Mr. Klein introduced the finalists from the Dr. Robert H. Brown Middle School 5th Grade Declamation contest. Mr. Klein stated that he served as a judge for this contest, which was not an easy task, as the participants were all very articulate and poised. Mr. Klein reported that the Daniel Hand High School Waes Haeil Choir had recently participated in the 2008 Festivals of Music in Virginia Beach, VA and was awarded the distinction of Best Show Choir – First Place – Superior Rating, under the direction of Daniel Hand High School Choral Teacher Ron Soja. Mr. Klein further stated that groups from Daniel Hand High School won a multitude of awards at the festival, and attributed these awards to a combination of talent and hard work. He also stated that he has heard nothing but positive compliments on the way these students conducted themselves and represented their community. Daniel Hand High School Senior Emma Norris and Junior Tom Presti were recognized for their service as Board of Education Student Representatives for the 2007-2008 school year. Mr. Klein and Chairman Hale commended and thanked them for their contributions and presented each of them with a token gift of thanks. Ms. Norris was wished well as she heads off to college in September.

**4.6. Recognition: *Kate Robertson, Walter C. Polson Middle School Social Studies Teacher*
Partnership with Taian #6 Middle School in Shandong Province, China**

Ms. Anita Rutlin, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment introduced Walter C. Polson Middle School Social Studies Teacher Kate Robertson, who recently traveled to China as part of the Madison Public Schools partnership with Taian # 6 Middle School in Shandong Province. Ms. Robertson reported that the trip had been a wonderful experience, both on a personal and professional level. She thanked the Board of Education and the Madison Public Schools for allowing her to make the trip, and said it would be a fantastic experience for any teacher or student who had the opportunity to go.

**4.7. Recognition: *Paul Curran, Daniel Hand High School World Languages Teacher*
Recipient of Fulbright Foundation Award to Non-Native Teachers of Chinese for six weeks of study in China**

Ms. Rutlin next introduced Paul Curran, World Languages Teacher from Daniel Hand High School. Ms. Rutlin explained that when the partnership with Taian #6 began, there were many visitors from China to Daniel Hand High School and Mr. Curran acted as the translator. He decided to pursue his teaching certification, and is completing his first year as the Mandarin teacher at Daniel Hand. He recently applied for the Fulbright Foundation Award, which is bestowed upon non-native teachers of Chinese and quickly found out he was one of ten teachers from the United States who was accepted for this prestigious award. He will travel to China for six weeks of study this summer.

Mr. Curran stated that he is very much looking forward to the trip. The program covers nearly all expenses and offers top notch instruction. Mr. Curran explained that the studies will be intense, in that one day of class will be equivalent to roughly one week of study in American university. He is looking forward to the trip and improving his ability to speak Chinese and become a better teacher.

Mr. Curran was presented with a Certificate of Recognition signed by Mr. Klein and Chairman Hale, and wished well for his travels.

4.8. Public Participation

Mr. Rick Flanders of 553 Durham Road asked the Board whether any decisions had been reached on the budget reductions that will be made. Chairman Hale read the recommended list of reductions (attached) and stated that the Board would be voting to approve the reductions during the business portion of the meeting.

5. Board of Education Student Representatives' Report

Ms. Norris and Mr. Presti gave their final report for the year.

Mr. Presti gave an update on athletics. The girls' tennis teams are the runners up in States. Boys and girls lacrosse teams are doing well; the boys are playing in the quarter semi finals today and the girls won the SCC's. Lastly, the baseball team is playing in the state semi-finals tonight.

Ms. Frey reported that the boys' lacrosse team had won their game.

Mr. Presti reported that the orchestra concert was held on May 29th, and it was the final performance for graduating seniors.

Mr. Presti reported that the National Honor Society inductions were held on May 28th. There were a large number of juniors inducted who demonstrated excellence in academics, service and leadership.

Finally, Mr. Presti reported that the Underclassmen Awards Ceremony will be held on Friday, June 6th.

Ms. Norris reported that on May 21st, many Daniel Hand High School students were given an opportunity to share their musical talents at the Night of Songs. The program was a great success enjoyed by all, and a good deal of money was raised to benefit the ABC House.

Ms. Norris next reported that the past two days have seen Walters C. Polson Middle School Grade 8 students touring Daniel Hand High School in preparation for next year. They were introduced to the school's Mission Statement and had a question and answer session with Daniel Hand student leaders. Ms. Norris was one of the student leaders and stated that it was a great experience to help the 8th graders begin their initiation to high school.

Finally, Ms. Norris reported that the Senior Prom was a great success, as was the Senior Outing at Holiday Hill. Senior exams will begin on the 11th; and on June 17th there is a brunch for Seniors to say their last goodbyes before graduation on the 18th.

Mr. Presti stated that this would be the final meeting for Ms. Norris as a Board of Education Student Representative. The Board thanked both students for their efforts and contributions, and once again wished Ms. Norris well in her future endeavors.

6. Superintendent's Report

6.1. Enrollment Report

Mr. Klein, and Mr. Arthur Sickle, Director of Administrative Services, presented an enrollment report via a Power Point Presentation (on file) that they prepared for the Board based on ADS (Applied Data Systems) projections.

A lengthy discussion ensued regarding the reliability of the ADS projections based on one, three and five year data. Some of the points raised were:

- ADS one year projections are highly reliable (generally within 2% + or - of actual);
- ADS five year projections are less reliable (tend to be over by as much as 12%)
- Kindergarten and Grade 1 are the most difficult to project;
- The most accurate projections are in Grades 9-12;
- Total district enrollment is on a downward trend
- There are other factors that need to be considered such as real estate sales and economic conditions.

Chairman Hale asked when the next study was due from the state on enrollments. Mr. Klein replied that will happen in the fall.

Ms. Mona Goodman, Principal of J. Milton Jeffery Elementary School asked how ADS reconciles their projections. Mr. Sickle responded that they use current data annually in October.

Atty. Sellers asked if the ADS average overestimation of 6-12% (for five year projections) is consistent in other districts. Mr. Klein did not have that information, but said he would find it out.

Discussions will continue, but one point that everyone agreed on was that predicting the future was no easy task.

6.2. Elementary School Day Overview

As requested by the Board, the Elementary Administrators presented an overview of a typical elementary school day, via a Power Point presentation (on file).

Ms. Mona Goodman thanked the Board for the opportunity to present information regarding the elementary schedules, and proceeded to walk the Board through the typical school day at each grade level. Included in the presentation was a copy of the floor plans for each elementary school with notations showing what each space is used for throughout the day. A lengthy discussion ensued and some of the points made by the administrators for their specific buildings were:

- Ms. Kathy Nutley, Principal of Island Avenue Elementary School, pointed out that the Music and Art rooms are used throughout the day for breakout reading and math groups, as well as the 15 specials classes held each week.
- Ms. Goodman stated that the ‘specials’ rooms at Jeffrey are also used for other purposes, and are even more heavily used because they house the kindergarten program.
- Dr. Paul Sinicrope, Principal of Kathleen H. Ryerson Elementary School showed an overview of the period of 9:00 to 9:40 a.m. each day and what is going on in each space during that time. He said there are generally 11 group activities going on in the building outside of the core classrooms – primarily in the hallways. Dr. Sinicrope also stated that the Occupational Therapy room at Ryerson is really no more than a closet, but it is used all day, every day.

The administrators were all in agreement that they are using every available space during every part of the day, which results in children being distracted and raises the possibility of confidentiality issues being compromised because people are constantly moving through the buildings.

Discussion continued with Ms. Coffey commenting on how space requirements have changed over the years because of the inclusion model and that makes a huge difference in the demands the district places on its buildings.

Ms. Gowanlock commented on how the block scheduling has impacted space requirements, and that both positive and negative results stem from that. Mr. Klein stated that discussions regarding the daily schedules will take place shortly. He stated that all initiatives that have been implemented in the past should be evaluated to determine their usefulness.

Dr. Sinicrope stated that another effect of the space shortage is that teachers who do not have a dedicated space also have to move their supplies on carts from space to space.

Mr. Clorite stated that he had reviewed some analysis on building efficiencies; a new building would be used at 80% efficiencies, while ours are being used at well over 100%.

Ms. Frey asked where teachers who do not have their own room store their supplies, and the administrators explained that they have, by necessity, become very creative in their buildings as far as storage.

Mr. Klein thanked the elementary administrators for preparing this report in such a timely manner.

Ms. Frey echoed Mr. Klein’s thanks and stated that it is very important for the Board to get a good handle on how our facilities are being used.

Ms. Frey also asked that copies of the floor plans be provided to the Board in larger versions, and Mr. Klein stated that they will be provided with the same notations.

Ms. Coffey asked that the Pre-K programs be included as well. All were in agreement that all programs should be included.

7. Board Member Comments

Chairman Hale distributed handouts from the State Department of Education that he recently got while attending a conference on secondary school reform (on file). He reported that there have been many changes since the inception of the reform movement. Madison has adopted some of the initiatives and will comply with all requirements.

8. Reports from Board Committees / Liaisons

8.1. Planning Committee

Ms. Frey reported that the committee had met last Thursday with the focus of the discussion on the elementary facilities. There was a presentation on energy efficiency and Bill McMinn, Director of Facilities explained how grant monies were invested toward improved efficiency.

8.1.1. Island Avenue School Building Committee

Mr. Clorite reported that the project has not yet begun but everything is looking positive for the project to be on schedule and within budget.

Ms. Coffey stressed that the building will not be open to students or parents for the summer while the work is being done.

8.2 Personnel Committee

Ms. Coffey reported that the Committee will meet with the health insurance consultants tomorrow in preparation of the AMA negotiations, which will begin shortly.

8.3 Policy Committee

Ms. Gowanlock asked the Board to review a First Revision Reading on the Travel and Exchange Policy which is attached / included with tonight's agenda. She explained that our current policy addresses only incoming students; the proposed revision also includes Madison students studying abroad.

8.4 Finance Committee

Ms. Coffey reported that as the current budget year draws to a close, we are still in the black. Areas are still being watched closely but we should end the year in the positive column. Ms. Coffey called the Board's attention to the attached line item transfers for substitute teachers and legal expenses. Ms. Dotty Bavin, Director of Finance stated that the necessary funds had previously been set aside for these expenses.

Ms. Coffey distributed a list of the proposed budget reductions (attached), which was to be voted on by the Board at this meeting.

Ms. Coffey then read the following statement:

"Before you today is a list of \$130,000 in budget cuts that correspond to two reductions voted this spring by the town's Board of Finance.

Together, these cuts will change the way the district next year will support the teaching of science in elementary schools; will return several budget accounts to current year's spending levels; and will reduce by \$10,000 the planned funds to replace older volumes in the library print collection.

The most substantial change from the Board's approved February budget is the elimination of the new science specialist who was to support elementary school teachers next year. Science teaching support is still critically important now that the state Connecticut Mastery Tests measure students' knowledge of lab methods and scientific principles. But the \$130,000 in cuts had to be made and other options would have impacted students more. As a result, eliminating this new position for next year is the recommendation of the administrators and the Board's Finance Committee.

Instead, the district will support elementary science teachers next year by hiring consultants who can offer professional development to improve science teaching methods and to develop model lessons. About \$30,000 of the \$72,000 that was allocated to this planned new hire will be transferred into professional and technical services to pay for the science teaching consultants while the remainder - \$39,000 – will be cut from the budget.

Also eliminated are planned increases in supplies and services accounts that were included to address price increases. Freezing spending at this year's levels means that supplies and services cost increases next year cannot be absorbed without reducing planned and scheduled purchases.

It is unfortunate that the Board and the administration were forced to make difficult choices about spending in so many accounts but I applaud the Superintendent of schools and the Administrators for develops a cuts list that strives to keep the cuts out of the classroom. We are optimistic that the creative solution to increase professional development focused on science teaching will still allow Madison's elementary school teachers the support they need to help each student master scientific principles and lab techniques.”

8.5. Community Outreach Committee

Mr. Klaskin thanked the Administration and the Finance Committee for not cutting the amount budgeted for Community Outreach for 2008-2009. Mr. Klein stated that as himself and some of the Board members are still relatively new to the district, it wasn't yet clear how to best communicate with the community. All were in agreement that the goals of the Community Outreach Committee are still important, but there may be different ways to attain those goals. The committee and the Superintendent will work together over the next year to determine the best way to proceed.

8.6. LEARN Liaison

No report.

Ms. Coffey asked that two items be listed to the agenda, and the Board agreed.
