they are up to date and reflective of the world today. Technology is different and needs to be addressed. Sam wants to ensure that we are covered from a FERPA perspective. The first paragraph could be adjusted to include language around FERPA and safety. Ken will rewrite the paragraph to address the concerns to apply some additional protection.

Students

Alcohol, Drugs and Tobacco

I. Definition of Terms

“Drug/Mood Altering Substance/Alcohol” shall include any alcohol or malt beverage, and drug listed as a controlled substance, chemical, abused substance or medication for which a prescription is required under the law, and/or any substance which is intended to alter mood. Examples of the above include, but are not limited to: beer, wine, liquor, marijuana, hashish, chemical solvents, glue, look alike substance and any capsules or pills not registered with the nurse, annotated within the student’s health record and given in accordance with the school district policy for the administration of medication to students in school.

Drugs are defined as any substance other than food or water that is intended to be taken or administered (ingested, injected, applied, implanted, inhaled, etc.) for the purpose of altering, sustaining, or controlling the recipient’s physical, mental, or emotional state. Drugs may include, but not be limited to, alcoholic beverages; controlled substances such as marijuana, hallucinogens, cocaine, barbiturates, amphetamines, narcotics; and non-authorized prescription drugs.

Controlled substances, for purposes of this policy shall include all controlled substances prohibited by federal and state law, look-alike drugs, alcoholic beverages, anabolic steroids, drug paraphernalia, any volatile solvents or inhalants, such as but not limited to glue and aerosol products, and prescription or patent drugs, except those for which permission for use in school has been granted pursuant to Board policy.

Under the influence, for purposes of this policy shall include any consumption or ingestion of controlled substances by a student.

Electronic nicotine delivery system means an electronic device that may be used to simulate smoking in the delivery of nicotine or other substance to a person inhaling from the device, and includes, but is not limited to, an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar, electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe or electronic hookah and any related device and any cartridge or other component of such device.

“Child Study Team” is a multi-disciplinary team composed of school personnel. This team has been trained to understand and work on the issues of adolescent chemical use, abuse, and dependency and will play a primary role in the identification and referral process of students coming to their attention through the procedures outlined in this policy. The team will enlist the resources of a licensed drug and alcohol facility when professional assessment and/or group programs are recommended.

Alcohol, Drugs and Tobacco

I. Definition of Terms (continued)

“Chemical Abuse Specialist” is a community-based chemical abuse specialist with expertise in the area of chemical dependency and school based assessment (such as those resources and personnel from a licensed drug and alcohol facility to be utilized by the New Fairfield Public Schools).

“Distributing” is to deliver, sell, pass, share or give any tobacco, alcohol, drug or mood altering substance as defined by this policy from one person to another or to aid therein.

“Possession” is to possess or hold, without any attempt to distribute any tobacco, alcohol, drug or mood-altering substance determined to be illegal, or as defined by this policy.

“Drug Paraphernalia” includes any utensil or item which in the school’s judgment can be associated with the use of drugs, alcohol, or mood-altering substances. Examples include but are not limited to roach clips, pipes, bowls, crack vials, miniature cocaine spoons and tobacco rolling paper.

Liquid nicotine container means a container that holds a liquid substance containing nicotine that is sold, marketed or intended for use in an electronic nicotine delivery system or vapor product, except “liquid nicotine container” does not include such a container that is prefilled and sealed by the manufacturer and not intended to be opened by the consumer.

Vapor product means any product that employs a heating element, power source, electronic circuit or other electronic, chemical or mechanical means, regardless of shape or size, to produce a vapor that may or may not include nicotine that is inhaled by the user of such product.

CBD, for purposes of this policy, is defined under federal law as a cannabis product with less than 0.3% tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) on a dry weight basis. It is also referred to as hemp. (Nonprescription CBD products that are available have not been approved by the U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for any use.)

Tobacco includes, but is not limited to cigarettes, cigars, snuff, smoking tobacco, smokeless tobacco, nicotine, nicotine delivering devices, chemicals, or devices that produce the same flavor or physical effect of nicotine substances; and any other tobacco or nicotine innovations.

II. Alcohol and Drugs

The New Fairfield Board of Education recognizes the harmful effect that substance abuse can have on a student and the student's peer group. For this reason, a student on school grounds or at a school-sponsored activity at any time or at any location who is under the influence of alcohol, drugs or mood-altering substances or possesses, uses, manufactures, dispenses, sells or aids in the procurement of alcohol, narcotics, restricted drugs, mood-altering substances, or any substance purported to be a restricted substance or over-the-counter drug shall be subjected to discipline pursuant to the Board of Education policies and regulations, as described in Expulsion and Suspension Policy 5114.

Possessing, using, or transmitting any substance which is represented to be or looks like a narcotic drug, hallucinogenic drug, amphetamine, barbiturate, marijuana, alcoholic beverage, stimulant, depressant, or intoxicant of any kind, including such substances that contain chemicals which produce the same effect of illegal substances including but not limited to Spice and K2 and bath salts are addressed by this policy.

The New Fairfield School System will, in a coordinated effort, attempt to respond openly and effectively to the uses and abuses of drugs, alcohol and mood-altering substances by members of the student population. This effort, through the curriculum, community support and resource services, such as those provided by a licensed drug and alcohol facility, and strong, consistent administrative rehabilitative and disciplinary procedures, will work to educate, prevent and intervene in the use and abuse of all drug, alcohol, and mood altering substances by its student population.

Disciplinary action taken by District officials against a student for the use, sale, or possession of marijuana (cannabis) on school premises or at any District/school sponsored activity, on or after January 1, 2022, shall not result in any discipline, punishment, or sanction greater than that which a student would face for the use, sale, or possession of alcohol. (C.G.S. 10-221(d), as amended by P.A. 21-1, June Special Session, Section 19)

III. Tobacco

For purposes of this policy, "use of tobacco" shall mean all uses of tobacco, including but is not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, snuff, blunts, bidis, pipes, chewing tobacco, or any other substance that contains tobacco or nicotine, and all other forms of smokeless tobacco, rolling papers and any other items containing or reasonably resembling tobacco or tobacco products. In order to protect students and staff, the Board prohibits the use of tobacco or nicotine-based products in school buildings, on school grounds, in school vehicles, or at any school-related event.

III. Tobacco (continued)

In the face of overwhelming evidence about smoking as a health hazard, and in keeping with the teachings in our school curriculum, and as a further deterrent and prevention against smoking by young persons, the New Fairfield Board of Education institutes the following policy:

1. Smoking and the use of tobacco products is prohibited in school buildings, on school property, at school activities, and on school buses at all times. All schools are “Drug-Free School Zones.”
2. Visible display and/or possession of tobacco products by students is prohibited on school property.
3. The New Fairfield Board of Education authorizes the principal and/or designee of New Fairfield High School to notify and provide statements or other assistance to the New Fairfield Police Department with respect to violations by students of the CT General Statutes prohibiting smoking in public buildings.

Any student (over the age of sixteen) found to be in violation of this policy will be subject to arrest by the New Fairfield Police Department who may issue smoking policy violators a Superior Court enforced ticket in compliance with the Connecticut General Statute.

IV. School Guidelines

As an extension of this policy, the New Fairfield Board of Education directs the Superintendent to develop guidelines to be used by all school district personnel in responding to drug, mood-altering substance, and alcohol-related situations.

As an integral part of the New Fairfield Public Schools, Tobacco, Alcohol and Other Drug guidelines represent one component in a district-wide effort to respond effectively to tobacco, drug, mood-altering substance and alcohol-related situations that may occur at school or at school-sponsored activities. These guidelines are also intended to provide a consistent disciplinary means to respond to tobacco, alcohol and other drug-related incidents. The New Fairfield Public Schools will provide a safe and healthy environment for students with due consideration for their legal rights and responsibilities. The Board reserves the right to use any extraordinary measures deemed necessary to control substance abuse even if the same is not provided for specifically in any rule or regulation enumerated herein.

V. Instruction

Students will receive instruction emphasizing the effect of alcohol, nicotine, tobacco, and drugs on health, character, and personality development wherever appropriate in the health education program and such other contexts which touch on the subject.

VI. Cooperation with Community and Parents

Any effort put forth by the New Fairfield Public Schools to address alcohol, drugs and tobacco usage requires support from all parents and cooperation from the community in order to be effective.

VII. Medical Marijuana

Although possession and use of marijuana for certain medical conditions, consistent with Connecticut's P.A. 12-55, "An Act Concerning the Palliative Use of Marijuana," as amended by P.A. 16-23, is no longer a crime in Connecticut, the possession and use of marijuana remains illegal under federal law. Consistent with federal law, including the Controlled Substances Act and the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act, the use and or possession of marijuana continues to be prohibited while a student is on a school bus, at school, on school grounds or at a school-sponsored activity. The District will continue to enforce its policies regarding controlled substances and any students who violate District policy prohibiting the use, sale or possession of illegal drugs in District facilities and school property will be subject to disciplinary and criminal action.

VIII. Use of CBD Products

Students are prohibited from possessing, using, selling, delivering, or manufacturing any substance containing cannabidiol (CBD) or tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), regardless of whether it constitutes a controlled substance under federal law.

Students are prohibited from being under the influence of any controlled drugs, narcotic, substance or any mind-altering substance or intoxicant, illegal or legal, specifically any product with cannabidiol (CBD), whether hemp or cannabis, and regardless of the amount of THC (tetrahydrocannabinol) in the product or the extent to which it is legal or illegal under state law.

Construction

Concepts and Roles in Planning for Educational Facilities

Construction

This policy governs major renovation and construction projects which are determined through budgetary process. Projects which are implemented by the local legislative body and are not maintenance oriented are governed by this policy. For Cap and Non projects see Policy 7110. Regular maintenance and repair are part of ongoing operations and are not governed by this policy.

Concepts and Roles in Planning for Educational Facilities

It shall be the policy of the Board of Education to plan for educational facilities. The Board shall maintain an instrument for determining the need for new facilities or for major facility improvements. The instrument shall be reviewed at least biannually. The instrument may incorporate local demographics, community use of educational facilities, projected enrollments, local educational philosophies and policies, existing and planned educational programs, existing facilities, and the ability of the local electorate to provide needed facilities.

The policy reflects the responsibility of the Board of Education to plan for education facilities and the local legislative body's responsibility to raise funding for and to construct needed educational facilities. This policy governs major renovation and construction projects. The definition of a major renovation or construction project is determined through budgetary process. Projects which are implemented by the local legislative body and are not maintenance oriented are governed by this policy.

A. Goals and Objectives

- (1) Identify an educational need for a new facility or renovation to an existing facility.
- (2) Plan for a new facility or renovation to an existing facility.
- (3) Gain public approval for the construction or renovation of a facility.
- (4) Construct or renovate a facility in cooperation with the Town's Permanent Building Committee.

B. Assumptions

This policy assumes all educational programs will be housed in spaces that comply with all applicable building codes and regulations. Further, this policy assumes that spaces provided to educational programs shall not hinder the attainment of educational goals and objectives and that the goal of the Board of Education is to provide facilities with the best possible conditions for attaining educational goals.

Construction

Concepts and Roles in Planning for Educational Facilities (continued)

C. Community

- (1) It is recognized that public educational facilities are constructed primarily for public educational activities, but are owned by the public and will be made available for public use wherever that use does not adversely effect educational activities. The design of educational facilities shall take into consideration public use and make accommodations for that use wherever practical and consistent with building use practices. Some of the community uses which shall be considered include recreation, use of facilities for emergency shelters and by non-profit organizations.
- (2) Community demographic information will be considered. Information to be considered shall include road maps with existing and planned sidewalks, maps and descriptions of existing and planned industrial and housing changes, population statistics and local and regional planning studies past, present, and future.

D. Enrollment

The projection of student enrollment is an essential element in educational facility planning. However, any projection is based upon assumptions and subject to inherent weaknesses. Projections will be considered the best estimate at a given point in time. Therefore, enrollment projections shall be updated annually or when new data becomes available or when assumptions change or prove untrue.

- (1) The methods that may be used to predict enrollment include cohort survival, students per dwelling unit and/or percentage of total population.
- (2) Some of the statistics concerning enrollment which will be maintained include the past 5 (five) year enrollment, 8 (eight) year predictions, and enrollment summaries by school for past year, present year, and next year. Other statistics will include non-public school enrollment by grade level and students with identified learning disabilities by district and by grade for each school. Existing school districting maps and plans to redistrict will be included.

E. Educational Philosophies and Policies

To the extent that educational philosophies and policies affect facilities, they will be considered in the development of the educational facility plans.

Construction

Concepts and Roles in Planning for Educational Facilities (continued)

F. Educational Programs

Educational facilities must be based on the activity to be housed. Facilities that do not conform fully hinder fulfillment of the goals and objectives of the programs housed as well as the philosophy and objective of the curriculum.

G. Facilities

Planning for educational facilities will take into consideration the capacity of existing facilities and systems and their adequacy to house existing educational programs and the physical condition of the facilities.

(1) The instrument will consider individual building inventories consisting of construction dates, renovation dates, floor plans, legal capacity by space, type of construction, listing of educational spaces and handicap access information. Such information will also be shared with the Town's Permanent Building Committee.

(2) Retirement of Buildings

A building operated by the school district may be retired from use when the Board of Education determines that it is no longer useful to the district and/or is unsuitable to the current needs or projected needs of the district. Recognizing that the closure of a facility may well be an emotional one, the Board of Education will appoint a committee representing a cross-section of opinion in the school district and the community as well as representing the people in the area served by the facility to study the issue and to recommend alternatives for the Board to consider, including retirement, alternative use, remodeling, continuation in use, or any other recommendations the committee might choose to make.

When a building is retired and determined to no longer serve an educational purpose it shall be returned to the Town and shall no longer be operated or maintained by the Board of Education.

(3) Naming of Facility

It shall be the prerogative of the Board of Education to establish the need and appropriateness for naming any school unit, which includes all outdoor and indoor facilities of the school. When the need has been determined, guidelines will be established by the Board of Education and input will be sought from members of the community.

Construction

Concepts and Roles in Planning for Educational Facilities (continued)

Ordinarily a facility will not be renamed unless the current name becomes obsolete or inappropriate because of the community it serves or the program it houses. The approval to name a facility or recognize a donor will not last beyond the reasonable life of the facility.

If the Board chooses to recognize a major donor in its naming of facilities, the Board will incur no obligation to the donor beyond the agreed upon recognition.

The Board recognizes the New Fairfield Rebels Hall of Honor to be the preferred forum to honor individuals and groups who have made significant contributions to the school community.

No plaques, signs or memorials in recognition, honor or memory of any person or organization shall be placed in or on any school facility without the recommendation of the Superintendent and the approval of the Board.

H. Finance

The Town has the responsibility of funding the construction of educational facilities. The Board of Education recognizes the need to plan new facilities, in cooperation with the Town's Permanent Building Committee, within the Town's ability to pay. Therefore, liaison shall be established with the Town when a particular need is determined for new facilities or for improvement to existing facilities. After a project has been identified an estimate of the cost will be developed and given to the Town for consideration and inclusion in the Town's long-range Capital Improvement Plan.

All possible sources of funds that will help defray direct costs to the local taxpayers including, but not limited to, State Department of Administration Services grants and Federal grants will be investigated. Funding options shall be discussed with the Board of Finance as early as possible following identification for the need of a construction project.

I. Conclusions

A list of facility inadequacy and/or future needs shall be developed and presented to the Board of Education for their consideration.

Community Relations

Public Videotaping of Educational Activity

The Board of Education (Board) hereby establishes limits on the use of recording equipment in order to minimize disruption and protect instructional time essential to improving student achievement. Any recording activity, even activity permitted under this policy, will be prohibited if the activity creates a disruption to the education process, or creates a safety and security risk.

Definitions

Visual Recording: Registering visual images on film, tape, digitally or by other mechanical or electronic means.

Audio Recording: Registering sounds on tape, digitally or by other mechanical or electronic means.

Outside Entity: Any individual, group, organization or corporation other than the administration, officers, staff or students of the District or individuals authorized to act on behalf of the District.

Recording by Outside Entities

The Board prohibits the use of video or audio recording equipment on District property or at District activities by outside entities without permission from the Superintendent or his/her designee unless authorized by law.

This prohibition shall not apply to:

1. Performances or activities to which the general public is invited, such as athletic competitions, concerts and plays.
2. Recording of staff for the sole purpose of professional training or development.
3. Open meetings of the Board or committees appointed by or at the direction of the Board.
4. Outside entities, including student-initiated groups, using or renting District facilities in accordance with Board policies and established administrative procedures.

Recording by District Personnel

The District may make audio or visual recordings to provide security, to maintain order, for professional staff development use or for other purposes related to furthering the educational mission of the District. This may include the use of video equipment in school buildings and on District transportation. No recording equipment will be placed in areas of the building where the occupant would have a reasonable expectation of privacy, such as restroom facilities or locker rooms. Recordings by and on behalf of District personnel that include students and are considered student records will be maintained in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and other applicable laws.

Community Relations

Public Videotaping of Educational Activity (continued)

Recording by Students

The District limits the use of video or audio recording equipment on District property or at District activities by students unless:

1. Required by a school-sponsored class or activity.
2. At performances or activities to which the general public is invited such as athletic competitions, concerts and plays.
3. At open meetings of the Board of Education or committees appointed by or at the direction of the Board.
4. As otherwise permitted by the Building Principal or classroom teacher.

Recording of Meetings

The Board of Education recognizes a parent's/guardian's right to record a PPT meeting held pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

The Board prohibits the use of audio, video, or other recording devices at other meetings held between District employees and parents/guardians. Exceptions to this prohibition will be made only in accordance with Board policy and law. Requests for such exceptions must be made within a reasonable period of time prior to the scheduled meetings. This prohibition does not apply to conversations held within view of District security cameras or devices.
