The regular meeting of the Bristol Board of Education was held on Wednesday, March 4, 2015 at 7:00 p.m., in the auditorium of the Board of Education Administration Building, located at 129 Church Street, Bristol, Connecticut.

CALL TO ORDER and PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

2015 SCHOLASTIC ART AWARD WINNERS

Dr. Solek thanked Lori Eschner, Art Department Chair for organizing this evening's presentation and the reception was held before this evenings meeting. She also thanked all of art teachers that were present for the fine work that they do with our students and she enjoys being able to view the work that is always at the Board of Education.

This was the 26th Annual Connecticut Regional Scholastic Art Awards this is the largest juried student art exhibition in the state. The Connecticut Regional Awards were established 1920. This National program was originated to honor the creative efforts of grade 7 to 12 students in public, private and parochial schools and it was recently opened up to private businesses, CREC schools, magnet schools . The competition is getting tougher each year. For 2015, the Connecticut Region Scholastic Awards exhibition featured select works from over 130 participating schools with art; selected from over 2,000 total entries, 665 works were on exhibit at the University of Hartford. The Bristol Public schools students earned 16 awards.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Operations - Commissioner Vibert reported that the committee met on March 2nd. They discussed a request from the City for the discontinuance of a portion of Pine Street between Evergreen and Sycamore Streets; it is called the Pine Street Terminus. The committee approved the discontinuance because it does not and will not affect students now or in the future. The committee also reviewed a request from the City's Synthetic Fields Committee to use parking spaces at the King Street entrance to Bristol Eastern High school in the event that a synthetic field is located at Page Park. Following a lengthy discussion, the committee voted to approve their request.

Student Achievement - Commissioner Dube reported that the Student Achievement Committee, met on February 18th and they voted to approve a curriculum revision for Italian I and to recommend that it be presented to the full Board for a second reading. We will hear Christina Chamberlain, Supervisor for Humanities and World Languages, briefly describe the revision tonight. The committee discussed an update of the Adult Education Certification Program, presented by supervisor Lawrence Covino. The program has been very successful program, and at this point has attracted the interest of local businessmen who have approached Mr. Covino with requests to be included in future expansion. Mr. Covino is seeking to be recognized as an “Eligible Training Facility” to qualify for federal funding and support. This program fills a significant need in our community.

Finance - Commissioner Fitzgerald reported that the committee met on Thursday, February 12th and received the budget reforecast from Gary Franzi. The current 14-15 budget is \$106.8 million the current reforecast is projected at \$107.9 million or \$1,041,747 over plan. The current reforecast for the Food Services Operation is a projected operating deficit of \$277,486. Special Education expenditures continue to be volatile and significantly impacting the overall district for 2014-2015 fiscal year. The current reforecast is \$23.9 million or 4.44% over plan. The State of CT has provided the projection for Excess Cost revenues for 2014-15; the projection is \$3,274,062 or \$674,062 over the budgeted revenue amount set by the City. This projection by the State will be finalized by May 2015. Administration has met with the City Comptroller to provide the State projection amount and to request this excess funding be provided as a supplemental appropriation from the Special Education excess cost to offset expenditures in excess of plan. The prior year reserve of \$1,026,859 will be forwarded to the current fiscal year 2014-2015 to offset certified salaries. This request was approved by the Board of Finance at the November 2014 meeting. Also, in addition to the monthly meeting, workshops were held to develop the 2015-2016 budget, which Dr. Solek will be presenting this evening.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

Nick Savino reported on Bristol Central activities. Student Advisory Council met with Dr. Solek on February 18th. The group discussed bullying in the high schools, and potential solutions will be proposed next month. Culture Night was held on February 19th, this event allowed students to explore different cultures and taste the food from different cultures at Bristol Central. To wrap up the month, we had the annual winter formal dance that was put on by Student Council. This upcoming month is busy for juniors and seniors with the college application process. For juniors, the National Honor Society will be holding its tapping ceremony on March 13th and the induction ceremony will be held on March 17th. The Interact Club will be holding its annual rotary pizza challenge on March 15th at Giammati Little League, and the money raised at the challenge will go towards a scholarship for Interact Club students. The Interact Club is also participating in the charity cycling challenge to benefit protectors of animal shelter on March 28th. Preparations have begun for Mr. BCHS, a male comedy pageant for senior boys; they will be raising money for the Bristol Boys and Girls Club. The boys have also been going around collecting money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society; the show is on April 25th. Mr. Schleer and Mr. Broderick are starting a new event called Push up for Patriots which will raise money for the Semper Fi Fund a foundation that supports wounded Marines. Mr. Schleer and Mr. Broderick will be doing 11 push-ups and running sprints for 3 minutes for 24 hours straight. Students will come out to support this cause and maybe join in. Finally the Academic Bowl will be held at the end of the month where several local high schools will participate. Commissioner Vibert requested that Nick keep the board apprised of the work that the Student Advisory Council will be doing in regards to bullying.

Sophia Dzikas reported on Bristol Eastern activities. Eight seniors in the Bristol Eastern Band were accepted into the First Chair Honor Band at UConn. With our band director Mrs. Dauphinais, we met fellow seniors, college students and UConn directors and professors. We worked with professors of our instruments and then performed two pieces for families in the afternoon after only a few hours of rehearsal. Last weekend the

International Championship of High School Acapella East Coast Semifinals were held at Bristol Eastern. Our Acapella group Strawberry Fields took second place out of the eleven groups present, and one of the soloist received the Outstanding Vocalist award. The math team has their last official meet today in Suffield. They are currently ranked third in their division and will be sending six students to represent Eastern at the State Meet in April. Bristol Eastern will be hosting their annual Music in Our Schools Month Concert next Thursday, March 12th at 7 p.m. This concert will include performances from the elementary and middle school bands in our district as well. The Annual Regional Academic bowl will be held at Lewis Mills High School on March 28th. Bristol Eastern will be represented by an Academic Bowl Team and students who will be present original poetry and compete in public speaking. There are several student activities planned this month to hopefully welcome a warm and exciting spring season. A spring fling dance is in the works for later this month and a few teachers are putting together a Shamrockin Lunch, which will include green ice cream, music and Irish dancing during the lunch periods. Our annual talent show will also be held at the end of March.

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT:

Budget Presentation

Dr. Solek presented the 2015-2016 Board of Education Budget. Following a detailed district program presentation, Dr. Solek asked Gary Franzi, Finance Director to walk Commissioners through the operating budget. The 2015-2016 proposed budget is \$110.2 million 3.3% over this years plan or 3.16% increase.

Questions followed regarding BYOD policy revisions for staff and addressing class sizes for next year.

On motion by Commissioner Fitzgerald, seconded by Commissioner Dolan it was unanimously

VOTED: That the Board of Education approve the 2015-2016 Board of Education budget in the amount of \$110,217,917 million dollars an increase of \$3,381,267 or 3.16 % over the 2014-2015 budget and to send this recommendation to the Board of Finance for further action.

Chairman Amara declared the motion **PASSED** with seven (7) Commissioners in favor of the motion and one (1) Commissioner, Commissioner Morgan opposed.

Middle School Programming Update

Dr. Solek reported that the sub-committee of the Middle School scheduling committee met last Thursday and reviewed the Superintendents' recommendations which the board reviewed last month. The committee is aware that they will be scheduling based upon those recommendations, but without compromising current offerings in terms of frequency or length of class offerings. They will be meeting again this coming Thursday and she anticipates that they will finish their work at that time, and she will bring back to the board a final outline of implementing middle school programming including as many Superintendent recommendations as possible. Finally, we are planning on implementing intrascholastic baseball and softball this spring at the middle school level.

GRANTS

2014-2015 Bilingual Education Grant

The Bilingual Education Grant award is in the amount of \$10,060.00 and will be used to offset the cost of educating Bilingual students in Bristol. This year - three schools have 20 or more identified ELL students of the same dominant language (Spanish) - Bristol Central, West Bristol and Greene Hills.

Stocker Foundation Grant

United Way Grant in Collaboration with the Bristol Community Organization

Bristol FRC's in collaboration with The Bristol Community Organization is requesting funds for an Ages & Stages Screening (ASQ) grant for the United Way funding cycle 2015-18 (3 year grant). This grant from United Way will provide Ages & Stages Screenings (ASQ) to approximately 150 children ages birth to five served by the FRCs and BCO. FRC Staff will conduct Ages & Stages screenings at the FRC and at BCO. The ASQ is designed to screen children for developmental delays during the critical first 5 years of life. The ASQ has high reliability and validity with strong evidence supporting it as an effective early detection tool. The grant total request is for \$25,000 (per year) which will be divided between the agencies as 70% to FRCs (\$17,500) and 30% (\$7,500) to BCO. United Way disburses funds to BCO as the official 501(c)3 agency partner. Upon approval of the grant, BCO will remit payment to the BOE, on a monthly basis to cover the FRC responsibilities/cost under this grant for fiscal year July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016.

Robyn Beaudoin – 53 Northmont Road Ext – addressed the board regarding 4th grade class sizes at South Side School and the effect that it has on the student's learning. She hopes that we will address this matter for next year.

Dylan Cushing – 214 Brentwood Drive – addressed the board regarding music in the middle schools. He believes that the quality of music has changed since students had to choose. He is advocating having music returned to the middle schools.

CURRICULUM REVISION

Italian I Curriculum Revision - Second Reading

Christina Chamberlain, Supervisor for Humanities and World Languages presented the Italian I Curriculum Revision for a Second Reading. The Italian I curriculum has been updated and revised to reflect changes in modern culture, the addition of Common Core Standards, and a shifting emphasis in the Connecticut World Language Frameworks. The new curriculum features increased rigor in grammatical concepts, greater emphasis on authentic speaking and learning, rich opportunities for meaningful reading and writing, and updated cultural connections.

TEXTBOOK ADOPTION

Italian Textbook Adoption - First Reading

Christina Chamberlain, Supervisor for Humanities and World Languages presented the Italian Textbook Adoption for the First Reading. A team of world language teachers has selected a new textbook for use in Italian courses. The book, *Sentieri*, presents vocabulary in meaningful contexts, allows for the practice of vocabulary and grammatical concepts through communication activities, explores cultural themes, develops reading skills in the context of unit themes, and includes online supporting materials such as an electronic textbook, videos, MP3s, and interactive activities. *Sentieri* will effectively support the Italian curriculum and its alignment to both state and national standards.

A.P. U.S. History Textbook Adoption - First Reading

Christina Chamberlain, Supervisor for Humanities and World Languages presented A.P. U.S. History Textbook Adoption for a First Reading. A team of social studies teachers has selected a new textbook for use in the AP US History course. The book, *The American Pageant: AP Edition* presents a balanced survey of U.S. History spanning Native American civilizations before European exploration to major events during President Obama's first term in office. There is a strong emphasis on preparation for the AP test, including test-taking strategies, review questions, sample document-based questions and free-response questions, and a wide range of historical texts. Supplementary texts, *Voices of Freedom: A Documentary History* (Volumes I and II), trace the development of American freedom over the last 250 years through diverse primary sources. An online book companion site provides a variety of resources to help students more deeply understand historical content.
