The project includes the replacement of the existing ceiling and lights in fourteen classrooms. The project also includes additional cabinetry and the replacement of cabinetry in the 12 classrooms. The new lighting system will be more energy efficient and allow staff to better control light levels in their classroom. The work will be concentrated in classrooms on the west corridor. The classrooms on the east corridor were completed last year during Phase 1.

2. **Authorization of Health and Hospitalization Insurance Rates for 2011-2012**

It was the recommendation of the Insurance Committee that the District remain with PreferredOne on a self-insured basis for the 2011-2012 contract year. The recommendation for the renewal for the 2011-2012 plan year was a 5% increase to the premiums. This increase will be applied to both health plans – the low deductible and the high deductible with the VEBA option. The rate increase will be below the national medical inflation trend of 11%. It was also recommended that the District change the stop loss carrier to Humana effective July 1, 2011. The change would bring a 10.4% savings to the health insurances reserves.

A motion was made by Mr. John Moroz to approve the recommendations of the Insurance Committee that the District remain with PreferredOne on a self-insured basis, that a rate renewal for the 2011-2012 plan year of 5% would be applied to both health insurance plans and a change to the stop loss carrier to Humana. The motion was seconded by Mr. Jay Hesby and the motion passed unanimously.

3. **Authorization of Dental Insurance Rates for 2011-2012**

A motion was made by Ms. Carter Peterson to approve the recommendation of the Insurance Committee that the District remain with Delta Dental on a self-insured basis and a rate renewal for the 2011-2012 plan year would be 2% overall. The motion was seconded by Ms. Linda Cohen and the motion passed unanimously.

It was recommended that Thelen Heating & Roofing Inc., the low bidder, be awarded the base bid in the amount of \$548,000.00 and Alternate 1 at \$230,000.00 for a grand total of \$778,000.00.

The base bid involves the replacement of two sections of roof. Roof top mechanical systems will need to be removed and reset to accommodate the new roof. The new roof system will be designed to meet energy code and to allow proper drainage. The alternate bid is to replace two additional sections of the roof.

The project will be funded with roof reserve dollars.

A motion was made by Mr. Jay Hesby to award the 2011 Reroofing and Mechanical Renovation at Birchview Elementary School to Thelen Heating and Roofing, Inc. for the base bid amount of \$548,000.00 and Alternate 1 at \$230,000.00 for a total bid award of \$778,000.00. The motion was seconded by Ms. Susan Gaither and the motion was passed unanimously.

The attached lease agreement is with Interfaith Outreach and Community Partners (IOCP), at the new facility located near the corner of Highway 101 and County Rd 6.

This lease agreement is for 4,244 square feet of space which will allow the District to be a partner with IOCP and Hennepin County in creating a one-stop, multi-service and learning center designed to meet a variety of unmet needs of learners and families in the Wayzata School District’s community.

Learning programs being planned for this location include; Early Childhood Programs, Adult Basic Education and Adult English as a Second Language, Parent Engagement and Education Programs, Adult and Senior Enrichment Services, K-12 Academic Support and High School Service Learning programs.

Operations and program costs will be funded through Community Education program funds. The lease will be funded through lease levy.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve the Lease Agreement with IOCP and authorize the Board Clerk to sign the agreement.

LEASE AGREEMENT

This Lease Agreement is executed in multiple originals effective this ____ day of _____, 2011, by and between Interfaith Outreach & Community Partners (IOCP), referred to as the "Landlord", and Wayzata Independent School District #284, referred to as the "Tenant" or "School District".

1. Leased Premises. Landlord, in consideration of the rents and covenants stated in this Agreement, to be paid and performed by the Tenant, does lease to the Tenant and the Tenant does lease from the Landlord, the following described Premises situated at 1605 County Road 101, in the City of Plymouth, County of Hennepin, State of Minnesota, 55447, as illustrated on the building plan attached hereto as Exhibit "A:" consisting of 3,688 SF of dedicated space and an equivalent of 556 SF of shared space for partial use of the community room immediately west of the early childhood education space, resulting in a total square feet of 4,244 SF ("Premises").

2. Purpose, Permits. The Tenant hereby agrees that it shall lease the Premises for the following purposes only: A school, training, early childhood education and offices.

Landlord and Tenant agree that Landlord has made no warranties or statements regarding the compatibility of Tenants intended use with the zoning ordinances of the City of Plymouth. Tenant acknowledges that the use of a portion of the Premises as early childhood education/drop-in day care will require Tenant to apply for and secure an amendment to the Planned Unit Development in place for the current uses, and agrees to apply in a timely manner for such approvals, and pay for all relate permits, fees and expenses related to processing the amendment. Tenant, shall comply with all regulations and requirements of the municipality in which the Premises is located or any other public authority having jurisdiction regarding the condition and conduct of the Premises. Tenant acknowledges that Landlord is a 501(c) (3) organization and that the Leased Premises have been financed, in part, with proceeds of qualified 501(c) (3) tax exempt bonds under section 145 of the IRS Code. Because of applicable federal tax rules, the use of the Leased Premises must be limited. Tenant also acknowledges that the building is proposed to be exempt from property taxes. Landlord acknowledges that Tenant's proposed use primarily to deliver educational and drop-in day care services meets both the property tax exempt standards and the standards of the tax exempt bonds. Tenant agrees that if there is a substantial change in use or sub-lease of the Leased Premises to another entity Tenant will confer with Landlord to confirm that the use meets the required standards.

3. Term. The Tenant shall lease the above-described Premises for a period commencing on May1, 2011 and terminating on December 31, 2016, subject to early terminations provisions as outlined in Section 12.

4. Lease Payments.

4.1 Base Net Rent. As “Base Net Rent” for the above Premises (excluding operating costs and fees), the Tenant agrees to pay to the Landlord Base Net Rent as follows:

The Base Net Rent and operating costs do not reflect any evening usage of the building by the tenant. If Tenant desires to use the building for evening events, Tenant would be charged a \$150 per evening event fee. Landlord is open to a future negotiated rent rate increase to factor this cost into the Base Net Rent rather than as an event fee.

The parties acknowledge and agree that the lease payments provided in this paragraph are the sole payments to be made hereunder by the Tenant except for any additional charges for use of common space pursuant to paragraph 15 below. Payment of said rent shall be made on the first day of each month at the Bayport Properties, 10653 Wayzata Blvd., Suite 250, Minnetonka, MN 55305, or at such other place as may be designated by the Landlord.

4.2 Operating Costs

4.2 (a) For the first year of this Lease, Tenant agrees to pay its pro rata share of operating costs from the commencement date, such costs estimated to be \$ 23,342, payable in equal monthly installments of \$ 1,945.15 at a rate of \$ 5.50 per square foot. In years two through five the per square foot operating cost number shall be increased by three percent (3%) each year.

4.2 (b) Prior to December 1 of each calendar year within the term of the lease, Landlord shall provide Tenant with a written estimate of Tenant’s pro rata share of all operating costs of the Building which are to be paid by Tenant as additional rent for the calendar year, or fraction thereof. The estimated monthly amount shall be paid by Tenant, together with each month base rent-payment. Within ninety (90) days after the expiration of each calendar year, Landlord shall provide Tenant with documentation of the actual operating costs of the preceding calendar year, and, if the actual costs are more or less than the estimate provided by Landlord, Landlord shall make a proper adjustment, either by giving Tenant a credit within sixty (60) days or by submitting an invoice for the additional costs to be paid by Tenant within sixty (60) days. Base Net Rent and the additional rent identified in this Section 4.2 (b) are referred to herein as “Rent”.

4.2 (c) The term "operating costs" as used herein shall mean all expenses and costs (but not specific costs which are separately billed to and paid by specific tenants) incurred and normally required with respect to the repair, replacement, maintenance and

operation of the building and equipment, improvements, sidewalks, driveways, and parking facilities, including but not limited to:

1. Wages, salaries, and related expenses of all on-site employees engaged in the operation, maintenance and security of the Building;
2. All supplies and materials used in the operation and maintenance of the Building;
3. Cost of utilities, including water and power, heating, lighting, air conditioning, and ventilation for the Building;
4. Maintenance and service agreements for the Building and the equipment therein, and administrative costs for services which are directly connected to the operation of the Leased Premises, provided any administrative costs do not exceed five (5%) percent of the annual gross rental for the Leased Premises;
5. Costs of all insurance, including but not limited to fire, casualty and liability applicable to the Building;
6. Any and all common area maintenance costs related to public areas of the Building, including but not limited to all sidewalks, landscaping, drives, and service areas;
7. All taxes, special assessments or similar charges, ordinary and extraordinary, unforeseen as well as foreseen, of any kind which are assessed, levied, charged, confirmed, or imposed by any public authority upon the Building, its operations or the rent provided for in this Lease.
8. Any special services that both parties mutually agree on. Such special services may be allocated to the respective Tenants on a different allocation percentage than the standard common area percentage determination. This would include any agreed upon cost sharing of a joint receptionist for the building tenants.

4.2 (d) Tenant Share of Operating Costs: In any case when Tenant shall be charged for expenses on a pro rata basis, the following square foot amounts and percentages shall apply:

Tenant's percentage of Building	15.2%

Any expense which is wholly allocable to or for the sole benefit of Tenant shall be wholly allocated to Tenant and not prorated among other tenants.

4.2 (e) If this Lease commences or terminates at any time other than the first day of the calendar year, the operating cost adjustment referred to hereinabove shall be prorated, such that Tenant shall pay only the operating cost adjustment for the calendar days during the calendar year for which Tenant is obligated to pay rent with respect to the Leased Premises.

5. Leasehold Improvement and Tenant Alterations.

5.1 Leasehold Improvements: Prior to the commencement date but no later than August 1, 2011 Landlord, shall complete all work in accordance with the plans and specifications attached hereto as Exhibit B, with respect to the Leased Premises (herein the "Leasehold Improvements"). Landlord and Tenant agree that the proposed budget for Leasehold Improvement shall be as shown on Exhibit C, and any mutually approved adjustments (increase or decrease) to the proposed budget shall be reflected in the final Base Net Rent.

5.2 Landlord's Consent. Tenant shall not make or cause to be made any alterations, additions or improvements in or to the Premises without submitting to Landlord plans and specifications and obtaining Landlord's prior written consent thereto which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. All of Tenant's Alterations shall be made in a good and workmanlike manner and shall meet all applicable building codes and governmental regulations. Tenant agrees to indemnify and hold Landlord free and harmless from any liability, loss, cost, damage or expense (including attorneys' fees) by reasons of any said alteration, repairs, additions or improvements.

5.3 Alterations Become Part of Premises. All alterations, decorations, or improvements including leasehold improvements and permanent fixtures with the exception of trade fixtures, made or installed on the Premises by or on behalf of Tenant shall at the Landlord's option, become part of the Premises and shall become property of the Landlord. Upon expiration of the Lease Term or any extension thereof at the Landlord's option either: (a) all such alterations, decorations, improvements and permanent fixtures except trade fixtures shall become property of the Landlord; or (b) all such alterations, decorations or improvements and permanent fixtures including trade fixtures shall be removed by Tenant and the part of the Premises altered by such removal shall be restored to its original condition, reasonable wear and tear exempted.

6. Landlord's Covenant. The Landlord hereby covenants and agrees as follows:

6.1. Furnish all necessary utilities for the proper basic functioning of the building, including heat, electricity, including electricity for window air conditioning units, water and sewer and to keep same in good repair. Any electrical requirements beyond those listed above shall be installed by the Tenant.

6.2. To provide custodial and maintenance services for the leased Premises and common areas, including ice and snow removal in accordance with its normal snow removal schedule.

6.3. To enter the leased Premises at all reasonable times, and with minimum disruption for the purpose of inspection and to repair and correct all structural and other defects in the Premises and equipment, fixtures, or appliances serving same.

6.4. To provide an interior building directory or map to assist members of the public in locating the Tenant's space.

6.5. To provide a parking lot which will be available for use by the Tenant and others using the Premises.

6.6. To maintain the building's normal operating hours of 7:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M., Monday through Friday, and such evenings and weekends as hereinafter provided. Tenant hours of operation are 7:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M., Monday through Friday. Any Landlord provided custodial services, in excess of that provided to the building as a whole, shall be paid by Tenant at the hourly rate. If Tenant desires to utilize the building during times other than the normal operating hours, Tenant agrees to provide Landlord with a reasonable "Use Fee" to compensate for the extra operating costs incurred by Landlord for that extended use.

7. Tenant's Covenants. The Tenant hereby covenants and agrees as follows:

7.1. Not to use or permit any activity upon said Premises that will increase the rate of insurance thereon or anything that may be dangerous to life or limb.

7.2. To provide a certificate of insurance covering its exposure to liability as set forth in Section 8 of this Agreement.

7.3. Not to deface or injure the leased Premises, or the building or surrounding grounds, or to overload the floors, or to do or permit anything to be done upon said Premises, or in the building or the surrounding area that will amount to or create a nuisance.

7.4. Not to erect or permit to be erected on the exterior of the Premises of the building any signs, and not to erect or permit to be erected within the interior of the building any sign without having first obtained the written consent of the Landlord. Such consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Tenant shall be permitted interior signs of the same size and type as other tenants.

7.5. Not to sublet the Premises or any part thereof, nor to assign the lease or any interest therein nor to permit such lease to become transferred by operation of law or otherwise without first obtaining the written consent of the Landlord. Any assignment, sale in bankruptcy, or insolvency of the Tenant may, at the option of the Landlord, be considered an assignment within the meaning of this lease and as breach of the covenants thereof. It is understood and agreed that Landlord may withhold or delay its consent because of reasonable concerns about the potential effect of any such assignment, transfer, sublet, or occupancy either on Landlord's liability for unrelated business income tax or on Landlord's compliance with section 145 of the IRS Code.

7.6. Not to waste nor to misuse water, electricity, heat, or any of the other utilities or services that shall be furnished by the Landlord.

7.7. To notify Landlord immediately upon taking possession of or first using the Premises or any equipment, plumbing, fixture, appliances and machinery therein, of any defects in the equipment, plumbing, fixture, appliances and machinery otherwise such taking possession of the Premises shall be conclusive evidence of the satisfactory condition of the Premises and the equipment and other services servicing same.

7.8. To comply with the provisions of the Landlord's policy for a tobacco free environment. A copy of the policy will be furnished to Lessee prior to its effective date.

8. Landlord's and Tenant's Scope of Liability.

8.1 Tenant Insurance. Landlord and Tenant agree that Tenant shall obtain a policy of insurance providing Landlord and Tenant with coverage against liability resulting from the careless, negligent, or unlawful use of the leased Premises by Tenant, its officers, agents, or employees and that the cost of such policy of insurance shall be paid for solely by Tenant. Such coverage will be in an amount not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) Dollars per occurrence.

Landlord states that it has and will continue to require all other Tenants of the building to maintain public liability insurance providing such Tenants and Landlord with coverage against liability resulting from the careless; negligent, or unlawful use of the lease Premises by each such Tenant, its officers, agents, or employees.

Landlord further states that it maintains and will continue to maintain during the term of the lease its own policy of public liability insurance providing coverage against liability resulting from the careless, negligent, or unlawful use of the Premises by the Landlord, its officers, agents or employees.

The Landlord shall not be responsible or liable to the Tenant for any injury or damage resulting from acts or omissions of third persons occupying property adjoining the leased Premises or any part of the building of which the lease Premises is a part, or for any injury or damage resulting to the Tenant or its property from bursting, stoppage or leading of water, gas, sewer, or steam pipes, except where such loss or damage arises from the willful or negligent misconduct of the Landlord, its agents or employees or from the Landlord's failure to make the repairs which it is obligated to make hereunder.

8.2 Personal Property Tenant shall, at its expense, at all times during the Term maintain insurance with respect to Tenant's equipment, machinery, systems, trade fixtures and personal property against loss or damage by fire and other risks as are customarily covered by an extended coverage policy with an all risk endorsement, in each case for the full insurable value thereof; and

8.3 Real Property Landlord shall maintain fire and extended coverage in such amounts as deemed appropriate by the Landlord.

8.4 Insurance Certificates Tenant shall provide Landlord with certificates evidencing the insurance to be carried hereunder upon the request of Landlord. Such certificates shall state that such policies shall not be modified or cancelled without at least thirty (30) days written notice to Landlord.

9. Waiver of Subrogation. Notwithstanding any other provision in this Lease to the contrary, Landlord and Tenant each hereby releases the other party and the officers, employees and agents of the other party from any and all liability or responsibility to such party or anyone claiming through or under them by way of subrogation (to the

extent insurance coverage is not diminished) or otherwise for any loss or damage to the Premises, Tenant's property on the Premises, or to the building or property, resulting from any occurrence coverable by the property damage insurance policies required to be maintained hereunder by such party, even if such occurrence shall have been caused by the fault or intentionally tortuous or negligent act or omission of the other party or anyone for whom the other party may be responsible. Each of Landlord and Tenant agrees that its policies will include such a clause or endorsement permitting such waiver.

10. Partial Destruction of Premises. Landlord and Tenant agree that if during the term of this lease the leased Premises or the improvements thereon shall be injured or destroyed by fire or the elements, or through any other cause, so as to render the leased Premises unfit for occupancy, or to make it impossible to conduct the business of the Tenant thereon, or to such an extent that the Premises cannot be repaired with reasonable diligence within thirty (30) days from the happening of such injury, then the Landlord may terminate this lease as of the date of such damage or destruction. The Tenant shall then immediately surrender the leased Premises and all interest therein to the Landlord.

The Tenant shall pay rent only to the time of surrender. In case of any such destruction or injury the Landlord may re-enter and repossess the leased Premises described in this lease, and may dispossess all parties then in possession thereof. But if the leased Premises can be restored within sixty (60) days from happening of the injury thereto, and the Landlord within fifteen (15) days from the occurrence of such injury elects in writing to so repair or restore said Premises within sixty (60) days from the happening of the injury thereto, then this lease shall not end or terminate on account of such injury by fire or otherwise. In such event the rent shall not run or accrue from the date of such injury through the date of completion of such repairs, except that the Tenant shall during such time pay a pro rata portion of such rent apportioned to the portion of the leased Premises which are in condition for occupancy or which may be actually occupied during such repairing period. If, however, the leased Premises shall be so slightly injured by any, cause aforesaid, as not to be rendered unfit for occupancy, then the Landlord shall repair the same with reasonable promptness, and in that case the rent shall not cease or be abated during such repairing period. All improvements or betterments placed by the Tenant on the leased Premises shall, in any event, be repaired and replaced by the Tenant at its own expense and not at the expense of the Landlord except to the extent that insurance proceeds attributable to damage to Tenant's improvements are available for repair of said damage. In the event that the Landlord shall fail to make the required repairs or to give the required notices as specified in this provision, the Tenant may, at its option, terminate this lease as of the date of such injury upon furnishing written notice to the Landlord of same. Such right to terminate by the Tenant shall exist from and after thirty (30) days from the date of injury should notice have been received; in either event, the repairs must not have been substantially completed.

11. Tenant's Default.

11.1 Events of Default. Each of the following events shall constitute a Default:

(a) if any Rent or any other charge or payment due hereunder shall be unpaid when due, and shall remain unpaid for a period often (10) days after Landlord has given Tenant notice of such default;

(b) if Tenant shall be in default in performing any of the covenants, terms and conditions of this Lease other than the provisions requiring the payment of rent and if Tenant shall fail to cure such default within thirty (30) days after Landlord has given Tenant written notice of such default, or, if the default is character as. to require more than thirty (30) days to cure, Tenant shall fail to use reasonable diligence in curing such default within the thirty (30) day time period and shall notify Landlord in writing of its attempt to cure;

(c) if the interest of Tenant under this Lease shall be levied or under execution or other legal process, or if any petition shall be filed; or if Tenant be declared insolvent according to law, or if any assignment of Tenant's property shall be made for the benefit of creditors; or if a receiver or trustee is appointed for Tenant or its property.

11.2 Remedies Upon Default. Upon any Event of Default as described above, Landlord may, in addition to any other rights or remedies Landlord may have at law or in equity, at its option:

(a) by summary proceedings or by any other appropriate legal action or proceedings, terminate the term of this Lease and enter into the Premises or any part thereof and expel Tenant or any person or persons occupying the Premises, and so to repossess and enjoy the Premises as in Landlord's former estate and be entitled to recover forthwith as damages a sum of money equal to the total of (i) the cost of recovering the Premises, including all attorneys' fees incurred in enforcing Tenant's obligations hereunder; (ii) the unpaid Rent owed at the time of termination, plus interest at the rate of eighteen (18%) percent per annum and late charges; (iii) the balance of the rent for the remainder of the Lease Term; and (iv) any other sum of money and damages owed by Tenant to Landlord; of

(b) Landlord may terminate Tenant's right of possession (but not this Lease) and may repossess the Premises without demand or notice of any kind to Tenant and without terminating this Lease, in which event Landlord may, but shall he under no obligation to do so, relet the same for the account of Tenant for such rent and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to Landlord. For the purpose of such reletting, Landlord is authorized to decorate or to make any repairs, changes, alterations or additions in or to the Premises which may be necessary or convenient, and (i) if Landlord shall fail or refuse to relet the Premises, or (ii) if the same are relet and a sufficient sum shall not be realized from such reletting after paying the unpaid rent due hereunder earned but unpaid at the time of reletting plus interest thereon,. the cost of recovering possession, repairs, changes, alterations and additions and the expense of such reletting and of the collection of the rent accruing therefrom to satisfy the rent provided for in this Lease to be paid, then Tenant shall pay to Landlord as damages a: sum equal to the amount of the rental reserved in-this Lease for such period or periods, or if the Premises have been relet, Tenant shall satisfy and pay any such deficiency upon demand therefor from time

to time; and Tenant agrees that Landlord may file suit to recover any sums falling due under the terms of this subparagraph from time to time on one or more occasions without Landlord being obligated to wait until expiration of the Lease Term; and that no delivery or recovery of any portion due Landlord hereunder shall be any amount not theretofore reduced to judgment in favor of Landlord, nor shall such reletting be construed as an election on the part of Landlord to terminate this Lease unless a written notice of such intention be given to Tenant by Landlord. Notwithstanding any such reletting without termination, Landlord may at any time thereafter elect to terminate this Lease for such previous breach.

11.3 Landlord's Right to Cure Defaults. If the Tenant shall default in the observance or performance of any of the Tenant's covenants, agreements or obligations hereunder, the Landlord may, but without any obligation on its part and without limiting any other remedies which it may have by reason of such default, cure the default, and Tenant shall forthwith upon demand pay to Landlord the cost thereof, together with interest thereon at the rate of 18% per annum.

11.4 Waiver of Default. The failure of the Landlord to insist, in anyone or more instances, upon a strict performance of any of the terms, covenants, and conditions of this Lease, or to exercise any option herein contained, shall not be construed as a waiver, or a relinquishment for the future, of such term, covenant, condition or option, but the same shall continue and remain in full force and effect. The receipt by the Landlord of rent with knowledge of a breach in any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of this Lease to be kept or performed by the Tenant shall not be deemed to have waived any provision of this Lease unless expressed in writing and signed by the Landlord. The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision hereof shall not affect or impair any other provision. All rights and remedies of Landlord enumerated in this Lease shall be cumulative and none shall exclude any other right or remedy allowed Landlord by law.

12. Termination of Lease.

12.1 Termination Notice. Tenant and Landlord agree to give the other party written notice thirty (30) days before the expiration of this Lease of its intention to vacate the Premises or to demand vacation of the Premises. Unless either party gives notice that the Premises shall be vacated at the end of the lease term, or any extension by option thereof, the lease shall be extended for successive one-month periods commencing as of the date of the end of the Lease, or any extension by option thereof, and continuing until terminated upon a one month written notice delivered to the other party. Rent payable during such period shall be at the same rate as that paid during the original term, or any extension by option, which rent shall be paid on a monthly basis. If for any reason the Tenant does not promptly vacate the Premises at the end of the term, or any extension by option thereof, the Tenant agrees to pay the Landlord, for such time as elapses between the end of the term of the lease as same may be extended by this provision of the Agreement and that time when the Tenant actually vacates the Premises, a pro rata rental equal to one and one-half (1 ½) times the rent, provided to be paid during the term of the lease, if Landlord has previously given notice of termination, otherwise, rent shall be the specified dollars per month.

On the last day of the Term hereof, Tenant shall peaceably and quietly surrender the Premises in the same condition as the Premises were in upon delivery of possession excepting only reasonable wear and tear, and shall surrender all keys or electronic access cards for the Premises to Landlord at the place then fixed for the payment of rent. Tenant's obligations to observe or perform this covenant shall survive the expiration or other termination of the Lease Term.

12.2 Termination by the Tenant. The Tenant shall have the right to terminate this Lease, in whole but not in part, at the end of any fiscal year of the School District, in the manner and subject to the terms specified in this Section and Section 12.3, if the governing body does not appropriate or budget moneys sufficient to pay the Rental Payments coming due in the next Fiscal Year, as determined by the School District's budget for the Fiscal Year in question. The School District may effect such termination by giving the Landlord a written notice of termination, as evidenced by a resolution of the governing body specifically determining not to provide moneys to pay Rent payments for the succeeding fiscal year, and stating the governing body's determination to terminate this Lease, and by paying to the Landlord any Rental payments and any unamortized Leasehold Improvement costs which are due and have not been paid at or before the end of its then current fiscal year. The lease rate factors in a ten year amortization of the Leasehold Improvements. The School District shall give notice not later than March 1 of its intent to terminate this Lease at the end of the fiscal year and shall notify the Landlord of any anticipated termination. If notice of termination is not given to the Landlord by March 1, this Lease shall be deemed to be renewed, and the Tenant shall appropriate money for its payment, for the succeeding fiscal year. In the event of termination of this Lease as provided in this Section, the Tenant shall surrender possession of the Premises in accordance with 12.1 within ten (10) days after the expiration of the then-current term of this Lease.

12.3 Effect of Termination Upon termination of this Lease as provided in 12.2, the Tenant shall not be responsible for the payment of any additional Rental Payments coming due with respect to succeeding fiscal years, but if the Tenant has not delivered possession of the Premises in accordance with 12.1 within ten (10) days after the termination date, the termination shall nevertheless be effective, but the Tenant shall be responsible for the payment of damages in an amount equal to the amount of the Rent payments thereafter coming due which are attributable to the number of days during which the Tenant fails to take such actions and for any other loss suffered by the Landlord as a result of the Tenant's failure to take such actions as required. The Tenant shall be required to pay over to the Landlord any moneys which it has appropriated or budgeted for the purpose of paying obligations under this Lease for any fiscal years preceding the fiscal year for which termination under Section 12.2 is effective.

13. Notices All notices, requests, demands and other communications which may or are required to be served or given hereunder (for the purposes of this Section collectively called "Notices") shall be in writing and shall be sent by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, addressed to the party to receive such Notice as follows:

14. Common Spaces. Tenant shall have access to and the use of common spaces, such as, but not limited to the building lobby and public restrooms, during normal operating hours according to the terms of such policy as it exists at the time of a request by the Tenant.

15. Condemnation.

15.1 If any substantial part of the building, property or Premises should be taken for any public or quasi-public use under any governmental law, ordinance or regulation, or by right of eminent domain, or by private purchase in lieu thereof, and the taking would prevent or materially interfere with the use of the Building or Premises for the purpose for which it is then being used, at the sole option of Landlord, this Lease shall terminate effective when the condemning authority acquires possession in the same manner as if the date of such taking were the date originally fixed in this Lease for the expiration of the Lease term.

15.2 If part of the building or Premises shall be taken by right of eminent domain, or by private purchase in lieu thereof, and this Lease is not terminated as provided in subparagraph 15.1 above, this Lease shall not terminate but the rent payable hereunder during the unexpired portion of this Lease shall be reduced to such extent, if any, as may be fair and reasonable under all of the circumstances. In such event, Landlord shall undertake to restore the building and Premises to a condition suitable for Tenant's use, as near to the condition thereof immediately prior to the taking of such improvements as is reasonably feasible under all the circumstances.

15.3 Upon any such taking or purchase, Landlord shall be entitled to receive and retain the entire award or consideration for the affected lands and improvements, subject to the rights of the holder of any mortgage of Landlord's interest in the property or the building, and Tenant shall not have nor advance any claims against Landlord or the condemning authority for the value of its property or its leasehold estate or the unexpired Lease term, or business interruption expense or any other damages arising

out of such taking or purchase; provided, the foregoing shall not be construed to preclude Tenant from seeking and recovering on its own account from the condemning authority any separate award or compensation attributable solely to the taking or purchase of Tenant's chattels or trade fixtures or attributable to Tenant's relocation expenses provided that any such separate claim by Tenant shall not reduce or adversely affect the amount of Landlord's award. If any such award made or compensation paid to either party specifically includes an award or amount for the other, the party first receiving the same shall promptly account therefore to the other.

16. Interpretation and Amendment. The terms of this Lease Agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Minnesota. The parties agree that no assent, express or implied, by the Tenant or the Landlord to any breach of any of the covenants or agreements contained herein shall be deemed or taken to be a waiver of any succeeding breach of such covenant.

This Agreement is binding upon the parties hereto and their successors in interest and it contains the complete agreement of the parties. This Agreement can only be amended in writing signed by both parties.

1. Board Policy and Regulations 706 and 706-R – “Fund Balance” – First Reading

In February 2009, Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) issued GASB Statement No. 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions, which is effective for the Wayzata School District’s fiscal year-ended June 30, 2011. This accounting standard creates new classifications for fund balance based on a new focus on the constraints placed on the use of current fund balance and also redefines governmental fund type definitions. Implementation of GASB 54 by the District is required for the first fiscal year ending June 30, 2011.

The attached Policy 706 reflects the changes to the original fund balance policy to make it in compliance with GASB 54 and the Minnesota Office of the State Auditor’s pronouncement. Regulations 706 –R have been reviewed and no changes have been made.

FUND BALANCE

POLICY: 706

~~Fluctuation in revenue and certain expenditures is beyond the control of the District and can place the financial stability of the District at risk. To protect the District's fiscal integrity, the annual budget planning and implementation shall provide for the maintenance of an operating fund balance at fiscal year end equal to a minimum of 5% to 7% of the previous year's expenditures for the General Fund. The General Fund reserve amount will be increased to compensate for any negative balances in the Food Service Fund, and/or Community Service Fund.~~

Purpose

The Board recognizes that the maintenance of a fund balance is essential to the preservation of the financial integrity of the district and is fiscally advantageous for both the district and the taxpayer. Unassigned fund balance is an important measure of economic stability and thus, it is essential that the district maintain adequate levels of unassigned fund balance to mitigate financial risk that can occur from unforeseen revenue fluctuations, unanticipated expenditures, and similar circumstances. The fund balance also provides cash flow liquidity for the school district's general operations. This policy establishes goals and provides guidance concerning the desired level of year-end fund balance to be maintained by the district.

Definitions

A fund balance is a measurement of available financial resources and is the difference between total assets and total liabilities in each of the district's governmental funds.

It is the policy of the district to comply with provisions of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). GASB Statement No. 54, *Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions*, distinguishes fund balance classifications based on the relative strength of the constraints that control the purposes for which specific amounts can be spent. Beginning with the most binding constraints, fund balance amounts will be reported in the following five classifications:

- 1) **Non-spendable fund balance** - amounts that cannot be spent because they are either not in spendable form or legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.
- 2) **Restricted fund balance** - amounts limited by external parties or legislation whereby constraints have been placed on the use of the resources.
- 3) **Committed fund balance** - amounts that are committed for specific purposes by formal action of the school board. Amounts classified as "committed" cannot be used for any other purpose unless the school board removes or

changes the limitation by taking the same form of action it employed to previously impose the limitation. The action to commit fund balances must occur prior to year end; however, actual amounts can be determined in the subsequent period.

- 4) **Assigned fund balance** - amounts that are intended by the school district to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor limited, should be reported as assigned fund balance. Intent should be expressed by the school board, Superintendent, or Executive Director of Finance and Business Services in accordance with this policy. The district is not allowed to assign balances that result in a residual deficit.
- 5) **Unassigned fund balance** - includes any remaining amounts after applying the above definitions (amounts not classified as non-spendable, restricted, committed or assigned).

Minimum Unassigned Fund Balance

The district will maintain a minimum unassigned General Fund balance of 5% to 7% of the previous year's expenditures. The General Fund minimum unassigned balance will be increased to compensate for any negative balances in the Food Service Fund and/or Community Service Fund.

If the unassigned fund balance falls below the minimum balance, the district administration will notify the board and present a plan to restore the fund balance to the acceptable level.

Order of Resource Use

If resources from more than one fund balance classification could be spent, the school district will strive to spend resources from fund balance classifications in the following order (first to last): restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned.

Committing Fund Balance

A majority vote of the school board is required to commit a fund balance to a specific purpose and subsequently to remove or change any constraint so adopted by the board.

Assigning Fund Balance

The school board, by majority vote, may assign fund balances to be used for specific purposes when appropriate. The board also delegates the power to assign fund balances to the Superintendent and the Executive Director of Finance and Business Services. Assignments so made shall be reported to the school board on an annual basis, either separately or as part of ongoing reporting by the assigning party, if other than the school board.

An appropriation of an existing fund balance to eliminate a projected budgetary deficit in the subsequent year's budget in an amount no greater than the projected

excess of expected expenditures over expected revenues satisfies the criteria to be classified as an assignment of fund balance.

Review

The school board will conduct an annual review of the sufficiency of the minimum unassigned general fund balance level.

FUND BALANCE

REGULATIONS: 706-R

To implement Policy 706 and protect the District's fiscal integrity against revenue and expenditure fluctuations, the Administration has set the following objectives for the maintenance of an operating fund reserve:

1. Annually review revenues and expenditures to ensure maintenance of at least a 5% to 7% reserve in the General Fund, increasing the reserve to compensate for any negative balances in the Food Service and/or Community Service Funds.
2. Monitor abatements, proration of State aids, and legislation that affect K-12 education funding.
3. Utilize one-time, nonrenewable revenue as a source of funds for the reserve.
4. Continue efforts to maintain and improve the District's rating by a national rating service.

1. Approval of Proposed School District Calendar - 2012-2013

The Calendar Committee, which includes representatives from Teaching and Learning, each school site, early childhood, and a parent/community member, recommends approval of the attached calendar for school year 2012-2013.

When constructing a school calendar, many issues have to be considered. It is important to balance, as closely as possible, the number of days among the quarters and between semesters. We have to consider testing and conferencing schedules, and quarter breaks in a manner that reflects sound educational practice.

The committee has to manipulate the length of winter break, the timing of spring break, and the last day of classes for students and staff so that we have 172 student contact days and 184 teacher workdays. The committee met several times in November and December to develop the calendar. The teaching staff voted in December indicating their support for the proposed calendar.

We have maintained our commitment to have two years of calendars available to our staff and community.

Senior **Gaurav Singh**, who placed in the top 20 last year on the national exam, was automatically qualified to take the national exam again this year without having to take the state exam.

This year's 14 Minnesota nominees are among nearly 1,000 students nationwide who took a national qualifying exam in April to select finalists. Of those, 20 students are chosen to participate in intensive chemistry training in June at the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado. The top four students from this elite group will be chosen to represent the U.S. at an international competition.
