VI. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Eric Alviti, Frank Rizzo, Larry Roccamo, and Pat Toth all spoke in support of renaming the baseball field at New Fairfield High School “Garbowski Field” in honor of Michael and Joe Garbowski. Eric Alviti gave some examples of the amount of time the Garbowski family has volunteered for the baseball program. He spoke of the pride that players have when a field is named in honor of someone.

Chairman Dominic Cipollone read an email from New Fairfield Baseball President Ken Bennett also in support of renaming the baseball field Garbowski field.

B. Superintendent’s Report - Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction Dr. Kristine Woleck gave a report in Dr. Craw’s absence. She spoke of the following upcoming events:

- Many Holiday concerts are coming up at the schools.
- Kindergarten registration began on December 1st.
- There have been two discussion sessions for the book *The Anxious Generation*. The next one will be held on Monday, December 8th at 6:30 p.m. and is open to all families of PreK- Grade 12 students.

C. Student Representative Report

Senior Representative Ella Skogstrom spoke of the following:

- Western Connecticut State University held an onsite admission day on November 21st. There will be an onsite admission day for Naugatuck Valley Connecticut Community College on December 9th.
- The National Honor Society held a Blood Drive on December 3rd.
- The yearbook is on sale until January 1st. The deadline for advertisements is January 9th.
- The Post Grad committee is creating a gratitude wall. Messages can be purchased for a price of \$3 for one and \$5 for two. Proceeds will help defray the cost of Post Grad activities.
- There will be an upcoming Model UN Conference in Hartford.
- Mid-terms will be held from January 15th to 21st. The second quarter will end on January 23rd.
- The National Honor Society is offering peer tutoring.

Junior Representative Hailey Lofaro spoke of the following:

- The Veterans’ Day ceremony was held on November 11th.
- The DECA Powder Puff game was held on November 21st.
- Over 600 food and personal care items were collected at the DECA Food Drive.
- All Payments for the Junior Class trip to Washington DC are due by February 2nd.
- There will be a Chamber Singers, Wind Ensemble and Jazz Band concert on December 10th. The Strings concert will be held on December 18th.

D. Committee Reports

1. Curriculum - Dominic Cipollone noted that this subcommittee met and discussed new State Standards for Social Studies. There is a 5-year plan for curriculum.

2. Policy - Samantha Mannion noted that this subcommittee met on November 17th and discussed the policy regarding the facilities and specifically the fields. A new draft of this policy will be discussed at the next meeting. They further discussed the process for approving policies and will amend bylaws so that three readings will no longer be required for approving a policy.

3. Special Education Ad Hoc - Kathy Baker noted that this committee met tonight and discussed literacy, and a requirement by the State that mandates the district to evaluate all children to see if they are in need of services. There will be an Information Night for families on February 18th about transitions from one school to the next and the transition beyond high school. There will be a Parent Meeting on January 28th to help families understand the IEP Process and another meeting on May 21st to discuss technology that supports students in the district.

E. Liaison Reports

1. Board of Finance - Greg Flanagan noted the BOF met on November 19th and elected Wes Marsh to serve as the Chairman. They adopted a Medical Fund Reserve policy and approved the calendar of meetings for 2026. A BOE liaison will be appointed at the next regular meeting.
2. Parks and Rec Commission - Greg Flanagan noted that the Parks and Rec Commission met on November 10th and discussed the process for demolition for the Snack Shack at the Town Beach. They will decide on price increases for Day Camp and boat slips at the next regular meeting on December 8th.

A. New Fairfield High School/Consolidated School Building Project Update

Director of Business and Operations Carrie DePuy noted that the propane issue is ongoing. Colliers and the PBC are working on next steps for this. The Bus Lot issue will be discussed at the Planning Commission meeting and will go to a public meeting in January. It is hopeful that this will go out to bid in the spring. The sunshades are installed at the playground at the Elementary School. She thanked the PTO for this donation.

This program gives a detailed map of the standards and allows users to view the specifics of what is taught in various subjects.

Legal Obligations Under IDEA

Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)

Free, appropriate special education and related services designed to provide **meaningful educational benefit** for every eligible student.


Least Restrictive Environment (LRE)

Educate students with non-disabled peers to the **maximum extent appropriate** for that individual student.

Continuum of Services

A full range of placements and supports to meet individualized student needs

Continuum of Services



In-District Capacity

- In-district programs provide **appropriate supports within the district**
 - a. Integrated Life Skills (ILS) Program
 - b. Behavioral Emotional Support Team (BEST) Services
 - c. STRIDES transition program (ages 18-22)
- Educating students in-district aligns with **family preference** and **student stability**
- In-district options may reduce the need for **out-of-district placements** when appropriate

Outplacement Considerations

An outplacement is considered only when a student's needs **cannot be met within the larger school environment**, after exploring the full range of in-district services

Primary factors for consideration:

- **Behavioral Needs**

Intensive supports required to maintain safety and meaningful learning

- **Clinical Needs**

Mental health, medical, or specialized therapeutic requirements

Current Outplacement Exceptionality Categories

New Fairfield Public Schools Total Outplacements: 19 Students


New Fairfield students educated in specialized out-of-district programs are identified with the following disabilities:

Budget vs Actual



Unanticipated Budget Needs

Contributing factors include:

- Unanticipated outplacements
- Complexity of needs for students requiring outplacements
- Rising costs of outplacements and services

Excess Cost Eligible Expenses

Definition:

Excess Cost = special education expenses beyond 4.5x Per Pupil Expenditure

Examples of Excess Cost Expenses:

- Special education tuition
- Transportation
- 1:1 paraeducators
- Related services (speech, OT/PT)

Excess Cost Reimbursement

How Reimbursement is Determined

Example:

Total Special Education Cost.....\$200,000
(1 outplacement - tuition & transportation)

Only applies to costs exceeding:
4.5× Per Pupil Expenditure.....(\$106,670)

Eligible Excess Cost:.....\$93,330

Reimbursement prorated based on state ranking and available funding.

NF Reimbursement rate (68%)
(rate dependent on available state funding)

NF State Rank = 51st (Wealthiest Tier 1-58)

Reimbursements processed in February & May

Eligible Excess Cost:.....\$93,330

Estimated FY 26 Special Education Budget Shortfall

Mitigation Strategies

- Ongoing monitoring of special education budget and Excess Cost reimbursement
- Continued implementation of FY 26 budget controls
- Explore and pilot programmatic enhancements to expand in-district options

FY 27 Budget Outlook

- FY 26 reflects a **\$1.2M special education overage**, driven largely by increased outplacements and services.
- Many outplacement and service costs are **ongoing and multi-year**, not one-time expenses.
- State Excess Cost reimbursement will offset only a **portion** of these costs.
- If current trends continue, the **FY 27 budget** will reflect a continuation of these costs.

Bylaws of the Board

Formulation, Adoption, Amendment of Policies

The New Fairfield Board of Education considers policy development its chief function, along with periodic review through its policies. It is through the development and adoption of written policies that the Board shall exercise its leadership in the operation of the school system; and it is through study and evaluation of reports concerning the execution of its written policies that the Board shall exercise its control over school operations.

It is the intent of the Board to develop policies and put them in writing so that they serve as guidelines and goals for the successful and efficient functioning of the public schools.

Written policies serve as guidelines for the discretionary actions of all district employees and as a source of information and guidance for all persons who are interested in, and affected by, the district schools.

Changes in needs, conditions, purposes, and objectives will require revisions, deletions, and additions to the policies of present and future Boards. Thus policy development is an ongoing process.

Policy Adoption

Adoption of new policies and changing existing policies are solely the responsibility of the Board.

Policies will, barring emergencies, be adopted or amended after consideration ~~for at least thirty days~~ **for not less than three (3) weeks** by the Board of Education. The time between Board meetings shall permit further study, and also provide an opportunity for interested parties to be heard on the matter.

Regarding matters of unusual urgency, the Board may waive the above procedures and take immediate action to adopt or revise existing policies. When such immediate action is necessary, the Superintendent shall inform interested groups or individuals as to the reasons for the waiver for this procedure.

The agenda and minutes shall be marked to indicate policy matters. The formal adoption of policies shall be by majority vote of the Board of Education in attendance and the action shall be recorded in the minutes of the Board of Education. Only those written statements so adopted and so recorded shall be regarded as official policy.

Formulation, Adoption, Amendment of Policies (continued)

Policy Dissemination

The Superintendent is directed to establish and maintain an orderly plan for making pertinent policies of the Board known to staff members, students, and others affected by them.

The Superintendent shall arrange to disseminate to staff members all new policies that affect them and their work and shall also provide easy access to an up-to-date policy collection for all employees of the school system and members of the Board.

The Board's policy manual shall be considered a public record and shall be open for inspection at the Board offices.

Bylaws of the Board

Formulation, Adoption, Amendment of Bylaws

Proposed new bylaws and suggested amendments to or revision of existing bylaws must be adopted by a majority vote of all members of the Board of Education. This adoption will usually occur during the second of two regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Education, **not less than three (3) weeks apart** ~~that four (4) weeks apart~~ in the calls for which meeting the proposed additions, amendments, or revisions shall have been described in writing.

Formulation, Adoption, Amendment of Administrative Regulations

The Board of Education does not adopt administrative regulations unless specifically required to do so by law, or unless requested to do so by the Superintendent. Adoption and amendment of such Board of Education-adopted regulations shall be by the same procedure as that specified for policies in 9311.

The Board of Education reserves the right to review and direct revisions of administrative regulations should they, in the Board of Education's judgment, be inconsistent with the policies adopted by the Board of Education.

Dear New Fairfield Board of Education Members,

Re: Framework for Determining Appropriate Levels of Athletic Recognition

This document has been developed to establish benchmarks for evaluating whether an individual's contributions to New Fairfield High School warrant recognition through a facility naming. Its purpose is to align such decisions with Board of Education Policy 7000 and the district's past practice, ensuring that recognition is applied thoughtfully, consistently and with respect for precedent.

For your reference, the criteria for the Hall of Honor have already been clearly defined in the New Fairfield Rebels Hall of Honor [Bylaws](#).

Included in this letter are:

- Key criteria for evaluating athletic recognition requests;
- An athletic recognition rubric comparing plaque vs. field naming;
- Summaries of historical examples of past recognitions;
- Summaries of the Garbowski family contributions;
- Application of criteria and rubric to the current request; and
- Appendix A: Full résumés for Marty Morgan, John Zinser, Mike Garbowski, and Joe Garbowski.

Over the years, the Board and administration have considered several forms of honors, such as field namings, plaques and Hall of Honor inductions, and each pathway reflects a different level of impact and visibility. By compiling examples of past recognitions, this document is intended to serve as a practical guide to help the Board distinguish when a request rises to the level of naming a school facility and when a plaque or alternate form of recognition may be more appropriate in special circumstances.

The accomplishments of individuals such as Coach Marty Morgan and Coach John Zinser demonstrate the types of significant contributions that have historically supported field naming or plaque recognition. Marty Morgan's decades-long record of competitive success and community impact provides precedent for naming an outdoor athletic facility, while the commemorative plaque honoring Coach Zinser illustrates how the district has recognized significant contributions short of naming a field. These examples provide a benchmark against which future requests, including the current proposal regarding the NFHS Baseball Field, can be evaluated.

By grounding its decisions in Policy 7000(d)(3) and established patterns of past practice, the Board can ensure that all naming and recognition requests are considered equitably and in a

manner that reflects the district's values. Ultimately, this document is intended to support that process by offering a clear, consistent framework for determining the level of recognition warranted in each case.

Key Criteria Reflected in Prior NFHS Recognitions

Coaching Longevity

- Decades of strong leadership aligned with the district's mission
- Consistent high-level winning seasons
- Builds lasting, exemplary program culture

Team Accomplishments

- Competitive success (e.g., conference championships, state championships)
- Sustained program excellence over multiple seasons
- Notable milestones or historic team achievements

Player Development

- Demonstrated impact on athlete growth over time
- Number of athletes advancing to college programs
- Development of All-State, All-American or Academic All-American players

Coaching Accomplishments

- Local, state or regional coaching awards

- Contributions to the broader athletic community or sport

Application of Key Criteria to the Garbowski Supporters' Request

When applying the district's established criteria and historical precedents to the current request, it is important for the Board to distinguish between the types of contributions that have traditionally supported field naming and those that are better aligned with plaque recognition. The central question before the Board is whether they have reached the historic benchmarks that have previously justified naming an athletic field.

Additionally, supporters of the request are advocating for the field to be named after the **Garbowski Family**. This raises an additional question for the Board:

If the Board determines that field naming is warranted, would the recognition honor the Garbowski family as a whole, or should it specifically reflect the accomplishments of the varsity head coach, Joe Garbowski, whose work currently drives the program?

This distinction is important because past precedents have focused recognition on individuals whose professional careers and achievements reached the highest levels of program impact over many decades.

Benchmarking against precedent:

- **Field Naming:** Reserved for varsity head coaches with decades of leadership, multiple state championships, high-level player development, and extensive community impact (e.g., Marty Morgan).
- **Plaque Recognition:** Honors substantial contributions without naming a facility (e.g., John Zinser, volunteer or foundational coaches).

Potential recognition pathways (in no particular order):

- **Plaque for Mike Garbowski:** Honors decades of volunteer service and mentorship.
- **Combined Family Recognition Plaque:** Could recognize past contributions (Mike) and ongoing contributions (Joe), leading to enhancements to the baseball program.
- **Field Naming:** The Board may choose to (1) recognize the Garbowski family with a field naming, or (2) solely recognize Joe Garbowski's accomplishments with a field naming, or (3) he could be eligible for a field naming in the future after further historic achievements as the varsity head coach.

Final Note

I hope this information provides the Board, in its governance role, with a clear framework for evaluating the current request and for maintaining consistency with past practice and Policy 7000. Please feel free to reach out with any questions or if further clarification would be helpful.

Community Relations

Public Videotaping of Educational Activity

The Board of Education (Board) hereby establishes limits on the use of recording equipment in order to minimize disruption and protect instructional time essential to improving student achievement. Any recording activity, even activity permitted under this policy, will be prohibited if the activity creates a disruption to the education process, or creates a safety and security risk. If an individual is unsure whether videotaping is permitted in a particular situation, they are encouraged to consult with a building administrator in advance.

Definitions

Visual Recording: Registering visual images on film, tape, digitally or by other mechanical or electronic means.

Audio Recording: Registering sounds on tape, digitally or by other mechanical or electronic means.

Outside Entity: Any individual, group, organization or corporation other than the administration, officers, staff or students of the District or individuals authorized to act on behalf of the District.

Recording by Outside Entities

The Board prohibits the use of video or audio recording equipment on District property or at District activities by outside entities without permission from the Superintendent or his/her designee unless authorized by law.

This prohibition shall not apply to:

1. Performances or activities to which the general public is invited, such as athletic competitions, concerts and plays.
2. Recording of staff for the sole purpose of professional training or development.
3. Open meetings of the Board or committees appointed by or at the direction of the Board.
4. Outside entities, including student-initiated groups, using or renting District facilities in accordance with Board policies and established administrative procedures.

Recording by District Personnel

The District may make audio or visual recordings to provide security, to maintain order, for professional staff development use or for other purposes related to furthering the educational mission of the District. This may include the use of video equipment in school buildings and on District transportation. No recording equipment will be placed in areas of the building where the occupant would have a reasonable expectation of privacy, such as restroom facilities or locker rooms. Recordings by and on behalf of District personnel that include students and are considered student records will be maintained in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and other applicable laws.

Community Relations

Public Videotaping of Educational Activity (continued)

Recording by Students

The District limits the use of video or audio recording equipment on District property or at District activities by students unless:

1. Required by a school-sponsored class or activity.
2. At performances or activities to which the general public is invited such as athletic competitions, concerts and plays.
3. At open meetings of the Board of Education or committees appointed by or at the direction of the Board.
4. As otherwise permitted by the Building Principal or classroom teacher.

Recording of Meetings

The Board of Education recognizes a parent's/guardian's right to record a PPT meeting held pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

The Board prohibits the use of audio, video, or other recording devices at other meetings held between District employees and parents/guardians. Exceptions to this prohibition will be made only in accordance with Board policy and law. Requests for such exceptions must be made within a reasonable period of time prior to the scheduled meetings. This prohibition does not apply to conversations held within view of District security cameras or devices.
