Proposed Drug Testing Mission Statement:

In alignment with Calallen ISD's transforming mission to challenge and encourage each student to achieve academic excellence, interpersonal and technical skills and promote responsible citizenship, the intent of a district drug testing policy is to prevent, deter and detect drug use in order to promote the health and safety of students while achieving the District's mission and goals.

Proposed Goals of Drug Testing Policy:

1. To provide for the health and safety of students;
2. To maintain optimum student learning potential at all times;
3. To give students a reason to say NO;
4. To educate students about the harmful effects caused by illegal drug usage;
5. To provide help for students using drugs by offering counseling assistance and referral services as needed.

Problematic Usage

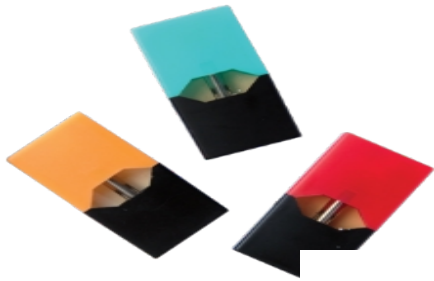
Juuling/Vaping/Marijuana/Xanax

- Vaping rates have skyrocketed in recent years, especially among teens.
- E-cigarettes /Juuls are now the most frequently used tobacco product among adolescents.
- Besides alcohol, marijuana, vaping and use of “Xanax type” drugs are most prevalent among teens.

WHAT TYPE OF TEST WILL WE USE?

SALIVA VS. URINE

Saliva

- Saliva testing has the ability to detect within a few hours of use.
- Can detect drug use in the last 1-48 hours (detection period varies by drug)
- Very convenient; easy to administer and witness
- Saliva tests measure the parent compound so it can measure exactly how impaired a person was at the time of the test.

Both are
comparable
in terms of
accuracy.



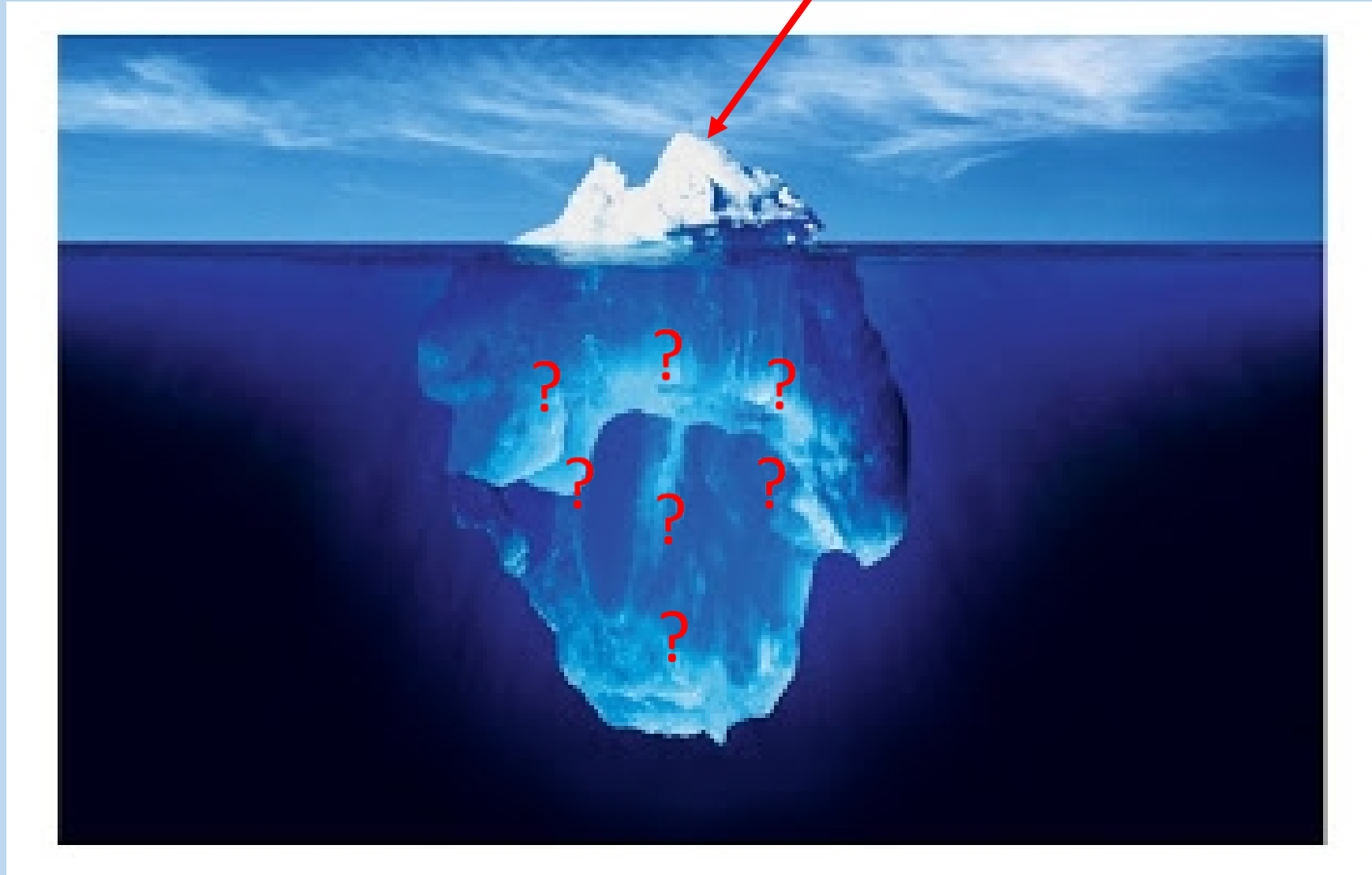
Urine

- Urine drug tests are simple and can produce rapid results.
- Urine tests only measure by-product drug compounds, and these compounds don't correlate with current impairment levels.
- Larger window of time for detection of usage

PANEL OPTIONS – WHAT SHOULD WE TEST FOR?

Panel:	Tests for:
• 5-Panel	marijuana, opiates, PCP, cocaine, and amphetamines
• 6-Panel	marijuana, opiates, cocaine, amphetamines, methamphetamines, & benzodiazepines
• 7-Panel	marijuana, opiates, PCP, cocaine, amphetamines, benzodiazepines, and barbiturates
• 8-Panel	marijuana, opiates, PCP, cocaine, amphetamines, methamphetamines, benzodiazepines, and barbiturates
• 9-Panel	marijuana, opiates, PCP, cocaine, amphetamines, methamphetamines, benzodiazepines, barbiturates, and methadone
• 10-Panel	marijuana, opiates, PCP, cocaine, amphetamines, benzodiazepines, barbiturates, methadone, methaqualone, and propoxyphene
• 12-Panel	marijuana, opiates, PCP, cocaine, amphetamines, benzodiazepines, barbiturates, methadone, methaqualone, propoxyphene, ecstasy, and oxycodone

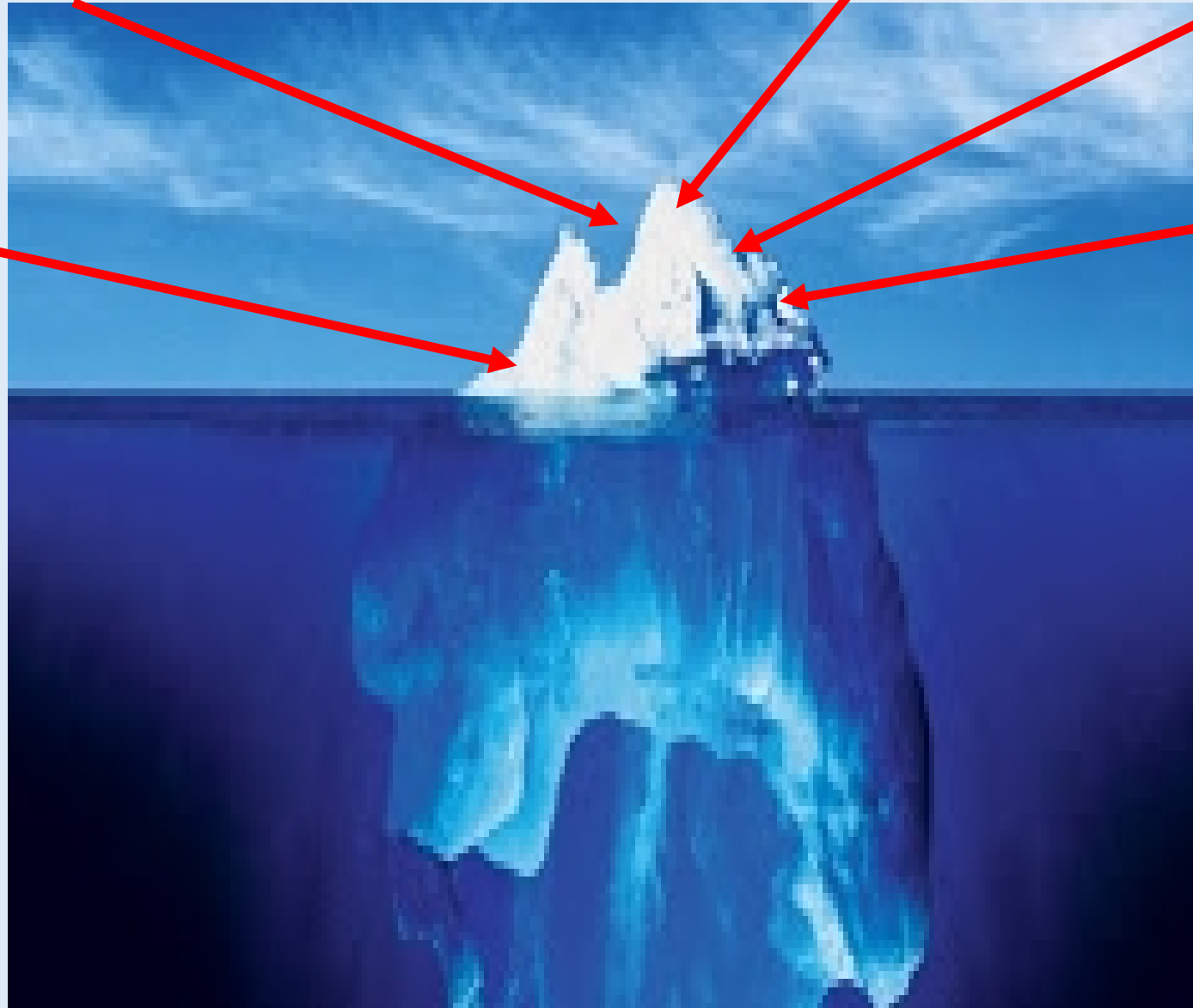

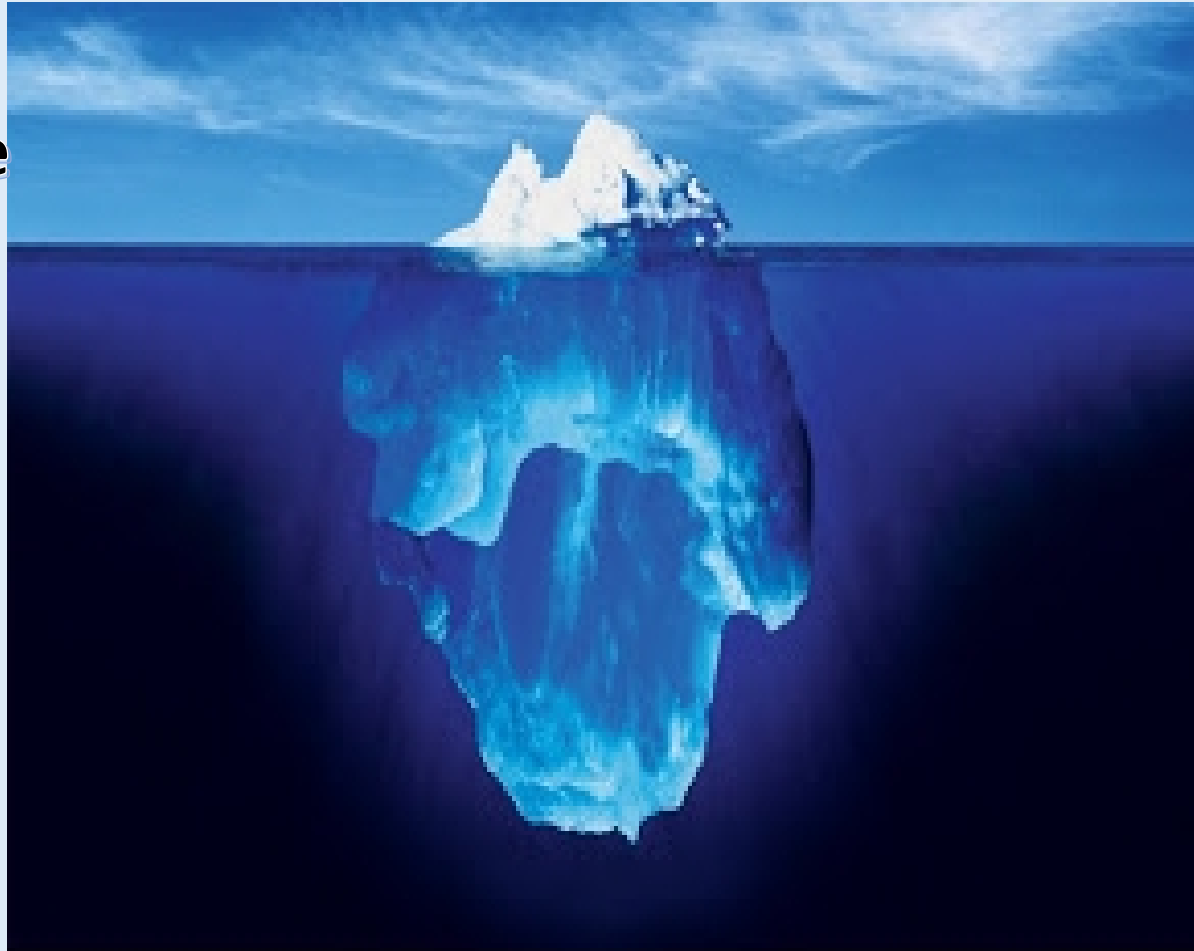

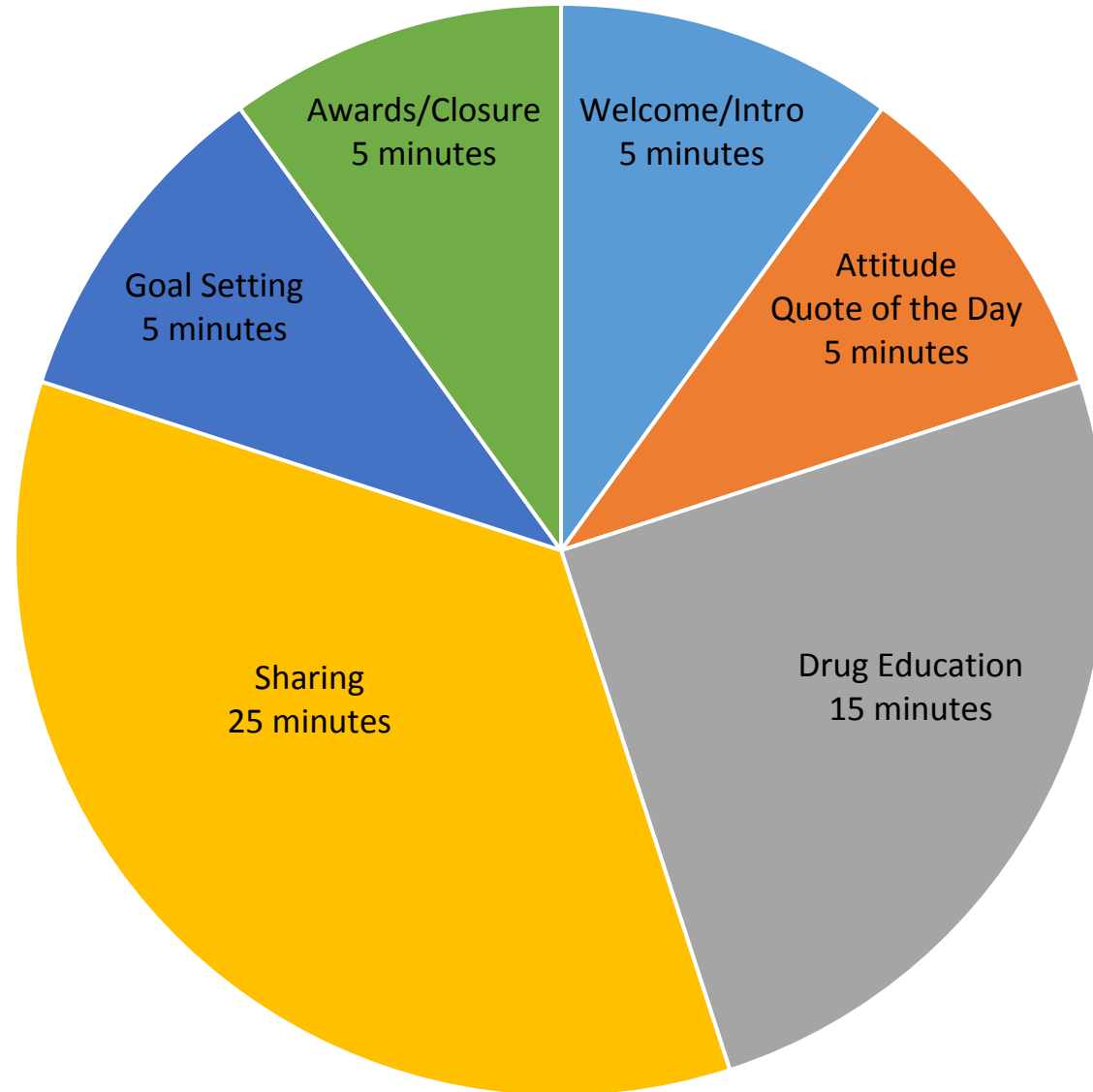
The student will be suspended from **participation and practice** in all extra-curricular activities for one (1) calendar year, and will be unable to park on school property for (1) calendar year as well.
