Season Recap/Highlights

The varsity wrestling team had a successful dual meet season. The varsity team took 1st place this year at the Don Dravis Dual Meet Tournament in Staples. The wrestlers defeated Sartell/St. Stephan, Aitken, and Kimball to win the tournament. The team once again advanced to the Section 3AA semifinals. The wrestlers had a good showing at the Section 3AA individual tournament this year with 9 placewinners and four state entrants.

The program finished the year with 35 wrestlers in grades 7-12. Of those 35 there were 25 wrestlers from YME, five from RCW and five from MACCRAY. The program added a new coach from MACCRAY (Justin Franke) and having him should increase our MACCRAY numbers.

Girls Basketball End of Season Report

Girls Basketball: We finished the year at 6-18. Overall, I was pleased with many aspects in terms of what we accomplished. We overcame a major injury to Kelly Anderson. She was a captain, a floor leader, and was averaging 15.2 PPG. With her presence on the court, I believe we win a lot more games. We lost 10 games this past season where we were either ahead or behind by no more than 2 points with under 6 minutes to go in the game. The girls worked hard on the court. We learned a lot of new things....pushing the tempo, full court pressure, a 2-3 zone, new offensive schemes, new defensive pressures off the 2-3, new post and wing defensive schemes. We started to digest many of these changes towards the end of the season. I felt we were competitive outside of 3 games this entire year. We played a ton of younger girls. I believed we improved. The last 3 weeks of the year, we played some very good teams to the wire, including a 54-51 loss to BOLD, a 45-43 loss to Montevideo, a 51-50 win over LQPV, and a 61-55 tournament loss to TMB where we led with 2:20 to go. The girls played with enthusiasm and passion. Chyanne Sand may have put together one of the best single seasons of any player in YME history. She broke a single season steals record with 123 steals and fell just 4 rebounds shy of setting a single season rebounding record with 282 rebounds. Her 356 points was the 12th highest in YME history. I believe the future for girls basketball is bright. With a good summer, we will vastly improve.

Boys Basketball Board Report 2013-14

Boys Basketball

Recap:

Season Record - 4-22 (1-12 Conference)

From a record standpoint, this season did not reach my expectations. Without making excuses, we dealt with lingering injuries from the football season that played a larger impact than normal with the earlier start to the season. We lost a couple tight games early that played a big role in our confidence early in the year.

Highlights:

I feel we improved throughout the season. From a team stats perspective, by the end of the year we were committing nearly 10 less turnovers per game and scoring about 8 more points per game. We finished the year on a high note beating a solid Benson team 90-66 (2 points away from setting a school record) and getting a playoff victory over LQPV on a buzzer beating shot.

Concerns:

1. Mr. Knapper and I clearly laid out a plan in regards to how the communication process between parents and coaches should be handled. I would like to thank Mr. Knapper and a couple of the board members who expressed their support. No different than in the classroom, I want everyone of our kids to be as successful as possible. We are going through a tough stretch in terms of wins and losses right now, but with your support I feel we have a great plan to develop our kids.

2. Mr. Knapper and I have met regarding finding creative ways to use our facilities to their maximum potential. At this point in time, we are probably a gym short to serve every grade level (including our elementary kids). My goal is to get our K-6 kids hands on a basketball more often, but we face a many barriers with even getting them time together at a reasonable time under quality instruction.

With that said, I feel any concerns regarding the boys basketball program at this time are being taken care of adequately between Mr. Knapper and our coaching staff. There is no magic bullet that will turn things around...just hard work and dedication from our coaches, players and families involved in athletics.

We had 4 dancers named to the All Tournament Team at the State Tournament. Annie Refsland and Sadie Miller in High Kick and Morgan Svobodny and Danielle Weir in Jazz.

The team also received the Team Academic Award from MADT for having a team cumulative GPA higher than 3.3.

We scored very well this season with both dances. Our scores in jazz were similar to last year, our high kick scores were some of the highest scores we have ever received.

All 3 of our JV teams also had a very successful season. The JV coaches would be able to give more exact placements, but I know they placed well at most competitions.

We had 43 girls who danced this season and 3 managers.

Superintendent Report

- LeeAnn, Denise, and I traveled to St. Paul to receive an orientation to Springsted Incorporated and the services they provide in planning for a school referendum. Later in the meeting you will hear and see a tax comparison of YME to neighboring school districts. Should you choose to proceed with a \$3,000,000 Capital Projects Levy Referendum it will cost on average a \$100,000 homeowner an additional \$17 a year.
- Toured the New London-Spicer Greenhouse last Friday, March 7. Two YME teachers also traveled to New London after school to see the building. Preliminary discussions continue with a local contractor with a design and site location to be determined in the near future. The Bush Foundation \$100,000 grant will fund the greatest portion of this project.
- YME is a “racially isolated school district.” Minnesota legislation has added Achievement to the Integration program. Along with activities to integrate minorities with neighboring school districts (Lakeview, Dawson-Boyd, Canby, Minneota, and Renville County West) an emphasis is now on closing the achievement gap within the free and reduced demographic subgroup. Goals and activities are being finalized with approval of the \$100,000 budget needing to be completed at the April 14 Board Meeting.

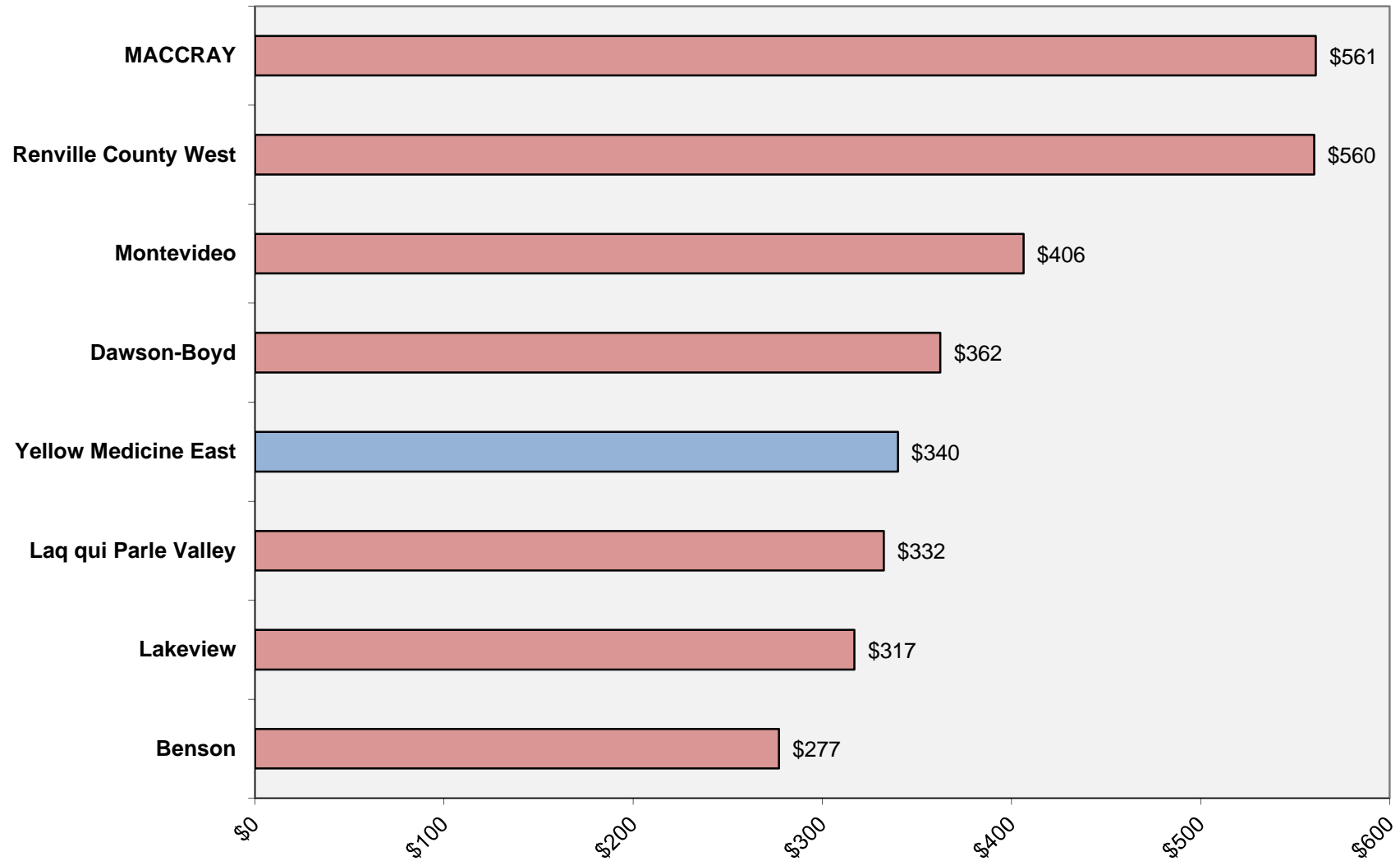

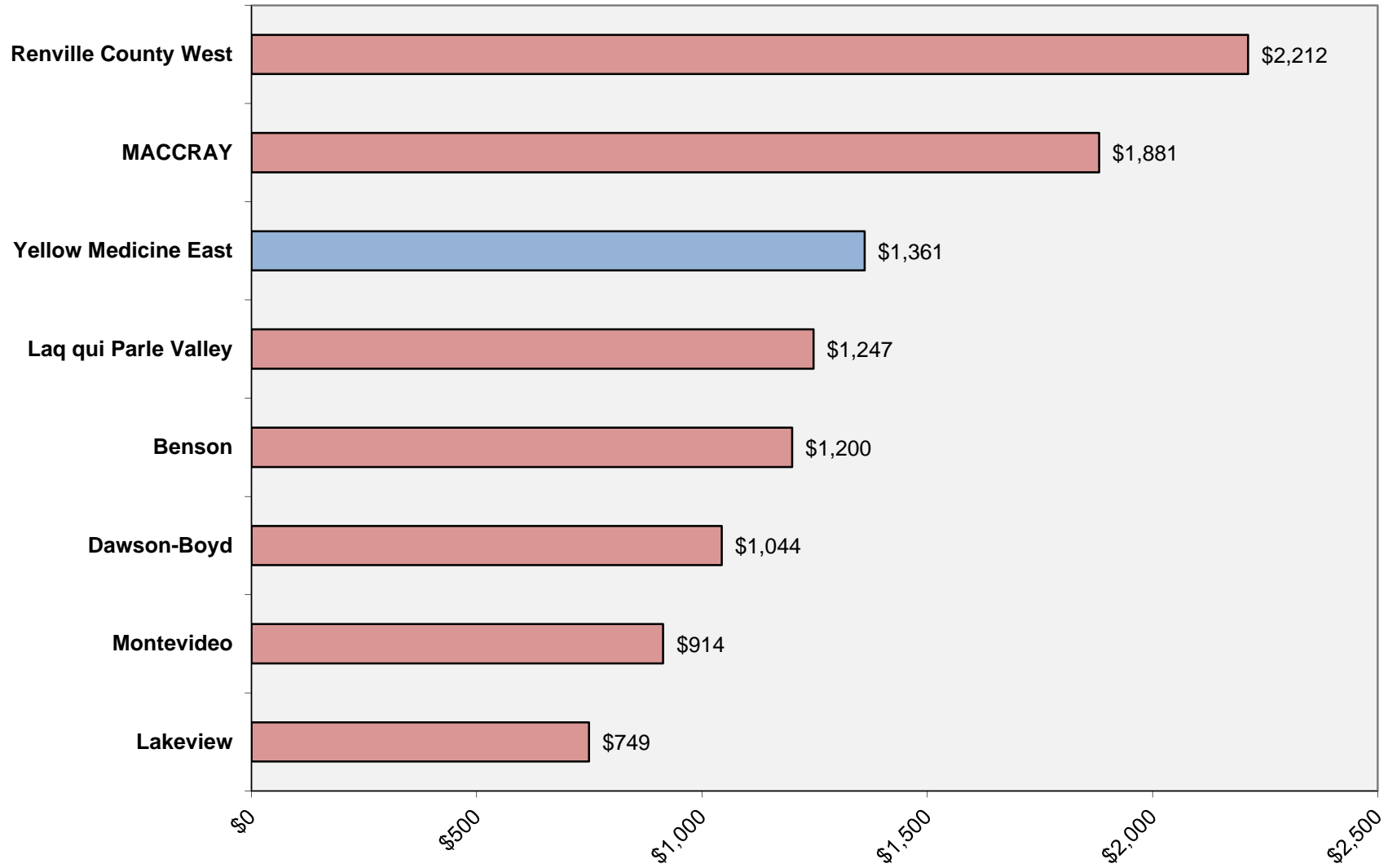
